MUSTANGS SQUEAK BY GREYHOUNDS, 14-13

Friday night the Mustangs traveled to Gruver to take on the Greyhounds in a deciding game to see who would walk away as the sole possessor of the lead in District 1-1A.

Many spectators credit the Mustangs win to the strong north wind that blew through Greyhound stadium, which prevented a potential game tying the extra point attempt to clear the crossbar of the goal post for the Greyhounds.

Gruver appeared to open the scoring for the night on a touchdown pass from quarterback, Jim Potts, to Brant Armes down the sideline. This score, however, was wiped out by an illegal procedure penalty.

But, just a few minutes later Potts completed a 27 yard touchdown pass to Buster McLain, who made an unbelievable diving catch that left fans from both sides in awe. The kick was good and the Greyhounds led the game 7-0 with 2:15 left in the first quarter.

Wheeler refused to be outdone, however, and in the second quarter the Mustangs scored on a three yard touchdown run by Jeremy Davis. The kick was good and the Mustangs trailed 6-7 with 6:17 to go in the half.

As the second quarter wound

down, the Greyhounds proceeded to drive the ball down the field and with seven seconds to go in the half they had a first and goal situation. But, the Mustang defense held strong and on a fake field goal attempt the Mustangs forced an incomplete pass and the Greyhounds came up empty handed.

As the second half opened the Mustangs came out with a little more fire under them as they took the opening kickoff down the field and scored on a four yard touchdown run by Jeremy Davis.

The Mustangs then attempted a two point conversion, which failed and they took their first lead of the game, 12-7. After the kickoff the Mustang defense shut down the Gruver offense and forced a punt. Then the Mustang offense took over where it left off and drove the ball down the field for what most fans thought would result in a Wheeler touchdown.

Unfortunately, the Mustangs fumbled the ball away on the Gruver eight yard line. The Mustang defense comes in bound and determined to keep the Gruver offense from taking advantage of this turnover and on first down they stuffed the runner for a three yard loss.

On the second down they forced an incomplete pass and then on third down the Mustangs get a tremendous rush and Gruver quarterback was flagged for intentional grounding in the end zone, which resulted in a safety. This gave the Mustangs a 14-7 lead with 9:01 left in the fourth quarter.

Gruver though, was determined to give the Mustangs a run for their money and after the safety the Grey-

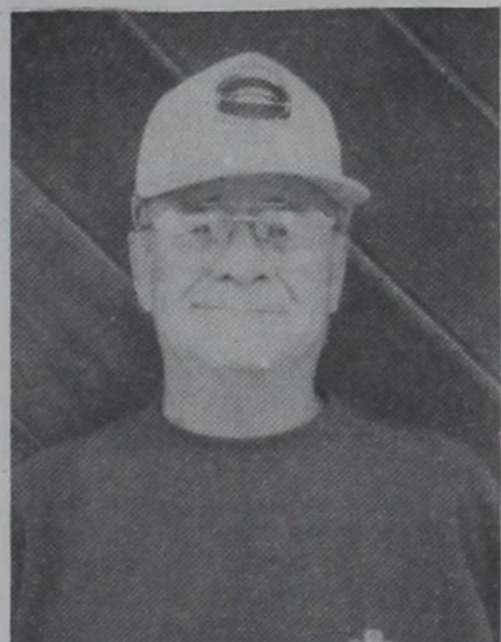

Tour Planned On Range & Pasture Management

Producers in Wheeler County and surrounding counties are invited to a Range and Pasture Management Meeting Monday, November 17, 1997. The meeting, sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service offices in Wheeler, Gray, Carson, Roberts, Hemphill and Collingsworth counties, will begin at 6:00 p.m. in the Wheeler School auditorium.

J. F. Cadenhead, Extension Range and Brush Control Specialist at Vernon, will discuss Grazing Management of Rangeland. The discussion will include estimating available forage, leaving sufficient forage on the land and grazing to maintain forage production and control weeds. Cadenhead will also review range plant identification, chemical weed and brush control and chemical safety.

Rickey Gilliland, District Supervisor with the Texas Animal Damage Control Service in Canyon, will cover the topic of Wildlife Damage Management. He will concentrate on predators such as coyotes and feral hogs.

