

# HOMECOMING QUEEN, KING CORONATION

'98 HOMECOMING KING AND QUEEN WILL BE CROWNED AT PEP RALLY ON SQUARE; BONFIRE THURSDAY EVE.

Homecoming will be observed at Wheeler High School Friday, September 11, 1998. The Mustangs will meet the Sunray Bobcats for the first home game of the season at Nicholson Field at 7:30 p.m. The 1998 Homecoming Queen and her entourage will be presented in a pre-game ceremony at 7:00 P.M. Homecoming activities have been going on at school all week with each day having a theme.

Thursday evening at 8:45, a bonfire will be held at the track, north of the school.

## PEP RALLY

The Friday afternoon Pep Rally will start at 2:40 p.m. on the west side of the courthouse on Friday, September 11. At this time the Homecoming King and Queen will be crowned. The eight candidates were nominated and chosen by the vote of the student body. The results will not be known until the announcements at the pep rally. The Homecoming Queen candidates will be escorted by the king candidates—members of the 1998 Mustangs football team. During the introductions, the queen candidates will be escorted to the west curb of the courthouse square.

School will be dismissed in order for the students to leave the school in time for the pep rally. The band and queen candidates will precede a number of decorated modes of transportation.

The queen candidates, their escorts and the 1998 Mustangs will be on the courthouse steps and walk immediately in front of the courthouse. The band will be on the courthouse lawn. First through fifth grades will need the area next to the curb. The public is asked to remain on the street to the west of the courthouse square.

In case of inclement weather, the pep rally will be moved to the new gym.

The 1998 Homecoming Queen and King will be introduced in the pre-game ceremony beginning at 7:00 P.M.

