## Wheeler I.S.D. Receives TEA "Recognized" Rating

Wheeler ISD has received accountability ratings from TEA. Wheeler ISD is again a "Recognized" school. In order to be rated as Recognized, at least 80% of students and each student group had to show mastery on the TAAS tests. Dropout rates had to be 3.5% or less for all students and each student group. And, attendance rates had to be at least 94% for grades 1-12. In order to be classified as "Exemplary", the highest rating, a school would have had to have at 90% passing rates, a 1.0% dropout rate, and at least 94% attendance. for the Nationals in Northfork, Virginia. Only the four best times, throw

or jumps qualified. Those boys from the Wheeler area competing were Michael Jones in the 300, Juan Salas in the 100 m hurdles, 200 m hurdles and mile relay; Dee Alston in the same three plus the triple jump; Tyler Lewis in the 100 m, 400 m and the mile relay; Chris Gallagher in the 100 m, mile relay and the long jump; and Junior Newman from Briscoe in the 400 m and the 800

Juan Salas in the 100 hurdles; Michael Jones in 800 m, and Junior Newman in the 800 m (midget division) qualified on Friday to stay and compete in the finals on Saturday. However because of their slow prelim times, Salas and Jones decided not to stay and run on Saturday. Junior Newman did stay and ran a very fine 2:34 800 meters to place fourth and qualify to go on to Virginia.

Chris Gallagher placed ninth in the long jump competition with a good 16'2" jump. The winning jump in his age group was 19'6".

### Wheeler Kindergarten **Enrollment Information**

Any child who will be 5 years old on or before Sept. 1, of this year is elgible to attend kindergarten.

Registration packets for children who will be attending Wheeler ISD Kindergarten during this school year are available and may be picked up in the hall outside the superintendent's office on business days.

The required forms included in the packets are: 1. Registration form. 2. Student health information (a two page questionnaire); 3. Home language survey. The parent/guardian must provide all the requested information, including full legal names and the child's social security number, as well as, copies of the child's official birth certificate (state copy - not hospital copy) and immunization records (authorized by doctor of official clinic), before his/her child can be enrolled in

The estimated length of time needed to finish these documents is from 15 to 30 minutes; some of the information required (for example, the date of the last dental exam or the phone number of your preferred hospital ) is generally kept with other personal records at home or may even require a call to your family

Because of these factors, coupled with the usual, unavoidable registration "Traffic Jam" of waiting in line to complete the enrollment process, school personnel believed some parents might prefer the option of completing these documents in the quiet and privacy of their own homes. Parents who prefer to wait until registration day are welcome to do so.





### AREA SCHOOLS' FREE & REDUCED PRICE MEALS

The Fort Elliott CISD, Allison ISD, Kelton ISD, and Wheeler ISD today announced their policy for providing free and reduced-price meals for children served under the National School Lunch and School Breakfast Program. The central office has a copy of the policy, which may be reviewed by any interested party.

The household size and income criteria identified below will be used to determine eligibility for free and reduced-price benefits. Children from households whose income is at or below the levels shown are eligible for free or reduced-price meals. Foster children who are the legal responsibility of a welfare agency or court may also be eligible for benefits regardless of the income of the household with whom they reside. Eligibility for the foster child is based on the child's income.

Application forms are being distributed to all households with a letter informing households of the availability of free and reduced-price meals for their children. Applications also are available at the principal's office in each school. To apply for free and reduced price meals, households must fill out the applications and return it to the school. Applications may be submitted anytime during the school year. The information households provide on the application will be used for the purpose of determining eligibility and verification of data. Applications may be verified by the school officials at any time during the

school year. For school officials to determine eligibility for free and reduced-price benefits, households receiving food stamps or AFDC/TANF only have to list their child's name, food stamp or AFDC/TANF case number, and an adult household member must sign the application. Households who do not list a food stamp or AFDC /TANF case number must list the names of all household members, the amount and source of the income received by each household member, and the social security number of the adult household member who signs the application. If the adult who signs the application does not have a social security number, the household member must indicate that a social security number is not available by writing the word "NONE." The application must be signed by an adult house-

hold member.

Under the provisions of the free and reduced-price meal policy the reviewing official will review applications and determine eligibility. Parents or guardians dissatisfied with the ruling of the official may wish to discuss the decision with the reviewing official on an informal basis. Parents wishing to make a formal appeal for a hearing on the decision may make a request either orally or in writing to the Superintendent at the district office.

Households that list a food stamp of AFDC/TANF case number must report when the household no longer receives these benefits. Other households approved for benefits based on income information must report increases in household income of over \$50 per month or \$600 per year and decreases in household size. Also, if a household member becomes unemployed or if the household size increases, the household should contact the school. Such changes may make the children of the household eligible for benefits if the household's income falls at or below the levels shown above.

In the operation of child feeding programs administered by the U.S. Department of Agriculture, no child will be discriminated against because of race, color, sex, national origin, age, or handicap. If any member of a household believes they have been discriminated against, they should write immediately to the Secretary of Agriculture, Washington, D.C. 20250.




