

This year was a learning experience for the Allison Lady Lopes. They only had two returning starters from last year. The season ended with a 19-7 record for the Lady Lopes. Jaicee Herren was honored with All District MVP (most valuable player) and TACB All Region. Both Jaicee and Glenda Dukes received All District. Kendra Lane was voted for Honorable Mention All District.

The Allison Antelopes placed 2nd in district, but were defeated in Bi-District by the Gruver Greyhounds. Starting for the Antelopes was Nathan Rainey being rewarded Six Man All Region and Six Man All State, Nathan, Monty Dukes, and Ashley Lane all received All District. Kelly Lane and lan Jones received Honorable Mention All District. The Antelopes finished the season 13-13.



Breast Cancer Screening At Parkview on April 27

The Women's Center of the Don and Sybil Harrington Cancer Center and Baptist St. Anthony's Health System will conduct a Breast Cancer Screening Clinic at Parkview Hospital, 901 S Sweetwater in Wheeler on April 27, 1999.

Breast cancer affects one in eight women. The key to winning the battle against cancer is early detection by having an annual breast exam, mammogram and performing a breast self-exam each month.

Participants will receive a low-cost screening that includes a mammogram and instruction on selfexamination by a registered nurse. The total cost is \$75.00. A minimum of fifteen women needs to register in order for the mobile mammography clinic to come to area towns. Funding is available through Texas Depart-ment of Health for Texas residents who qualify for assistance. All exams are done by appointment only. Spring A Busy Time For Farming & Conservation

Spring is a busy time for farming operations and for conservation work. Wheeler County has a lot of conservation work to be done this spring. CRP grass must be planted before June 1st. If you have grass to seed this year, plans should be made to get the seed and get it planted. If you have OLD STANDS of Lovegrass or Plains Bluestem that will be replaced with Native Grasses, work should be underway to remove old grass and get ready to plant a dead litter cover this fall. Also, if wheat has been planted for a cover crop, it needs to be killed before or about April 15th. We have 68 CRP contracts that have some of this work to be done.

EQIP producers are also busy applying conservation practices. Pipelines for livestock water, fences, water storage facilities are being installed this year.

Technical Assistance to install these practices is provided to producers by the local NRCS (SCS) office in Wheeler. For several years Calvin Devereaux and Fred Allison have been here to give assistance, however; due to people retiring in Wellington and Pampa, the Wheeler Staff has been reduced. Calvin Devereaux will be working full-time in

SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT--is the term used or perhaps quietly being implemented in your commu-

Sharon Spenrath, Past President of the Texas CattleWomen, had never heard the term until two years ago. She was invited to attend a meeting of a "Visioning Council" in her county. This initial committee was charged with bringing the Texas Hill Country into compliance with the rules and requirements of a process called "Sustainable Development or Managed Societies". While the idea of building a better community sounded appealing, the committee's techniques for accomplishing their goals raised some red flags.

Spenrath and her husband are ranchers in the area and were concerned that this process would adversely affect their livelihood. Sustainable Development would result in the loss of private property rights. Following two years of research, Spenrath is convinced that Sustainable Development and the hidden political movement driving it will destroy both rural communities and cit-

A capsule view of the Sustainable Development doctrine was once expressed by Maurice Strong, founder of the Earth Council, and Chair of the Business Council for Sustainable Development, and presently appointed to reform the United Nations: "It is clear that current lifestyles and consumption patterns of the affluent middle class--involving high meat intake, consumption of large amounts offrozen and convenience foods, use of fossil fuels, appliances, home and workplace air conditioning, and suburban housing--are not sustainable. A shift in Lifestyles is needed."

As ranchers, Kenneth, Sharon, and their children, Amanda and Michael Spenrath are devoted environmentalists, and see no need for a shift in lifestyles. This conflicting philosophy is why Sharon Spenrath is visiting various communities to share her


