The third program will be March 24 in Wheeler. Program topics will include the importance of beef quality and consistency and breeding systems to achieve these goals.


The final program is scheduled for March 31 in Skellytown and will cover breeding soundness evaluation of bulls and heifer reproductive tract evaluation.

Each container and egg had to weigh 1 pound or have a mass of 454 grams.

The outside dimensions had to conform to the following: (grades) K-3-35 cm; 4-5-30 cm; 6-8-25 cm; 9-12-20 cm.

Several of the eggs did not survive the 20 ft. drop, but a large number did survive the 30 ft. drop.







Extension Update By Joan Gray, CEA-HE

FEEDING CHILDREN NUTRITIOUS FOODS

Diet plans primarily target adults. So how do you know what to feed children? Joan Gray, County Extension says three meals a day are not enough for kids. They have smaller stomachs, so they need smaller, more frequent meals and snacks. To make sure they get the proper nutrition, she suggests categorizing foods. For instance, one important group includes breads, cereals, rice and pasta. These foods are good sources of complex carbohydrates, fiber and B vitamins. The best source of calcium would be milk, yogurt and cheese. So that's another nutrient group. Fruits and vegetables contain essential vitamins such as A and C and they add fiber to the diet. The last group includes meat, poultry, fish, dry beans, eggs and nuts. This protein group also provides vitamins, iron and zinc.

Clarendon College Will Offer GED & CLEP Exams


Clarendon College will offer the GED and CLEP exams on Tuesday. March 17, at the Bairfield Activity Center in Clarendon.

"No. 1, I respectfully suggest that such background would justify a belief that any legal opinion furnished by me to any County Official would be legally well-reasoned and sound." From The Minister's Desk:

Will Rodgers once observed that there are three stages of American history--the passing of the buffalo, the passing of the Indian, and the passing of the buck.

It is fairly obvious that the passing of the buck is a prominent characteristic of the twentieth century. It is easier for people to blame someone else than it is to accept responsibility for their own life. Since this characteristic is so prominent, it is not surprising that Christianity has been affected.

Perhaps this affect can best be illustrated by a question. This question is: "Who will be responsible if you are not saved? "There are only three possible answers to this question.

God will be responsible. One of the most popular religious ideas is predestination which advocates that God has predetermined the people who will be saved and the people who will be lost. But the New Testament says that God is -not wishing for any to perish, but for all to come to repentance. "(II Peter 3:9)

It is extremely hard to understand how anyone could truly believe that God is responsible if someone is not saved. The New Testament clearly describes the costly provision that God has made for the salvation of people. He gave His son, Jesus Christ, as a substitutionary sacrifice for the sins of the people. (Romans 3:21-30)

also important for people to remember the nature of the church. The church is composed of people who are saved by the grace of God not their sinless perfection. (Ephesians 2:4-10; Titus 2:11-14; 3:4-8)

To expect sinless perfection from the church is an expectation that God Himself does not have. He does not want the church to sin, but He knows that it will. For this reason the church has "--an Advocate with the Father, Jesus Christ the righteous; and He Himself is the propitiation for our sins; and not ours only, but also for those of the whole world. 



Protect your rights! "Render" your taxable property by April 15th.

A "rendition" is a report to the appraisal district that lists all. the taxable property you owned or controlled on January 1st of this year. The rendition form is available at your local appraisal district office... or you may draft a similar form.

Who must file a rendition?

You must file a rendition if you own tangible personal property that is used to produce income-such as the inventory and equipment used by a business.

Are there any advantages to you?

The advantages of filing a rendition are:

- You give your opinion of your property's value. If the appraisal district believes the value is higher, it must notify you in writing of the higher value and explain how you can protest that value to the appraisal review board.
- So You record your correct mailing address so your tax bills will go to the right address. If your bill is mailed to the wrong address, the law still holds you responsible for paying your taxes on time or paying extra charges for late payments.
- You can also file a "report of decreased value" to notify the appraisal district of significant depreciation of the value of your property in 1997. The district will look at your property before assigning a value in 1998.

What's the deadline?

The last day for filing 1998 renditions is April 15. Call your appraisal district for the last date the rendition may be postmarked, if mailing. You can get an extra 15 days if you ask for it in writing by the April 15 deadline.



Area Alfalfa, Wheeler Producers Need To Check Crops

Local entomologists are asking area alfalfa and wheat producers to watch for army cutworms. The pests have been identified as infesting alfalfa and wheat in Kansas. Causing some damage, especially in alfalfa.

According to Dr. Carl Patrick, entomologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service in Amarillo, the army cutworm is a sporadic pest of alfalfa and wheat in the Texas Panhandle. Occasional heavy infestations can cause considerable damage to both of these crops.

Farmers should be aware that cutworms lay eggs and hatch offspring in the fail. This species will feed periodically as temperatures allow during the winter. And, given the type of winter, the worms can be quite large by February and March, and be most damaging. "Mature larvae can attain lengths of 1 1/2 to 2 inches. " Patrick said. The worms are greenish-brown or greenish-gray, and have a narrow pale stripe down their backs, the full length of the body. Although true cutworms, the feed on foliage much like army worms. During sunny days they will be under debris or slightly underneath the soil

surface. Their presence will be obvious on plants during overcast days and at night when temperatures are above freezing, said Don King, Wheeler County Extension agent.

"Fortunately, there is only one generation per year," said Patrick, however, these worms could cause damage over the next 3 to 4 weeks.

Insecticide applications are justified when four-to-five army cutworm per square foot are causing visible damage in well-established alfalfa or wheat. In poor, thin stands of wheat or seedling alfalfa - the economic

threshold should be dropped to two per square foot.

"During outbreak years, it is not uncommon to find 10 to 20 army cutworm per square foot," said Patrick.

Effective treatments for wheat are Karate, Lorsba 4E SG, and alfalfa producers can select from Karate, Lorsban, Pounce, Ambush, or Baythroid insecticides.

"The cutworm moths, also called 'Millers' can be a real nuisance in April and early May before flying away from this area," Patrick added.




