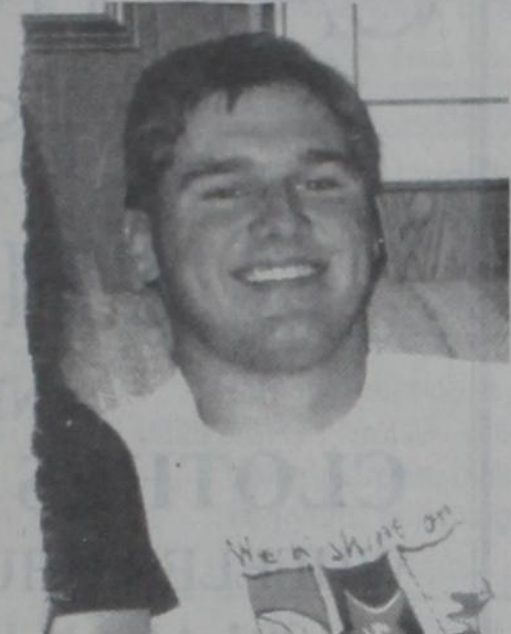

Kyle Masters Shows Winning Heifer At Amarillo Tri-State Fair

For Kyle Masters, his heifer is not just a 4-H project, it's a down payment on college and a business. And Classy is not just any heifer, she's the Supreme Heifer of the Tri-State Fair youth heifer show.

Masters competed Sunday with his heifer. But when the show is over, he said he's not through with Classy. She will be bred in the next few weeks and make the show circuit about eight more months. Then she will become part of the herd he's been building for

the past seven years.

Masters, 17, said he hopes to have a herd built by the time he graduates from Wheeler High School. He plans to sell the calves to put himself through college.

Heifers are only a part of Master's 4-H and FFA projects. He also shows lambs and hogs and has shown steers in the past.

"I did do steers, but after the county show, you can't get anything out of them. With heifers, you can breed them and sell the babies," Masters said.

Annual Wheeler Co. Range & Pasture Tour Set for Wednesday, October 7

The annual Wheeler County Range and Pasture Seminar and Tour will be held Wednesday, October 7, 1998. Rolling Plains Production Credit Association will sponsor a meal following the tour.

The tour will leave from the parking lot of Maxey's Steakhouse at 9:30. A two-hour continuing education unit (CEU) meeting will be held following the tour and seminar.

Information presented during the event will give beef cattle producers a method they can use to determine how much forage they have available for the winter. This can help them make decisions on the options they have for surviving the winter following the drought this summer.

Participants will visit one or two sites where J.F. Cadenhead, Extension Range Brush Control Specialist will show how to determine the amount

of forage available for the winter and show how to calculate grazing capacity. He will also discuss management of overgrazed ranges and pastures next spring.

Dr. Ted McCollum, Extension Beef Cattle Specialist, will discuss options for dealing with the current situation including supplementation strategies, mineral supplementation and culling the cow herd.

Following the range and pasture meeting Cadenhead and Dr. Carl Patrick, Extension Entomologist, will present a program that will give pesticide applicators two (2) CEUs toward the renewal of their license.

Those planning to attend the Range and Pasture Meeting and/or the CEU meeting must make their meal reservation by 5:00 p.m. Friday, October 2 by calling the Wheeler County Extension office at 826-5243.