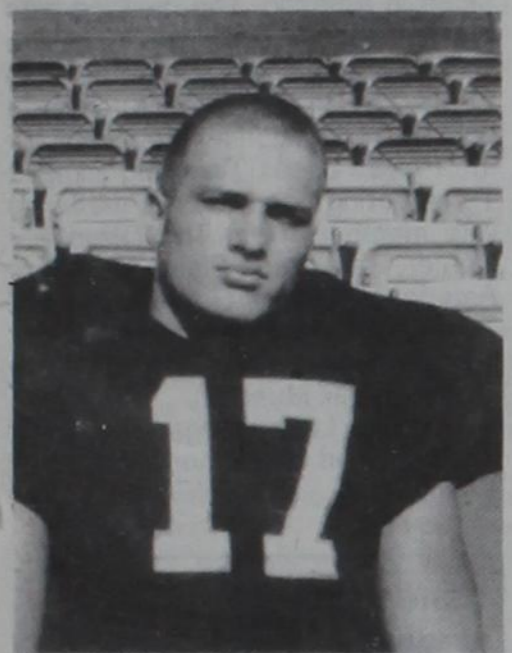

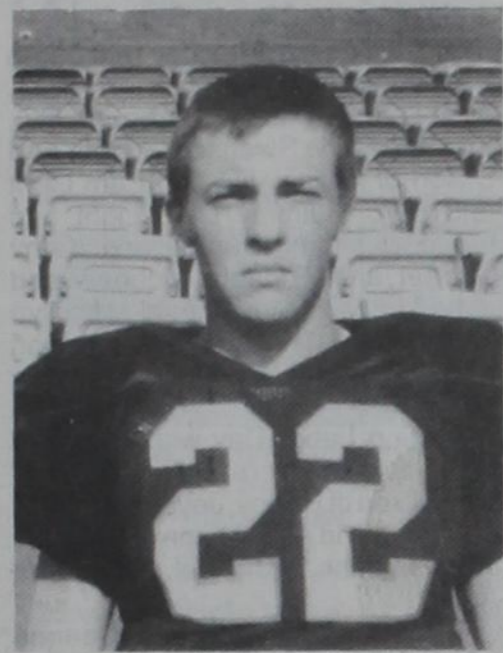

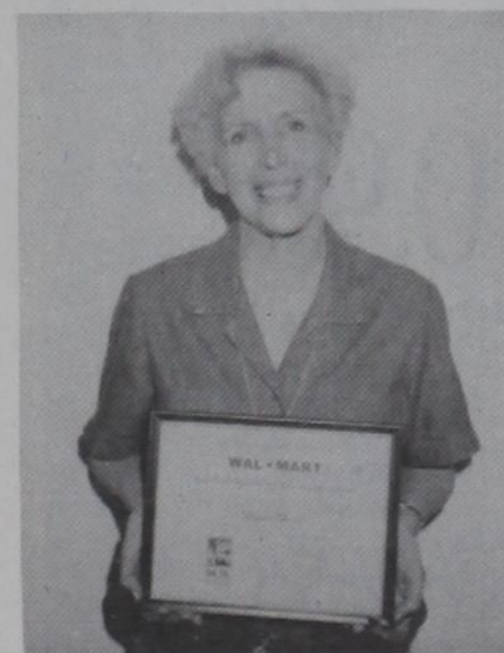
## Mobeetie/Briscoe Bike-A-Thon Is Sat., Sept. 19

