

Graveside Services Pending For Kevin D. Rarden

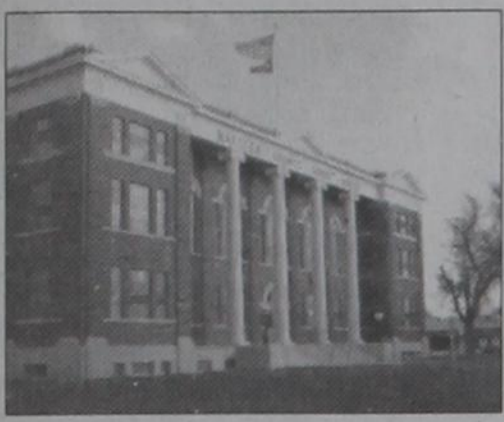

CITY ORDINANCE

DISASTER DECLARATION 2011

WHEREAS, on January 10th, 2011, the Mayor issued a proclamation declaring a state of disaster for City of Wheeler resulting from "Imminent threat of loss of life and property from wildfires";

WHEREAS, the conditions necessitating declaration of a state of disaster continue to exist; and

WHEREAS, §418.108(b) of the Texas Government Code provides that a local state of disaster may not be continued for a period of excess of seven days without the consent of the governing body of the political subdivision,

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDERED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF Wheeler Texas:

1. That the state of disaster proclaimed for the imminent threat of wildfires by the Mayor on January 10th, 2011, shall continue until terminated by order of the CITY COUNCIL.

2. This ordinance is passed as an emergency measure and pursuant to local authority for emergency measures and shall become effective on the 17th day of January, 2011.

PASSED AND ADOPTED, this 17th day of January, 2011.

Each nomination is to be accompanied by a list of reasons for the nomination. The list will be used in determining the most deserving.

