Saturday, May 3, 1997, is election day for the naming of representatives to the city councils, school boards and hospital board in Wheeler County. The City of Mobeetie and Allison and Ft. Elliott Schools have contested races, so elections will be held. Voters in Briscoe, Allison and Mobeetie will vote to reelect their representatives on the board of directors at Parkview Hospital

CITY OF MOBEETIE

The terms for the mayor and two aldermen expire on the Mobeetie City Council. Mayor Dale Corcoran has filed for re-election and is unopposed in the election.

Two places are to be filled on the city council. Place 1 is presently held by Wanda Estes. Tommy Forbes has filed to serve in Place 1 of the council.

Ray Forbes is unopposed in his quest for re-election to his Place 2 on the council.

St. Judges awards a t-shirt to each child who gets \$35.00 in pledges and a duffle bag and t-shirt to the child who gets \$75.00 in pledges. Riders may get as many sponsors as they want with each one giving a one time donation (not by the mile) and all monies are due on the day of the event. We are trying to get enough donations to give prizes for the most laps ridden in each age group. Extension Update By Joan Gray, CEA-HE

FOOD SUPPLEMENTS

Dr. Victor Herbert is adamant when it comes to diet supplements. He is a doctor at Mount Sinai Medical Center in the Bronx. He is also an attorney who believes the people who sell vitamins and other supplements are defrauding us of our hard-earned money. He calls it organized crime and refers to them as "the vitamin pushers." In a speech at Texas A&M University, Herbert also took aim at the recently passed Hatch-Richardson Dietary Supplement and Health Education Act. It prevents the Food and Drug Administration from regulating supplements such as vitamin C. Dr. Herbert says vitamin C supplements can bring on heart attacks because they increase bad cholesterol. He says vitamin E can bring out auto-immune diseases such as diabetes in people who are predisposed to those illnesses. The only two supplements Herbert recommends are folic acid and B-12 and only in combination with each other. He says folic acid alone can mask a B-12 deficiency and lead to symptoms associated with and often misdiagnosed as Alzheimer's.



From The Minister's Desk:

In his poem, Devotions Upon Emergent Occasions, the sixteenth century poet John Donne wrote some very impressive statements. He wrote: "Any man's death diminishes me, because I am involved in mankind; And therefore never seem to know for whom the bell tolls. It tolls

These words became relevant to me last Friday morning. I was diminished when I learned about the death of one man. This man was Frank "Red" Roach, a professional bird dog trainer who lived in Pampa. I first became acquainted with Frank when I was a college student and he trained bird dogs for my dad. After I graduated from college and began my ministry, I did not see him for several years. However, when I moved to Wheeler in 1985 and began my ministry with the church of Christ, I renewed my acquaintance with him.

During the last eleven years, I have trained bird dogs with him; I have hunted quail with him and I have developed a deep friendship with him. For this reason, his death has left a void in my life that will never be completely filled. However, I do have some memories of my friendship with him that I will always cherish.

It is these memories that has caused me to remember a poem that was written by an eighteenth century poet, Henry van Dyke. This poem is entitled, "A Wayfaring Song", and itsays:--

> "O who will walk a mile with me Along life's merry way? A comrade blithe and full of glee, Who dares to laugh out loud and free And let his frolic fancy play, Like a happy child, through the flowers gay That fill the field and fringe the way Where he walks a mile with me."

And who will walk a mile with me Along life's weary way? A friend whose heart has eyes to see The stars shine out o'er the darkening lea, And the quiet rest at the end o' the day---A friend who knows, and dares to say, The brave, sweet words that cheer the way Where he walks a mile with me.

Unused or Abandoned Water **Wells Are Risk At Old Homesites**

Many old homesites, farms, and ranches have unused or abandoned wells which are not properly capped or plugged. These wells serve as a major risk to health of the water of the Ogalalla Aquifer and to those who draw their drinking water from the

It remains unclear how many unused or abandoned wells dot the Texas landscape but estimates put the number above the ten thousand range. These wells provide a direct conduit for surface water and other contaminants to enter the Ogalalla Aquifer and contaminate millions of gallons of precious drinking water. One contaminated well on your property can not only ruin your drinking water but the water of others for miles

These open abandoned or unused wells also pose a physical threat to small children, livestock, and wildlife. Small children and animals can fall down the shaft of an open abandoned well and result in serious injury and even death. Everyone remembers the Baby Jessica saga in Midland. Fortunately thanks to the efforts of trained rescuers, she was safely rescued. Others are not always so lucky. Plugging of the well is the only sure way to prevent contaminants, children, or animals from entering the

When plugging an abandoned well, the owner must meet the minimum well code requirements for well plugging. A well owner should consult

with a registered and licensed water well driller, the local underground water conservation district or the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission (TNRCC) at 512-239-1000 for assistance. A well owner should also remove the pump, piping and any other materials that may be obstructing the well and chlorinate the well before sealing it. The entire length of the well should be sealed with slurries of cement or clay to prevent surface water, children or livestock from entering the well and to prevent contaminants from moving from one aquifer to another.

If you are not sure if an abandoned or unused well is located on your property, consult with the previous landowner, neighbors who have lived in the area for an extended period of time or look for a depression near the house, barn or livestock pens. Also check under the front porch and under old windmill sites.

By investing time and money in plugging an abandoned or unused well, a landowner can protect the health of their drinking water and that of their family members for generations to come.

For more information regarding closing an abandoned or unused well or to reduce the risk of contaminating your working water well, contact Don King of the Wheeler County office of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service for information on the TEX*A*Syst Wellhead Protection program.







