## Mustangs Edged Out Kress, 26-24 For Bi-District Title In a Wild Snowy Battle

The Mustangs began their 1997 play-off run in Childress by taking on the Kress Kangaroos in the bi-district play-off. Last year the Mustangs pulled off one of the biggest upsets of the year by beating the Kangaroos out of the play-offs with a 27-13 victory. And when both teams arrived at the stadium you know that was still on their minds.

The Mustangs took the field, facing the snow, and kicked off to the Kangaroos to open the game. The Mustang defense then shut down the Kress offense and forced a punt. The Mustangs took over possession on their own 41 yard line. The Mustangs wasted little time as they drove the ball down the field and Aaron Dunnam capped off the drive with a one yard touchdown run. Ben Dollar made the kick and the Mustangs took a early 7-0 lead. The rest of the first half then became a defensive battle as the only other scoring taking place was a 39 yard field goal made by the Kangaroos to cut the Mustang lead to 7-3. The first half would end with the score remaining the same.

The Mustangs opened the second half by receiving the opening kickoff and driving the ball down the field for a touchdown. This time it was Jeremy Davis who did the honors from five yards out. Ben Dollar once again put the kick through and the Mustangs opened up a 14-3 lead. The Mustangs defense then took the momentum and used it to shut down the Kress offense and force a punt. This time Jeremy Davis decided he'd had enough with these little short touchdown runs, and he proceeded to ramble 59 yards for a touchdown. The kick failed and the Mustangs blew the game wide open with a lead of 20-3. The Kangaroos refused to give up, though, as they took the next kickoff and returned it to the 50 yard line, and then drove the ball down the field for a touchdown. The kick was good and the Kangaroos cut the Mustang's lead to 20-10.

Not to be outdone the Mustang offense immediately drove the ball down the field and Aaron Dunnam dove over the goal-line for a one yard touchdown. The Mustangs then attempted a two point conversion that was no good, and the score was 26-10. From this point on, though, the game became the Kress Kangaroos show. Kress then scored another touchdown to make the score 26-16. The Kangaroos then completed a two point conversion to make the score 26-18. Then, after a fumbled kickoff Kress scored once again on an eight yard run. The game now got very interesting as the lead was cut to 26-24. Fortunately on the two point conversion attempt the Mustang defense held tough and forced an incomplete pass. The Mustangs then got the ball on the kick, but after three plays they were forced to punt. On the first play Kress fumbled the ball and the Mustangs recovered, seemingly ending the game. But, on the very next play the Mustangs fumbled the snap and gave the ball back to the Kangaroos. The Mustangs then held Kress to a key fourth down play, but Kress completed a pass for a first down. Then the Mustangs allowed Kress to complete another fourth and ten situation. On the next series, however Kress fumbled the ball and the Mustangs recovered the ball and then ran out the clock to hold on for a 26-24 victory.

The Mustangs finished with 15 first downs, 253 yards rushing, and 50 yards passing, for a total of 303 yards. All 50 yards passing came on one pass from Aaron Dunnam to Kurt Boedeker. The Mustangs punted 4 times for a 29 yard average. They had 3 fumbles, losing one, and were penalized 7 times for 50 yards. Jeremy Davis led the rushing department with 23 carries for 142 yards, Bryan Judd carried 18 times for 91 yards, and Aaron Dunnam had 12 carries for 20 yards. Kurt Boedeker led the defense with 7 tackles and 1 assist, Ben Dollar had 6 tackles and 1 assist, Josh Lee had 6 tackles, 2 assists, one sack, and one fumble recovery, Aaron Dunnam had 4 tackles, and 3 assists, Michael had 3 tackles, Jorie Masters had 2 tackles, and Korje Salas had 5 tackles, 1 assist, and one knocked down pass.

