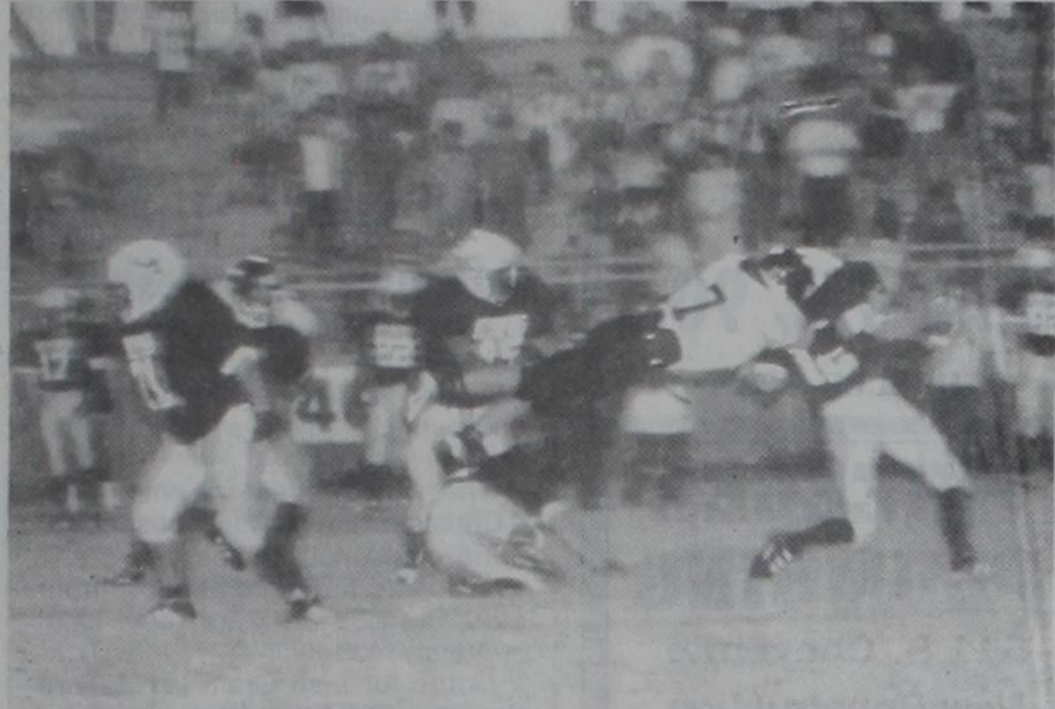

All recommendations will be considered in drafting tentative resolutions to be voted on at the annual meeting.

