Mrs. Lola Brown received word last Thursday night that her husband, First Sgt. Ed Brown, is missing in action since Dec. 21. Brown has been in the fighting zone on the German western front. He had written his wife and two children three days before he was reported missing.



Clyde Fillmore, formerly county attorney for Wheeler county, was reported missing at Java and later reports have told of his being a prisoner of the Japanese. Mrs. Fillmore now resides in Wichita Falls but since the couple is so well known locally, we think the article will be of much interest to Times readers. Mrs. Fillmore's sister, Mrs. Roe Green, resides in the Jowett community.)

The day was November 11th. The year was 1941. The hour was four A. M., and the last train had pulled out of Camp Bowie, carrying with it the men of the 131st Field Artillery. Armistice Day - signifying peace and the end of wars - yet our husbands and sons had just left, under sealed orders, for the West Coast. That was 1941. November 11th, 1944 2nd Battalion, are prisoners of the Japanese in Java, March, 1942.

The 36th Division was mobilized, November 25, 1940; Battery D, composed of Wichita Falls men under the command of Captain Leroy Zeigler, was mobilized and quartered in the City Auditorium, and Headquarters Battery under the command of Major Winthrop Rogers was quartered to be with her husband, Pvt. Buster in the old Bailey-Moline building in Walser, who is in the Mayo General

hard work, with the final reward of success.

Mr. Pennington was born September 29, 1867, in White County, Tennessee. He received his early schooling in Tennessee, but circumstances forced him to go to work at the early age of 11 years, at the hardest work in the world, farming, to support his widowed mother and two sisters. He worked many a day for 25c a day.

He said that many times he had plowed the ground when it was frozen over, the hard way when there were no modern implements to make farm work lighter. His bare feet would be bleeding, and almost frozen. Then at the close of the hard day's work he sat down to just a frugal meal of corn bread. Canning was not thought of in that early day, and the pantries and cellars were not stocked with canned and preserved foods as they are in this age of development He never had a holiday in his life until about twenty years ago.

He is a member of the Baptist church, a Mason, and is a good citizen. He has always been interested in good schools, churches, and good roads, and he has donated to every church and other worthy cause for the upbuilding of Wheeler. He has lived with his business, and has taken very little time for recreation or secial affairs.



The guides set up by the War Manpower Commission for Selective Servdifference between the "essential" industrial employment and that which is considered as "critical" to the war production program. Most smaller communities (excepting mining and specialized manufacturing towns) which are closely related to their agricultural areas, will find that most of the men in the affected age group fall in the category of "essential" employment when they work in such fields as the following:

Agricultural services: Commercial poultry hatcheries, seed processing, animal breeding, crop disease protection services, initial processing services of compressing, threshing, cleaning, shelling, curing and the like, 5-tfc minutes before the show is actually irrigation services, farm repair and over and starts a mad stampede to maintenance services, farm product ing and ice harvesting. No "critical" guide for agricultural services. The class of employment. In the category of "critical" em-

ployment, as it may affect the draft status of citizens of non-industrial smaller towns, is listed such work as the repair of automobiles, busses, trucks, tractors and farm equipment However, it is intended that in the category of repair services consideration be given only to individuals qualified to render all-round repair services on the types of equipment included in the essential list. Types of repair service other than the above are deemed "essential." In the field of health and welfare

services the critical classification is appliéd to physicians, surgeons, dentists, oculists, osteopaths, sanitary engineers, veterinarians engaged in farm live stock treatment, medical, dental and optical laboratories, pharmaceutical services, hospitals, nursing services and institutional care Into the "essential" class go mort-In the forestry and lumbering fields
