A recent issue of the Amarillo Globe News contained a thoughtprovoking editorial that was written by Myrne Roe, a columnist for The Wichita Eagle in Wichita, Kansas. This editorial was entitled, "Michael Is Right About Adding Sugar" and it said: ---

"John Travolta, as Michael in the movie of the same name, tells a loving, if irascible dog: "Remember, Sparky, no matter what they tell you, there is no such thing as too much sugar. "That is the gist of both the line and the sentiment."

"Michael puts copious amounts of sugar on his cereal and in his coffee. He even puts it on his French fries. When a character explains that one should eat a lemon by putting salt on it, Michael says that it is better still squeezed into a glass of water with lots of sugar added." colleague's wall "If Life Gives You Lemons, Make Lemonade" used to trigger my gag reflex. As a truism, however, the plaque-centered wisdom has grown on over the years. The tough skin of cynicism can be and often is shed as one gets older."

"That is not to say that there are no longer sour spots in life. Pain is a human condition. Nothing is gained by suggesting that all problems can be solved by simply putting on a happy face. War, poverty, crime, ignorance, biogtry cannot be eradicated by having tea parties and speaking in euphemisms."

"No, Pollyanna has never been nor probably ever will be my role model. The point is that when I was younger, I often saw the downside of everything. I ate my lemons with salt. I made too many things even that which had a possible happy aspect as negative as I could." "That's cynicism. Instead of seethe gloomy side of things." ing progress on a matter, the cynic sees only that the problem is still there. Instead of giving a pat on the back for two steps forward, the cynic proclaims it was really two forward to 10 steps backward. Instead of praising attempts to do good, the **Church of Christ** cynic demeans. There is no hope in Wheeler, Texas the cynic's soul." "They are perpetual doubters who can't make decent lemonade. Which brings me back to the movie "Michael". It's about an angel who comes to earth to bring two disparate and desperate people together. He guides them into taking a risk at love. In the meantime, he teaches by doing: He dances, hearing music everywhere. He laughs even at very bad jokes, including "What's the opposite of white? "The answer: "Yolk."

"I can't seem to get the movie out of my head for two reason: My own pessimism continues to recede as the years go by. Second, others, cynicism irks me more and more, makes me want to flee into the sunlight away from their dark thoughts and angry words."

I'm not speaking of clinical depression here, but rather of an attitude that exists among those who rely on negativity to make themselves feel intellectually superior."

"Many are old enough to know better. They are past the age of youthful posturing, demanding absolutes when there are none: "Michael" is not a movie for such folks. It has too much hope, too many examples of pleasure in simple things."

"It may seem a rare place in life for a columnist to be, especially when my job requires an occasional probing of seemingly dismal and desolate topics. But I'm trying for more sweetness. Life, as Michael can attest, is much too short and wonderful to waste on "Michael" reminds me to consider indulging in more sugar. When is a better time to do that than the beginning of a new year?

Junior age bulls calved after January 1 of 1996, have an average daily gain (ADG) of 4.14 lbs. Senior age bulls, calved between September 1 and December 31, 1995, have a 4.31 lb. ADG. At this point in the test, the 3.25 lb. weight-per-dayof-age (WDA) of these bulls is the highest in the 45 year history of the Panhandle State Testing Station. The bulls will be weighed off test February 1 and will be sold in the 45th Annual PSU Performance Tested Bull Sale, February 22, 1997.

One of Chris Allen's Simmental bulls still leads the junior age bulls with a gain of 5.31 pounds per day.

William Thomason of Thomason Herefords, Perry, OK has the top gaining senior age bull. This bull, sired by Star Mark C40, is leading all bulls on test with an ADG of 5.36 lbs. A Siminental bull of Mellema Farms. Dalhart, TX is second at 4.90 lbs. per day. Also, with an ADG of 4.90 lbs. is a Larry Weinkauf Angus bull sired by Hoff Northlander SC 6029. Another of his bulls sired by the VDAR New Trend bull is fourth at 4.75 lbs. per day.

Mellema Farms mixed pen of Simmentals and Red Angus leads the senior division with an ADG of 4.61

lbs. Larry Weinkauf's pen of four Angus is second at 4.40 lbs. per day and Thomason Herefords pen of four Herefords, all sired by Star Mark C40, is third at 4.28 lbs. per day.