Kress had 14 first downs, 124 yards rushing, and 75 yards passing, for a total of 199 yards. Kress was 4-12 passing. They had 4 punts for a 39 yard average, and were penalized 4 times for 40 yards. They also had 2 fumbles, and lost them both. Friday the Mustangs will travel to Hereford to face the Petersburg Buffaloes. The Mustangs will be the home team. The Mustangs also want to give a special thanks to all the fans who faced the snow and cold to support them.

## JERRY HEFLEY ANNOUNCES AS CANDIDATE FOR COUNTY JUDGE

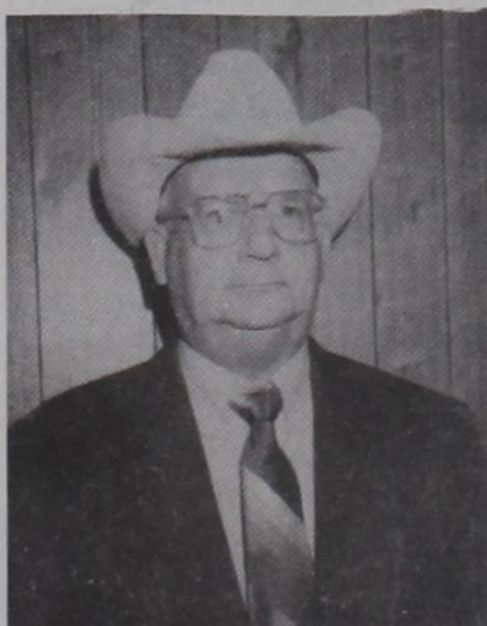
Jerry Dan Hefley announces this week, he will be a candidate for election to the office of County Judge of Wheeler County.

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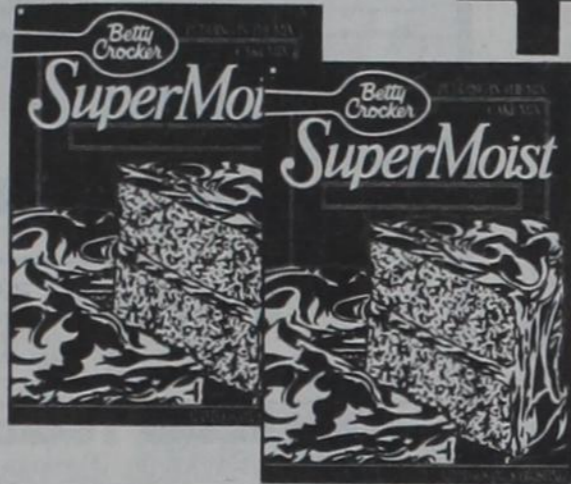

## Bobbye Hill Addresses Kappa Gamma Sorority

Bobbye Hill, a Wheeler attorney and volunteer at the Old Mobeetie Jail Museum, presented a history of the museum last Saturday at the Delta Kappa Gamma meeting held at the First Assembly of God Church in Pampa.

The museum, which was founded in 1973, was inspired by Sally Harris, who wrote *Hidetown*.

According to Hill, Harris knew how to get people to help her. She did much fundraising and used money out of her own pocket. She began getting small grants. The museum organization is presently working from a \$25,000 technological grant by putting in computers and getting on the Internet.

Hill showed slides of what the area originally looked like. She emphasized several times that "this area is important."

Plans are also being made to remodel the upstairs, provide for display cases, and to build a livery stable to preserve farm equipment, buggies, and the cedar flagpole, which dates back to 1875 or '77.

An important exhibit there, Hill said, is "Sweetwater Saga," which demonstrates how water, grasses, and animal life brought people to the area. The town was originally called Sweet Town, then Sweetwater, then Mobeetie.

Other than the fort, the first building erected was a saloon. The First State Bank of Mobeetie, the oldest continuous bank in the Panhandle, was started in the saloon.

Named for Joel Elliott, who was a teacher and soldier, Fort Elliott and the town of Mobeetie expanded together.

The fort disbanded in 1890; it had outlived its usefulness.

