Wheeler Economic Development Board Makes First \$4,000 Grant

The Wheeler Economic Development Board, meeting in regular session on Tuesday, September 22, 1998, voted to approve a grant to the Turkey Creek Recreation Area of up to \$4000 for the engineering and topography studies for the development of a regional recreation park.

The Economic Development Board was formed to administer the funds received from the half-cent sales tax levy in the city of Wheeler. Board members include Charles Brown, President, Stacy McQueen, secretary, Bob McCain, Ben Ed Hillhouse, Calvin Devereaux, David Wright, and Charles Kuntz.

The Turkey Creek Recreation Area will be a regional park and recreation facility to be located on the property behind the present-day show barn on the Northeast side of Wheeler. The area will be planned for expansion over the next two to ten years. A list of the items that will be considered for development include:

A. A New Swimming Pool that can be covered for use as an indoor physical therapy for seniors and for the school's to develop swimming and diving teams.

B. Walking and Bike Trails

C. Picnic Tables, Benches, and Sheltered Eating Areas

D. Children's Play Areas to be developed in three areas: behind the Wheeler School; in the present Wheeler Park; and in the new recreation area

E. A Nine-hole Golf Course
F. The Wheeler waste water will be used to irrigate the golf course and park

A separate project is being considered to build a community center/library in the park facility.

Wheeler City Council appointed Bobby Hill, Harrison Hall, and Jim Alvey as the Turkey Creek Recreation Committee. The committee will be getting information to the public concerning the development. If you have a question, comment, or concern please contact one of these members.

Having a home and support helped her tremendously but it didn't take away the uncertainty of what she was going to do.

She called her mother in Michigan, I think, and asked if she could come home for a little while till she could figure something out. Her mother said since her father had heart problems, it might be best she not come. It's been years, and the last I heard, he was still alive.

After weeks and months, with ours and Willis' and Laverna's help she got a car, then a job. She put the three children in foster care.

Paula had gone through a lot of trauma during the last pregnancy. So she toyed with the idea of putting the baby up for adoption. Because of the trauma it seemed like the love she should have for the baby wasn't there. I suggested that if she felt like she could never love him like she did the other two, that maybe it would be the right thing to give him to a family that would lavish all their love on him. It was a very hard decision and she struggled with it for months. I believe it was around 9 mo. when he was adopted I think she watched for years to see his face in the crowd.

Once when the children were in foster care, her husband called me and asked to talk to the children. He pretended he was a long way off, but he was only a few miles away. We think his plan was to walk in quickly, pick up the children and leave. Paula was in Pampa, but she got here in "record time". In time she married, had two boys, and adopted her sister's baby girl.

She has been conducting fieldwork and field schools in prehistoric and historic archeology for over 25 years. Her primary interest is the study of human adaptation to arid environments. She taught archeology, cultural anthropology, and human biology at the college level for 15 years, achieving the rank of Associate Professor of Anthropology. She also served as Director of the Division of Social Sciences, Business Administration, and Multidisciplinary Studies at Incarnate Word College in San Antonio, Texas. She has conducted inventory, assessment, and mitigation archaeological projects, as well as historical research for state and federal agencies and for private companies and individuals in Texas, New Mexico, and Illinois. She was the Principal Investigator for the 1996 Texas Archeological Society Annual Field School held in the Texas Panhandle.

Dr. Paul Katz is the Director of the Carson County Square House Museum in Panhandle, Texas. This nationally recognized museum focuses on the history, natural history, and art of the Texas Panhandle. Dr. Katz has a bachelor's degree in Art History from Swarthmore College and three graduate degrees in Anthropology from the University of Kansas. His background and experience is in both prehistoric archeology and museum. He has conducted field work, taught at the college level, curated collections, and directed museums in Kansas, Washington, Illinois, and Texas for 30 years. Before moving to the Panhandle in 1991, Dr. Katz was Director of the Kampsville Archaeological Museum, a component of the Center for American Archeology in Kampsville, Illinois. He is a past president of the Northwest Texas Museum Association and is currently the Mountain-Plains regional representative of the Small Museum Administrators' Committee of the American Association of Museums.