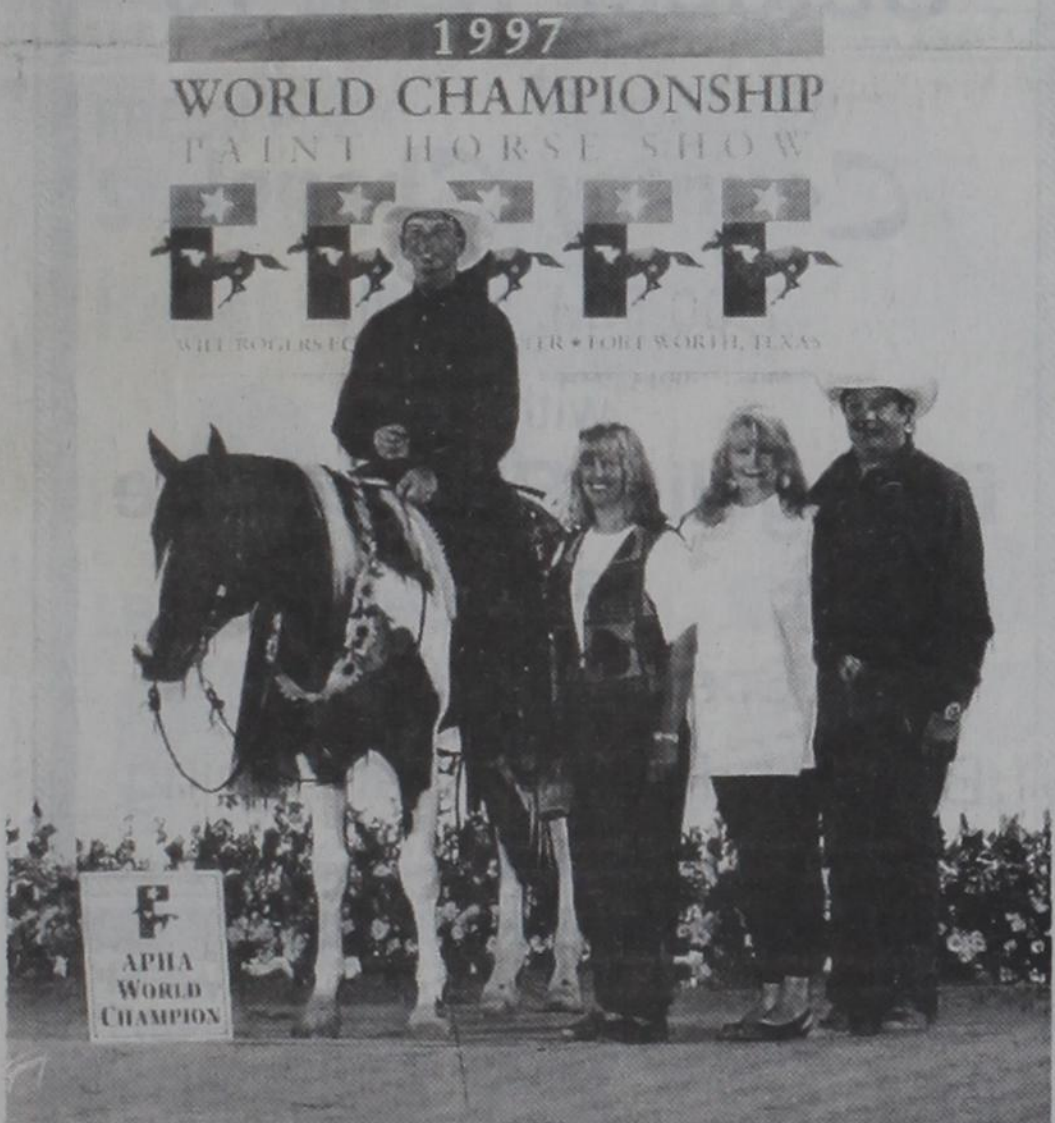
The meeting will be held at the Wheeler School cafeteria in Wheeler.

### Rives Wins Paint Horse World Championship

Billy Rives, formally of Shamrock, is the son of Marcia and Curley Rives of Twitty. He raises paint horses on his ranch just outside of Bertram has just been officially declared the winner of the 1997 American Paint Horse Association World Championship Paint Horse Cutting Futurity with his three year old stallion, Doctor Thunder. The horse was ridden and trained by Allen Rapert of Gainesville.

The 1997 APHA World Championship Paint Horse Show was held July 4-13 at the Will Rogers Equestrian Center in Fort Worth. The record setting show attracted 1,631 horses and 22,840 entries from 44 states and three Canadian provinces, Brazil and Italy. This show reported to have been the largest horse show of all time held in Fort Worth.

Rives has been breeding and training paint horses in Burnet County since the late 1970's. His stallion, Doctor Thunder, was bred and raised by Rives who also owns his sire Texans Thunder, out of world champion Long Tall Texas, as well as his dam, Doc Bars Kitty out of world champion cutting horse, Docs Tom Cat.

Doctor Thunder will stand at the 1998 breeding season at Serenity Creek Ranch, Gainesville.

His sire, Texans Thunder, will stand at Rives Ranch outside of Bertram. Foals from both Sires will be eligible for APHA Incentive Funds and most major futurists.

#### Wheeler City Council Has Sept. Business Meeting

Regular Meeting September 15, 1997

Mayor Wanda Herd called the regular meeting to order.

