The activities start early with breakfast and end with the street dance downtown until 1:00 A.M. Park activities begin at 10:00 A.M. and continue to dusk with the free fireworks display. The fun Run/Walk and Punt, Pass & Kick will be at the courthouse square and on the track respectively before 10:00 A.M.

Saturday morning will open with breakfast at the Masonic Lodge beginning at 6:30 A.M. You do not have to get up that early. Serving will continue for some time. This breakfast is a must in your day of activities.

The Fun Run will be under the supervision of Robert and Marla Ford. Starting time will be 8:00 A.M. Individuals who signed up for the fun run early were charged a \$5.00 entry fee; those participating without preregistering will have a \$6.00 fee. Each individual participating will receive a t-shirt; those registering on the day of the race may have to wait for their t-shirt.

It is not necessary to run; many just walk and enjoy the fellowship of fellow participants. The starting point for the run will be the west side of the courthouse square to avoid the crossing of highway 152. Male and female participants will be divided into three groups: 12 and under, 13-17 and 18 and over; ribbons will be presented.

Punt, Pass and Kick will be at 8:30 A.M. at the track. Larry Jones has been asked to chair this activity. The event will be at the track, north Highway 83. This event is open to any youngster wishing to participate; the group will be divided by ages. Ribbons will be presented to winners at

At 10:00 A.M. the activities at the park will begin. This year the chamber is offering a \$50 prize to the group with the most patriotic booth; judging of the decorations will be conducted by an appointed commit-

The park activities will kick-off with the raising of the flag and the singing of the National Anthem. Scheduled for the day will be the turtle races, balloon toss, swim meet and many other activities.


Brown's body was found about 1 p.m. Friday on the north side of the swim area at Foss Lake in Custer

Brown disappeared Sunday, June



Texas Farm Bureau Will Not Sponsor John Sharp

When the Board of Directors of the Wheeler County Farm Bureau met last week, members chose not to accept the Texas Farm Bureau's endorsement of State Comptroller John Sharp for Texas Lieutenant Governor.

During the first week of May the

During the first week of May, the TFB Friends of Agriculture (AGFUND) voted to endorse Democrat Sharp over Republican candidate and Texas Ag Commissioner Rick Perry while meeting in Austin.

"This is the most difficult political decision this board has ever had to make," said Bob Stallman, TFB and AGFUND President, after the May 5 meeting. "Both Candidates are friends of Texas Agriculture and friends of Texas Farm Bureau,"

But apparently not all of TFB's 211 organized Farm Bureaus in Texas are going along with the decision. That's something highly unusual in the normally unified organization.

The general consensus of the Wheeler County Farm Bureau Board was they did not agree with the TFB's endorsement at the state level.

The powerful Texas Farm Bureau had 311,523 members in 1997. Its AGFUND has a highly successful track record in its political endorsements—which usually cause little uproar.

Stallman said he realized the decision would be controversial.

"It would have been politically safe for AGFUND to sit this one out, but we have not become a major force in Texas politics by always taking the safest road," Stallman said.

The TFB leader said that as AGFUND president he will strongly support Sharp and make many campaign appearances with the candidate

"No one on the AGFUND board wants to leave the impression that Rick Perry has not been a good Agriculture Commissioner," Stallman said. "However, an exhaustive review of this race has led us to concluded that John Sharp should be the next Lieutenant Governor of Texas."

As Texas Farm Bureau's Political Action Fund, TFB's AGFUND may endorse and contribute financially to candidates. AGFUND is financed only by voluntary contributions from TFB members.





Letter written by Mark Huselby June 19, 1925 to J. Evetts Haley. Mark Huselby is a native of England. I came from Dodge about December 15, 1874, to the Panhandle. I had Christmas dinner on Commission Creek, coming down with four companies of the 6th Cavalry.

We camped on the Washita for about two months, and went from there to Camp Cantonment. We stayed there until May, when the site was selected for the fort.

