The University awarded master's degrees to 77 graduates and bachelor's degrees to 462 graduates.

Graduates with an overall grade point average of 3.50 or higher were recognized as honor graduates and were eligible to wear gold honor cords. The three levels of recognition are Cum Laude (3.50-3.74), Magna Cum Laude (3.75-3.89) and Summa Cum Laude (3.90-4.00).

Wheeler Kindergarten Registration To Begin

Any child, who will be 5 years old on or before Sept. 1, of this year is eligible to attend kindergarten.

Registration packets for children

Registration packets for children, who will be attending Wheeler I.S.D. Kindergarten during this school year are available and may be picked up in the hall outside the superintendent's office on business days.

The required forms included in the packets are: 1. Registration form. 2. Student Health information (A two page questionnaire). 3. Home Language survey. The parent/Guardian must provide all the requested information, including full legal names, as well as, copies of the child's official birth certificate (state copy—not hospital copy), the child's social security number and the child's immunization records (authorized by doctor of official clinic), before his/her child can be paralled in school

enrolled in school.


The estimated length of time needed to finish these documents is from 15 to 30 minutes; some of the information required (for example, the date of the last dental exam or the phone number of your preferred hospital) is generally kept with other personal records at home or may even

require a call to your family doctor.

Because of these factors, coupled with the usual, unavoidable registration "traffic jam" of waiting in line to complete the enrollment process, school personnel believe some parents might prefer the option of completing these documents in the quiet and privacy of their own homes. "We're orphans," jokes guitarist, Jeff Simmons, a native of Virginia and electrician by trade. "We've been disowned by purists of more kinds of music than I ever knew existed! But that's okay," he grins, "we just do our own kind of music our way."

"That's what it's all about," adds Virginia-born mandolin player, Joe Kitts, who is twice retired (US Air Force and Railroad Repair Shop). "We play as a group—not as individuals-we draw from our different backgrounds to enhance the basic bluegrass sound." His reference to varied background may be an understatement. "I've played bluegrass all over the country from Virginia to California," says Joe. "Jim's background is primarily east coast country, Randy's a veteran of country and bluegrass throughout the southwest, and Jeff went the Nashville route—he's shared states with some of the best."

Jeff's younger brother, General Telephone retiree and bass player, Jim Simmons, (also from Virginia) agrees. "We've all been playing music for what seems like forever," he adds with a typical grin. "Of course forever' is longer for some of us than for others...take Jeff, for example—he's older than dirt!"

Council Passes Ordinances Concerning Property, Trash

The City of Wheeler is taking action to eliminate a few "eyesores" located over town and stop the removal of trash from dumpsters. An ordinance passed Monday makes it illegal to allow property "grow up" in weeds. An edition to an existing ordinance makes it illegal for an individual to remove anything from dumpsters.

Overgrown and litered property is the target of one ordinance in consideration. Weeds or brush on any city property can not be allowed to grow in excess of 10" in height. Rubbish or unsightly or unsanitary matter is not to be allowed to accumulate on the property. If the city feels the property is in violation of the ordinance, they can have the problem corrected and charge the property owner through due process of law.

There is a problem within the city with scavengers going through the dumpsters and removing whatever "catches their eye". A supplement to

PCA Will Help Continue Boll Weevil Eradication

Cotton farmers fighting the dreaded boll weevil may be breathing a little easier this week, following an agreement between three Production Credit Associations (PCAs) in the state, the Farm Credit Bank of Texas and the Texas Boll Weevil Eradicatin Foundation to provide funding for the program in several regions of Texas.

The loans, \$29.4 million, were originated by Texas PCA based in San Angelo and participated by Rolling Plains PCA in Stamford and Wichita Falls PCA. They are providing approximately \$19 million in funds to continue boll weevil eradication efforts in the Southern Rolling Plains and Winter Garden eradication zones in Texas. In addition, they are providing \$10.4 million in new funding for the program in the Centroll Rolling Plains eradication zone. The Farm Credit Bank of Texas will participate in the overlines and service the loans. which were closed at the bank's Austin, Travis County, headquarters last

"We are pleased to be able to continue financing this program, and we applaud the Texas Legislature and the many producers and others who worked diligently to ensure that boll weevil eradication efforts can continue in Texas," said Terry Dane, CEO of Texas PCA.

Breast Cancer Screening Will Be Offered Locally

The Women's Center of the Don and Sybil Harrington Cancer Center and Baptist/St. Anthony's Health System will conduct a Breast Cancer Screening Clinic at Parkview Hospital, 901 S. Sweetwater in Wheeler on August 12, 1997.

Breast cancer affects one in eight women. The key to winning the battle against cancer is early detection by having an annual Breast exam, mammogram and performing a breast self-exam each month.

Participants will receive a low-cost screening that includes a mammogram and instruction in self-examination by a registered nurse. The total cost is \$75. A minimum of fifteen comen needs to register in order for the mobile mammography clinic to come to area towns. Funding is available through the Texas Department of Health for Texas residents who qualify for assistance. All exams are done by appointment only. P.C.A. (from Page 1) April struck down parts of the law which created the Eradication Foundation in 1993, leaving seven PCAs in Texas (the Foundation's only lender) with \$37 million in credit outstanding to the program. The legislature responded by passing a bill addressing the court's concerns and validating all debt. However, the legislation limited the avenues available for collecting the \$9.8 million loan to the Lower Rio Grande Valley zone.

Boll weevil eradication efforts have been successful in Virginia, North Carolina, South Carolina, Georgia, Florida, parts of Alabama, California, Arizona and northwestern Mexico. Those area have realized increased cotton yields and 40 to 80 percent reductions in insecticide use on cotton following eradication, which generally takes three to four years.

Production Credit Associations are member-owned lending cooperatives, making short-term and intermediateterm production loans to farmers, ranchers and agribusinesses. They discout their loans through the Farm Credit Bank of Texas, which provides funds to PCAs in Texas, New Mexico and Louisiana.

Texas PCA, based in San Angelo, has offices in El Paso, Marfa and Snyder. Wichita Falls PCA provides financing through its offices in Baird, Brady, Breckenridge, Goldthwaite, Lampasas, San Saba, Seymour, Throckmorton, Vernon and Wichita Falls. Rolling Plains PCA is head-quartered in Stamford, with offices in Abilene, Childress, Matador, Munday, Spur, Canadian, Pampa, Perryton, and Wheeler.


