

Mustangs Outscore Greyhounds, 21-6

The Wheeler Mustangs took on the Gruver Greyhounds last Friday night in the Mustang's second district game of the season. Wheeler was favored in this game, but the chance of an upset was possible. The Greyhounds received the ball to begin the game, but could not get a first down and had to punt. Wheeler would start on their own 46 yard line and have a 54 yard, 11 play drive ending with a Casey Childress touchdown run. The Mustangs lead 7-0. On Gruver's next possession, they were held to only three plays and a punt. Wheeler would not be able to capitalize though, and lost the ball on downs in Gruver territory. The Mustang defense was able to hold Gruver again. The Wheeler offense would again drive into Gruver's end of the field, but would turn the ball over on downs. On the next play the Greyhounds fumbled and the Mustangs' Bret Goad recovered. The quarter would end with the score 7-0, but the Mustangs were in scoring position.

At the start of the second quarter Casey Childress scored on a 3 yard run and the extra point was good. Gruver would then begin a drive of their own getting their first 1st down of the night with 10:54 left in the second quarter. The next play, however, Caleb Finsterwald intercepted the ball bring Gruver's scoring chance to a halt. The second quarter ended with the score 14-0.

Wheeler would receive the kickoff after half time. The Mustangs were able to move the ball successfully, but they fumbled and gave Gruver the ball on the Wheeler 6 yard line. On Gruver's second play sophomore running back, Garrett Pool, ran for a 94 yard touch down. The two point conversion was stuffed leaving the score 14-6 in favor of the Mustangs. The rest of the third quarter would be a struggle between the two teams. Neither one able to put together a scoring drive.

In the fourth quarter the Greyhounds would turn the ball over twice, an interception by Aaron Dunnam and a fumble recovery by Kyle Masters. The fumble recovery was the start of the Mustangs final scoring drive. The Mustangs pounded the ball down the field with four straight running plays. A holding penalty moved them back 5 yards, but on the next play Aaron Dunnam would connect with Craig Pass on a 32 yard touchdown pass. The extra point was good, and the Mustangs went ahead 21-6 over the Greyhounds with 2:16 left in the game. Gruver tried to put together a miracle to come back, but the Wheeler defense was able to keep them from getting a first down. The Mustangs received the ball on downs and the game ended with Aaron Dunnam downing the ball.

The Wheeler Mustang offense had 22 first downs, 267 rushing yards, 97 passing yards, 364 total yards of offense, punted 3 times for a 34 yard average, fumbled twice and lost both of them, and had 8 penalties for 75

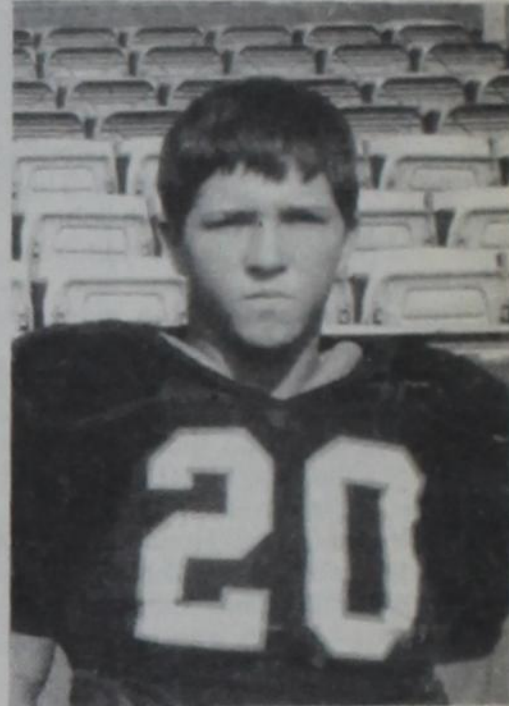
yards.
Casey Childress carried the ball 27 times for 130 yards and two touchdowns.

Caleb Finsterwald had 18 carries for 71 yards.
Aaron Dunnam had 14 carries for 66 yard. He also completed 5 out of 11 passes for 97 yards and one touchdown.