A meal will be sponsored by the Rolling Plains Production Credit Association. Those who plan to attend are asked to contact the county Extension agent in their county no later than 5:00 p.m. Thursday, November 13th so meal arrangements can be made.

GIVE KIDS A BOOST

A booster shot means added protection for kids. Booster seats make it easier for toddlers to eat at the "big table" and car booster seats can protect kids in vehicles.

Motor vehicles crashes are the leading cause of unintentional injury-related deaths for children. Nationally, nearly 400 kids of car booster seat age die each year. In Texas last year, 25 kids between the ages of 4 and 8 died because they were unrestrained. Additionally, in that same age group, 2,892 kids were injured because they were unrestrained.

Who needs a car booster seat? Any child who is too big for a convertible car seat and too small for a small safety belt should use a car booster seat.

A booster weight-child is usually between 40-60 pounds and about 4 to 8 years old. The booster seat protects a child from serious spinal cord and internal injuries caused by incorrect safety belt fit. A lap belt should rest low over a child's hips, not on a child's tummy area. A shoulder belt rests correctly on a child's shoulder, not on the face or neck.

Many parents place their kids in the back seat and use the safety belt but as they go down the road they discover their child has unbuckled the belt and is no longer riding in a safe manner. Lucila Torres, the safety education officer with the Texas Department of Public Safety in El Paso, said, "many children cannot see from the back seat because they sit so low in the seat. Children are smart and figure out a way to unbuckle their seat belt and move to a position in the vehicle where they can see out of the windows. It would behoove parents to make the investment in a car booster seat so children can see, are content to sit in the backseat and encourage seat belt use."

When you decide the car booster seat is a good investment for your child, you need to know there are three types of car booster seats:

- "A car booster seat without a shield must be used with both lap/shoulder belts.
- "A car booster seat with a shield is used with a lap belt.
- "A high back car booster seat for a taller child (whose head rests above the seat back) will help protect against whiplash from a rear-end collision. This is good for minivans with low backs and no head restraints.

Tips for using a car booster seat:

- "To correctly install a car booster seat, read both the car booster seat instructions and the vehicle owner's manual. Never put a shoulder belt under a child's arm, and never use pillows or books to boost a child—use the car booster seat.
- "Show a child that everyone has to buckle up for a ride.
- "Make a child a "Buckle Up Deputy" and he or she can make sure that everyone in your vehicle buckles up.
- "Be firm and consistent if a child tries to unbuckle himself/herself, talk to him or her in a firm, serious voice. Show the child that you will not drive the car until everyone is buckled up.
- "Always make sure every passenger is buckled in, front seat and back seat and place children in proper child restraint system from birth.

Everyone riding in a vehicle needs to be properly restrained. The back seat of the car is the safest place to ride for children under 12 years and under.

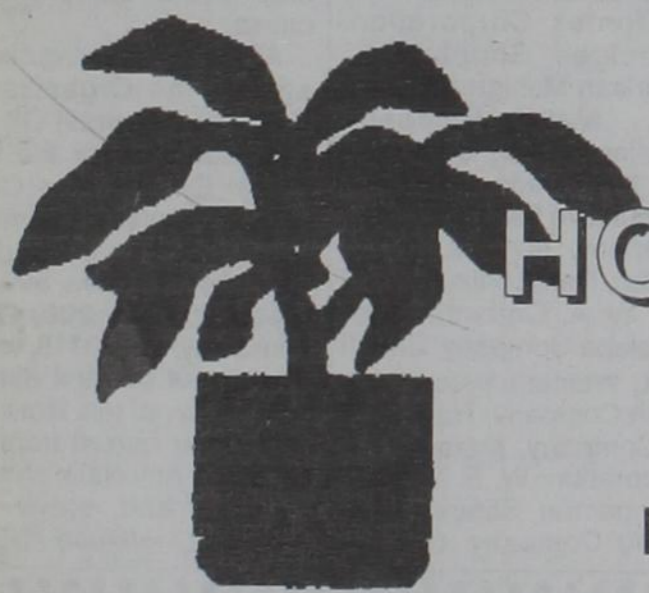

Butternut, Acorn & Spaghetti Squash



To prepare a fresh pumpkin for cooking, first slice in half crosswise, and remove the seeds (but don't discard). Put the halves, cut side down on a jellyroll pan, and bake at 325 degrees for 45 minutes or until the pumpkin is tender. When it's cool, remove the skin and mash the pulp. A 5 pound pumpkin will yield about 4 1/2 cups of cooked, mashed pulp.

