

Burnice Earl Clift was born April 16, 1900 in Duncan, MO to Nancy Ellen (Coots) and Gabriel Clift and passed away May 9, 1998 in the Sayre Memorial Hospital at the age of 98 years and 23 days.

Burnice married Lottie (Kelley) Clift on February 22, 1925. The couple purchased a farm near Reydon where they established their home. Three children were born to this union, Gwen, Noel "Sonny", and Joyce. Two children preceded him in death, Gwen (Lane) in 1973 and "Sonny" in 1985. Joyce married Loyd Beals and still lives in the Sweetwater Community. His wife, Lottie, also preceded him in death in 1977. Burnice came to Oklahoma in 1911 with his parents when they left Missouri in 2 covered wagons. They settled in the Grimes area where he attended Highland School. As a young man Bernice spent a year in the U.S. Army. Burnice probably knew more early settlers in the Reydon area than anyone else. Guests were Chris Osborne and Supt. Glyndol Holland.


