Stamps continuing to be good and those soon to be made good are: red stamps 25, R5 and S5 which became valid Dec. 3. Red stamps T5, U5, V5, W5 and Z5 will become good on Sunday, Dec. 31. Blue stamps X5, Y5, Z5, A2 and B2. In addition, blue stamps C2, D2, E2, F2 and G2 will become good on Jan. 1. Sugar stamp No. 34; another sugar stamp will become good on Feb. 1.

The five red stamps, each worth 10 points, will give consumers 20 more meat points during January than they have had in previous months, but Bowles said the OPA had hoped to make it six red stamps. This was decided against, however, because of smaller supplies generally, and because lard, shortening, cooking and salad oils, some veal, lamb and pork are still point-free.

A new sugar stamp will become valid February 1, and will be good for five pounds, but it will be for a three-month allotment instead of two and a half months.

The OPA also announced that gasoline ration coupons B-4, C-4 and fourth quarter T coupons will expire at midnight Dec. 31.




