

Wheeler's Highway Barn Gets 2-Year Reprieve

A group of concerned citizens gathered at City Hall in Wheeler to express their concern over the proposed closing of the State Highway Barn in Wheeler. The Texas Department of Transportation felt the structure was out dated and could be put to a better use by some other taxing entity of the area. If the facility were to be closed, the state would have to

purchase 2-3 acres for stockpiling materials for use in north Wheeler County.

David Casteel, Childress District Engineer, with TxDOT was in charge of the meeting. David Deger of Shamrock has been the head of Wheeler County road maintenance for the past two years.

Only two of the state's 17 Wheeler County employees live in Wheeler. Justin Rose is in charge of Highway signs over the county and Butch Calcote does road work. The building is occupied only about 5% of the time. One maintainer is stored part of the time in the building and it is used for the changing of blades during

snow storms—only 4 times during the past winter.

The cost of maintenance is \$500-\$700 per month. These costs being utilities, repairs, paint, etc. It was pointed out by Commissioner Tommy Puryear that this is only a very small percent of the \$1 million plus budget for Wheeler County.

Mayor Wanda Herd pointed out that North Wheeler County as a whole has worse weather than the south portion. This was verified by several in attendance from Briscoe and Allison. Sweetwater Creek seems to be the line for the change in weather and/or road conditions.

Harrison Hall expressed the opinion of those in attendance when he stated "We would all feel better if we had something (equipment) here all the time."

Panhandle Beef Conference To Be Held May 2

The Panhandle Beef Conference will be held on May 12, 1998, at the Amarillo Civic Center. This year's program will highlight forage management, performance evaluation of cattle, and outlooks for weather and markets.

Cool-season grazing forage production for cattle production is a topic of great interest in the High Plains. Dr. Vivian Allen, Texas Tech University, will recap her research and experiences with cool-season forages in the South Plains area. Dr. Larry Redmon, Oklahoma State University, has planted and observed various cool-season forages in western Oklahoma. The combined observations of these experts will provide some insight for cool-season forage selection and management in the south and north Plains areas of the Panhandle.

Dr. Ted McCollum, Extension Beef Cattle Specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, will report on the 1997-98 Ranch to Rail North program. Cattle from over 100 ranches in 6 states are enrolled in this year's program. Culling breeding stock to sustain cow productivity but improve growth and carcass traits

will be discussed by Mr. David Lust of West Texas A&M University. Trait selection and EPD's are among the tools that will be discussed.

Feedyard performance, carcass traits, cattle value and closeouts can be affected by implant programs. Dr. John Hutcheson, Hoechst-Roussel Vet, will address the economics of implants strategies in pasture and feedlot cattle.

Will El Nino continue for a while or subside? Mr. Ed Andrade, lead forecaster for the National Weather Service in Amarillo, will discuss trends in the weather for the Plains region. The program will close with Mr. Jim Sartwell of the Texas Agricultural Extension giving the outlook for grain and cattle markets in 1998.

TxDOT Seeks Applicants For Federal Grant

The Texas Department of Transportation is seeking qualified applicants to receive a Federal Grant to provide transportation for elderly and/or disabled persons. The program, known as Section 5310, provides funds to private, nonprofit organizations, public entities, and associations.

The program provides up to 80 percent of the cost for capital equipment such as buses, vans, and other paratransit vehicles used to transport elderly and/or disabled persons. Also included are the purchases of vehicles for service expansions, radio and communication equipment, wheelchair lifts and restraints, and vehicle rehabilitation. The funding is appropriated by the Federal Government under the Federal Transit Act. Qualified projects will be selected for funding by TxDOT using quantitative measures such as coordination efforts, ability to meet service needs of elderly and/or disabled persons based on passenger trips per month, local match ability, hours of operation, ability to maintain equipment, average fleet mileage where applicable and average fleet age where applicable.

