The US Postal Service has issued one of its newest commemorative first-class \$.33 stamp in recognition of the 3000 hospices, 25,000 professionals and more than 100,000 volunteers that have made hospice, increasingly, the quality end-of-life choice for Americans.

Crown of Texas Hospice and Postmaster Ada Lester will commemorate the new hospice stamp at the:

Wheeler TX Post Office on Friday, March 26, 1999, from 10:00 am to 2:00 pm

A Ribbon Cutting/Presentation will take place at 11:00 am

The public will have the opportunity to purchase the hospice stamp which may be "cancelled" with the hospice cancellation.

The "Hospice Care" stamp symbolizes life's journey to its final stage, the part where hospice lends its vision for end-of-life care. The use of color gradations is an attempt to convey transition through the stages of life until we come home to death. The butterfly is a symbol of spiritual release - a positive metaphor for the last transition of life.

More than 100 million stamps will be issued and are available at every post office in the nation.

When asked what people think when they hear "hospice", many respond with the word "death" or "dying". Hospice care is about living...living life to the fullest. A limited edition commemorative stamp has just been released with the art symbolizing life's journey to its final stage, the part where hospice lends its vision for end-of-life care.

As more Americans live longer, family members are faced with confronting and planning for end-of-life care. It's no wonder that in a nationwide Gallup poll conducted in 1996 respondents cited their greatest fear associated with death is "being a burden to family and friends," and "fear of pain". Hospice care addresses these fears as well as many others.

Hospice professionals and volunteers are committed to helping people during the final stages of life to live life to the fullest in the warmth and comfort of their home or chosen environment and among family and friends. The stamp design includes a butterfly, symbolizing the spiritual release - a positive metaphor for the last transition of life. The use of color gradation is an attempt to convey transition through the stages of life until we come home to death. Those of us involved with hospice accept death as a natural part of life, seeking neither to hasten nor prolong the dying process...in short, to help terminally ill patients live out their final days in dignity, and without the fear of dying in pain and alone.

"The stamp is truly a unique and special form of recognition, with a plan for about 100 million to be printed," U.S. Postmaster General William J. Henderson said. "The USPS now receives approximately 40,000 suggestions annually for special editions, and it selects only about 30 new ones per year. We felt that on many levels, hospice services are something that Americans need to know more about. We hope this helps raise the awareness."

The "Hospice Care" stamp represents a celebration of 25 years of improving the way people are cared for at the end of their lives. I am among the thousands who dedicate this celebration to all those who have been served by hospice and the professionals and volunteers who make hospice end-of-life care a compassionate, dignified and meaningful experience.

2 Teenagers Killed in Separate Accidents

Twice in less than a week a teenager has been killed in a traffic accident in the Wheeler Area. One person was killed and four were injured in a two-vehicle accident in Wheeler on Friday night. A one-vehicle roll-over in the north edge of Wheeler County on Tuesday claimed the life of a Ft. Elliott senior.

Kimberly Newland, 16, of Plains died at 8:40 p.m. at Parkview Hospital in Wheeler, as the result of the accident at the intersection of Hwy 83 and Farm-to-Market Road 2473 (Cemetery Road) on Friday.

Ja'Nae Goad, 17, was driving on FM 3303, east and north of Briscoe. She could possibly have dodged something on the road and lost control of the vehicle a little after 9:00 P.M. The auto rolled, tossing Ja'Nae out.

Newland was a passenger in a 1998 Chevrolet Camaro driven by 18-year-old Andrew Hillhouse of Wheeler.

The accident occurred around 8:15 p.m. just inside the south city limits.

Hillhouse was traveling north on U.S. 83 and attempted to make a left turn onto FM 2473, when the wreck occurred.

Hillhouse was taken to Northwest Texas Hospital for facial injuries and a possible broken neck. He was released Saturday.

Jarod Newland, 14, of Plains, was in the back seat of the Camaro. He was taken to Nwth in Amarillo and released Saturday.

