Homecoming will be observed at Wheeler High School Friday, September 19, 1997. The Mustangs will meet the Wellington Skyrockets at Nicholson Field at 7:30 p.m. The 1997 Homecoming Queen and her entourage will be presented in a pre-game ceremony at 7:00 P.M.







YOUNG CHILDREN CAN EXPRESS INTELLIGENCE IN SEVEN AREAS

Early childhood professionals have always looked at the whole picture when considering children's intelligence. Psychologist Howard Gardner's Multiple Intelligence Theory reinforces the fact that there are many different ways for children to be smart. Instead of asking, "How smart is this child?" a better question may be, "How is this child smart?"

During the early years, children learn how to get along with others and meet their own needs. These factors, along with many others, contribute to children's intelligence -something far too complex to be measured by a standardized test, or even

According to Multiple Intelligence Theory, each of us possesses seven "intelligences," or ways to be smart. Some of us are more adept at using our hands; others are good at making rhymes, or singing songs. Each type of intelligence gives us something to offer to the world. What makes us unique is the way each intelligence expresses itself in our lives.

By recognizing multiple intelligences, we can help children enhance their individual strengths. But don't be too quick to label a preschooler as a future accountant, artist, or athlete without giving her a chance to explore the world, work on her skills, and develop her own abilities.

Understanding multiple intelligences means more than focusing on individual characteristics. Imagine a grown person who could do nothing but write poetry, or solve algebra problems. To do everyday things like drive a car or follow a recipe, a person needs to be smart in more ways than one

Each of us is smart in all seven ways. Here's how to recognize these multiple intelligences:

Word smart-Journalists, lawyers, and storytellers often demonstrate what Gardner refers to as linguistic intelligence. These people are best at using the written or spoken work to communicate.

Logic smart--People with a great deal of logic-mathematical intelligence are good at reasoning, and thinking in terms of cause and effect. Scientists, accountants, and computer programmers generally have this ability.

Picture smart--Otherwise known as spatial intelligence, this involves thinking in pictures or images. Such individuals may be able to follow directions best, or be able to visualize and draw accurately

ful in many aspects of life. Parents and early childhood professionals must recognize these different strengths in children as they emerge.

Some children may respond more to words, others to music--the point is for adults to let children express themselves. If children have the opportunity to learn in the areas they prefer, and to improve in those areas that are not as strong, they will grow to become intelligent in more ways than one!





## **Dryland, Irrigated Grain** Tour Planned Sept. 24

Sorghum growers looking for more options to use in their production plans next season should attend an upcoming research tour scheduled on Wednesday, Sept. 24.

Participants will need to assemble at 9 a.m. just south of the Bushland School, three-tenths of a mile south of I-40 on FM 2381. The tour will start from that point and proceed first to the Mike Menke farm. Later in the morning, the tours will move to the Texas A&M James Bush Research Farm two miles north of Bushland on FM 2381

Scientists with the USDA Agricultural Research Service, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station and Texas Agricultural Extension Service will be hosting the late season, specialized research and technology update designed especially for Panhandle area producers.

"We want to give growers the chance to look at what is being done in fields where some dryland sorghums are severely drought-stressed this year," said 0. R. "Reggie," Jones, soil scientist with USDA-ARS at Bushland.





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has been 50% of normal at the research locations this summer" he added.

According to Jones, nine sorghum hybrids in dryland production will be eatured. The sorghums were planted as early as June 4, and as late June 26. "We're also comparing two different planting rates and row spacing schemes with this group of hybrids," he said.

Field demonstrations will include briefings on weed and insect control. Dr. Brent Bean, Extension Service weed scientist will discuss what may be working to control weeds in sorghum this year. Extension entomologist, Dr. Carl Patrick will discuss seed treatment products available on the market today, including his evaluation of Gaucho.

"We're attempting to answer questions about the impacts of traditional cultural practices, primarily wheat grazing and tillage, commonly used in this area. The chief indicator is how these activities affect soil water storage," said Dr. Steve Winter, Experiment Station agronomist and co-organizer of the tour.

Winter and Jones will discuss the strategies that seem to be working this year and those that aren't based on their work with tillage methods, different sorghum hybrids, row spacing, and cropping systems including continuous sorghum.







## **PUBLIC NOTICE** BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS SPECIAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 4, 1997

#### **PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT**

Senate Joint Resolution 36 proposes a constitutional amendment to allow a person to hold the position of municipal judge in more than one municipality.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to allow a person who holds the office of municipal court judge to hold at the same time more than one civil office for which the person receives compensation."

#### **PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT**

Senate Joint Resolution 43 proposes a constitutional amendment to allow the legislature to limit the maximum annual increase in homestead appraisals for each year since the most recent tax appraisal. The amendment would also permit the legislature to allow the governing body of a school district to elect to apply the law providing for the transfer of the age-65and-older school property tax freeze to the person's new homestead, if the move to the new residence homestead occurred before the law took effect.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to authorize the Legislature to limit increases in the appraised value of residence homesteads for ad valorem taxation and to permit a school district to calculate the school property tax freeze applicable to the residence homestead of an elderly person or the surviving spouse of an elderly person in accordance with the law authorizing the transfer of the school property tax freeze to a different homestead regardless of whether that law was in effect at the time the person established the person's homestead."

#### **PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT**

Senate Joint Resolution 45 proposes a constitutional amendment to allow the legislature to authorize counties, cities, towns, and other local taxing entities to grant exemptions or other forms of ad valorem tax relief on property on which approved water conservation initiatives have been implemented.

amendment to update the Texas Constitution by deleting duplicate numbering in its provisions and removing certain of its obsolete portions.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment eliminating duplicate numbering in and certain obsolete provisions of the Texas Constitution.'