Rolling Plains PCA Has Annual Meeting

Rolling Plains Production Credit Association held its Annual Stockholders' Meeting in Canadian on Tuesday April 28, Childress on Thursday April 30, and Stamford on Friday May 1. Garon B. Tidwell of Munday and Dan Henard, Jr. of Wellington, were reelected to the Board of Rolling Plains PCA. John R. (Bob) Beagle of Perryton was chosen by stockholders to represent the Perryton Branch Office area. Board members serve three-year terms. Other Board members are Lance D. Morris of Crosbyton, Terry O'Neal of Pampa, Thomas R. Helton of Wheeler, Keith Corzine of Stamford, Garner Schoenhals of Canadian, Dean Turner of Matador and Jack Reese of Abilene.

Terry O'Neal gave the Board Report to the gathering. Earning the highest rating possible by the Tenth District Regulator for the tenth consecutive year, the Association maintains its Tier I designation and won the Farm Credit Bank's prestigious Pace Setter award. The award is based on financial performance and business development.

The Association made a net profit after taxes of \$2,016,479. In 1997 Rolling Plains Production Credit Association loaned more than \$115 million to approximately 1,000 borrowers in its 25-county territory.

The Association's Board of Directors declared a patronage distribution based on 1997 fiscal year earnings. Total patronage was \$1,413,231 with 40% being paid at the three sessions of the Annual Meeting. From The Minister's Desk:

That Old-Time Religion is the title of a religious hymn that was extremely popular in the early 1900's. This popular old hymn consisted of five verses which say: --

"It was good for the Hebrew children, It was good for the Hebrew children, It was good for the Hebrew children, And it's good enough for me." (verse 1)

"It was good enough for Paul and Silas, It was good for Paul and Silas, It was good for Paul and Silas, And it's good enough for me." (verse 2)

"It was good for the prophet Daniel, It was good for the prophet Daniel,

he has both the Father and the Son." (II John 9)

When people do not obey these texts and other texts which emphasize the divine pattern for Christianity, they usurp God's authority. God has not ordained that people can believe what they wish or worship Him as they choose. Rather through the inspired teachings of the Bible, God has given a divine pattern that He expects people to imitate.

Sadly, however, there are some people who scoff at the imitation of the divine pattern that is revealed in the Bible. These people say: "The first century Christians greeted one another with a holy kiss; they washed one another's feet and they shared their property with each other. Therefore, should twentieth century Christians imitate these practices?" Such statement only reveal that the Bible knowledge of these people is shallow and superficial.

It is true that some Biblical admonitions are rooted in the cultural customs of the first century. However, serious Bible students will recognize that it is the principle of the cultural customs that twentieth century Christians need to imitate not the cultural customs themselves.

For example, the first part of the eleventh chapter of I Corinthians records an admonition that instructs Christian women to have their head covered during a worship service. Is this an admonition that twentieth century Christian women should imitate? To answer this question, it must be remembered that woman having their heads covered during a worship service was a first century custom. However, this custom had an important underlying principle which was a recognition of the leadership of men. Therefore, twentieth century Christian women do not have to imitate this custom, but they should imitate its principle.

The Bible is not filled with admonitions that can be altered by the wishes or desires of people. Rather it is filled with admonitions that record a divine pattern that is "good enough" every person of any generation.

1. "Now these things, brethren, I have figuratively applied to myself and Apollos for your sakes, that in us you might learn not to exceed what is written, in order that no one of you might become arrogant in behalf of one against the other." (I Corinthians 4:6)

2. "I am amazed that you are so quickly deserting Him who called you by the grace of Christ, for a different gospel; which is really not another; only there are some who are disturbing you, and want to distort the gospel of Christ. But even though we, or an angel from heaven, should preach to you a gospel contrary to that which we have preached to you, let him be accursed." (Galatians 1:6-8)

3. "Retain the standard of sound words which you have heard from me, in the faith and love which are in Christ Jesus." (II Timothy 1:13)

4. "Anyone who goes too far and does not abide in the teaching of Christ, does not have God; the one who abides in the teaching,

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

"In-Kind" Oil, Gas Programs Increase Funds
The Texas General Land Office's "in-kind" oil and gas programs pumped \$50.38 million into the Permanent School Fund (PSF) during fiscal 1997, an increase of \$12.37 million over fiscal 1996, final figures show.