Craig Bass had one touchdown reception.
The Wheeler defense was able to hold Gruver to 6 first downs, 109 rushing yards, 59 passing yards, for a total of 168 yards of offense. The defense intercepted two passes and recovered 3 out of the 4 Gruver fumbles. Wheeler also forced the Greyhounds to punt 4 times.

Aaron Dunnam lead the defense with 8 tackles, 4 assists, 1 forced turnover, and 1 interception.
Ben Dollar had 4 tackles and 3 assists, Brooks Brown had 3 tackles, Kirt Boedeker had 3 tackles and 1 assist, Michael Montgomery had 2 tackles,

Bruce Copeland had 2 tackles and 2 assists, Ben Britt had 2 tackles and 2 assists, Caleb Finsterwald had 1 tackle, 1 assist, 1 fumble recovery, and 1 interception, Bret Goad had 3 assists and 1 fumble recovery, Kyle Masters had 1 tackle and 1 fumble recovery, Don Hudgins 1 tackle and 1 assist, Mike Jones had 1 tackle, and Craig Bass had 1 tackle.



PLAYER OF THE WEEK: Casey Childress, Mustang running back, was named player of the week in the Amarillo Daily News. In a 21-6 win against Gruver, the junior ran 27 times for 130 yards and scored two touchdowns. His first-half touchdown runs of 8 and 27 yards helped set the tone as the Mustangs solidified their hold on first place in District 1-1A. Although nearly dead in one ear, Childress is Wheeler's leading rusher for the year with 660 yards and seven touchdowns. "Casey has had several good games over the last few weeks," stated coach Jim Verden. "He has consistently gotten better over the past few weeks. He has a great attitude, and you never hear him complain, and he just keeps getting better and better."

Postmaster Thompson stated: "These employees have consistently and conscientiously served the residents of the Mobeetie community and the Postal Service. I'm very proud to have employees like Steve and Sue. They are very dependable and dedicated. I thank them for being nice people to work with."

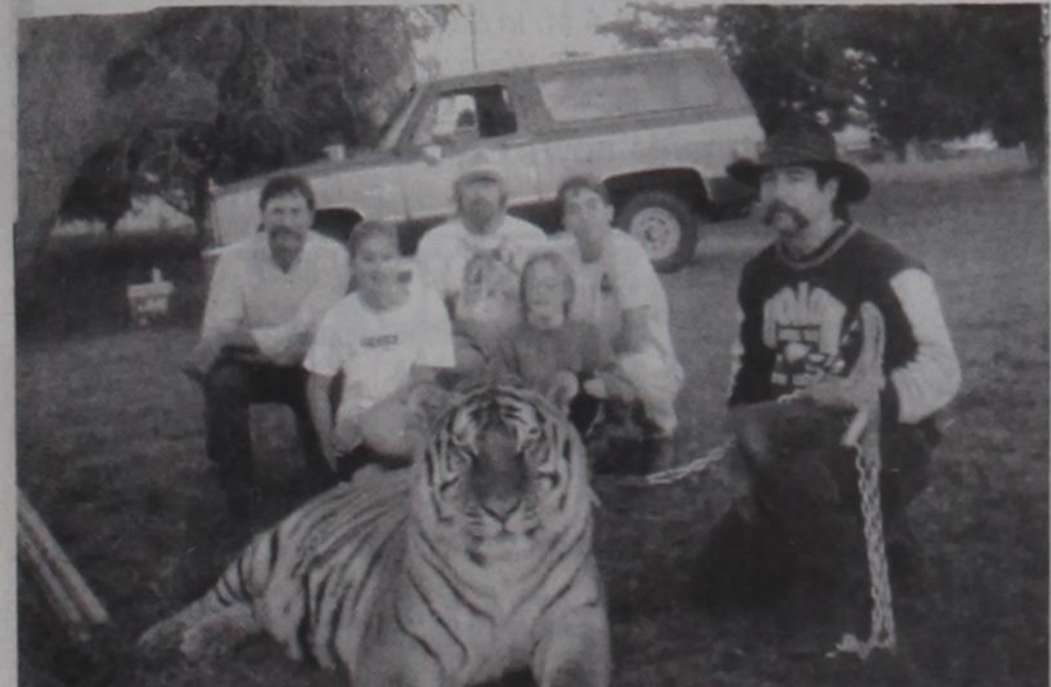

We are trapping for a bothersome armadillo that digs up flowers at my sister's. I caught a squirrel in a live trap and turned him loose; wish I had more. I understand you Wheeler folks don't want them—so will you trap

them for me? I'll furnish the trap and the peanuts. I've always heard that you can't raise squirrels in captivity, but have recently learned that you can—so I would like to try.