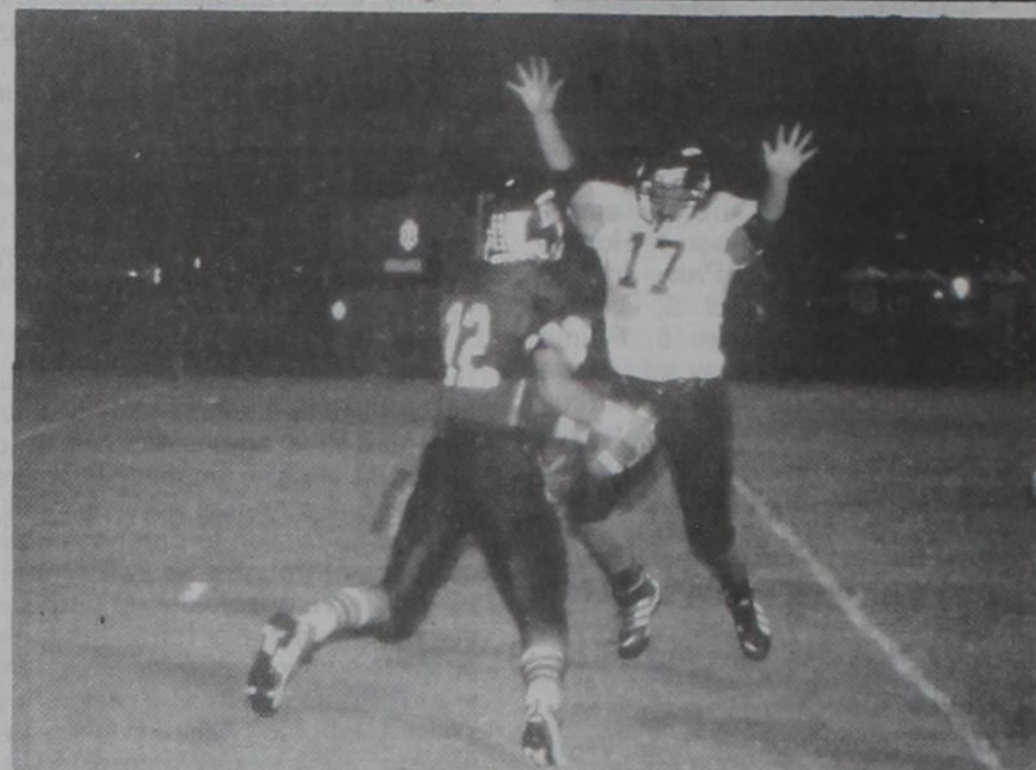

 Rubel Shelly, the minister of the Ashwood Church of Christ in Nashville, Tennessee, recently wrote an editorial that taught a needed lesson. This editorial was entitled, "When Life Hands You a Lemon" and it said: ---
 "Professional athletes get traded routinely. Somebody needs a center fielder, and another team has two good ones. A team seeks to shore up its pitching staff and goes player swapping. Unless the trade involves a superstar, most don't make headlines. Let me tell you about one you may have missed."
 "Ken Krahenbuhl was playing minor league ball for the Pacific Suns in Oxnard, California. He was having a decent season, but he wasn't about to be yanked to the Big Show--player jargon for the major leagues. In late July of this year, he was traded to the Greenville (Mississippi) Bluesmen for some cash, a player to be named, and ten pounds of catfish."
 "So how do you spell insulted? "The Suns could have gotten some players in exchange for me to help their ball club, instead of the stinking catfish, but they just don't care." Krahenbuhl said. They traded me for catfish. Can you believe that?"
 "Do you have any idea how he felt when word reached him of the trade? Perhaps it rings bells for you of a poor grade on a pretty decent science project you labored over in junior high. Or maybe it reminds you of not making the high school chorus or church choir--knowing full well there were other voices no better than yours that were accepted."