Under these programs, the land office takes oil and gas from state leases in lieu of cash royalties to the lessee companies. If the lease calls for a 25 percent royalty for the PSF, the land office takes 25 percent of the production instead of the lessee's calculated cash value of the product.

The land office markets the oil through a sealed bid process to private firms, and sells the gas to various governmental entities, such as prisons, hospitals and colleges, giving them reduced gas utility costs. Currently, the land office is taking about half of its oil royalty in-kind, and about 35 percent of its gas royalty in-kind.

"These programs have proven to be highly successful, not only by producing more money for the Permanent School Fund but by saving on gas bills for 130 state entities and five other governmental entities," said Texas Land Commissioner Garry Mauro who initiated the programs back in the 1980s.

In fiscal 1996, in-kind oil sales produced \$16,126,523 for the PSF. The amount increased to

Lee Haygood Recognized by Angus Assoc.

Lee Haygood, Briscoe, Texas, has been recognized nationally by the American Angus Association for having 2 registered Angus cows included in the American Angus Association's 1998 Pathfinder Report.

Only 1,833 of the more than 30,000 members of the American Angus Association are represented in this year's report, according to Richard Spader, executive vice president of the American Angus Association with headquarters in St. Joseph, Missouri.

The Pathfinder Program identifies superior Angus cows based upon recorded performance traits that are economically important to efficient beef production. These traits include regular calving and heavy weaning

weights, reports John Crouch, director of performance programs for the American Angus Association. All registered Angus cows that meet the strict Pathfinder standards are listed, along with their owners, in the Pathfinder Report that is published annually by the American Angus Association.

The 1998 Pathfinder Report lists 7,225 individual cows. It is published in the May issue of the *Angus Journal* and extra copies are available from the American Angus Association. The largest number of Pathfinder cows from a single herd this year is 83, and several hundred breeders have a single cow that qualifies for the exclusive listing.

The land office is working with the U.S. Minerals Management Service to develop a pilot project for taking oil and gas in-kind at the federal level.

Since its creation in 1854, the Permanent School Fund has received \$7 billion in deposits from the land office, with more than half that amount coming during Mauro's 16-year tenure as land commissioner. In fiscal 1997, the land office deposited \$198.1 million from all sources into the fund, up from \$155 million in fiscal 1996.

From its investments, the fund produces about \$700 million per year for public education, or about \$215 per student.

FACTS ABOUT VA HEALTH CARE ENROLLMENT

Veterans and their families have raised questions about new eligibility and enrollment rules for VA health care. Specifically, misinformation has led some veterans to wonder whether they will lose their eligibility for VA health-care services if they are not enrolled at VA by October 1, 1998. The answer is NO, they will not lose their eligibility, but in most cases, they do need to apply for enrollment by contacting their nearest VA medical center or outpatient clinic.

VA healthcare eligibility reform was authorized by Congress and signed into law by the President in October 1996. The new law required VA to manage veterans' access to VA care by using a system of enrollment priorities. There are seven enrollment priority groups, and the Amarillo VA will enroll veterans from as many of the groups as possible.

Veterans can apply for enrollment AT ANY TIME they come to the medical center or one of the community based outpatient clinics for care, even AFTER the trial enrollment period, which ends on October 1, 1998.

If you have received VA healthcare services at any of our facilities since October 1, 1996 you do not need to apply. In this case, we will automatically process an application for enrollment on your behalf.

The series consist of 3 injections over a period of 6 months.