I've caught a blue heron twice lately trying to get gold fish out of my stock tank.

Sunday Bobby Hill and Melba Corcoran attended the Gray County Historical meeting at the White Deer Land Museum. Bobby presented the program with slides and a story on Fort Elliott and Mobeetie.

This month is Archeological Awareness Month. The museum delivered materials to the area school. Texas Archeology Did you Know-Archaeology is not a study of dinosaurs, or rocks, or fossils—archaeology is a study of past human cultures. People came to North America over the Arctic land bridge across the Bering Strait, and they came to Texas thousands of years before Columbus arrived in the New World. American Indians did not use the bow and arrow until about 1500 years ago earlier hunters used spears.

Destruction of the Past. Through land alteration and the ravages of treasure hunters and artifact collectors, more than 4,000 sites are badly disturbed or destroyed each year in Texas. Since both archeological investigation and relic collecting involve removing artifacts from the earth, why is one called preservation and the other destruction? The pot hunter, or relic collector, seldom bothers to record or report what is removed from sites. The "page" taken from the earth's story by an uncaring collector digging in a site is gone forever. The soil, once disturbed, can no longer reveal the secrets of the past. One person determinedly shoveling dirt from a site in search of pots or arrow points can destroy in one afternoon the untold story of literally hundreds of years in Texas history. In some areas, artifact collectors even use heavy equipment in the search of artifacts, ruthlessly pushing into meaningless rubble centuries. What value can we place on artifacts that are removed from the earth at the cost of our knowledge of human history? The artifact that has been carelessly removed is no longer a clue to the past. Even if the artifact eventually finds its way into a museum. It is merely an object, perhaps interesting in itself but no longer capable of telling us about the people who made it. Relic collectors and other heedless destroyers of archeological sites have been called "the thieves of times" because their actions—the objects they remove and the sites they damage—steal something priceless from generations past and to come. If self-interested collectors and uncaring vandals are destroying or damaging thousands of sites each year, and if the laws that already exist can not fully protect our fragile heritage, what can we do? The answer to the question is simple. Do not wait for the federal or state government to preserve the archeological and historical resources of Texas. Do it yourself, join a local, regional, or state archeological society and participate as a positive force for preservation. The Old Mobeetie Texas Association supports the preservation of our sites and history.

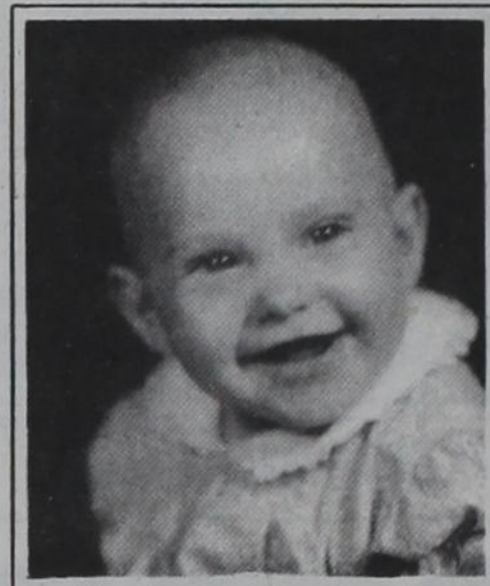

From The Minister's Desk:

One of the most essential parts of an automobile's engine is the battery. It is essential because it furnishes positive and negative electrolytes. Both of these electrolytes are necessary for the engine to properly operate.

Genuine Christianity is also composed of positive and negative aspects. The Apostle Paul emphasized the proper mixture of these aspects when he wrote: "Do not be overcome by evil, but overcome evil with good." (Romans 12:21) Christianity is a balanced faith, consisting of a proper mixture of its positive and negative aspects.

