It can cause permanent liver damage and scanning, severe illness, and in some cases even death. Every week hundreds of teenagers get Hepatitis B. Like most viral illnesses, once Hepatitis B virus is contracted, there is no cure. Hepatitis B virus is transmitted by blood and body fluids. The series consist of 3 injections over a period of 6 months.

Local Wheat Crop Not Hurt by Recent Freeze

Has this latest cold snap damaged area wheat? To find out, farmers have been out checking their fields. So has Dr. Brent Bean, agronomist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service here.

Bean says wheat in fields to the north of the city wouldn't be harmed with anything other than possible leaf burn since the head of the plant is still below ground. This is called the pre-jointing stage of growth in wheat.

In areas to the south, plants might be entering the first phases of jointing, and therefore more susceptible to cold or freeze damage. Once above ground, the plant becomes more vulnerable to temperature extremes.

"We're still early in the growth period. There is excellent soil moisture and a lot of time for the plants to recover," said Bean, who is closely monitoring current wheat research trials at the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station near Bushland.

"There are 20 varieties involved in our Bushland study," he said, None of the wheat in these trials had jointed as of last Friday. The plots were planted on Sept. 9.

According to the agronomist, cold temperatures would need to be in the single digits for a sustained period to affect pre-jointed wheat significantly. Should damage occur, Bean said only the leaves would show any ill effects, And new leaves soon replace weaker ones as part of the plant's recovery.

In fact, Bean thinks the cold weather may be a blessing since early spring freezes, such as the one last year on April 12, can do extensive damage. With this year's chilly temperatures coming just before spring's onset, the wheat's development is delayed enough to offset the impact of a later freeze.

Russell J. Woollard Completes 6-Mo. Tour

Marine Cpl. Russell J. Woollard, son of Rick and Judy L. Woollard of Mobeetie, Texas, recently returned to his homebase of Camp Pendleton, Calif., after a six-month deployment to the Western Pacific and Indian Oceans and Arabian Gulf, With the 13th Marine Expeditionary Unit (MEU), embarked aboard the ships of the USS Peleliu Amphibious Ready Group (ARG).

During the deployment, Woollard's unit participated in Operation Southern Watch in the Arabian Gulf, enforcing U.N. sanctions levied against Iraq after the Gulf War in 1991. The MEU also participated in Exercise Eager Mace, an amphibious, ground, air and naval training exercise with Kuwaiti armed forces demonstrating U.S. resolve and commitment to the region.



HOW IMPORTANT IS POISON PACKAGING?

Children are curious creatures with an ample amount of persistence. When it comes to opening a container if their fingers won't work, their teeth might.

The Poison Prevention Packaging Act requires that packages be difficulf for children under five to open and obtain a toxic amount within what's termed a reasonable time.

U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission regulations require that aspirin and other products be packaged in special containers which would prevent at least 80 percent of those children tested from opening the container during a 10 minute

"This means that some children may still be able to open and obtain a toxic amount of the product," said Janet Pollard, Extension associatehealth. "Therefore keep poisonous substances out of reach.

Adults can find child-resistance packaging on products such as aspirin, liquid furniture polish, oil of wintergreen, drain cleaners, lighter fluids, turpentine and paint solvents.

Remember these steps to use child-resistant packaging properly: --Read the instructions to make it

easier to open the packaging. -- Be sure to resecure the closure tightly. Nevertransfer the contents to other containers.

-Do not leave loose pills anywhere. -Keep medicines and household products (even those with safety caps) out of sight.





"Productivity appraisal" may lower the property taxes on your farm, ranch or timber land!

Texas law allows farmers, ranchers, and timber growers to pay property taxes based upon the "production value" of their land rather than on its market value. This "productivity appraisal" means qualified land is taxed based on its ability to produce crops, livestock, or timber-not on its value on the real estate market. And it can mean substantial property tax savings.

When is the application deadline?

If your land has never had a productivity appraisal or you are a new owner, you must apply to your local appraisal district by April 30 to take advantage of this benefit on your 1998 property taxes. You may get up to 60 extra days if you have a good reason and ask for it by April 30. If you miss this deadline, you may still be able to apply, but you will pay a penalty. Check with your appraisal district office.

Do you need to reapply annually?

If your land already receives agricultural or timber productivity appraisal, you normally don't need to reapply unless the chief appraiser requires you to do so. If a new application is required, the appraisal district will notify you by mail.



- 4. A comprehensive revision of the hearing process.