And the seeds are perfect for snacking — bake them in an 8 inch square baking dish at 300 degree for 25 minutes. Or if you prefer stir in a little butter and seasoning salt for flavor before baking.

- Pumpkin Cheese Roll
- 3 large eggs
- 1 cup sugar
- 1 teaspoon soda
- 1/4 tsp. salt
- 1 tsp. lemon juice
- 2 tsp. pumpkin pie spice
- 2 2/3 cup pumpkin
- 3/4 cup flour
- 1/2 cup chopped pecans

Bake 350 degree oven 10-15 minutes in Jelly Roll pan (cookie sheet 15 x 10). Grease pan, line with wax paper and grease and flour it. Beat eggs at high speed till thick in large mixer bowl. Add sugar, soda, salt, lemon juice, spice and beat up fluffy. Add pumpkin and mix. Fold in flour and pour in pan and bake. Sift 1 to 2 Tablespoons powdered sugar on cup towel. Turn cake out on to towel immediately and remove paper carefully. Roll up with towel the long way and cool completely. Beat 8 oz. cream cheese, 1 tsp. vanilla, 1 cup powdered sugar, 1/2 stick margarine together. Unroll cake, spread filling on and roll without towel. Cover and chill. Slice and serve. May be frozen. Enjoy.

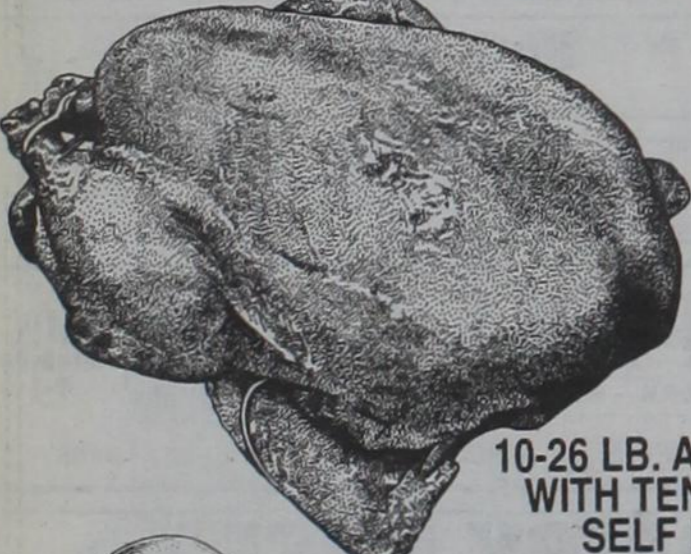

From The Minister's Desk:
 The Times of My Life is the title of the autobiography of Betty Ford, the wife of former President Gerald Ford. And in this autobiography, Mrs. Ford candidly discusses her past addiction to drugs and alcohol.

Before she received treatment for her addiction, Mrs. Ford acknowledges that she blamed other people for her addiction. But she finally came to the conclusion that she could only blame herself. She said: "In the end, what it comes down to is that you have to take responsibility for yourself. Never mind that your wife kept a dirty house or your mother didn't like you or your husband can't remember your wedding anniversary. Everyone has disappointments and anyone can rationalize his actions. But none of that matters. Blaming other people for your condition is a waste of time."

Mrs. Ford is not the first person to blame someone else for a mistake or a sin. Such a response has been popular since Adam attempted to blame Eve for his sin. (Genesis 2:1-12) It is extremely hard to say: "I have sinned." Most people rationalize their actions by saying: "I have sinned, but my sin

is not as bad as your sin" or "I have sinned, but your influence made me do it" or "I have sinned, but you would have done much worse under the circumstances." It is hard for people to simply say: "I have sinned."

This confession—"I have sinned"—is found thirteen times in the Bible. It is insincerely made three times. It is non-personally made three times. And it is made five times by people who were confronted by their sins. Yet only David and the younger son in the parable of the Prodigal candidly acknowledged their sins. (II Samuel 11-12; Luke 15:11-32)

When David acknowledged his sin, he did not blame Bathsheba or a permissive society. He simply said: "I have sinned against the Lord." (II Samuel 12:13) And the younger son did not try to blame the father or the elder son for his sin. He simply said: "Father, I have sinned against heaven and in your sight—." (Luke 15:18)

"I have sinned!" This is a hard confession to make, but it is necessary if people sincerely want to have a relationship with God.