Material for the houses was hauled from Fort Dodge, by oxen and mules. White pine was used in the construction of the houses, and contractors were hired to furnish it. The freight charges exacted by them was about \$2 per hundred. The adobe stables were built by Lieut. Hatch.

Scouting expeditions were sent out from here all over the country. We looked for trouble one time when all the troops were out on scouting expeditions. Five Hundred Kiowas camped about 4 or 5 miles east of the Fort and 5 were sent up to see who was there. They counted the men at the fort, of whom there were only 18. 1 saw what they were doing and reported to the officer in charge.

We barricaded the space between two buildings, and there was a well there where we might get water. We moved the women and children inside. We had one Gatling gun, but the Indians would have made it warm for us, for right east of us was a range of sandhills, and about 300 yards away, where the Indians might have taken refuge. The five went back and reported, but the medicine evidently didn't mix well and the medicine man did not advise them to go on the warpath. This happened in about 1876 or 1877. The fort was established to protect

the buffalo hunters. The whites had made an agreement to stay back, but they had begun to encroach upon the plains, which were the Indians hunting grounds, and then the Indians went upon the warpath.

The first fence in Wheeler County was constructed by Huselby in 1880. It was a ditch; dug five feet deep enclosing 3 or 4 acres of ground for garden and other uses. It was dug to keep out hogs and cattle, and traces of it may still be seen upon the Huselby ranch. It was dug by an Irishman. Mark Huselby bought two milk cows to the fort in 1875, and a dairy herd of 30 the next year.

The first farming done in that section was about the year 1884, when a sub-irrigated plot on the head of the North Fork was planted in cabbage. One of the heads raised weighed 28 pounds, and a wagonload of 100 heads weighed 1600 pounds. They were raised in the edge of Gray County, by a man named Schneider, and were made into sauerkraut for the soldiers' use by a man named

Huselby bought the first well drilling machine, the first hale-baler, and probably the first cows into the panhandle. He bought 2 cows in the spring of 1875. "They're buried up there at the fort, now. Both of them fell in a well and drowned, and mey're still there". I ran a dairy at the fort, but the Texas fever got 11 of the 13 head I had there, so I went out of the Allen is doing well at this time. C. H. Bonds is doing fair now.

From The Minister's Desk:

On Tuesday afternoon, May 27th, 1997, a deadly tornado struck Jarrell, Texas, small rural community which is located about forty miles north of Austin, Texas. The 260 mph winds of this tornado left a five mile long and half-mile wide

path of unbelievable destruction. Twenty-seven people were killed. Fifty houses were literally swept from their foundation. Plumbing pipes were pulled from the ground. Asphalt was sucked from the roads and bark was stripped from the trees.

As I watched and read the news reports about this tornado, I realized once again that the forces of destruction are often more powerful than the forces of construction. The residents of Jarrell had undoubtedly worked for many years to build a nice community, but in a matter of moments their nice community was reduced to rubble.

Such destructive results are not limited to a deadly tornado. These destructive results can also be experienced by people. For example, the good character that many people cultivate during their life can be severely damaged by careless words. Like a javelin, careless words can be thrust into the heart of the good character of people, creating doubt about their sincerity and honesty

Therefore, the disciples of Jesus, who are sincere in their faith, will heed the admonitions of the Bible which warn about the destructive power of careless words. Perhaps the most pertinent of these admonition is James 3:5-10 which says:"--

-- The tongue is a small part of the body, and yet it boasts of great things. Behold, how great a forest is set aflame by such a small fire! And the tongue is a fire, the very world of iniquity; the tongue is set among our members, as that which defiles the entire body, and set on fire the course of our life, and is set on fire by hell. For every species of beasts and birds, of reptiles and creatures of the sea, is tamed and has been tamed by the human race. But no one can tame the tongue; it is a restless evil and full deadly poison. With it we bless

can be destructive. They can do great damage to the life and character of people. For this reason, careless words should not be spoken by people who report to be disciples of Jesus.
