In the war effort, all kinds of paper are used to make, wrap or tag the thousands of items sent to our armed forces. Brown bags and wrapping \$1,320; Lela, \$990; Wheeler, \$4,620; boxes and cartons, magazines, books and newspapers are needed to make blood plasma boxes, supply parachutes, helmet linings, shell and ration containers, etc.

All waste paper should be packed in flat bundles and tied securely and if large quantities are turned in, various types of paper should be separated into different bundles.

Even if rationing through retailers was effective, the outlook for next year is bad. If civilian's cigarettes were distributed evenly, each smoker would get 15 a day. This is reasonable enough, but the amount is NOT reaching the smokers at present. As might be expected, a black market has been flourishing in some places, with even a bid of \$2.50 to \$3 a carton for cigarettes. There is the complaint that certain wholesalers discriminate among retailers who will pay higher prices such as can be allowed in hotels, night clubs, restaurants. Don't patronize that retailer who will sell you cigarettes IF you will buy other merchandise. The thing to do, is nip this business in the bud and help in seeing that every smoker gets his

Man's rights comes under two headings, moral and positive. Without either the individual is lost, and we hear much discussion of both today. Moral laws are those governing man's conscience, telling him right from wrong and thus man is inwardly conscious of his behavior. It has been proven no government succeeds if its moral laws are lost. A belief in principles of conduct regarding moral actions is vital. The positive laws are the legal laws, imposed and enacted by men and are rules of behaviorism too, concerning man's relationship to society. Legal or positive laws name individual rights and is a part of democracy, shape a civil structure. The two laws are argued about by some who accuse others of subjugating the human rights to the rule of the majority and making legal or positive law the yardstick. They contend the freedom of the man who belongs to the minority is disappearing. They say it is being taught in schools and that it overlooks such as the Bill of Rights and Declaration of Independence, and such is disasterous to democracy. Anyhow it is something to think about







Making A Small Plant Bed

Slow-growing plants, such as lettuce, cabbage, tomato, pepper and eggplant, may be started in a small bed to advantage. This practice gives the plants a "head start" in the early spring so that they will be ready by garden planting time six to eight weeks later.

A wooden box 4 to 5 inches deep, 18 inches wide and 24 to 30 inches long is a convenient size. An old washtub or abandoned dishpan or tomato box may be used. The main consideration is a small container that can be picked up and brought into
