42-7 Win Makes Wheeler 2-0 in Dist.

"Home, sweet, home!" After playing three games in a row out of town the Wheeler Mustangs were relieved to have the chance to play host for a change. Their opponents this week, the Claude Mustangs. Both Wheeler and Claude came into the game boasting 1-0 records in dis-

Wheeler started the game in fine fashion by recovering a Claude fumble. Then, Bryan Judd capped off the Mustang drive by running for a 24 yard touchdown. The extra point attempt was not good and Wheeler took a 6-0 lead.

The Wheeler defense held tough and forced the Claude offense to punt. On Wheeler's next possession, the offense moved quickly down the field and Aaron Dunnam scored on a 21 yard run.

On the two point conversion Aaron Dunnam was stacked up just short of the goal line and Wheeler took a 12-0 lead with 4:53 remaining in the first quarter. Once again the Wheeler defense held tough and forced Claude to punt. The Mustangs received the punt on their own 24 yard line, but after a few series of plays, Wheeler fumbled, giving Claude the football on the Wheeler 35 yard line.

Claude was able to take advantage

On the Mustangs very next play from scrimmage Bryan Judd rambled 67 yards for a touchdown. Then, Bryan capped off the two point conversion and gave Wheeler a commanding 20-7 lead.

The Mustang defense held the Claude offense to a three-and-out, and forced a punt. Unfortunately, the Mustangs had their drive stopped by a fumble on the Claude 24 yard line.

The Mustangs defense shut Claude down once again and gave the offense one more chance to score before half-time. Unfortunately the Mustangs could only get to the Claude 13 yard line before time ran

In the second half it became obvious that the Wheeler defense was just more than the Claude offense could handle as the defense only gave up 98 yards in the second half.

In the game the Wheeler Mustangs compiled 23 first downs, 666 yards rushing, and zero yards passing. The Mustangs fumbled the ball three times and lost two. They had six penalties for 60 yards.

Bryan Judd led the Mustangs rushing attack with 249 yards on 14 carries and three touchdowns.

Jeremy Davis added 201 yards on 17 carries, and Aaron Dunnam had 176 yards on 12 carries and three touchdowns.

The Mustang defense was led by Josh Lee, who had five tackles and Caleb Finsterwald, who also had five tackles and one interception. Aaron Dunnam had four tackles.

The Claude Mustangs had 14 first downs 178 yards rushing, 35 yards passing for a total of 213 yards. Claude was 2-12 in the passing department with one interception, that one interception by Caleb Finsterwald.

Claude punted four times for a 38 yard average. They fumbled four times and lost three. They were pe-

nalized twice for 20 yards. This was a great game for the Mustangs. They were able to return home and show their fans at Wheeler what they could do when it came time to perform. The entire defense should be commended on an unbelievable performance.

I really think the Wheeler Mustang offense should be congratulated for racking up 666 yards of rushing in one game. That is just an unreal statistic. The only way to achieve such an accomplishment is to have both your backs and your linemen going all out to win. I am in shock about the amount of total domination the Mustangs showed in this game. They should really be proud of their accomplishment. (Continued Page 2)

Tex. Water Board To **Divide State Into Districts**

On October 11, the Texas Water Development Board announced their intentions to divide the state into fourteen water planning regions. In the initial draft, Region "A" covers the entire Ogallala Aquifer. This would encompass 25 million acres, forty counties, in access of 100 cities and communities, and contain seven groundwater conservation districts. Region "A" would be larger than 13