David Immel, 30, of Wheeler was the driver of the other vehicle, a 1985 Ford Bronco. Immel was taken to Parkview, where he was treated for facial injuries and released.

Antelope was among the chiefs to sign the Treaty of Fort Wish on February 18, 1861.
August 1864 the peace faction of the Cheyennes led by White Antelope and Black Kettle dispatched a letter to Fort Lyon (formerly Fort Wise) asking that peace be reestablished. Major Edward Wynkoop influenced by a Cheyenne Squawman John S. Smith led an expedition into the heart of Indian country. Meeting with the Cheyennes on Smokey Hill River. He talked to them and White Antelope

PEACE CHIEFS OF THE CHEYENNE TRIBE

(Editor's Note: The following is part of a series of articles on the "Peace Chiefs" of the Cheyenne Tribe. The chiefs did not fight in Indian Wars after they became chief. Those killed were not fighting at the time of their death. The Native Americans are the focus of the Wheeler County Heritage Day on June 26, 1999. The information is made available to the Times by Melba Corcoran.)

WHITE ANTELOPE
White Antelope was another of the peace chiefs of the Cheyenne. In his earlier years he had been a great warrior. He was reported to have been with Yellow Wolf when he raided the Iowa horse herd on the North Fork of the Red River in 1826. He also took part in the battle against the Kiowa and Comanche on Wolf Creek. He was described as a leading peace-maker between the Cheyenne and the Comanches and Kiowas in 1840.

Since he was among the bravest and strongest of the Dog Soldiers he was assigned along with Little Old Man to go out and talk with the warriors bands about making peace. The Dog Soldiers put the matter into the hands of the two spokesmen so they went back, and told the chiefs that they were willing to make peace. Spring 1842 his village was camped at Cherry Creek they were visited by Bill Hamilton and his part of 8 free trappers. They stayed with the Cheyenne for some time trading and hunting.

In 1848 Hamilton and a party near Ash Hollow came upon White Antelope and seventy-five Cheyenne. They visited with them. Hamilton wrote that White Antelope was a noted chief and a proud and fine-looking warrior.
William Boggs stated that White Antelope made a successful rain on the Pawnee by himself in the winter of 1844. He went on foot and was gone five to six weeks. The tribe had given him up for dead, when he finally returned with eleven Pawnee scalps.
1851 he was at the signing of the Treaty of Fort Laramie. Though he was not one of the principal chiefs to sign the treaty. He was chosen to visit the Great Father in Washington. He did sign the amended version of the treaty in 1853 on the South Platte River.

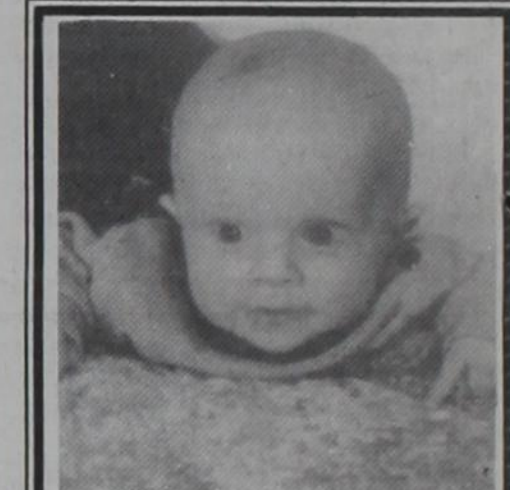
After returning from Washington he strove to keep peace with the whites. He was with the large body Cheyenne that were attacked on the Republican River in late July 1857 by General Edwin V. Sumner.
On July 29 Sumners had 400 troop and 4-mountain howitzer. He left his wagon train and pushed ahead to engage the Cheyenne warriors who had made medicine against the white men's bullets. Sumners however chose to make a saber attack. This unnerved the Cheyennes and put them to retreat.

