

Mustangs 1998 Area Champions

Regional Playoff Friday Against Sudan

Wheeler traveled to Dick Bivens Stadium last Friday night to take on the Happy Cowboys in the Area Championship. Wheeler was the District 1-1A Champion, and Happy was the District 2-1A. The winner of the Area game would go on to play either Sudan or Marfa in the Regional Championship.

Wheeler opened the game kicking off to Happy. After adjusting to the Cowboys' offense, the Mustang Defense was able to force a fumble and recover on the Wheeler 42 yard line. The Mustang Offense was then able to grind out a 10 play, 58 yard drive ending with a 21 yard run by Aaron Dunnam. The extra point kick failed, and the Mustangs led 6-0 with 4:44 left in the First Quarter. Wheeler's Defense was again able to hold Happy, and turned the ball over to the Mustang Offense on the Wheeler 43 yard line.

The offense then pounded the ball down the field on a 12 play, 57 yard drive. Caleb Finsterwald tight rope walked down the sidelines 11 yards, and dove into the end zone for Wheeler's second score of the night. Aaron Dunnam ran in the two point conversion and gave the Mustangs a 14-0 lead with 9:24 left in the Second Quarter. Happy came back with a score of their own. The Cowboys' quarterback went out to a wide receiver position. Happy's back-up quarterback connected with the starting quarterback for a long gain. He did not score, but on the next play he

threw a 10 yard touch down pass. Wheeler's lead was cut to 14-6 with 7:32 left in the Second Quarter. The Mustangs would take Happy's kick off and return it to their own 35 yard line. Wheeler's offense then went 65 yards on 11 plays. Casey Childress capped off the drive with a 4 yard run. The extra point attempt failed, and the Mustangs led 20-6 with 3:35 left in the half. Happy did not quit however. They drove the ball down 60 yards and scored another touchdown with 24 seconds left in the Second Quarter. Wheeler went into the locker room at half time leading 20-13.

Wheeler received the kickoff to start the Third Quarter. The Mustangs started on their own 13 yard line after an illegal block in the back penalty. On the second play from scrimmage, Aaron Dunnam hooked up with Kyle Masters on an 85 yard touch down pass. The two point conversion failed and left the Mustangs ahead of the Happy Cowboys 26-13 with 10:56 left in the Third Quarter. On Happy's first

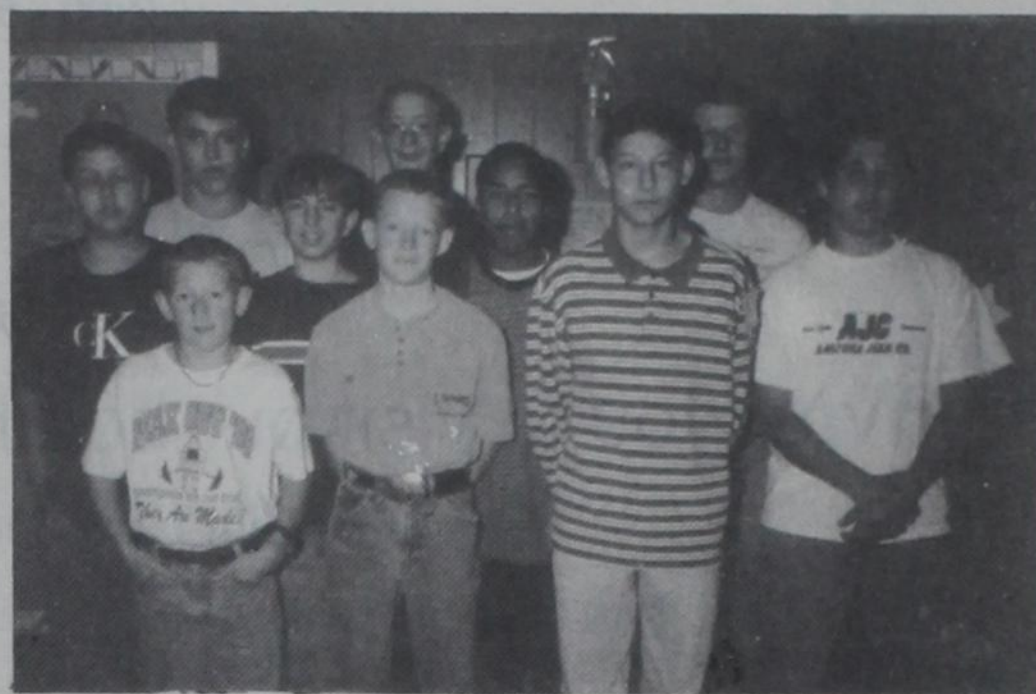
