Voters to Make Decision In Near Future

The Wheeler City Council voted Monday to add to the next ballot a proposal to fund economic development for the city of Wheeler, This economic development would be funded by a 1/2-cent sales tax increase.

Representatives of the Wheeler Chamber of Commerce and Wheeler Area Activities and Improvements Council were present at the City Council meeting to support the proposal. These groups stated that improving the economy of Wheeler could bring in new families. More families in Wheeler could spread the cost of city services and could ultimately lower city taxes.

Conversely, losing jobs and families mill force the remaining families to pay a higher price for the same

level of city services. Passing the economic development measure will put Wheeler in a more competitive position with Shamrock, Canadian, Pampa, and Amarillo who already have the 1/2-cent or greater tax in place to fund their economic development projects.

Cost of the measure for the individual family will be nominal. For each \$ 1 000 spent on taxable items. the measure would only add \$5.00 to the total.

The money generated by passing this proposal could be used in several ways. Incentive or aid packages to new businesses could be developed or money could be used as matching funds to secure grants.

Radio Station Begins **Broadcasting Next Week**

A new sound will be in the air over Wheeler County during the coming week, if all goes as planned. Radio station KRMN-FM will be coming "on air" sometime during the week of the 25th, according to Jim Turvaville, the station's owner and manager.

The station will be found at 92.7 on the FM dial, and will operate with a power of 6,000 watts from their tower site 2 miles north of

Twitty. The studios and office is presently at 121 W. Texas Street in Wheeler, with offices and studios planned in Shamrock in the coming

Programming on the station will feature an adult format of music from the past 4 decades, as well as today's easy adult contemporary favorites. A heavy emphasis on local weather, news, and sports will be featured, as well as live broadcasts from local and area events. All programming will originate from the local studios, not from a satellite service, except for state and national news each hour. Agriculture related programming will also be featured from several news services around the state, as well as up-to-the-minute market reports throughout the day.

Coming on the air with the station will complete almost 2 years of work on the project, which has been a life-long ambition of Mr. Turvaville, He has been in the radio business as a technician and contract engineer for 18 years, and has operated a technical consulting business for radio stations from his offices in Wheeler for almost 8 years.

The station is owned by Turbo Radio Limited Partnership, of which Jim Turvaville is the General Partner. There are 8 other silent limited partners, most of which are from Shamrock and Wheeler, who have assisted in bringing the station project to

completion. Local residents can contact the station by calling 826-9393 in Wheeler, or 256-3838 in Shamrock. The PAX number is 26-1007. The station welcomes the opportunity to serve the community with local radio programming, and invites everyone





The hostile force was fake, the embattled countries didn't exist and the war was a nightmare no one dared hope would happen.

But for the 1,700 real-life Marines aboard the amphibious assault ship USS Peleliu, the made-up war they fought could become an instant reality in "hot-spots" around the world. If that happened, neither these young Marines nor their enemy would settle for a "satisfactory" grade in battle. Instead, the winners would be paid in land and

Marine Cpl. Russell J. Woollard, the 21-year-old son of Rick and Judy Woollard of Mobeetie, recently took part in the war game "Exercise Kernel Blitz," which pitted 12,000 Sailors and Marines on 24 ships against against a fictitious enemy. The exercise was designed to prepare the troops to face potential adversaries in the real world.

"This exercise is important because it allows different units of the Marine Corps to train together and work out as many problems as possible before deployment," said Woollard, a 1994 graduate of Wheeler High School.

During the two-week training exercise, Woollard and his fellow Marines fought the imaginary countries of "Asotria" and "San Pendleton" - actually islands along the Southern California coast. The two major objectives of the training centered on how well the Marines pulled off a massive amphibious assault, and how well the Navy professionals aboard warships delivered them to the fight.

"Joint training helps create a "less frictional" environment where Marines and Sailors can work hand-in-hand towards a common," said Wollard, a three-year Marine veteran.


Woollard, a team leader, leads the Marines of his squad during training and combat. He and other Marines understand how vital this training is because they may risk their lives in a real battle some day.