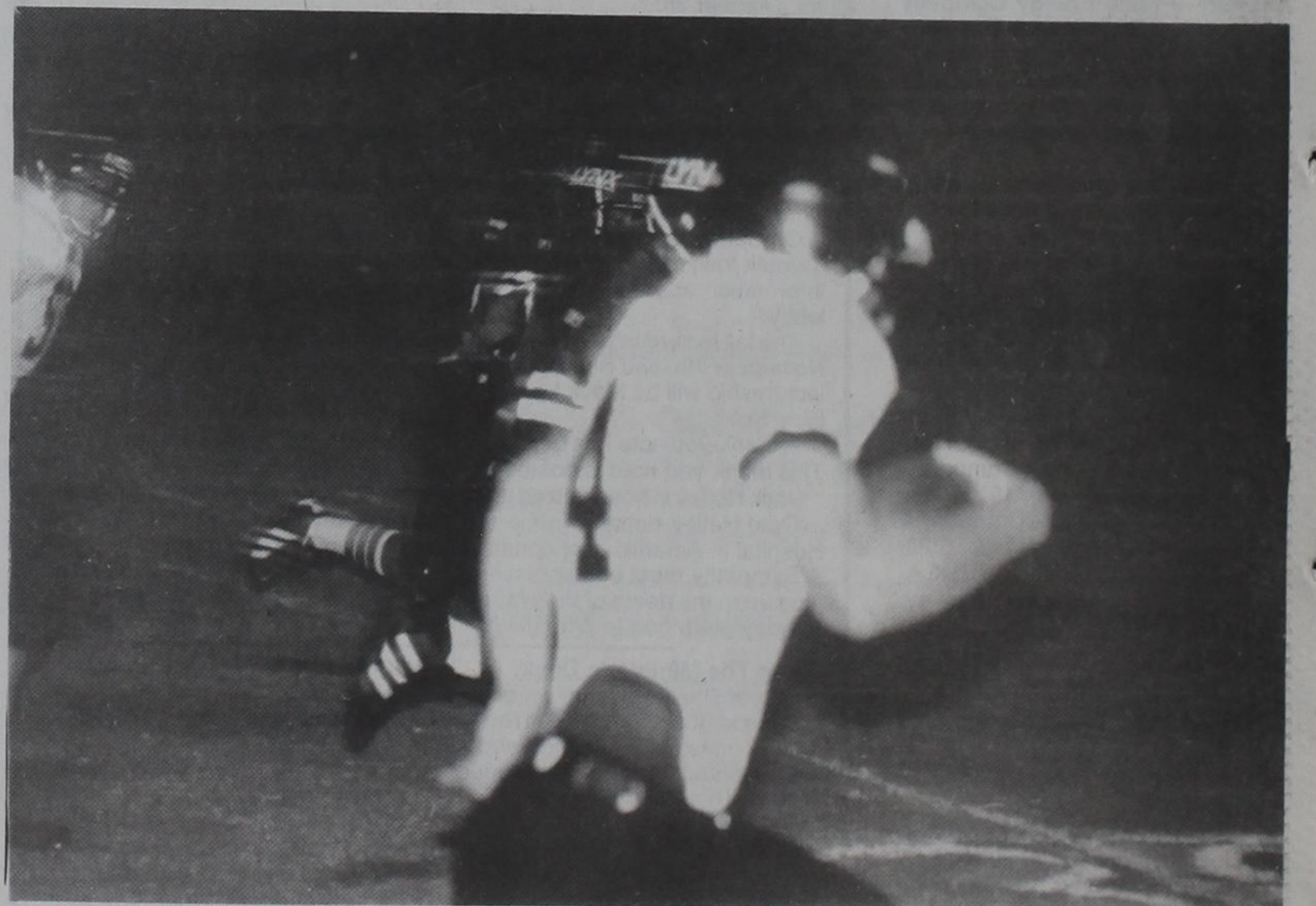