Barbra Koelzer made motion, seconded by Mark Frankenberg to approve minutes of last meeting as written. The motion carried.

Barbra Koelzer made motion, seconded by Don Rose to pay bills. The motion carried.

Frank Clymer met with the council on employees activities.

Charles Kuntz met with Council to discuss budget. He also recommended opening an account for the Tocker Foundation Library grant. Barbra Koelzer made a motion, seconded by Bob McCain to open this account the motion carried.

Don Rose made a motion, seconded by Mark Frankenberg to adopt an order and resolution #182 with regard to the electric tariff for grain elevators service by Southwestern Public Service Company.

Walter Simmons made motion, seconded by Don Rose to adopt ordinance #183 to order an election to be held on November 4, 1997 for voter consideration of proposition adopting additional sales and use taxes; and providing for a proclamation notice and publication of notice of said election; also to set a public hearing on same the 21st of October at 7 p.m., the motion carried.

Mark Frankenberg made a motion, seconded by Bob McCain to send a letter of support for a boot camp in Pampa, the motion carried.

Don Rose made motion, seconded by Bob McCain to adjourn, the motion carried.

Those present were: Mayor Wanda Herd. Council members: Mark Frankenberg Barbra Koelzer, Bob McCain, Don Rose, and Walter Simmons. Others present Frank Clymer, Charles Kuntz, and Wes Bradstreet.

Last Friday night the Mustangs took their show on the road attempting to do the same to the Memphis Cyclones that the Wellington Sky-rockets did to the Mustangs, spoil their homecoming.

The Mustangs won the toss and decided to receive the ball, but they were unable to move the ball and were forced to punt.

The Cyclones took advantage of the Mustangs inability to move the ball and on their first possession took the ball down the field and scored a quick touchdown to take an early 7-0 lead.

The Mustangs attempted to counter the scoring drive of the Cyclones with one of their own, taking the ball all the way down to the Memphis ten yard line. This drive was stalled by a penalty committed on the ten yard line, and then was completely halted by a fumble, giving the ball to the Cyclones.

The second quarter could in no way be described by an offensive shoot-out. Both defenses stepped up their play and didn't allow either offense to make any decent drive.

Unfortunately, with only two seconds left on the clock, the Mustang defense opened up and allowed the Cyclones to score at the end of the half on a 38 yard touchdown pass as time expired.

The Mustangs were able to block the extra point attempt and the Mustangs went into half-time trailing the Cyclones 13-0.

Anyone who was watching the game refused to believe that the Mustang team that came onto the field to start the second half was the same one they had seen go into the first half trailing, 13-0. The Mustangs kicked off to the Cyclones, but on the third down of the Cyclone's drive Kurt Boedeker, #16, intercepted a pass, setting the Mustangs up in great scoring position.

The Mustangs started their drive from the Cyclone 42 yard line and capped it off with a one yard touchdown run by Aaron Dunnam, #17. Ben Dollar, #51, kicked the extra point and made the score, Memphis 13, Wheeler 7.

On the next Memphis drive the Mustangs clamped down and forced the Cyclones to punt setting the Mustang offense on their own 47 yard line. Jeremy Davis, #35, finished off this drive nicely with a ten yard touchdown run and then Ben Dollar completed the extra point attempt giving the Mustangs a 14-13 lead, their first lead of the game!

As the fourth quarter began the Mustang defense continued to dominate just as they did throughout the third quarter. The Mustang defense held the Memphis offense completely in check and with 2:53 seconds remaining in the game the Mustangs scored their third, and final touchdown of the night on a seven yard run by Jeremy Davis. Dollar's extra point kick was wide to the right and the Mustangs took a 20-13 lead.

Once again the Mustang offense fell on the shoulders of Jeremy Davis who ran the ball 20 times for 86 yards. Aaron Dunnam had 25 carries for 90 yards and completed two passes. One was a 44 yard pass to Kurt Boedeker and the other was a 23 yard pass to #88, Kyle Masters.