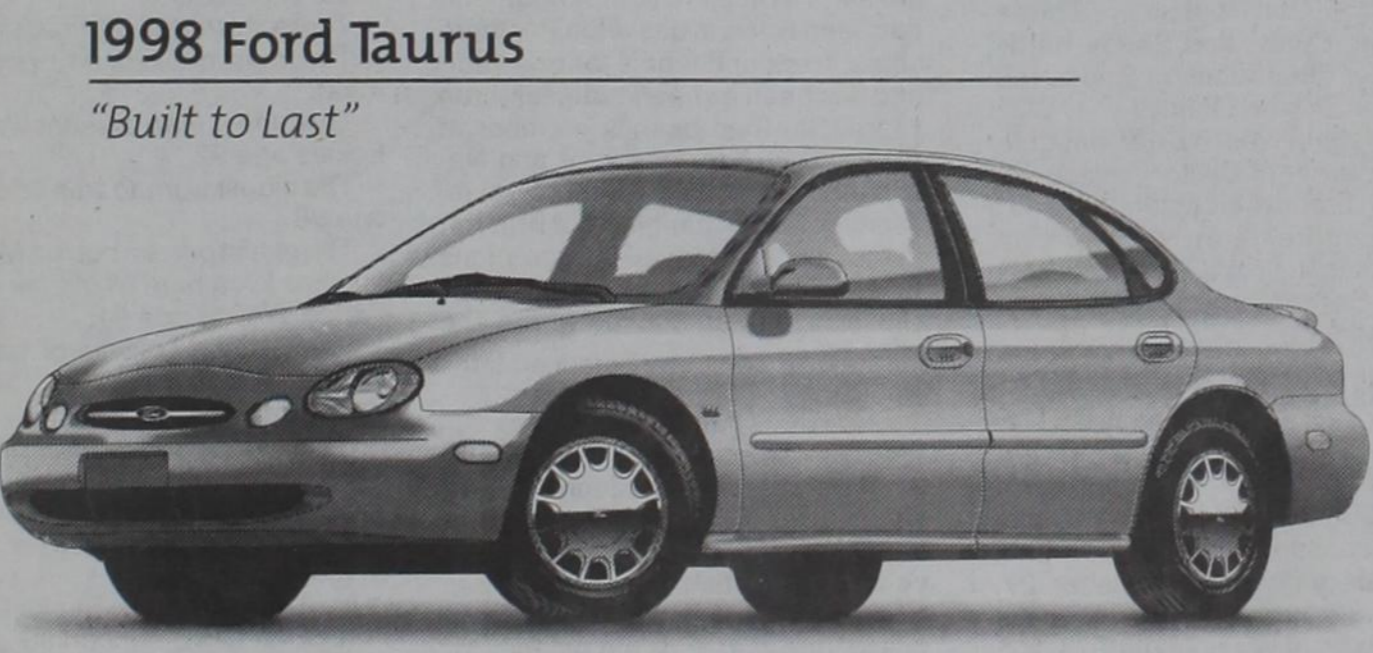

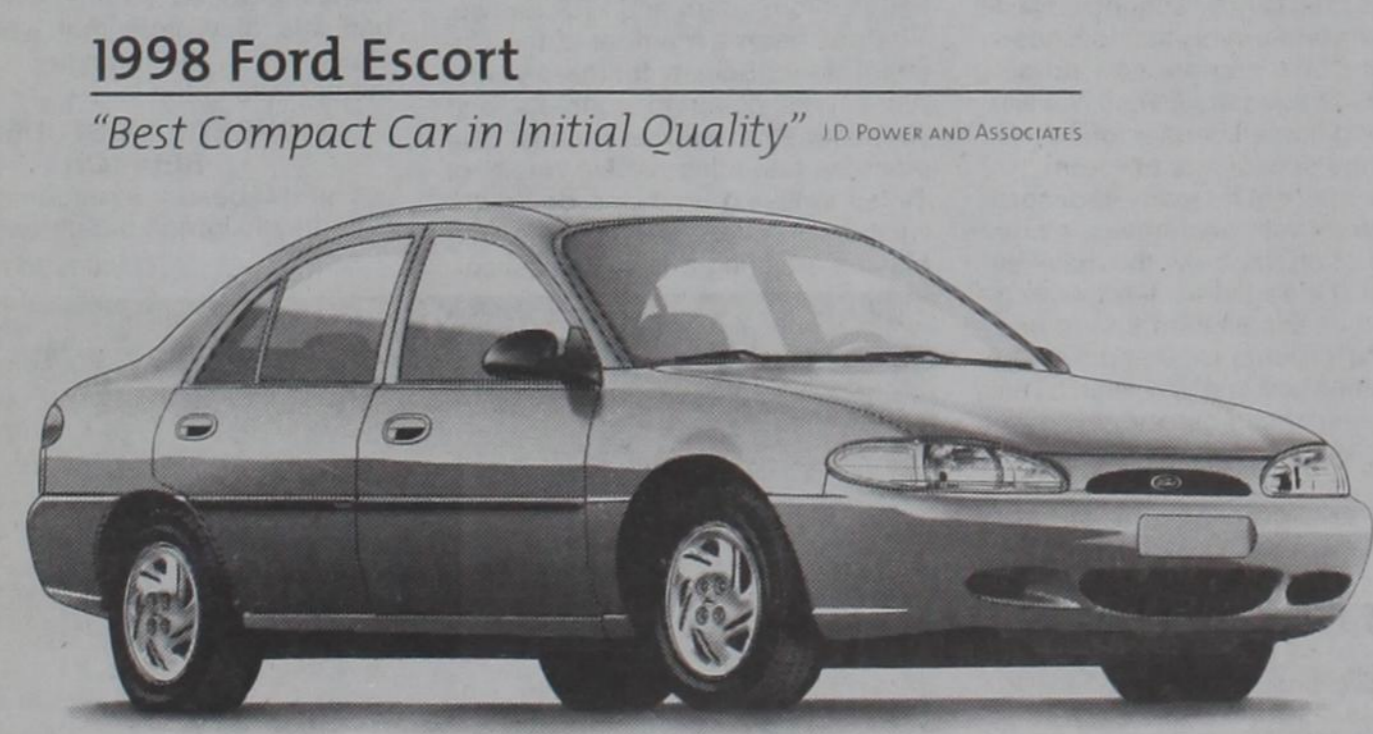

AUSTIN, Texas (Sept 1, 1998) - Is it time to prepare for the next influenza pandemic? Can the Spanish Flu of 1918 or the "Chicken" Flu from Hong Kong replicate in the United States? The probability is high, so health care workers are currently learning the necessary tools for influenza morbidity prevention. To better ensure Texans do not contract the current year's flu virus, the American Lung Association of Texas reminds us that this potentially life-threatening disease can be prevented with an annual vaccination.