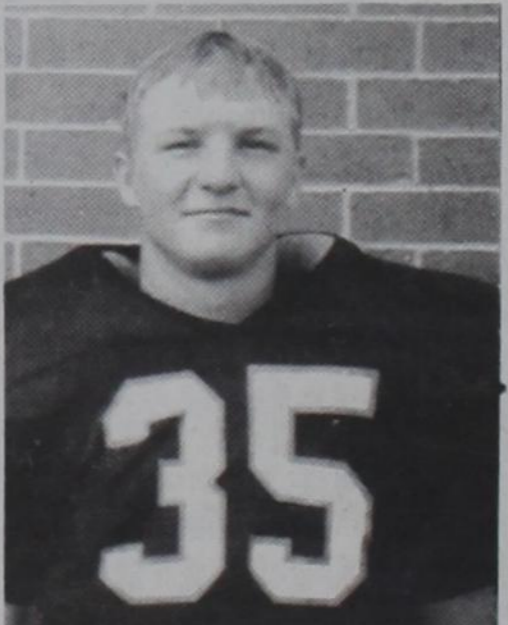
Erick's 15th Annual Honey Festival Nov. 8

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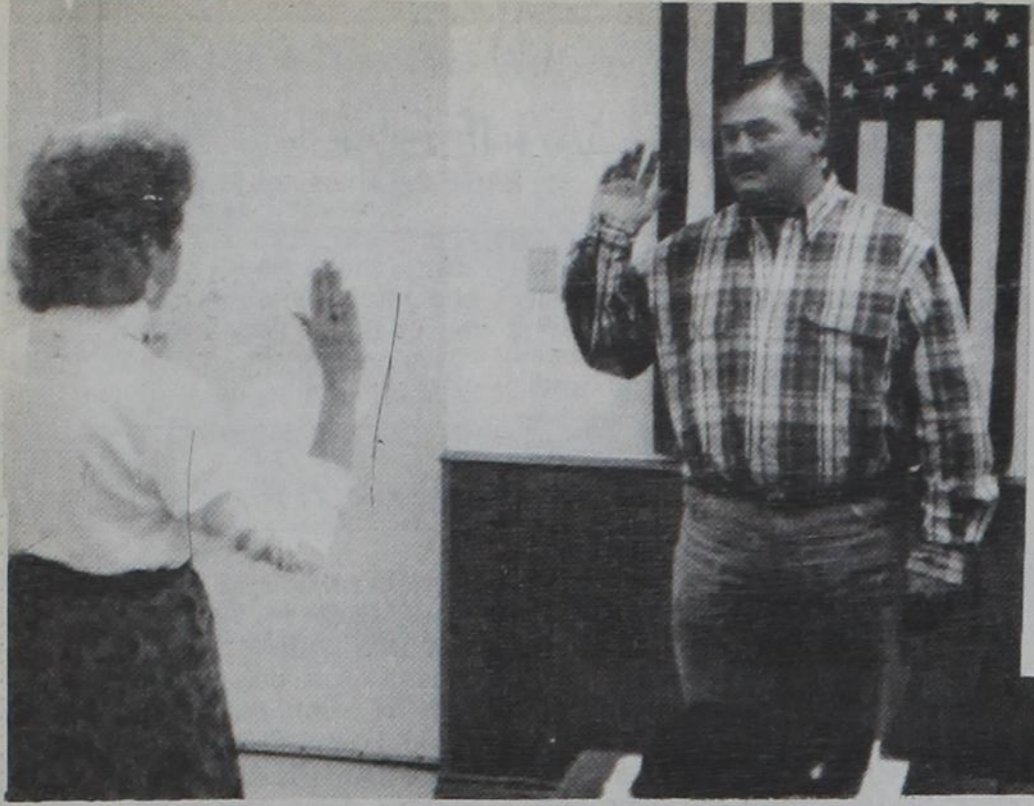

Be Cautious of Work At Home Schemes

"Assemble our products at home. Earn \$200 per week." Have you ever seen anything like this? We are going to talk about the Work at Home Schemes. Advertised opportunities to earn money by doing work in one's home are frequently nothing more than a fraudulent scheme. "No experience is necessary," while others indicate that "no investment is required." The one thing these have in common is that you must purchase something before you can start to work.

