1945 Agricultural **And Livestock Outlook** Is Exceptionally Good

The agricultural and livestock outlook for Wheeler county is exceptionally good for 1945, according to V. B. Hardcastle, administrative officer of Wheeler County ACA.

"Livestock around Wheeler is in excellent condition to go through the hard winter months ahead. This good outlook is due to the excess grain crops, winter pasturage and favorable weather conditions. The excess moisture has caused small grain crops to be above the average, and the wheat, barley, and rye harvest, is causing the protein feed situation to be less serious than in the recent past years," he said.

This favorable general condition will be advantageous to poultry raisers as well. The flocks around Wheeler are in fine condition, but as many birds have gone to market, they are

"While Wheeler doesn't have enough housing facilities for livestock, nor enough barns for storing feed, livestock is not expected to suffer serious losses-as they are in splendid condition to stand winter's coldest months," Hardcastle said.



Frederick C. Crawford, an Ohio business man, is one of six industrialists recently returning from a survey of the fighting fronts in Europe Speaking before an audience of businessmen, he reported that the little group came back "deeply stirred and sobered and deadly serious in our determination to make Americans understand" the necessity for giving the Army the materials it wishes without stint or question.

He mentioned the country as they had left it, where everyone read the papers and thought he knew the answers-that the war was over and people could leave tiring war jobs, without futures, for peacetime occupations. Worst of all, we were questioning military procedures and requests. And he pleaded:

'Let's cut out trying to run the home front by intuition, and give our Army staff an even break with the enemy. Let's let the professional soldier tell us what is needed to wage

These are true words, as the recent German break through proves. 