In an article published by Dr. Diane R. Gold in the American Thoracic Society's July 1998 edition of the American Journal of Respiratory and Critical Care Medicine - it is proposed that asthma in children may be linked to the mother's genetic predisposition. "If an asthmatic mother develops the flu, pneumonia or another severe respiratory infection during pregnancy, this may increase the tendency of the newborn to develop asthma," says Dr. Robert B. Klein, Division Chief of Allergy and Immunology at the University of Texas Health Center at Tyler. "This year's Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) guidelines states that all women after the 14th week of pregnancy are encouraged to get a flu shot. When I know that the mother is in a high-risk category, such as in the case of an asthmatic, I encourage a flu shot at any time during the pregnancy."

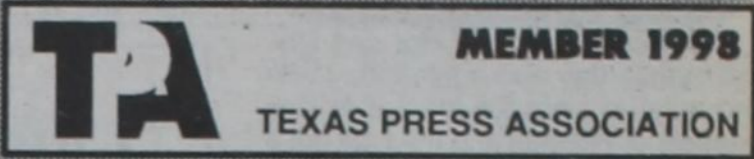

If FluMist(TM) minimizes inner ear infection (otitis media), we hope that it will diminish some of the early symptoms of pediatric asthma." National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Disease (NIAID) projects that the FDA will approve the FluMist(TM) for all pediatric patients by the 1999/2000 flu season.

Dr. Charles Bryan, Texas Thoracic Society President at the University of Texas Health Science Center, San Antonio says, "Soon there may be pills (GS 4104), disk-halers (Zanamivir), or other new ways of receiving annual flu immunizations. An influenza vaccination is about 70 percent effective in preventing influenza and reducing its severity, and it's safe." Together, influenza and pneumonia are the fifth leading causes of death among Americans over age 65 and the sixth leading cause of death among all Americans. Anyone can be a flu victim. However, high-risk groups are the most vulnerable.

The prime time to get a flu shot is between Oct. 1 and Nov. 15, before the flu season begins. In Texas, some physicians begin providing shots in early September and may continue offering the service through mid-December. Flu shots are available at doctors' offices, Health Maintenance Organizations (HMO), and most other health care facilities. In addition, flu shots are covered by Medicare and Medicaid. Most people experience little or no reaction to the vaccine. However, one in four people might have a swollen, red, tender area where the shot was delivered.