The people who are the biggest victims to these types of schemes are those who need extra money, but are not able to work outside their homes. These people are usually elderly, handicapped, mothers caring for young children, unemployed, and the people with low incomes.

The most common kind of work at home scheme is envelope stuffing. Typically, all you receive for your money are instructions to place an ad like the one you answered, which requires you to rip off your fellow citizens to make money.

Some of these schemes don't really offer work in the home, but sell ideas for setting up home businesses. Other schemes require you to raise animals. Many schemes require you to produce items, such as sewing baby booties or aprons, making Christmas wreaths or toys, or fabricating other specialty products. You are not told that there is generally little or no market for them. The promoters of such schemes are only interested in selling you something, that is, the ideas, animals, or materials you need to start your business.

Sometimes the promoters indicate "no selling is required." They promise to buy back any items you make, as long as your workmanship is "acceptable" or up to their "high standards". Of course, these promoters will reject everything you send them by telling you that your finished products do not meet their standards.

If you fall victim to a work at home scheme, immediately notify your local postmaster or the nearest postal inspector. The sooner postal inspectors become aware of such a scheme, the sooner they can prevent other people from being defrauded. Complaints may also be sent to the U.S. Postal Inspection Service, Operations Support Group-Chicago, Attn: Fraud Complaints Section, 433 West Van Buren Street, 7th Floor, Chicago, Ill 60607-5401.

On a lighter note, remember to use the Express and Priority envelopes furnished by your local Post Office. They are free and easily noticed by the Post Office.

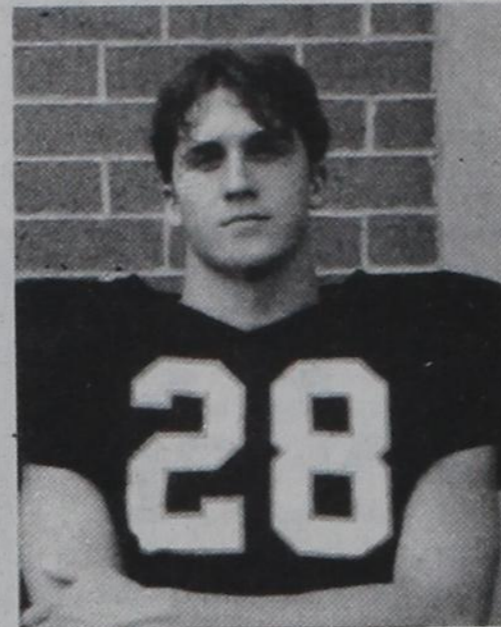

Gageby Shares Recipe for Carrot-Raisin Bars

We enjoyed these delicious carrot-raisin bars from the Happiness Book. Very nutritious also.

- CARROT-RAISIN BARS**
- 1/4 or 1/2 cup margarine
 - 1 cup white sugar
 - 1 cup brown sugar
 - 3/4 cup applesauce
 - 3 eggs
 - 1/3 cup orange juice
 - 3 cups flour
 - 1 teaspoon soda
 - 1 tsp salt
 - 2 tsp baking soda
 - 1 tsp cinnamon
 - 3 cups grated raw carrots
 - 3/4 cup raisins
- Cream margarine and sugars. Add applesauce, eggs, juice, soda, baking powder, salt, cinnamon. Mix well

and add carrots and raisins. Pour in greased and floured 1 1/2 by 15 in. pan and bake at 350 degrees for 20-25 min. Cool, then glaze with 3 to 4 tablespoons orange juice, 1 tsp margarine and 2 cups powdered sugar. Warm 3 tsp. juice with margarine till melted. Add p. sugar, adding more juice if needed. Spread thinly over bars. Instead of glaze, I made cream cheese frosting with 8 oz. cream cheese, box of p. sugar, 1 stick margarine, 1/2 tsp. each vanilla, lemon extract, and almond extract. Frost and sprinkle with nuts.

To add flavor to cooked rice, substitute chicken or beef bouillon for the water or add spices, fruit juice or orange peel.
