

GPS Satellite Navigator Presented to Amb. Serv.

The North Wheeler County Ambulance Service was presented a handheld GPS Pioneer Satellite Navigator by Northwest Texas Healthcare System.

The navigator will be used by the ambulance service to help guide the Lifestar helicopter to the location of an accident. When the local ambulance is call to the scene of an accident, the Lifestar is in some cases notified to become airborne. If the need for the medivac is determined after the ambulance arrives, the exact location of the scene can be marked by the navigator and the time of arrival can be determined.

Lifestar can be on the scene in approximately 45 minutes from Amarillo. In a situation requiring extrication, Lifestar might be on the scene by the time the victim is freed. They will be serving Hot

History: Notes fro m Dave Bowers

Dave Bowers came to the country at NW of Wichita Falls in March 1876.

His father hunted buffalo all over this county until they made their home, which they did as soon as the buffalo played out, then established a freight route and freighted from Dodge City to Fort Elliott.

They moved to Fort Elliott in 1880. Dave and his brother went to a little school there.

The old town was called Sweetwater when Bowers first moved there, then moved to about a mile east of the parade ground. The first town was not called anything at first. It was just a buffalo camp. They had to change the name from Sweetwater to Mobeetie because there was another town in the state called Sweetwater. Mobeetie is the Indian word for Sweetwater.

Dave's brother used to live in Wheeler

Mrs. Bowers made her home at Mobeetie and the boys worked on cow ranches. They worked for the NY and T Land for 6 years surveying and surveyed the whole Panhandle Country.

They went to Pecos City and surveyed from the Mexican line to the Rio Grand. They surveyed from 8 in the morning till dark. They commenced in 1887-1893.

Most of this country had no cattle, nothing but buffalo. Mark Huselby bought the first cows in this county from Dodge City. He had a big string of work oxen, and he threw his cows in with them (four or five).

The first cattle for ranching were brought in 1879, by Wagner and Burnett. They brought the first cattle

to Clay County and Wichita County. After that there was another herd moved on west of them which was Vorshain-Johnson-Steven and their brand was STV.

Then another outfit came in also;

their brand was OX. Swearenger-White bought them out. They lived at Childress.

North of them came Bill and Will Curtiss, the Diamond Tail. This ranch head quartered SW and ran up into Collingsworth and Hall countries.

North of them came the Rocking Chair Ranch. Old man Drew bought this ranch out, and ran both the Mill Iron and the Rocking Chair brands. A fellow named Noah Ellis bought herd cattle for the Rocking Chair Ranch. Cattle drifted mainly when big storms arose; the north boundary of the Rocking Chair was 1/2 mile South of town.

Masterson-Hamilton-Shelton had about the biggest outfit in Wheeler County. They bought out Albert Patton and George Boyd, and 0. P. Jones. Jim Robinson and another fellow bought out Jones and sold out to a fellow named Jehetto.

In the NE part of the county were quite a few ranches. Henry Frye, and Miller.

An another fellow named Alfred Rowe owned most of the SW corner of the county. He sold out to T. E. Jones and he sold out to Atkinson-Granes. McDowell bought out Atkinson.

Nick Eaton owned the N bar N Ranch in the NW part of the county, and he sold out to Frank Cole. His ranch included the entire NW corner of the county except a little along the N Fork of the River.

A man with a few head of cattle would come into the county and find four sections and then buy four sections from the railroad, and settle a ranch

The first freighting was wagon freighting from Ft. Worth to Ft. Elliott, then from Dodge City to Ft. Elliott. When you came from Ft. Worth, you would come through what is now Vernon. That was the old Chisolm Trail, then the trail came N and crossed Red River by Doan's store, then came through Greer County from where Mangum is now, and across to Ft. Elliott.

The first teacher was Mrs. Boles. She was the first judges mother-inlaw, Judge Willis. She had a boy in Pampa when this interview was written. After the old rock school, S. B. McCray was the first teacher in Mobeetie.

The first preacher's name was Wyant. He preached at the saloons.

The next preacher organized a church there, which was Presbyte-

Buffalo were killed out about 1879. Mobeetie had 8 saloons and 4 dance halls, 2 stores, and also the headquarters for the whole country.