Kay Batton, of Mobeetie, and a member of Delta Kappa Gamma, has ancestors that lived there in the early days--the Lockes, the Arringtons, and the Husebys.

At the meeting, Rudelle Rand, of Pampa, presented the meditation on giving.

## Extension Update

### RED LIGHTS MEAN STOP

You have seen people run red lights, maybe you have even done it yourself. According to a Gallop survey, 20 percent of respondents classified running red lights and stop signs as the second most dangerous driving behavior-second only to driving while intoxicated. Focus group research as found that not only is the public losing sight of the purpose of the traffic signal, but more important, compliance with traffic controls in general is deteriorating.

Statistics provided by the Insurance Institute for Highway Safety indicate that disregarding red lights and other traffic control devices is the leading cause of urban crashes, representing 22 percent of the total number of crashes. Nationally, the economic impact is estimated at \$7 billion each year in medical costs, time off work, insurance rate increases, and property damage. Statewide in 1996, there were 9,725 crashes as a result of drivers that "disregard stop sign or light." Of those violations, there were 85 fatalities and 7,014 injuries.

According to Lt. Brian Kyle of Bryan Police Department, "a green traffic signal does NOT necessarily insure that a motorist has immediate right-of-way. A vehicle operator MUST yield the right-of-way to pedestrians and to other traffic that is lawfully using an intersection." So you ask yourself, "okay, I know that but what about that yellow light?" The yellow traffic signal is a caution to drivers that the light will change to red. Drivers should slow down and prepare to stop for the red signal. A yellow traffic signal is not a signal to speed up to try to beat the light before it goes to red.

Lucila Torres, the safety education officer with the Texas Department of Public Safety in El Paso, said that, "people know what a red light means, they just do not want to sit and wait for the light signal to change."

Often, driver error is the cause of crashes. Everyone behind the wheel of a vehicle plays a vital role in making their community as safe as possible. Kyle said "using seat belts and child safety restraints, obeying the posted speed limits and using care and caution at intersections can help to reduce the traffic crashes which result in deaths, injuries and property damage from occurring on our streets and roadways."

Remember, the lights and stop signs are not designed to impede your progress but to enhance the orderly flow of traffic. Respect for traffic control devices is important and critical in maintaining an orderly flow of traffic and safety to all on the roadway.

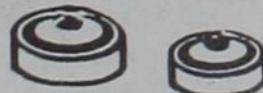

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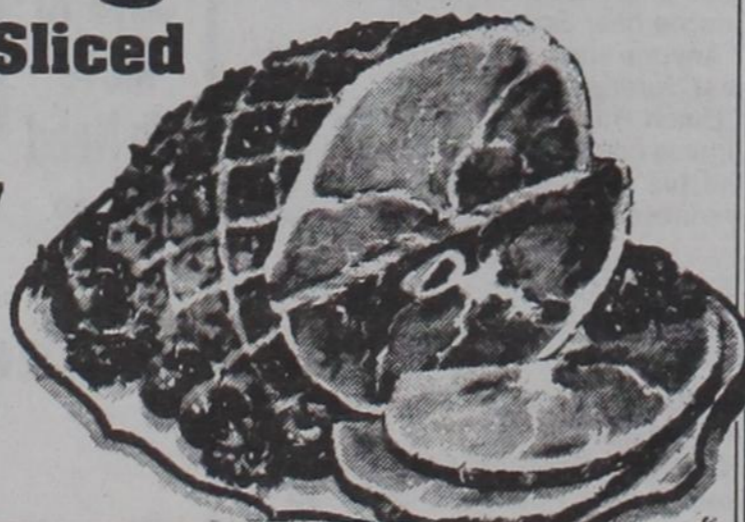

### From The Minister's Desk:

Discovery is the title of a religious magazine that is published by Apologetics Press in Montgomery, Alabama. The articles of this monthly magazine are primarily designed to help the Biblical understanding of children. However, some of these articles can also be helpful to the Biblical understanding of adults.