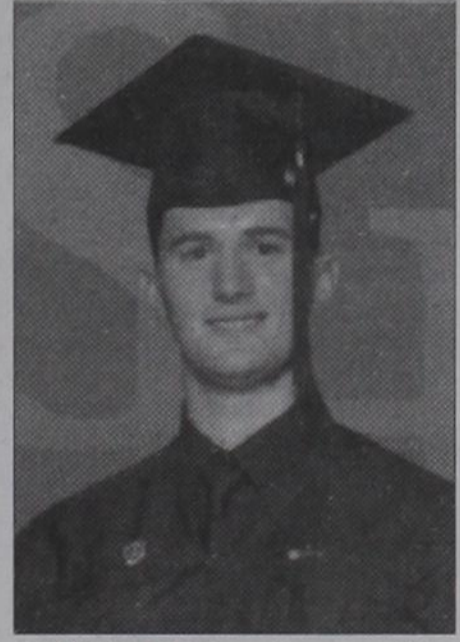

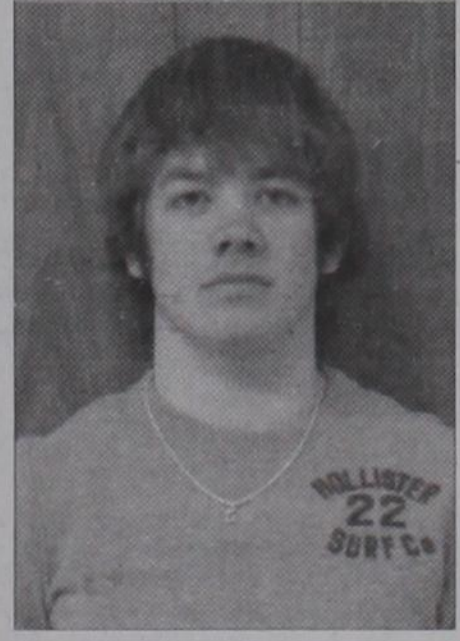
Comm. Court Has Jan. 24 Meeting

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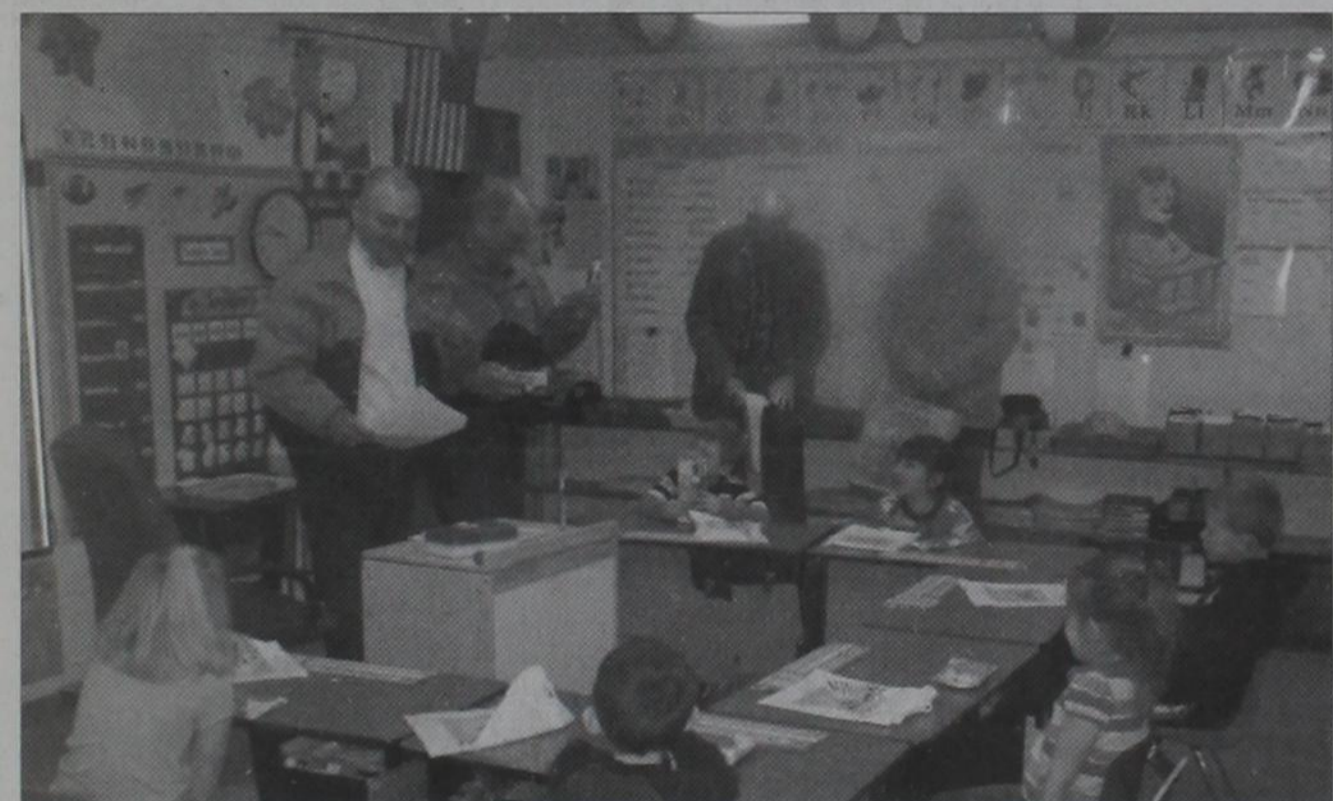

Tips For Driving Safely In Fog

Thick fog is a common winter driving hazard. When you are driving in fog, you should slow down to adjust to the reduced visibility. In the most severe situations, a Dense Fog Advisory will be issued if visibility is reduced to less than one-quarter mile.

Slow down. Disengage your cruise control. Most crashes occur because the driver is going too fast for weather conditions.

Use your low beams. **High beams will reflect back in thick fog, making visibility worse for you and other drivers.** Keep your car headlights clean. Get in the habit of wiping off your lights at the gas station, that way you're ready for low-visibility conditions.

Keep the view clear. Avoid fogged windows by regularly using the defroster and windshield wipers. Moisture can build up on the windshield both inside and out. The air conditioning setting will help keep moisture from building up inside.

Minimize distractions. Turn off the music and don't talk on your cell phone, so you can listen for traffic you cannot see.

Increase following distance to ensure enough time to stop safely.

Watch for emergency stops by other vehicles. Watch for slow-moving and parked vehicles. (Σ)

Use the right edge of the road, white fog line or roadside reflectors as a guide. Do not change lanes or pass other vehicles unless necessary.

If you pull off the road, pull over as far as possible, turn off your headlights and turn on your hazard lights.

Trooper Hawthorne says "Always turn your headlights on while in low visibility situations. Do not depend on your daytime driving lights; these lights do not turn on your tail lamps. Manually turn on your lights in daytime low visibility situations."

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OLD TIMES NOT FORGOTTEN

BIG MONEY HAULING HAY

By the time most of my friends and I were teen-agers, we'd already been exposed to the joys of hay-baling, hauling, and stacking. Now, it's time to take advantage of that "experience" and set about to making some real money!

I'll have to admit, it wasn't just the money that made this particular job appealing. It was also, about working with friends in a place where we liked to be anyway. The fact that we all could make big bucks, be outside and often close to the creek or a pond, was right down our alley. All the conditions were just right for us.

Dale Wofford's folks decided to invent a way to keep him busy in the summer. They bought him an old flatbed Ford truck, probably about a 1946 model. Now, he was a bona fide hay hauler! What he needed to complete this position was a couple of friends with strong backs and weak minds. Jimmy Hill and I pretty much fit the bill for the job. Time to start raking in the money! After all, hay hauling was paying six cents a bale. All you had to do, was to drive around in the meadow, while two of us picked up the bales and threw

them up on the truck, the other one would stack them, so they would sort of lock together.

