



Bobbye C. Hill Announces For Office of County Attorney


Bobbye C. Hill has announced her candidacy for Wheeler County Attorney to fill the two year unexpired term of Steven Emmert. Mrs. Hill graduated from Wheeler High School and the University of Texas of the Permian Basin with a BA in English Literature. Mrs. Hill taught school in Odessa, Texas and Wheeler before buying and managing B.J.'s Wearhouse in Wheeler for 8 years. In 1985, Mrs. Hill returned to school and graduated from Texas Tech School of Law in December of 1987 and was licensed to practice law in May of 1988. During law school, she worked at the Staff Judge Advocate's office at Reece Air Force Base and a title company at Lubbock, Texas. In 1988, Mrs. Hill was a briefing attorney for the Court of Appeals for the Seventh

joining a law firm in Amarillo that tocused on voting rights defense. During the next four years, Mrs. Hill concentrated on suing and defending governmental entities in the areas of redistricting and employment issues such as sexual harassment, whistle blowing, and First Amendment and 1983 violations. Mrs. Hill assisted 22 Texas Counties with reapportionment of commissioner and justice of the peace precinct boundaries based on the 1990 census as well as the precinct boundaries of cities, schools and hospital districts that have single member districts. She also counseled counties, cities, schools and hospital districts regarding the Open Meeting and Open Records Acts as well as the new rules brought about by the American With Disabilities Act, teaching mini seminars for governmental entities. Mrs. Hill's articles have been published in County Progress, a magazine dedicated to items of interest to county officials. Since 1995, Mrs. Hill has been practicing real estate, estate and probate law in Wheeler. She is licensed to practice in the state courts of Texas, the United States of America Court of Appeals for the Fifth Circuit, and the Northern and Western United States District Courts. Mrs. Hill also holds a real estate sales license and works with Wheeler Realty in Wheeler.

Mrs. Hill and her husband, Jimmy, a rancher, grew up in Wheeler. Their three children, Melissa, Chip, and Sonya, graduated from Wheeler High School and are married and live in Amarillo, Fort Worth, and Wayside, Texas, respectively. The Hills have six granddaughters and one grandson. Mrs. Hill's interest are her family, volunteering with the Mobeetie Jail Museum, grant writing for non-profits, and traveling. Over the years, Mrs. Hill has been active in Wheeler Band Boosters serving as President, Thursday Review Club, Wheeler Independent School District Board of Trustees and the Wheeler Chamber of Commerce. Mrs. Hill is a member of the Women's Financial Group of Canadian, the State Bar of Texas, and is serving as the Development Officer for the Northwest Texas Museum

like it will tear apart, it's probably too fragile for cleaning. However, it may

be soaked with no agitation in a mild

detergent. Rinse twice and lightly extract the excess water by pressing with a towel and then air dry -- do not wring. Pressing a lace table cloth is

From The Minister's Desk: While I was a student at Abilene Christian university, I had the opportunity to hear sermons by several outstanding ministers. One of these ministers was George Baily

who was the minister for the congregation that is now the University church of Christ. A characteristic of Mr. Baily's sermons was the use of epigrams.

For example, he once said: "When you spell danger, you will have spelled anger, and when you spell anger, you are only one letter short of danger. " In my judgment, this epigram is

Biblical. In the fourth chapter of Ephesians the Apostle Paul wrote: "Be angry and yet do not sin--. "(Ephesians 4:26) Anger is a Godgiven emotion, but it is also a dangerous emotion which can cause sin. For this reason, it is imperative that anger be controlled. But how?

Let me share with you an effective anti-anger technique that is found in two Biblical admonitions. These two Biblical admonitions are:

1. "A man's discretion makes him slow to anger, and it is his glory to overlook a transgression. "(Proverbs 19:11) This verse compares good sense and anger, emphasizing the wisdom of overlooking an

offense. When you are angry, talk to yourself, saying: "It is stupid to be angry. It will only get me into trouble. The momentary satisfaction of anger is not worth what I will experience as a result. "This rational procedure will slow down the reactions of your anger and

will help you rise above the provocation.

2. "This you know, my beloved brethren. But let everyone be quick to hear, slow to speak, and slow to anger; for the anger of man does not achieve the righteousness of God. "(James 1:19-20) These verses admonish us to be alert, but to always react slowly to emotional stimuli. Do not let anger make you say sharp words or make sarcastic replies. Practice the wise strategy of a delayed response.

Mr. Baily was absolutely correct when he used the epigram that said: "When you spell danger, you will have spelled anger and when you spell anger, you are only letter short of danger.

Anger is dangerous! But it can be controlled.


