This has been one of the saddest two weeks of our life. We lost our youngest son David. On Sunday, Sept. 18. David suddenly fell from his chair to the floor. The Last words he ever said were "Mama, please call the ambulance". They took him to the emergency room at Elk. After several tests and etc., we were sent on to OKC. There they told us that he was in such a deep coma from the leakage of blood on his brain, that they could not offer us any hope. And on Tuesdsay,

he passed quietly away. I never knew such an outpouring of love as we have received. From the Minister's Desk:

Gene Shelburne, the minister of the Anna Street Church of Christ in Amarillo, writes a weekly article for the Amarillo Globe News. This article, which is carried in the Saturday issue of the Amarillo Globe News, usually teaches an important lesson for people who want to be disciples of Jesus.

For example, Mr. Shelburne recently wrote an article that taught a lesson that many preachers need to learn. The title of this article was "Best preachers Know When To Scold Them, When To Hold Them" and it said:--

"What kind of person do you want standing in your pulpit? I remember with shame the earliest days of my ministry. Back then, whenever I stood up behind a pulpit, I became an angry young man.

"One dear gray-haired lady, having endured months of preacher abuse, wrote to me and asked plaintively, 'Don't we ever do anything right?' I needed to hear that."

"Master pulpiteer Haddon Robinson is right. 'Much of what passes as prophetic preaching,' he says, 'is just anger-cloaked in a sermon.' Don't take me wrong. I personally would not want a minister who had forgotten how to be angry about injustice. Like Jesus

was, when he saw the house of God being used to rip-off people. Like he was when religious leaders made their rules more important that God's people."

"R. C. Sproul probably catches the right distinction when he describes pioneer preacher Jonathan Edwards' restraint in the pulpit. 'Edwards preached the wrath of God,' Sproul says, 'but he refused to preach the wrath of Edwards. God help the congregation whose minister reverses that order."

"Margarent George, in her superb novelized biography of Mary, Queen of Scots, put a memorable line into the mouth of Mary's French secretary, Claud Nau. Commenting on the cruel sternness of those early John Knox days, Nau said to the imprisoned queen, 'This world of the elect of God makes tyrants out of little men. So does ordination sometimes."

"Some of us who dare to preach are like Sir Francis Drake. Historian Will Durant said, 'His egotism was the wind of his sails.' I must confess, along with the Apostle Paul, that in my youthful zeal I persecuted the church of my Lord—every Sunday.'

"Having stood beside many a grave and waited late with frightened families in hospital corridors, Iknow now that my people come to God's house not to be whipped but to be healed. Not to receive blame but to find grace. My best reaction to their sins is not a tirade. If I want to touch the hearts of those who have gone astray, they need to see