At this time, I believe we should take time to reflect on the reception made by Kurt Boedeker on the 44 yard pass thrown by Aaron Dunnam. The catch and run that Kurt made on this play could only be described as awe inspiring. It should also be noticed that the extremely crucial catch made by Kyle Masters helped to set up the second Mustang touchdown.

On the night the Mustangs gained 18 first downs, 191 yards rushing, and 67 yards passing. They compiled a total of 258 yards.

The Mustangs fumbled the ball five times losing only one. They were penalized seven times for 35 yards.

The Memphis Cyclones were held to seven first downs (only two in the second half), 172 yards total offense,

with 71 rushing yards and 101 yards passing. Memphis fumbled the ball one time and lost it.

This game could be summed up as a tale of two halves. The first half saw a flat, uninspired Mustang team being run over by the Cyclones.

But, at half-time Coach Jim Verden was able to get the team ready to come out and play real Mustang football. In the second half the Mustangs did as they have so many times, and completely took over the game and came away with the win.

The Mustangs will travel to White Deer next week to take on a 4-0 White Deer team that has not been scored on all season.

#### Andy King Names To A&M Sum. Honor Roll

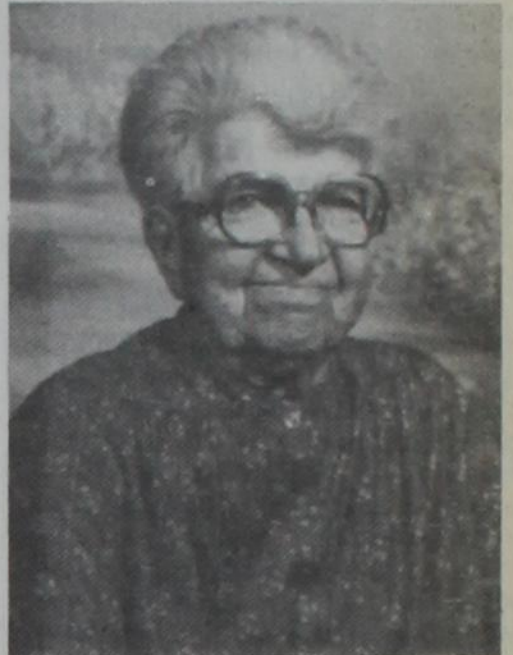
Texas A&M University has named its honor students for the 1997 summer semester, recognizing several thousand student for outstanding academic performance.

Avis May Stas was born in Latham, Kansas on July 12, 1904 to Pascal Denton and Mary Ellen (Rhoads) Tilley. She moved to Geary, Oklahoma with her parents in 1909, and graduated from Geary High School. She married Eugene Charles Stas, November 23, 1924 in El Reno, Oklahoma. Eugene passed away December 2, 1972.

She was a homemaker and an active participant in the family farming operations in Blaine and Canadian Counties. **HOSPICE AWARENESS**

**GETTING STARTED: VISITING PATIENTS AND FAMILIES**

Volunteers who will be visiting patients and families may wonder:

What will I say? Will they like me? Will I really be able to help? What will I do?

These questions are natural. Some of our volunteers have worked with sick people for years, but even they tell how hard it is to enter the life of a stranger who is in the midst of facing or coping with death.

There are no magic rules that can take away your anxieties. Take comfort from the fact that your reactions are normal- and expected. Just remember at these times that you have been selected to serve as a Hospice volunteer and team member because people experienced in the field have confidence in you.

Just plunge in, taking with you an attitude of openness and receptivity to the needs of the patient/family to whom you have been assigned. They will let you know what they need and

you, in turn will let them know what you can offer. The relationship unfolds itself step-by-step in a very natural way.

Here are some suggestions and guidelines that will help.

1. Be yourself. Aside from modifications in behavior to assure the comfort of the patient (quietness, less talking and more listening, conscious attentiveness, etc.), you should relate with the same personality you display in any other situation.

People appreciate being treated naturally, and in this way are reassured that illness or death has not set them apart any more than in the obvious ways. Try to relate to your patient according to what she/he would be like without the illness.