October 1857 White Antelope and three other chiefs appeared at Bent's Fort on the Arkansas River insisting that the attack had been unwarranted. It had been the North Platte Cheyennes, the Dog Soldiers that had been committing the acts of war against the whites. He said, "we are separate and distinct bands. They have their own rules and regulations".
Colonel W. A. Phillips visited the central plains in 1859, where he and his party came upon a great camp of Cheyennes on the upper Saline River. There they met White Antelope and other chiefs. They presented them with presents. White Antelope took his and divided it among his people and then, folding his blanket across his breast retired to his tipi. White

Antelope was among the chiefs to sign the Treaty of Fort Wish on February 18, 1861.

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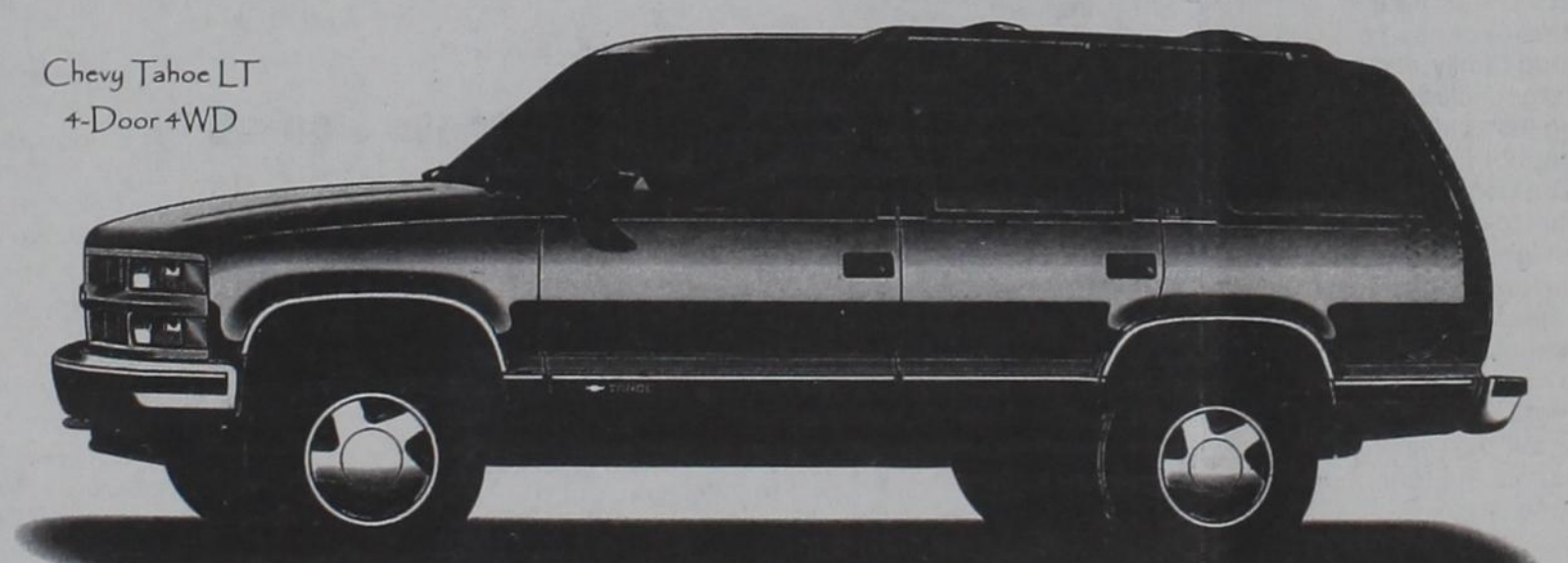

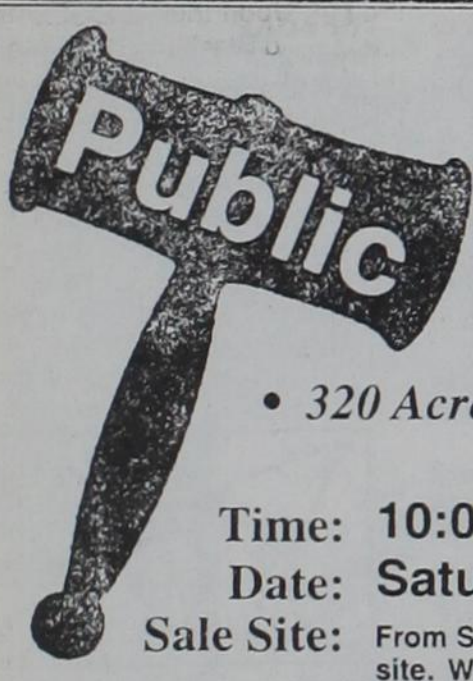

was on of the Cheyenne chiefs to agree to go to Denver for a council with Governor Evans and Colonial Cheyenne.