For example, a recent issue of Discovery contained an article that needs to be carefully read by many adult Bible students. This article, which was written by Bert Thompson, the editor of Discovery, was entitled, "A Good Time To Obey", and it said: -

"In the Bible account of the great flood, there are some interesting statements about Noah and how he reacted to the things God told him to do. First, in Genesis 6:22 it says: 'Thus Noah did, according to all that God commanded him, so he did.' Then again in Genesis 7:5, the Bible says: 'And Noah did according to all that the Lord commanded him.'"

"These two passages are very important, because they tell us that Noah took his obedience to God very seriously, and tried hard to do all that God had told him to do. For example, God told Noah to make the ark out of gopher wood. What if Noah had decided, on his own, not to use gopher wood, but to use another kind of wood? Would that have been acceptable to God?"

"What if Noah had decided to make the ark four decks high, instead of three? What if he had decided to put five doors in the ark, instead of one? Or ten windows instead of one? What if Noah decided to take into the ark fourteen of all the clean animals, and four of all the unclean? Two questions come to mind: (1) would Noah have been obeying God; and (2) would Noah have been saved?"

"The answer to both questions is 'No!' When we ignore God's instructions, and do what we want to do instead of what God tells us to do, we disobey God, and sin against Him. When God tells us to do something, we must do it exactly as He has asked us to. And if we do not, we cannot be pleasing to Him."

"There is an interesting story in the Old Testament that helps us to understand the importance of obedience. God's people, the Israelites,

wanted a king. So God made Saul king. On one occasion, God told Saul to take his army and go fight a battle. He also told Saul that after the battle, the Israelites were not to bring back anything that belonged to their enemy. (1 Samuel 15:10-33) Yet when Saul and his army returned, they brought back sheep, and oxen, and even the enemy's own king. God sent His prophet, Samuel, to talk to Saul about this. At first, Saul tried to pretend that he hadn't disobeyed God, and that he had brought the sheep and oxen back so he could offer sacrifices to God. But Samuel asked him: 'Has the Lord as great delight in burnt offerings and sacrifices as in obeying the voice of the Lord?' (1 Samuel 15:22). Finally, Saul admitted his mistake and said, 'I have sinned' (1 Samuel 15:24). But it was too late. God decided that Saul was no longer fit to be king, and so Samuel told Saul that he would lose his kingdom (1 Samuel 15:28)."

"Saul probably meant well when he brought back the sheep and oxen. But he did not do what God told him to do. And he lost his kingdom as a result. What if Noah had done the same kind of thing? What if Noah had changed God's instructions—even if he meant well? Would that have been pleasing to God? No, it would not have. It would have been a sin on Noah's part. Would the ark have floated if Noah had made it out of any other wood besides gopher wood? No. Would Noah and his family have been saved? No. We cannot change God's instructions and expect Him to be happy with us. In the New Testament, God's Son, Jesus, said: 'If you love Me, keep My commandments' (John 14:15). Noah loved God, and so he did all that God commanded him to do. Saul, on the other hand, showed that he did not love God as much as he should have, because he refused to obey God's commands."

"We need to be like Noah, not like Saul. We need to do exactly what God tells us to do, in exactly the way God tells us to do it. Whenever God commands us to do something, it is a good time to obey."

