For the past 10 years, Christner has been employed at United States National Bank in Galveston as a loan officer and he has served as vicepresident in the loan department of that bank since 1993.



The family requests memorials be to the Amarillo Chapter of the American heart Association.



Basil Overton, the editor of a religious newspaper that is published in Florence, Alabama, recently wrote an editorial that some religious people need to read. This editorial was entitled, "Is The Conscience A Safe Guide" and it said:

"There are many people who think that it does not matter what one believes or does in religion, just so they follow their conscience. But this philosophy exalts one's conscience above the Word of God; this philosophy makes one's conscience his guide instead of the Bible. Instead of the conscience being a safe guide, it must be safety guided by the Word of God. The conscience approves or disapproves, as it has been instructed. If the conscience has been instructed wrongly, it may approve of things that are wrong, or even disappointed of things that are right. A misguided conscience can mislead; this is often the case."

"Surely, almost all of us have had the experience of honestly taking the wrong road in traveling, going several miles, feeling all the time that we were on the







In 1866 and 1867, soon after the Civil War, Congress organized the Ninth and Tenth Cavalry Division and the Twenty-Fourth and Twenty-Fifth Infantry Regiments for western duty against the Indian Nations. The native Americans had such great respect for the fighting abilities of black soldiers, that they called them "Buffalo Soldiers", because of the soldiers' strength and courage they displayed during battle.

Buffalo soldiers were stationed at Fort Elliott and other military outposts from Texas to the Dakota territories, to help with the westward expansion of the U.S. The heroic deeds of most Buffalo Soldiers were never knows beyond the campfires of their comrades. The Indians knew the worth of the Buffalo Soldier. Like the buffalo itself, he had strength and courage, their accomplishments and endeavors are part of the heritage of Fort Elliott and Texas.



In the 1940's the towns in Wheeler County were Allison, Briscoe, Benonine, Kelton, Lela, Mobeetie, Shamrock and Wheeler.

Allison was settled on the Lone Star Townsite Co land bought from Nelson Willard. In 1929 the court granted A. V. Airington a 50-year telephone franchise for Allison and Briscoe, Bell Telephone had lines there too. The court asked them to get together on long distance messages and they agreed to make interconnections. On May 30, 1932 S. T. Rain was given a 50-year franchise for water system and in December 1932, C. A. Copeland, A. F. Forbis and others formed the Allison Consumers' Water Club. The Wiley Gas Co furnished Allison's fuel. Allison absorbed the voting boxes from Zybach in Aug. 1932.

Briscoe was first called Conrad. It was also on property sold by Nelson Willard to Lone Star Townsite Co. They were also service by The Wiley Gas Co for fuel.

Twitty was smaller than Allison or Briscoe. It was almost half way between Wheeler and Shamrock. The gin was a big service to the farmers since they didn't have to go as far to get their cotton ginned.

Kelton was also small. It had a wonderful school system, gin, filling station and store to accommodate the farmers.

Benonine was on the East Side of the county. It had a printing office at which some of the county printing was done. It also bid and received some of the county money on deposit and had high hope. June 12, 1933, T. E. Warden of Palo Pinto Co. and J. H. Scright, joint owners of 389 acres Sec. 5 Blk. 12, asked to have plating set aside and pay taxes on it as acreage property since no improvements since 1910.

STORM WARNING INFORMATION

When threatening weather is in the area, the Wheeler Volunteer Fire Department will have units surrounding Wheeler in an effort to detect severe weather (high winds, hail, heavy rain and tornado).

If tornadic conditions are detected the storm sirens will be sounded. When the sirens sound you should enter a storm shelter immediately. (The County Courthouse will be open for persons without access to a cellar.) The siren will sound for 105 seconds.

The WVFD will NOT give an "ALL CLEAR" signal. YOU are responsible for determining when the weather conditions are settled enough to leave your shelter.

The siren will only sound when dangerous conditions exist and for testing each Saturday at 12 noon.



When he failed to return home March 14, the boy phoned relatives.