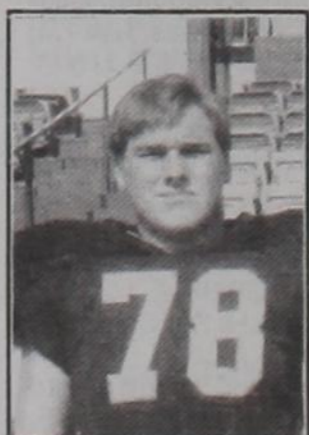

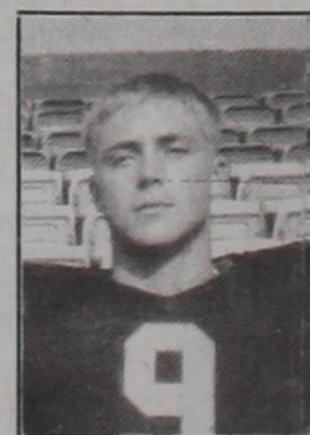

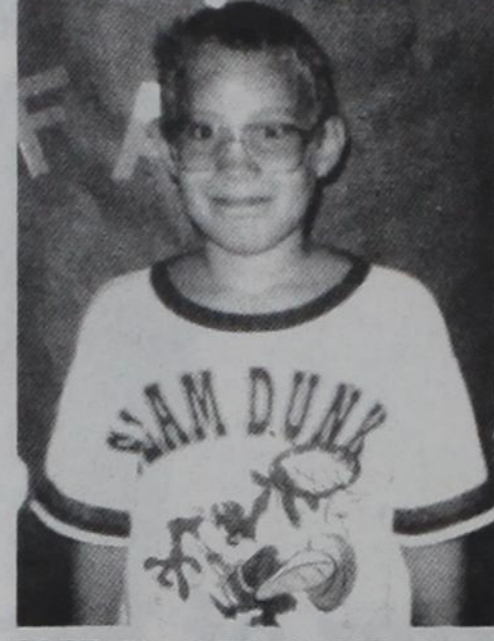

### From The Minister's Desk:

In 1909 an artist, John T. McCutcheon, drew a picture to celebrate the one-hundredth anniversary of the birth of Abraham Lincoln. The picture showed a Kentucky landscape that was covered with snow. And standing in the snow were two frontiersmen who were discussing current events. One of frontiersman ask: "Has anything new happened?" The other frontiersman replied: "Nothing much. Oh, I hear there's a new baby over at Tom Lincoln's. Nothing important ever happens around here."

With this picture, Mr. McCutcheon emphasized one of history's greatest truths. This truth is that one person has often had a powerful influence upon the world. History is filled with illustrations of such people.

For example, when the English language reached its zenith in the sixteenth century, it was the result of the gifted pen of one person, William Shakespeare. The link between bacteria and infectious disease was discovered by a crippled French chemist, Louis Pasteur. The theory of relativity was born in the brain of a brilliant German scientist, Albert Einstein. And when

God decided to reveal Himself to the world, He sent a person, Jesus Christ.

As these illustrations clearly show, it is impossible to overestimate the influence of one person. Yet it would seem that the twentieth century has forgotten about this influence. For several years, it has been popular to talk about a revival of decency, purity, and morality in this nation. But who will lead this revival? Too many of us excuse ourselves by saying: "I can't do anything about it. I'm just one. My influence is insignificant."

If there is one person that should not have this attitude, it is a disciple of Jesus. The description that Jesus gave of His disciples is: "You are the light of the world..." (Matthew 5:14) Notice that Jesus used a verb of the simple present tense in this description. He said: "You are..." He did not say: "You should be the light of the world."

A disciple of Jesus is a person that gives light to a darkened world. The attitude of a disciple of Jesus is: "I can do something. I'm just one. My influence is significant."