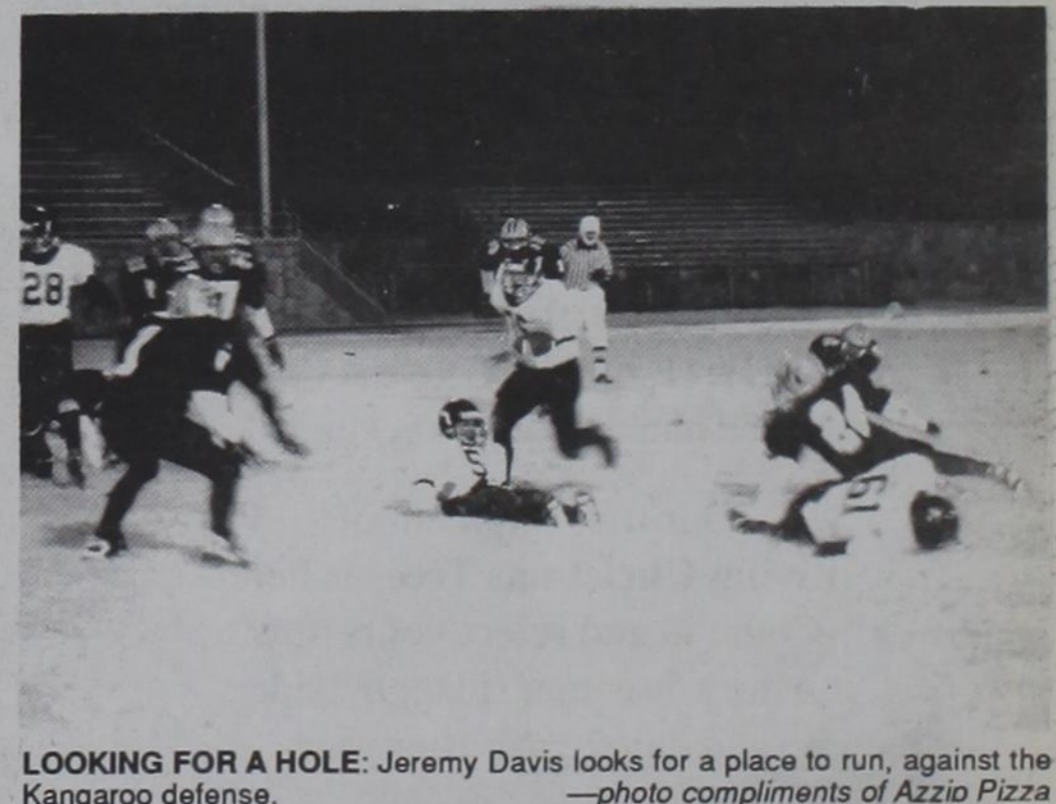

Open letter to The First Baptist Church

Thanks to the note to The Wheeler Times from Wilma Patterson where she had thanked the Christian Center Church for the repairs done to her home made me appreciate the few people who still believe in helping when it is needed. One very special lady, Mary Gladys Haddox, was a member of your church and a friend for some 29 yrs, before her death in 1983, another member, a nice friend, May Muse.

Her note gave me the courage of facing and dealing with my problem, a leaky roof on my Mobile Home at 403 W. Texas St. I am asking for your help, if you have a carpenter weight about 125 lbs, as I fear additional weight could cause more damage. Do not confuse me with the grass-hopper and ant story, as I have been writing Panhandle Community Services asking for help since early Spring of 96 and in 97. I had Mrs. Helen Gollahue, Director of PCS of Wellington ofc come by and check sagging tile in L.R. and kitchen. When she returned to her ofc. She called Amarillo PCS and told Mrs. Margaret Wolfe I needed help with roof. Her reply: Sure, advise Mrs. Lane we will give her a new roof in the yr. of 2002. This message was equal to getting a slap on the ear, Mike Tyson style. When I got my voice back I advised: "Forget it. If I'm still alive in 2002 I will be in a "Tee-pee" in my front yard or a resident on Court House Lawn. Since I know the rules about sleeping under bridges--It is illegal for the rich, as well as the poor."

These words reverberate over and over until the tears shut out the echos.