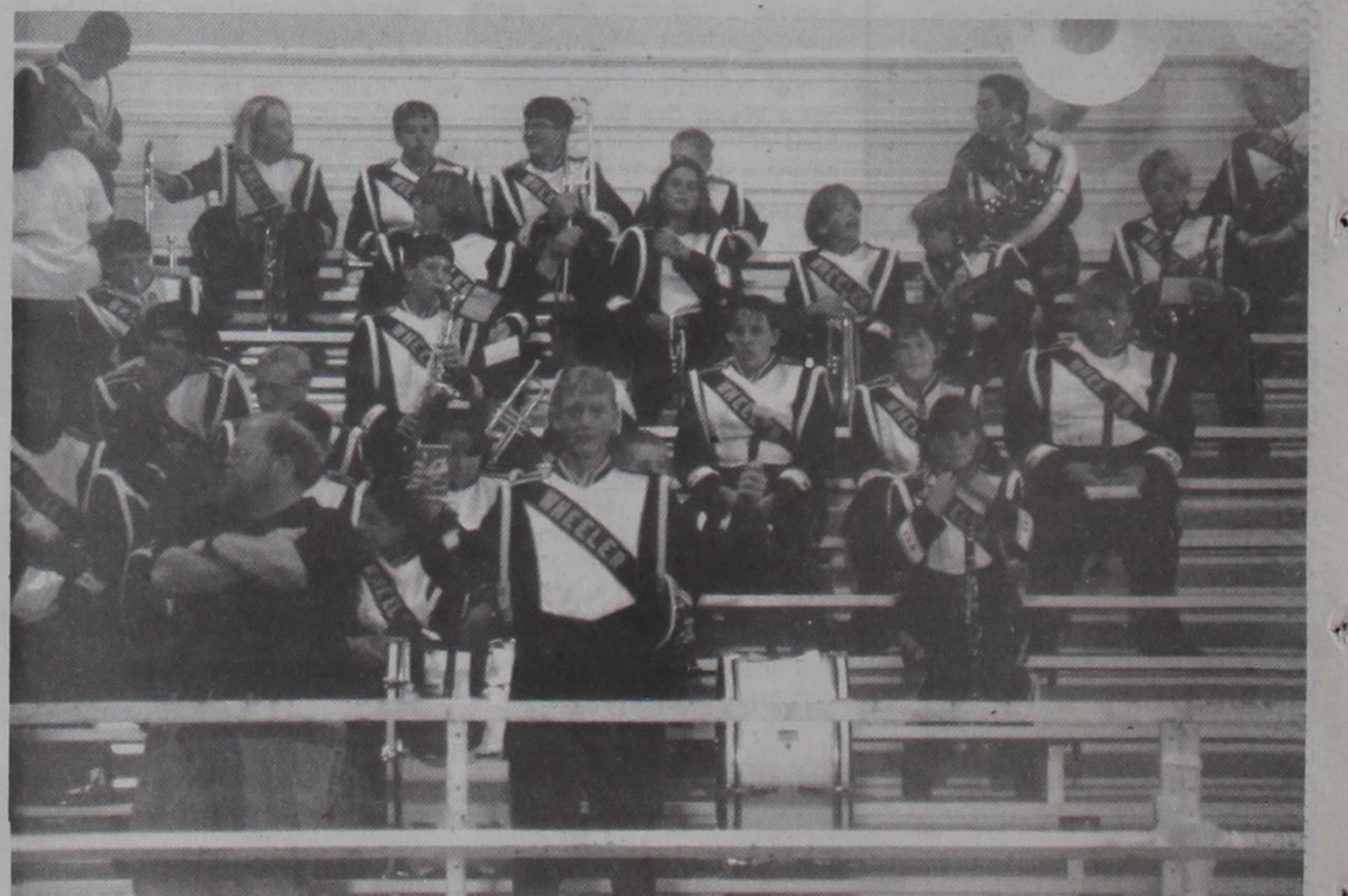