One of the most common complaints of the terminally ill is that they are treated as children or as if they were outside their control. Your role is that of helper and supporter, not expert or authority. You are not expected to know all the answers.

It does not take long to clarify for the family that medical and technical questions can be best answered by the nurse and physician and that you are there to facilitate this communication and to provide other, less technical support. This role definition comes about most easily when you feel comfortable from the beginning just being yourself.

2. The primary responsibility of a volunteer is to develop a helping relationship with the patient/family. Being a helper, however, does not imply being a counselor, psychiatrist, nurse or minister.

Being a helper to your family implies warmth and sincerity in a one-to-one relationship that conveys a feeling of esteem and genuine concern for fellow human beings. Relationships like this do not form overnight, but develop with each encounter. Do not allow yourself to be discouraged because your expectations are too high.

3. "Meet them where they are". This means terms of their own values and life patterns. Regardless of how much you may disagree with a family's way of dealing with their situation, it is never appropriate to give unsolicited advice.

Patterns of interaction between family members, no matter how counter-productive they may seem to you, have been formed over years of association and are rooted in a history of which you are not a part. Your responsibility is to work as helpfully and harmoniously as possible within the given structure, not to try to change it.

4. Your first visit is likely to be rather stiff and formal. Both you and your patient/family will be unsure of your roles. Plan on a short stay during which you will exchange pleasantries and basic biographical information.

Subsequent visits should not be unplanned random affairs, but scheduled on a regular basis, as appropriate. Many volunteers with active or bereavement assignments find it works best to determine a specific and consistent contact time each week, or as appropriate. That will enable your hospice work to become a painful part of your week and it will provide a day and time for patients/families to count on hearing from you. The need for dependability cannot be stressed enough. To hospice patients/families, your promised visit or phone call may be the bright spot of an otherwise darkened day. If you are unable to visit when you have planned to do so, please call to explain.

5. It is your responsibility to state clearly to the family what you can and cannot offer in terms of time and availability. This will prevent awkward and possible painful misunderstandings at another time. It is helpful to ask the family to outline their needs and expectations at the beginning (with the stated understanding that these may change as the situation changes), and to indicate how you can help fill these needs, given your life pattern.

Never offer more than you can deliver, sometimes, a family is reluctant to have you visit. It rarely has anything to do with you, but is almost always something going on with the patient or family. Keep in touch, in a comfortable way, by calling and offering to help or just to say hello. It is essential that you call them; telling them to call you when they need you doesn't work.

6. Always remember that your function as a Hospice volunteer is to meet the needs of your patient family. Rather than your own. In most instances, this means listening more than talking.

It may mean listening to the same stories over and over again—stories that for whatever reason satisfy a need of the patient or the family member in the telling. It may mean listening non-judgementally to outbursts of anger, frustration and resentment which serve to release tension.

Remember your role as helper and supporter—you do not have to make it all better. You cannot take away the pain. The pain needs to be experienced in the patient's own way and in his/her own time.

7. Silence is fine... Sometimes not talking but sitting and letting the person know your care is the greatest gift of all.

8. With some of your patients/families, you will talk about dying. With others the subject will never be mentioned. Do not feel as if you have failed if your relationship falls within the latter category. Listen with your ears and your heart, be open and empathic and do your best to create a warm and accepting atmosphere.

Under those circumstances, if your patient/family needs to talk about dying, she/he will do it. Don't impose your need. Again, accept the patient/family where they are! To talk about death and dying does not always mean that the patient wants to talk about what it is going to be like to die.

about what it is going to be like to live the last few weeks or days. Actual dying may not even be mentioned by the patient but it takes that awareness of approaching death to allow the patient to bring the "house into order".

9. Do not initiate personal topics of conversation (i.e., sex, finances, religion). If the person whom you are visiting initiates conversation in one of these areas, try to determine the issue or concern being expressed and bring it to the attention of an appropriate team member in patient care or a bereavement care counselor in bereavement care.