If I sound like a bitter old recluse or hermit--that is not me. Mention my name to Sharon Wright and she will tell you about me. She is with Parkview Home Health, or ask Mr. Bill Robertson, Admin. of Hospital. I rejoiced this morning as I was listening to a tape from United Methodist Church. Bless you Sally Ledbetter for seeing my name was on the list, as you realized how difficult it was for me to attend my church. Pastor Robb read a list of those in need of prayer. He said Sharon Wright's condition had improved, and I thanked God for allowing this lovely lady another victory with her Miracle head. I called a neighbor and asked he listen to the closing Hymn "God Will Take Care of You". He agreed music was pretty,

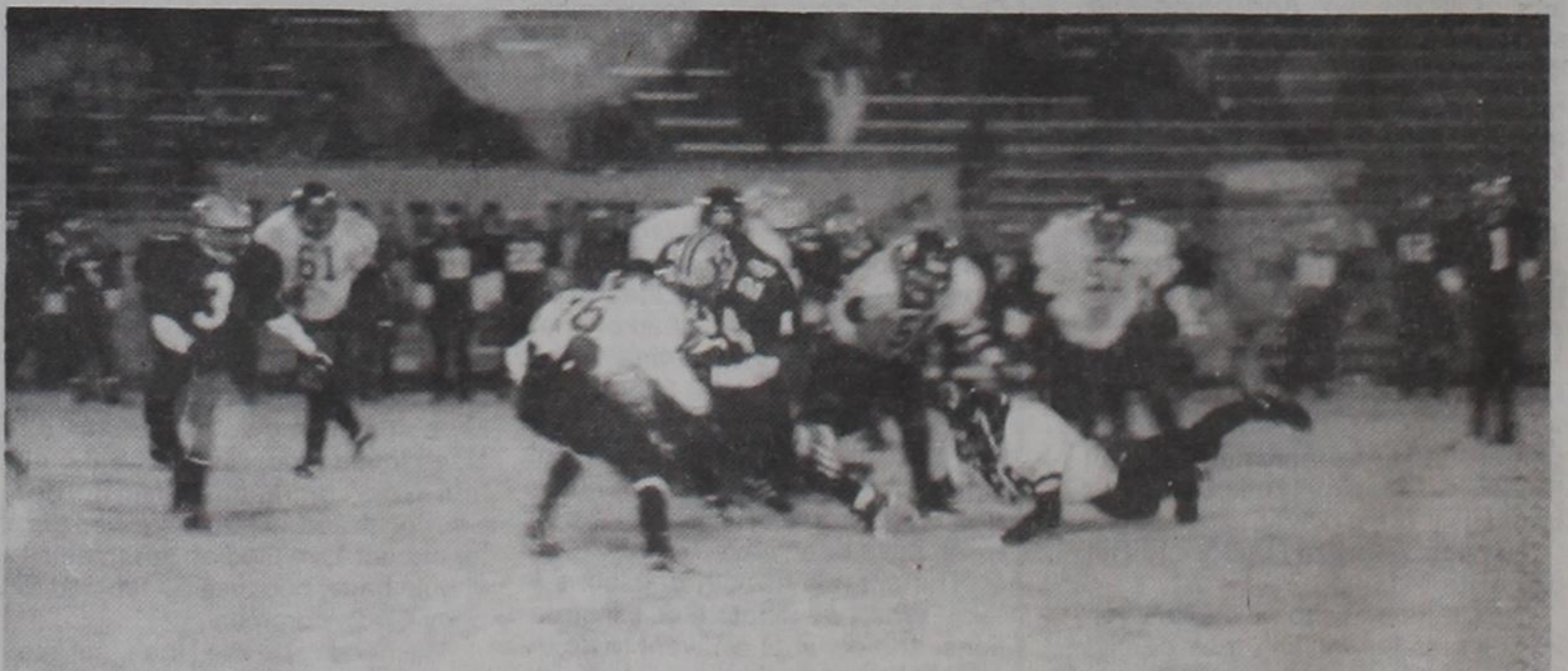

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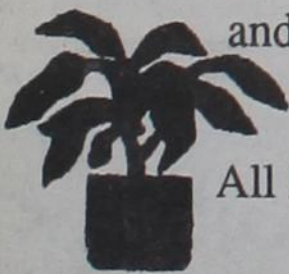