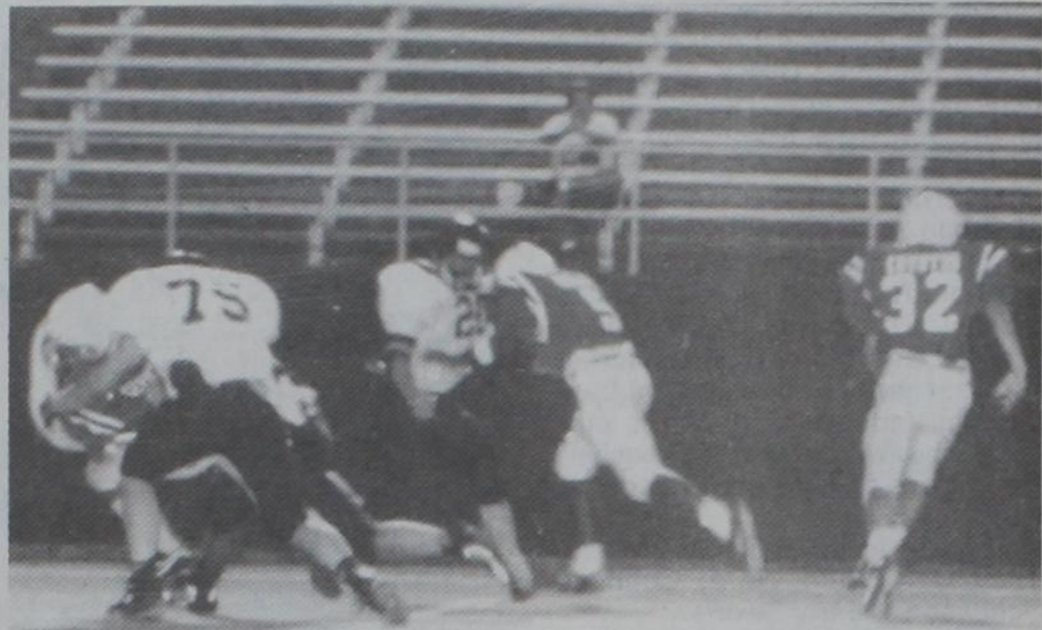

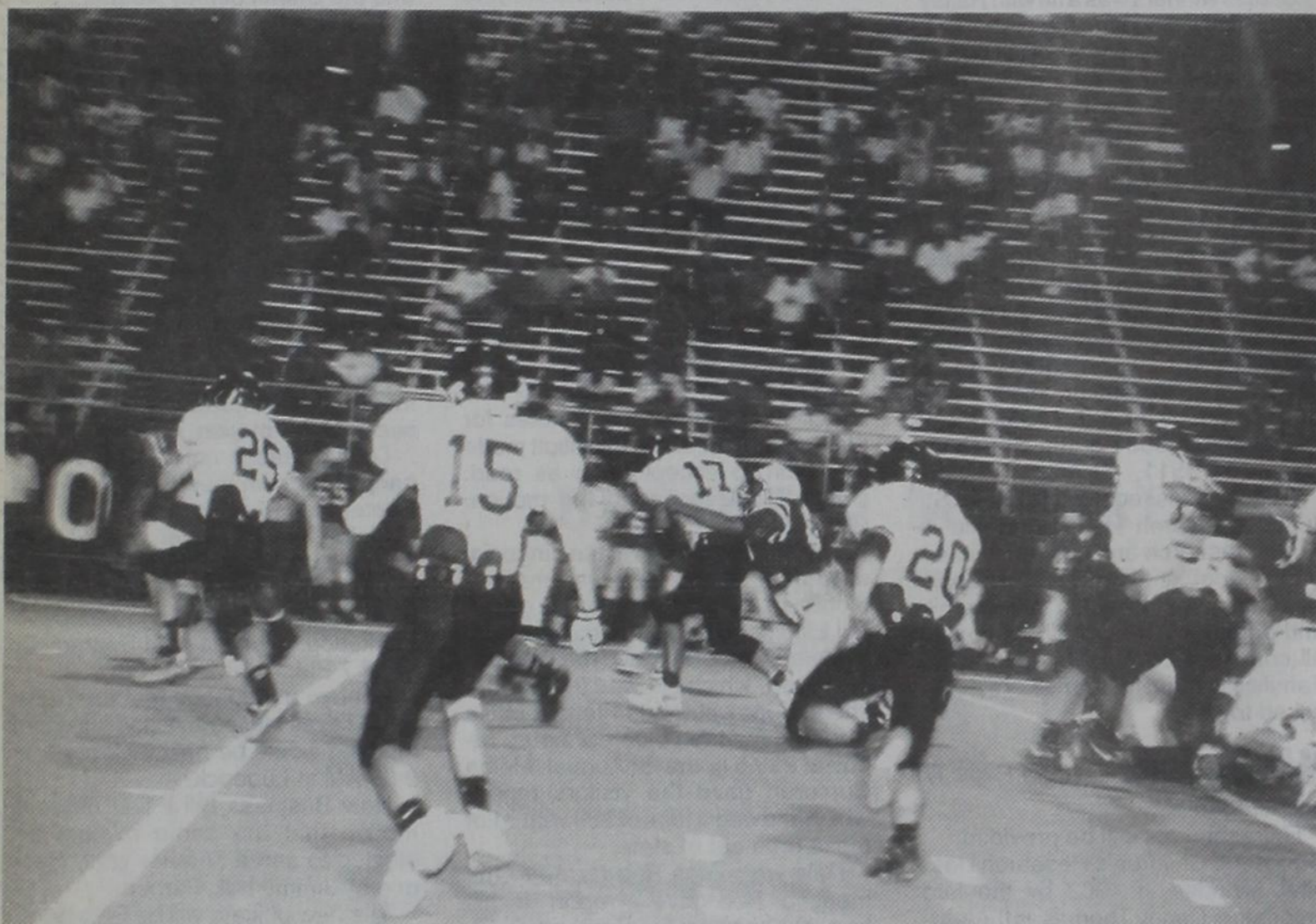

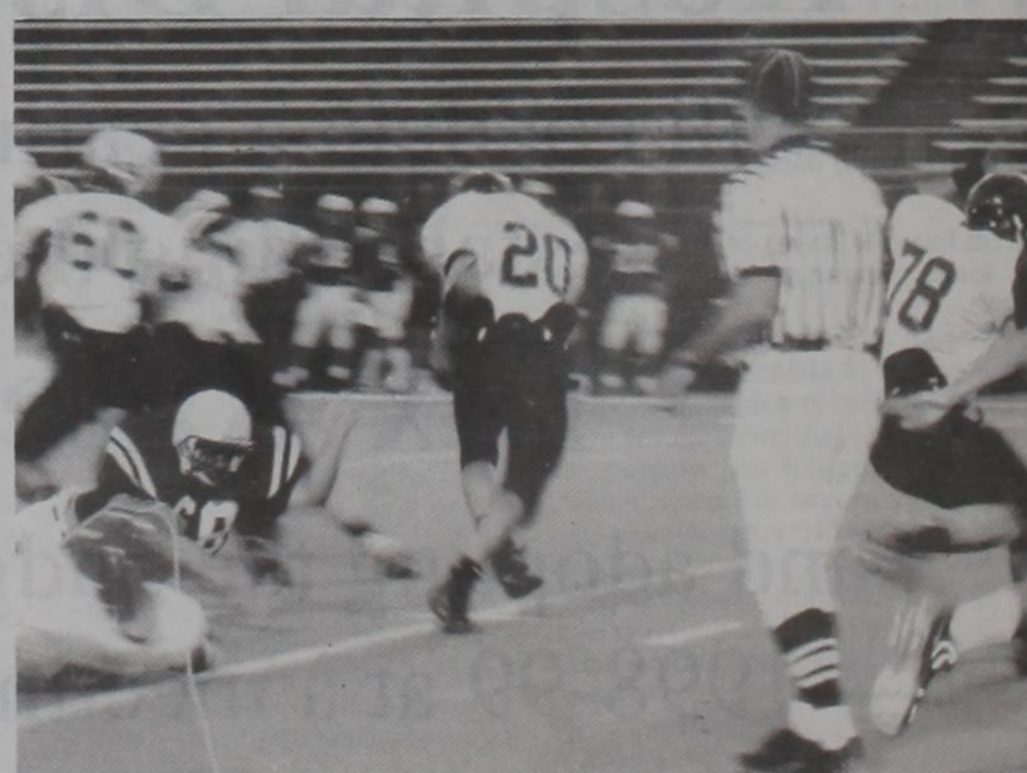
## A Report on the Game

The Wheeler Mustangs opened the 1998 football season with a win last Thursday night over the coyotes of Wichita Falls Junior Varsity. The Mustangs traveled to Wichita Falls and played their first game on artificial turf at Memorial Stadium. The field conditions did not bother the Mustangs as they scored on their first three possessions of the first half in route to a 32-6 win.

Aaron Dunnam caps off a 90 yard drive on the Mustangs first possession with a 2 yard run. Casey Childress had a 54 yard run in the drive which took only six plays. An apparent touchdown pass from Brooks Brown to Caleb Finsterwald is wiped out on the Mustangs next possession on an officials mistake, thus forcing the Mustangs to attempt a field goal. The Mustangs executed the fake field goal to perfection as Brooks Brown hits Michael Montgomery for a 5 yard TD to put the Mustangs up 13-0.