10. At some point the dying person may want fewer visitors, then just one, or maybe no one. It is a gradual separation from people, life, ties, roles. This may be another good time to send a card or note rather than continuing to visit. This allows the patient to separate, but also allows your continued support and care.

11. Keep in mind the needs of the whole family. Offer to provide a meal (in a container you do not need re-

turned); take the children shopping, to a movie, to the park; spend time with the spouse of the person who is dying—be aware of family needs that you might help fill. Listen and be aware.

12. You, as a volunteer, are not immune to such feelings as denial, fear of death or depression. Keep track of your feelings and don't hesitate to seek assistance and support from fellow team members, the volunteer coordinator, or a hospice volunteer support group.

13. If you find yourself dreading visits or find yourself making excuses to stay away, don't be alarmed. Sit down and try to discover the reason for your reaction.

Talk to the volunteer coordinator or some other team member with whom you feel comfortable. If you are having too much difficulty, there is no shame in asking to be removed from an assignment Hospice patients/families are our first concern and it is far better to have them experience a change in volunteers than to be abandoned.

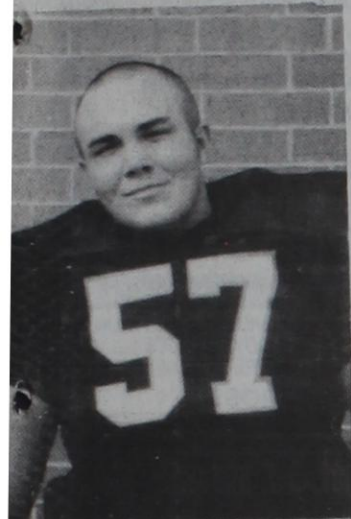

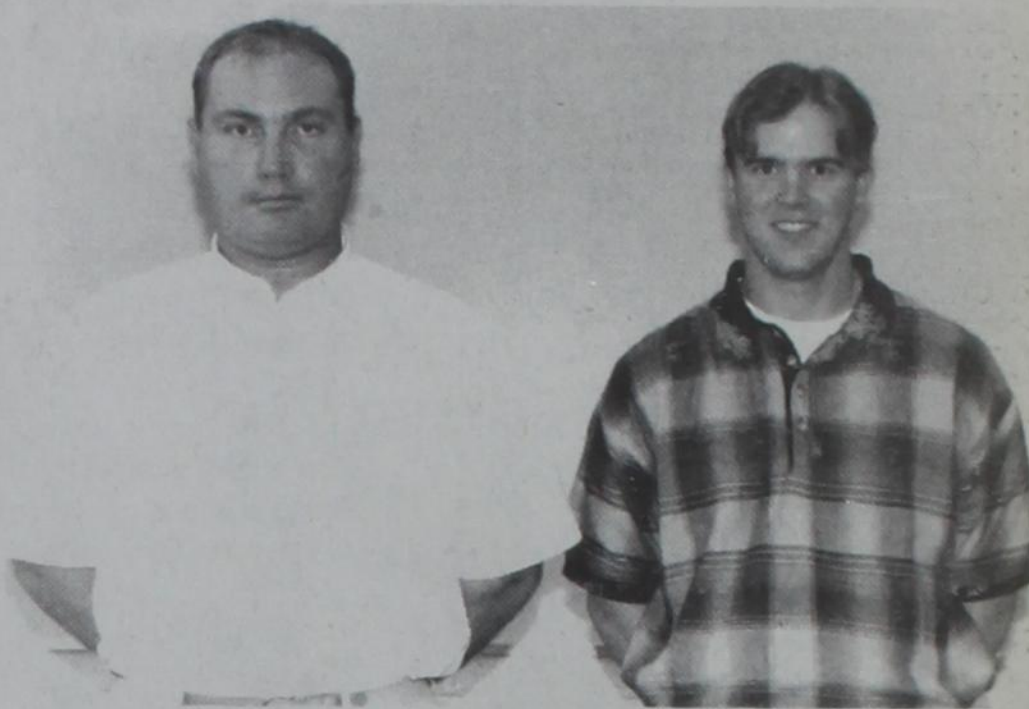