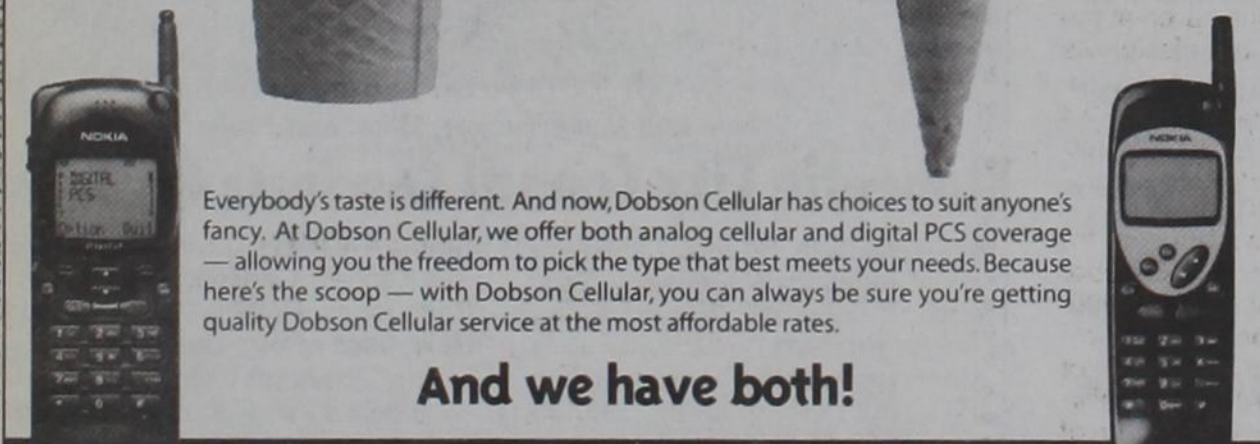

all."
This song must have been written by someone immersed in a culture devoid of understanding of the power of words. People still sing it today in ignorance, being lulled by its tremendous melody, not realizing its message of danger and fear. How many other messages have we absorbed because they have an immediately exciting or soothing quality; then, "for some reason," develop unexplained desires or fears?

As I attended the funeral of a long-time friend and classmate last week, I was greatly disturbed and saddened as I heard one of those who spoke curse my God.

I was both touched and agitated as I again heard the now familiar phrase, "God picked a flower from the garden of humanity, so he could have it for his garden in Heaven". This phrase is sugar coated arsenic. It tastes good going down, but it has spiritual destruction and death at its core.

Sometimes it takes bluntness to jar our complacency and motivate us to rethink the concepts we have accepted, and to change our understanding and perception in areas where we are heavy into ignorant tradition - as in the baby/cradle song.

More times than not, there are unsaved people at funeral services. They may hear and appreciate the analogy of "Picking a flower" in their immediate time of sorrow; but words like these, combined with the melody of a wounded heart and a lonely mind, produce catastrophic damage at the core of their soul, and "for some reason" they become even more leery of this "God of Love". When they hear someone speak kindly of the God of Love; from the core of their mind, where the flower lie has lodged, comes a response of confusion, doubt, cynicism, and a perception of ignorance toward the one who is now speaking to them.

They don't understand their response, or what seed was planted that created it. Their lack of understanding doesn't make the response any less real. The Gospel of Christ is rejected one more time, a soul continues its wandering, possibly to be lost forever.

Words can kill, with an immediate or delayed reaction, even if spoken with best of intentions.

Even if we have accepted Jesus as the Christ of our life, could statements like the flower analogy possibly be one of the core reasons we haven't been able to totally trust God and allow him to be the Lord of every area of our life?

Who could totally trust a father (or God) who at any time might decide to kill them - as "Pick a flower" blatantly implies. When we desire to draw near to God, we find an overwhelming reluctance to do so; and even if we yield under great pressure, we accept the first opportunity to escape to a safe distance.

Life on earth is, at the same time, both a dangerous place, and an awesome experience. God created us to live in this realm of existence for a short period of time (compared to eternity). We were placed here to experience it, with all its ups and downs. During this life we find ourselves immersed in the full and diverse range of physical, mental and spiritual experiences. During this time we have constant opportunities for growth in wisdom, knowledge and understanding in, and of, all three realms. When we are led astray by wrong concepts it may take us a long

Peanut Butter Sheet Cake
2 cups flour
1 teaspoon soda
2 cups sugar
1/2 teaspoon salt, mix together, set aside

1/2 cup oil
3/4 cup margarine
1/2 cup peanut butter
1 cup water, 2 eggs beaten
1/2 cup buttermilk
1 teaspoon vanilla
In saucepan bring oil, margarine, water and peanut butter to boil. Pour over dry ingredients and mix. Add eggs, vanilla and buttermilk, blending well. Pour into a greased and floured 11x15 sheet cake pan. Bake 350 degrees 15-18 minutes.

While cake bakes, combine, 1/2 cup evaporated milk, 1 cup sugar, 1 tablespoon margarine in saucepan. Bring to a boil, cooking for 2 minutes. Remove from heat and add 1/2 cup crunchy peanut butter and 1/2 cup marshmallows. Stir until melted. Add vanilla. Pour over warm cake and spread to cover. Delicious!