It was an act of courage for the chiefs for there were many among them who said it was dangerous and unwise to trust the word of the white men.

White Antelope made a speech during the council held on September 28, 1864. "When we sent our letter to Major Wynkoop it was like going through a strong fire, or blast, for Major Wynkoop's men to come to our camp; it was the same for us to come see you. We have our doubts whether the Indians south of the Arkansas or those North of the Platte, will do as you say. A large number of Sioux have crossed the Platte in the vicinity of the junction into our country. When Major Wynkoop came, we had no power to make peace. He said he had no power to make peace except to bring us here and return us safe. I understand every word you have said and will hold on to it. I will give you an answer directly. I Chieyenne all of them, have their ears open this way, and they will hear what you say. I am proud to have seen the Chief of all whites in this country. I will tell my people. Ever since I went to Washington and received this medal, I have called all white men as my brothers, but other Indians have since been to Washington and got medals and now the soldiers do not shake hands, but seek to kill me." White Antelope then promised Evans that he had "Taken you by the hand, and will tell the truth, and keep them from nothing."

He then answered all questions to the best of his ability about the trouble on the plains. The council ended with Cheyenne, a former minister, took the floor and said "I am not a big war chief, but all the soldiers in this country are at my command. My rule for fighting white men or Indians is, to fight them until they lay down their arms and submit to military authority. You are nearer Major Wynkoop than anyone else is and you can go to him when you are ready."

The chiefs considered his words to be a promise of protection if they would take their families into Fort Lyon. Upon their return White Antelope and Black Kettle began to move their villages toward Fort Lyon. They camped about 40 miles above the fort. They found that Major Scott Anthony had replaced Major Wynkoop. He told the Indians he was unable to feed them and they should remain at the Bend of Sand Creek. There they would not be bothered by government troops and where they could better hunt for their own subsistence.

Major Anthony was quick to go along with Cheyenne plan to attack the Sand Creek Village. At day break November 29, 1864 they found the village. A squaw out gathering wood alerted the village about moments before the troop attack.

White Antelope and Black Kettle raised a large American flag in front of Black Kettle's lodge. The flag was a gift of Commissioner A. B. Greenwood to Black Kettle in 1860.

They called out to the tribe to be calm that they were under the protection of the troops. Then the soldiers started firing with their pistols, rifles, and even the cannon.

White Antelope trying to prove his friendship ran forward with his hands in the air shouting Stop, Stop in English. When he was 15 to 20 steps in front of a line of troops. He finally saw it was hopeless to try and stop them. He folded his arm over his chest and began his death song "nothing lives long, except the earth and the mountains."

They shot him down. Later while the soldiers were celebrating their victory with whiskey they scalped him, then cut off his nose, ears and his scrotum to be used as a tobacco pouch. They killed over a hundred Indians that day. The battle has become known as the Sand Creek Massacre.

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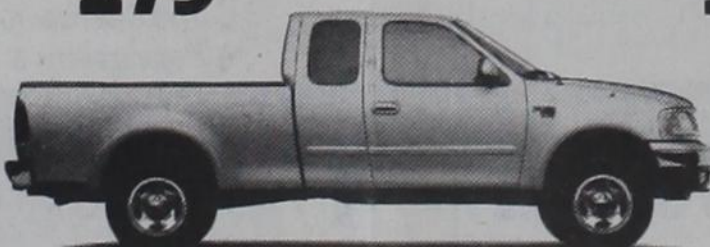
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
