Election Results Are Recounted; Hefley Elected by Five Votes

Wheeler County Democratic Executive Committee members canvassed the votes cast in the April 14 run-off election at 9:30 A.M. Friday, April 17 at the commissioners courtroom. The total number of votes cast for each candidate according to the tally sheets were the same as previ-

ously reported.

Following the canvass, a recount of all ballots was requested by Phil Pendleton, a candidate for County Judge. The request was based on the closeness of the vote and was accepted by Democratic County Chairman Norbert Schlegel. A formal request and a check for the estimated cost of the recount was forthcoming. Upon agreement of the two candidates, the eighteen hour notification and waiting period was waived and there was an agreement

to have an expedited recount at 1:00 P.M. Friday at the Wheeler County courthouse. The recount was supervised by the County Chairman and the keeper of election records, County Clerk Margaret Dorman. Both candidates were represented and witnessed the recount. All ten precincts and the early voting box were recounted on a precinct by precinct

The recount was conducted by individuals not involved in the first counting of the ballots. There was one person calling and two clerks tallying in separate tally books. The counting was observed by the County Chair, the County Clerk, Phil Pendleton and Carolyn Hefley, representative of Jerry D. Hefley. Ballots were open to inspection by each candidate or his representative.

The recount results indicated one misscalled ballot in the original count and that changed the total number of votes cast in the Shamrock East box from Pendleton 210-Hefley 86 to Pendleton 211—Hefley 85. The count in all other boxes remained the same as earlier reported, The county total for the candidates changed to the following: Phil Pendleton-666; Jerry Don Hefley-671, five votes difference out of the 1347 votes cast in the Democratic primary. There were ten ballots cast that didn't have a vote for either candidate in the County Judge's race.

The candidates have ten days to file other requests for review in regards to the close election.

County Chairman Norbert Schlegel had high praise for the election judges and clerks in the primary and run-off elections stating, "I am very proud of the competent people we have holding Democratic elections in Wheeler County. To have only one error in the 1347 votes cast is an outstanding

The closeness of the vote also reminds us of the importance of each voter. Your vote does count and can make a difference.



If you don't have a copy, stop in the Superintendent's office on your way in, and they will make a copy for you. The nurse needs these records to review before school starts. Leave your child's other records at home. Bring all records when you come to enroll your child this fall.

In February, 1998, she received the Wheeler Chamber of Commerce Pioneer Spirit Award for preserving Wheeler County history. Mobeetie played a significant role in early Panhandle history. She captured Wheeler County history in a book while serving as Historical Chairperson for Wheeler County in 1963, then conducted research for four years to write Hidetown in the Texas Panhandle about Old Mobeetie, the city of Canadian then asked her to write her third book, a history of Hemphill County.

Harris has since "poured her heart and soul" into establishing and expanding the Old Mobeetie Jail Museum, which is overseen by the Old Mobeetie Texas Association, where she served as President for sixteen years. She has been Worthy Matron of the Eastern Star, President of the Mobeetie Women's Auxiliary, the Texas Panhandle Women's Auxiliary, and the Wheeler Garden club.

The theme for Saturday's luncheon entitled "Women: Angels of the World", centered around the examples of women who have endeavored to give of themselves over the years. Cottage Industry of the Downtown Women's Center made angel center pieces for the luncheon. Amarillo Opera, Inc. and Amarillo College Theater School for Children provided entertainment.

judges. "A big focus of this conference is how judges can improve the quality of service provided by the judiciary in order to address some of the scrutiny the court system has received in recent years," Mari Kay Bickett, executive Director of the Texas Center for the Judiciary, Inc., said.

From The Minister's Desk:

On Tuesday, March 24th, two young boys, Michell Johnson and Andrew Golden, did not attend their morning classes at Westside Middle School in Jonesboro, Arkansas. Rather they took a van that belonged to Mitchell's stepfather and drove to the home of Andrew's parents where they took some guns. They then drove to the home of Andrew's grandparents where they took some more

Armed with these guns and dressed in camouflage clothing, these two boys drove to a wooded area that was located near the Westside Middle School. While Mitchell waited in the wooded area, Andrew went into the school and pulled the fire alarm, knowing that it would cause the school to be evacuated. He then quickly returned to the wooded area where Mitchell was waiting with the guns that they had taken.

When their classmates and teachers began to leave the school building, Mitchell and Andrew began to shoot at them. They fired twenty-two shots in about four minutes, killing five people and wounding ten others.

This tragedy in Jonesboro was the fourth time in the last six months that children under the age of seventeen have gone to school and methodically shot their classmates. As a result of these tragedies, people across the nation have been offering explanations for them. But frankly most of these explanations have been superficial and trite.

For example, one of the explanations that was offered for the Jonesboro tragedy was that Mitchell Johnson was unhappy because a girl had either broken up with or had refused to go out with him. If this explanation totally explains the tragedy at Jonesboro then every middle school campus in this nation would have experienced such a tragedy.

This explanation and the other explanations that have been offered for the tragedies, like the one that occurred in Jonesboro, emphasizes the symptoms of the problem and not the problem itself. The problem is that the sacredness of life has been minimized by society.

And sadly many children have been affected. These children have been told that an unborn baby is nothing more than a mass of tissue; therefore, it should not be surprising that they would toss a newborn baby into a trash can or try to flush a newborn baby down the toilet.

themselves for hours by watching movies and television programs that glorify violence. They have also listened to rap music that contains such lyrics as, "Die, die, die pig, die--the police" and "I'm 'bout to dust some cops off." Therefore, is it surprising that some of these children would decide that bloody violence is how the problems of life should be handled?

Life is sacred! And when society minimizes the sacredness of life, it will experience some terrible tragedies. Without any pang of conscience, some people will decide that unborn babies can be aborted and older people can be euthanized. Some children will also decide that they can go to school and kill their classmates as their momentary desires may dictate. Epilogue

I am truly afraid that the sacredness of life is being minimized in this community. For the last thirteen years, I lived on Main Street and have watched, with some amusement, the young people of this community "drag Main". While some of these young people have driven a little too fast, the majority of them have driven in a safe and

However, in the last few years I have observed that more of them are driving recklessly and carelessly, risking the injury of people and the destruction of property. On several occasions, I have stood in my front yard and watched two cars racing side by side at a high rate of speed down Main Street. The drivers of these cars seemed oblivious to the safety of children who were playing in the front, yard of their homes on Main Street and the other people who were driving on Main Street.

I have also heard that the yards of some people who live on Main Street have been damaged by young people driving their cars across their yards. These people have not reported this damage because they are afraid that more damage will be done to their prop-

There are, unfortunately, some adults who will excuse these young people by saying: "Kids will be kids." Such excuses will be of little comfort when a tragic accident occurs on Main Street and two or three people are killed. Please do not misunderstand. I

am not opposed to young people

"dragging" Main Street. However, I

am opposed to their disregard for the lives and property of other Bill Morrison, Minister
