



Chiefs" of the Cheyenne Tribe. The chiefs did not fight in Indian Wars after they became chief. Those killed were not fighting at the time of their death. The Native Americans are the focus of the Wheeler County Heritage Day on June 26, 1999. The information is made available to the Times by Melba Corcoran.)

LITTLE ROCK

Little Rock was a proven peace advocate among the Cheyennes. He was killed by Custer at the Battle of the Washita along with Black Kettle. August 19, 1968 Chief Little Rock of Black Kettle Band gave a full and open account of the affairs, as the Indians know it to be. The account was to Wynkoop the Indian agent the full details of the massacre of whites along the Saline and Solomon Rivers in Kansas by a drunken party of young Cheyenne. He also agreed to turn over the guiltily leaders of the party, though he knew that to do so would be dangerous for himself and his family. He died down stream from Black Kettle where he tried to fight a delaying action that would allow a small group of Cheyenne women to es-