Yet there are many Christians who try to live a faith that is based primarily on its negative aspects. In one of His most compact but penetrating parables, Jesus warned against this tragic mistake. He said: "Now when the unclean spirit goes out of a man, it passes through waterless places, seeking rest, and does not find it. Then it says, 'I will return to my house from which I came'; and when it comes, it finds it unoccupied, swept, and put in order. Then it goes and takes along with it seven other spirits more wicked than itself, and they go in and live there; and the last state of that man becomes worse than the first." (Matthew 12:43-45)

The tragedy of this parable hinges on the word, "unoccupied." Notice that after "the unclean spirit" was cast out of the house that it was "unoccupied". Taking advantage of this opportunity, "the unclean spirit" got "seven other spirits more wicked than itself" and occupied the house again. The conclusion of Jesus was: "The last state of that man becomes worse than the first."

The mere elimination of evil, however complete, is no equivalent for goodness. A faith that consists only of "thou shalt not" will never produce the abundant life. Such a faith is like adding up a column of zeroes. The answer is always zero.

And one of damning of all sins is merely to do nothing. Think about the scathing denunciation that the one talent man received in the parable of the talents. (Matthew 25:14-30) The sin of this man was "nothingness". He simply did nothing! Jesus called this man wicked and lazy, saying: "Cast out the worthless slave into outer; in that place there shall be weeping and gnashing of teeth." (verse 30)

To function properly, Christianity, like the engine of an automobile, must be characterized by positive and negative aspects. It is absolutely essential that Christianity not be characterized by evil. However, the elimination of evil is merely a preparation for producing positive works of good.

We got something over 24 inches in just 3 days. But overall, we learned about courage, love of one's fellow man and generosity. There was lots of trauma and tragedy, but we came through. I am sure that prayer helped many survive.

I have worked for TDCJ (Tex. Dept. of Criminal Justice) six years, so I have made some enemies among the inmates, so please do not publish my street address. Most inmates would not give trouble, but there are a few "nut cases". (I enjoy my job.) I am a subscriber in case you need my address.

As a farm wife in Kelton, I knew what it was to be snowed in and when I moved to New Braunfels, I felt sure that I would not be snowed in, but today, Sunday, October 18, I am "flooded-in".

New Braunfels is a beautiful city, and it still has a "small town" feeling. Both the Lomal and Guadalupe Rivers wind through New Braunfels. Tourism is one of our major industries, and the Schlitterban, a waterpark is one

of the most important attractions. The Schlitterban is on the Lomal River and there is lots of tubing on the Guadalupe River.

Yesterday, Saturday, the rain was so hard and heavy that I would not have been able to drive home from the grocery store, if I had not been driving a truck.

My son tried to get to my apartment from each of the four directions. After an hour of trying, he decided to drive home to Canyon Lake. It took an hour and a half to make the 30 minute trip.

Later, Tuesday, October 20, the water went down enough that I was able to drive to work at the Joe Ney Unit, west of Hondo. (It is a substance abuse state jail.) On the drive on IH 35, there was still some water near Schertz at the eastern edge of San

Antonio. Through New Braunfels and in parts of San Antonio there were potholes, bad washouts at the edge of the pavement, and other evidence of the recent flood.

In both the snow imprisonment and the water imprisonment one must practice patience and appreciate the moisture.

Immunization Clinic

An immunization clinic sponsored by the Texas Department of Health will be held Tuesday, November 17, 1998, from 10:00 a.m. until 1:30 p.m. in the Wheeler ISD Auditorium. The following immunizations will be available: DTP, Oral Polio, Measles, Mumps, Rubella, HIB, Td and Hepatitis.

Flu shots will be available. They will be charging a fee to pay for the cost of the vaccines. Please bring Medicaid card if applicable. No one will be refused treatment regardless of income.

Each child MUST be accompanied by a parent or legal guardian. Please bring immunization records if possible. This clinic is open to all individuals.

Effective March 1, the Texas Dept. of Health will offer the hepatitis vaccine to all children from birth to age 19. Hepatitis B is one of the viruses that attacks the liver. It can cause permanent liver damage and scarring, severe illness, and in some cases even death. Every week hundreds of teenagers get Hepatitis B. Like most viral illnesses, once Hepatitis B virus is contracted, there is no cure. Hepatitis B virus is transmitted by blood and body fluids. The series consist of 3 injections over a period of 6 months.