From The Minister's Desk:
At the conclusion of last year's football season, John Mackovic was fired as the head football coach of the University of Texas. He had been the coach of Texas football team for six years, compiling a record of 41 wins, 28 losses, and 2 ties.

Mackovic had not only compiled a winning record during his six year tenure as coach of the Texas football team. He also improved the graduation ratio of the Texas players. When Mackovic was hired as the Texas football coach in 1991, the graduation ratio of Texas football players was fifty percent, but when he was fired, the graduation ratio was eighty-six percent. This graduation ratio may have pleased the administrators of the University of Texas, but the football fans of the University of Texas were not pleased with Mackovic's football program. These fans strongly criticized Mackovic's won-loss record. They also criticized his personality, his wardrobe, and his lifestyle.

I am sure that Mackovic was probably not too surprised by this criticism. After he was hired as the football coach at the University of Texas, he was asked about the pressure of being the head football coach at the University of Texas. His almost prophetic reply was: "Every coach is on a hot seat. Your worth as a human being is often tied to how your team plays. If your team wins, people think that you are a good person."

If Mackovic's observation is correct, it clearly shows that the philosophy advocated by the famous football coach, Vince Lombardi, has become the prevailing philosophy of athletics. This philosophy is: "Winning isn't everything; it's the only thing."

But if this philosophy is correct, what does it say about the athletes who play hard and who demonstrate good sportsmanship, but who lose? Should these athletes be treated as "losers" who are guilty of some colossal failure that will haunt them for the remainder of their lives?

Hopefully these athletes will be treated like J. (Joseph) Parker was treated. Parker was a field goal kicker for the Army football team that played in the 1996 Independence Bowl. With only thirty-three seconds left in this game, Parker missed a twenty-seven yard field goal which allowed the University of Auburn to win the game by the score of 32 to 29.

The Skyrockets lifted off to their second win this season this week over Wheeler 21-16.

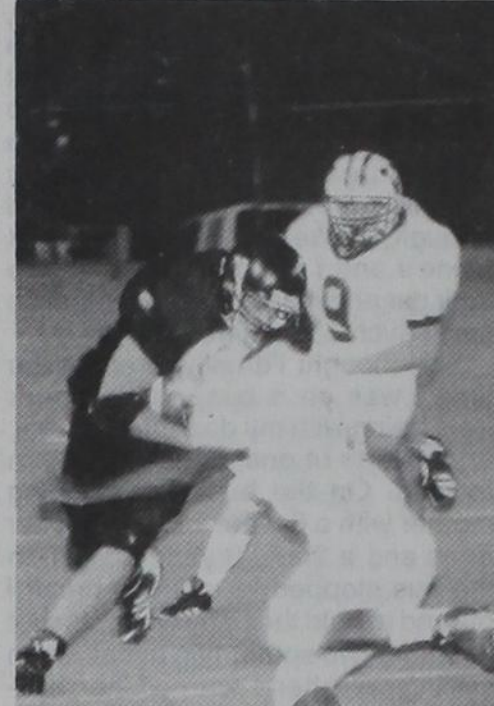
Wellington's Larry Vales blasted off for an 89-yard touchdown run in the first quarter. Shawn Turrentine provided the PAT.

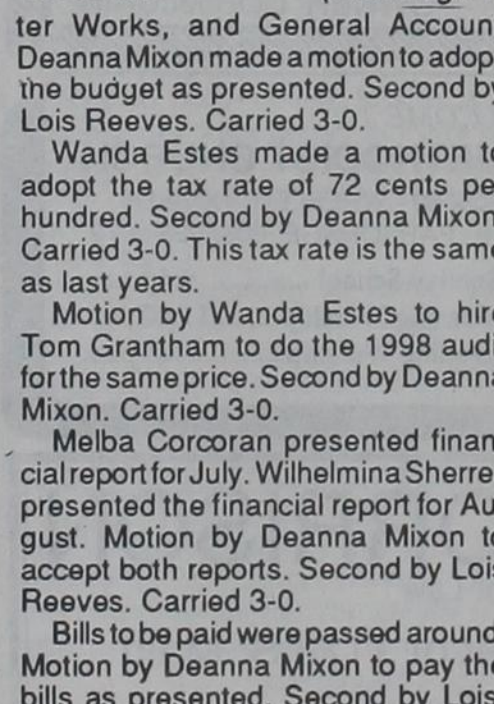