We didn't need a driver for the truck out in the meadow. We'd just put it in the "granny gear" and let it randomly idle around, while we loaded the bales. Then we'd take the bales to the location the farmer wanted them...stack'em there and head out for another load. As you can see, the bales were handled four times, providing none fell off on the way to the stack. If that happened, some would be handled a sixth time.

If there was a pond or creek nearby, we would always go for a swim at the end of the day. Most of the time, we'd wind up cleaner afterwards, than we were before we went swimming.

On a good long day, if we didn't have to haul too far, or lose part of a load, we'd tally up about 600 bales. Dale got a cent and a half for himself, a cent and a half for his truck, and Jimmy and I got a cent and a half each for our part, for each bale stacked. Dale was always good with arithmetic, so he could figure it up in his head. Six hundred bales amounted to eighteen dollars for him and his truck, and nine dollars each for Jimmy and me. It was kind of the slow way to get rich, but it kept us out of trouble.

The following summer, I went to Kansas with the Crossland family to haul hay and I think Jimmy's dad had work for him on their place. Dale got Wallace Johnson and Dale Bowerman to help him. He said they were really good hands, especially if you could keep Bowerman's mischievous streak under control, but then, that's Dale's story to tell...

Got Flu?

Your head aches, and so does every bone in your body. You're cold one minute and hot the next. Your throat is scratchy and you're starting to cough. You may be getting the flu!

If you have the flu, you'll have lots of company. Each year from November to April, all across the United States, as many as 60 million people come down with the flu. Although children get the flu most often, people in every age group can catch it. Usually when you're sick with a virus, your body builds up a defense system by making antibodies against it, so you don't get that particular virus strain again. Unfortunately, flu viruses mutate (change) each year, so you aren't protected from getting the flu forever.

Although you may feel miserable if you get the flu, it's unlikely to be serious. It's rare that healthy people have complications like pneumonia or bronchitis from the flu. Older adults (over age 65), young kids (under age 5), and people with chronic medical conditions are more likely to become seriously ill with the flu.

If you get the flu, the best way to take care of yourself is to rest in bed and drink lots of liquids like water and other noncaffeinated drinks. Stay home from school or work until you feel better and your temperature has returned to normal.

You probably don't need to contact your doctor unless you develop complications or you have a medical condition (for example, diabetes or heart or lung problems).

Antibiotics don't help people with the flu get better because they don't work on viruses. Sometimes doctors can prescribe an antiviral medicine to reduce the length of time someone is ill from the flu.

Physical Activity: Get Moving for Good Health

"Regular physical activity is important for good health," said Wendy Hazzard County Extension Agent. However most Americans aren't moving enough. According to data from the Behavioral Risk Factor Surveillance System, 25% of Americans reported that they did not participate in any type of leisure physical activity in the previous month. "Families are busy with work and school related activities and that doesn't leave a lot of time for physical activity in their day" Hazzard said.

The 2005 Dietary Guidelines for Americans and the United States Department of Agriculture's Food Guidance System, also known as MyPyramid, emphasize the importance of physical activity (www.mypyramid.gov). In fact, regular physical activity can reduce a person's risk of certain chronic diseases such as high blood pressure, stroke, type 2 diabetes, coronary artery disease, colon cancer, and osteoporosis.

Physical activity, any bodily movement that uses energy, is also a key player in body weight management. "Increasing amounts of physical activity in your daily routine can help you burn extra calories to either lose weight or prevent weight gain," commented Hazzard.

So, what are the recommendations for needed amounts of physical activity? Hazzard says the 2005 Dietary Guidelines for Americans recommend the following:

- To reduce the risk of chronic disease, engage in at least 30 minutes of moderate-intensity physical activity, above usual activity at work or home on most days of the week
- To help manage body weight and prevent gradual, unhealthy weight gain, engage in 60 minutes of moderate to vigorous intensity activity on most days of the week
- To sustain weight loss, participate in at least 60 to 90 minutes a day of moderate-intensity physical activity

"Children also need to be active and should engage in at least 60 minutes of physical activity each day," Hazzard added. "Activities involving the whole family are great for everyone's health and family bonding."

Examples of moderate physical activities include walking briskly (3.5 miles per hour), hiking, gardening/yard work, bicycling (less than 10 miles per hour), and dancing. Vigorous physical activity might include running/jogging (5 miles per hour), biking (more than 10 miles per hour), swimming laps, aerobics, heavy yard work, and walking very fast (4.5 miles per hour).

"It's important to remember that for many of us starting with 30 minutes of walking each day is a big improvement. Even this amount of physical activity has benefits," Hazzard commented. "You can also do a few minutes of physical activity here and there throughout the day to add up to at least 30 minutes a day." Hazzard also adds to check with your doctor before starting any physical activity program.