#### **PROPOSITION NO. 5 ON THE BALLOT**

Senate Joint Resolution 19 proposes an amendment to allow the Supreme Court of Texas to hold sessions at any location in this state. Currently, the court is limited to holding sessions only at Austin, the seat of state government.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the supreme court to sit to transact business at any location in this state."

#### **PROPOSITION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT**

Senate Joint Resolution 39 proposes a constitutional amendment to repeal the current provision which provides that the board of the Texas Growth Fund may not invest money in a business unless the business has disclosed to the board whether it has any direct financial investment in or with South Africa or Namibia.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment allowing the Texas growth fund to continue to invest in businesses without requiring those businesses to disclose investments in South Africa or Namibia."

#### **PROPOSITION NO. 7 ON THE BALLOT**

Senate Joint Resolution 17 proposes a constitutional amendment to create the Texas Water Development Fund II as a fund separate and distinct from the Texas Water Development Fund. The amendment would authorize the Texas Water Development Board to administer the fund and issue general obligation bonds for purposes of the fund under guidelines set forth in the amendment.

#### **PROPOSITION NO. 8 ON THE BALLOT**

House Joint Resolution 31 proposes a constitutional amendment which would authorize home equity lending, in which a loan could be secured by a lien against the borrower's homestead. The amendment would also establish several provisions providing for consumer protection in the home equity lending process.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The amendment to the Texas Constitution expanding the types of liens for home equity loans that a lender, with the homeowner's consent, may place against a homestead."

#### **PROPOSITION NO. 9 ON THE BALLOT**

House Joint Resolution 96 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the legislature to authorize a property tax of five cents for each \$100 valuation in rural fire prevention districts which are located in Harris County. The constitution currently authorizes a property tax of three cents for each \$100 valuation in rural fire prevention districts regardless of what county they are in.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to authorize an ad valorem tax rate in rural fire prevention districts located in Harris County of five cents on each \$100 of taxable value of property."

#### **PROPOSITION NO. 10 ON THE BALLOT**

Senate Joint Resolution 33 proposes a constitutional amendment to permanently dedicate monies from the Texas Crime Victims' Compensation Fund (and its auxiliary fund) so that they are used only for assisting victims of crime and not for any other purpose. If an episode of mass violence occurred, however, money from the funds could be used to assist victims of the mass violence if all other sources of authorized emergency assistance were depleted first.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment desig-

able over the last three fiscal years, excluding revenues constitutionally dedicated for purposes other than payment of state debt

The term "additional state debt" does not include bonds that, although backed by the full faith and credit of the state, are reasonably expected to be paid from revenue sources other than the general revenue fund.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment limiting the amount of state debt payable from the general revenue fund."

#### **PROPOSITION NO. 12 ON THE BALLOT**

House Joint Resolution 55 proposes a constitutional amendment to provide that if the Texas Supreme Court does not act on a motion for a rehearing within 180 days of the motion's filing, the motion is denied.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to establish a deadline for supreme court action on a motion for rehearing."

#### **PROPOSITION NO. 13 ON THE BALLOT**

House Joint Resolution 8 proposes a constitutional amendment to establish the Texas Tomorrow trust fund dedicated exclusively to the prepayment of tuition and fees for higher education. The amendment would guarantee that if there is not enough money during any fiscal year to pay the appropriate tuition and required fees, the needed money will be appropriated out of the first available money coming into the state treasury each fiscal year.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to encourage persons to plan and save for young Texans' college education, to extend the full faith and credit of the state to protect the Texas tomorrow fund of the prepaid higher education tuition program, and to establish the Texas tomorrow fund as a constitutionally protected trust fund."

House Joint Resolution 83 proposes a constitutional amendment to allow the legislature to set the official qualifications . for constables.



#### From The Minister's Desk:

The state of Missouri is located in the mid-western plain of the United States. It's nickname is the "show me, , state because its citizens have to be shown something before they will believe it.

But the people of Missouri are not the only people who have this attitude. There are some religious people who also have it. This "show me" attitude can clearly be seen by their belief that faith is not authentic if it is not created by some highly emotional experience. For this reason, these people claim to have had some experiences that are only rivaled by the six days of creation.

I would kindly suggest to these religious people that they should carefully study certain New Testament texts. These texts are the ones that record the response that Jesus made when the Pharisees asked Him to show them a sign from heaven. (Matthew 12:38-40; 16:1-4; Mark 8:11-13; Luke 11:29-32) According to these texts, Jesus refused to show them

a sign. . But why ? Jesus could have easily performed some great miracle or wonder for them to see. However, Jesus wanted their faith in Him to be the results of what He taught not they saw or experienced.

Perhaps the best example of people who possessed such an authentic faith would be the two disciples who talked with Jesus on the road to Emmanus. These two disciples were greatly confused about the death and resurrection of Jesus. To correct this confusion, Jesus did not tell them that they needed to have some emotional experience. Rather He said: "O foolish men and slow of heart to believe in all that the prophets have spoken ! Was it not necessary for the Christ to suffer these things and to enter into His glory?" (Luke 24:25-26) He then began, --with Moses and with all the prophets -- ", explaining ', -the things concerning Himself in all the Scriptures. "(Luke 24:27)

After this discussion, these disciples said: "Were not our hearts burning within us while He was speaking to us on the road, while He was explaining the Scriptures to us?" (Luke 24:32) These disciples had an emotional experience ! Their hearts had burned within them ! But this emotional experience was an outgrowth of what they had learned from the Scriptures.

It is wrong for people to have a "show me" attitude and build their faith upon the emotional experiences that they have. Rather people should expositionally study the Bible, allowing their emotional experiences to be the results of an authentic faith.
