

Knowing when to surrender to disease

Dr. Dr. Gott: I have been diagnosed with metastatic cancer of the lung and have received chemotherapy with no improvement. I recently heard about a program in Michigan that offers a special liquid diet and pulse patch to effect a cure. They claim a cure rate of 85 percent of 50,000 people to date. My doctor advised against the "formula" and I'm con-

fused as to what to do. Dear Reader: The scheme sounds like another get-rich scam. Anybody who can cure 85 percent of 50,000 cancer patients ought to be lionized. The fact that this organization is not in the headlines of this newspaper or on the cover to Time should provoke much healthy skepticism about such outrageous claims. Stick with your doctor. Your question prompts me to address an issue that is seldom discussed; when enough is enough. Cancer is a hideous disease in large part because there is no consistent cure for it. Sure, there have been marvelous advances, particularly the therapy of lymphoma and childhood leukemia. However, the majority of cancers are as untreatable today as they were 30 or 40 years ago. True, patients may live a few more months because of chemotherapy but there's an awful trade-off; those last few

pain and feeling like hell from the Many cancer patients are beginning to ask: Is it worth it? Do a few more weeks of life justify the pain and discomfort? When should I surrender to inevitability, give in to the disease and request that I be made a comfort-

months may be marked by constant

able as possible? These questions are difficult to answer but they must be asked. And each patient has to make his own peace. Traditionally, doctors' roles were to help patients accept death, to be comforting and supportive. Today, all too often, it seems to me, some cancer specialists play weird little games with their positions, giving this patient this and that patient that—all in the name of almighty survival, when really what is needed is caring, pain-control and help accept-

ing death. I hope your doctor is the kind of professional who can guide you through a tortuous maze of decisions. you have lung cancer that spread and did not respond to treatment: all bad, bad news. Now, with your physician's help, you can begin to examine the important resources you'll need: family, clergy, hospice and others. You'll need these resources when you say, "enough is enough" and address the issue of how you are going to die.

This is blunt talk, but in my opinion, you have to examine reality, not go off on a useless pilgrimage to Michigan. I suspect that your time to accept the inevitable is close; once you have accepted it, your confusion will evaporate. You may obtain clarity and peace.

When should a patient surrender? I don't know. I've practiced medicine

for more than 25 years and I don't know. But patients know. When I let them speak and express their hopes and fears, they know. There's no formula for this; it comes from inside. Peter Gott, M.D.




### SUMMER SNACKS

FSA Ag Credit Manager Larry Goetze is urging farmers who are interested in receiving an emergency loan to get their applications in to FSA as soon as possible. Goetze said, "We hope farmers will get their applications in early rather than waiting until near the deadline which is March 2, 1998. The longer they wait, the more chance there is for long delays in getting their checks. If the applications come in early, we can avoid backlogs and speed up the process.

FSA is a credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. It is authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recognized farmers who work at and rely on farming for a substantial part of their living. Eligibility is extended to individual farmers who are U.S. citizens and to farming partnerships, corporations or cooperatives in which U.S. citizens hold a majority interest.

Beef in a Healthy Diet We all can picture meals which we enjoy. Sizzling steaks cooking on the grill at a backyard barbecue, juicy lean hamburgers after the high school basketball game, the aroma of a pot roast as it slowly cooks on a Sunday afternoon. We recognize these meals as a delicious part of our American family gatherings. But as we enjoy these savory meals, we don't often realize that we are eating a food that is important to our health and well being. All of these tasty meals have a common denominator-BEEF.

Beef is a nutritious food, containing

quantities of essential amino acids in the form of protein. The primary job of protein is to build body tissue and to synthesize enzymes, some hormones such as insulin that regulate communications among organs and cells, and other complex substances that govern body processes. Of the 20 amino acids that make up protein, eight are considered essential, because the body cannot produce them, they must be supplied ready-made in food. Beef is one of the most available food sources of these proteins. Beef usually contains about 20% protein. Beef also contains B group vitamins, especially niacin and riboflavin. Iron, phosphorus, ash, and calcium also are present in beef. Certain beef products such as liver contain vitamins A and D. Four ounces of lean steak contain an amazing 73% of the recommended protein needed in an average woman's diet, and 95% of the important B 12 Vitamin. Since iron is another important ingredient in young adults' diets, it is notable that this lean steak contains 17% of the needed amount of this ingredient. For those with less expensive budgets, a 4 oz. lean beef patty still ranks high in nutritional value with 68% of the RDA of B12 and 52% of the protein needed in a young woman's body.
