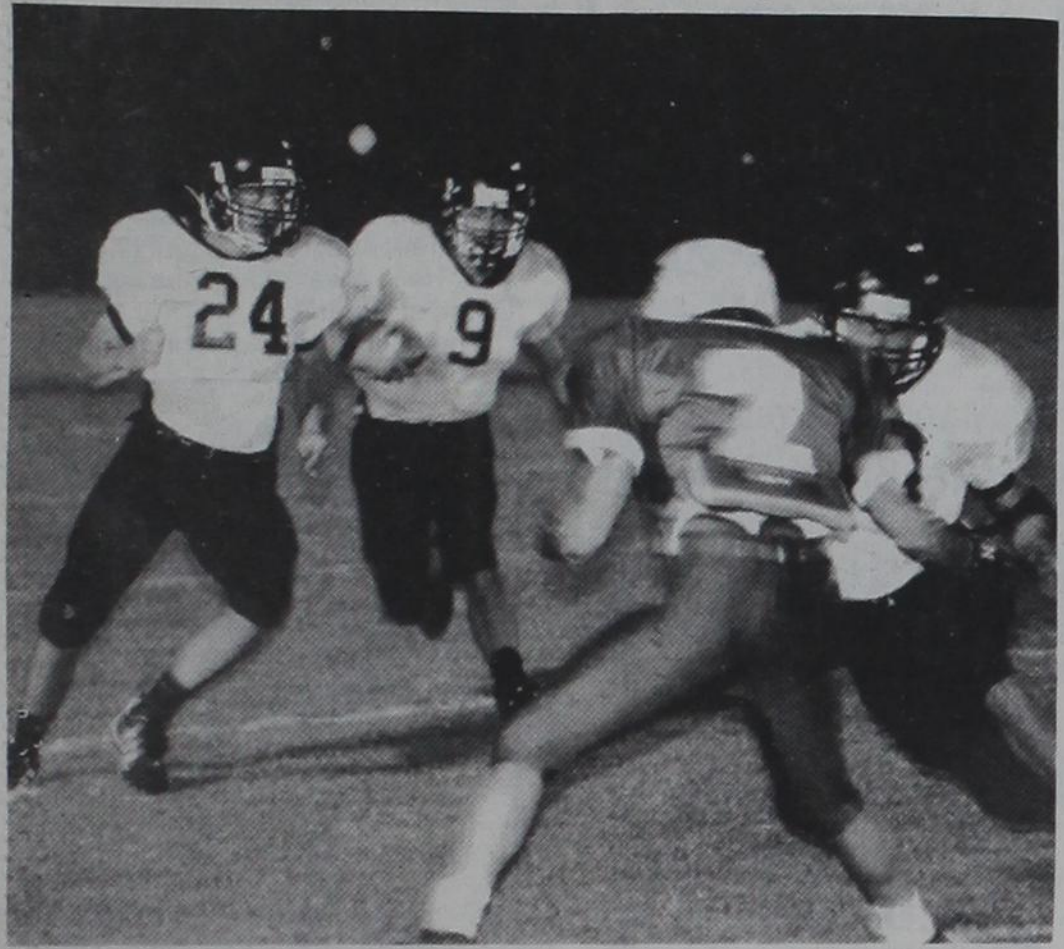

## Mustangs Shutout White Deer Bucks 51-0

The Mustangs traveled to White Deer last Friday night for the last non-district game against the White Deer Bucks. The Mustangs traveled to White Deer to finish up their non-district schedule of 2A teams and one class 4A JV team. White Deer was a team with 0-4 record, the Mustangs with a 4-0 record.

The Mustangs seemed to have a balanced attack as they would score about the same amount of points throughout the quarters, scoring 13 in the first, 15 in the second, 14 in the third and 9 in the fourth, while holding the White Deer Bucks scoreless throughout the game. The Mustangs would get on the board first as Brooks Brown goes over for 5 yards to gap a ten play 64 yard drive. Ben Dollar's kick is good.

The Mustangs would take a quick 7-0 lead with 5:37 remaining in the first quarter. The Mustang offense longed to get their second score as Caleb Finsterwald goes over for three after the defense turns the ball over to the offense. Caleb gets a 3 yard touchdown run. The kick is not good and the Mustangs up their led 13-0 with 3:55 in the first quarter.

The Mustangs played great defense the offense got the ball back and Caleb Finsterwald would get his second touchdown on a 1 yard run. Casey Childress would run in a 2 point conversion. The Mustangs would take a 21-0 led, this touchdown would cap enough lead to pave a long drive as the Mustangs would score with 10:34 in the second quarter. The defense would come up strong against White Deer's offense. Forcing the ball back then giving back to the offense. The Mustangs would strike quick as Brooks Brown hits Finsterwald for a 69 yard pass. Ben Dollar's kick is good. The Mustangs would led 28-0 with 7:55 in the second quarter. The margin at half time was 28-0.

Wheeler would take the opening kick off in the second half. The Mustangs drive 80 yards with 13 plays,

this drive is marked by penalties and set backs for the Mustangs, didn't let adversity overcome them as Brooks Brown goes a 4 yards out. Ben Dollar's kick is good as the Mustangs would up their led 35-0 with 6:13 left to go in the third quarter. The Mustang defense would hold White Deer to virtually no offense turning the ball back over to the Mustangs. Finsterwald would get his fourth TD in on a 20 yard run capping a 33 yard drive. Ben Dollar's kick is good and the Mustangs led 42-0 with 3:55 left in the third quarter.

The Mustang offense would cap off their scoring for the night with 11:28 in the fourth quarter. Casey Childress goes over and scores a touchdown from 23 yards out. Ben Dollar's kick is good, the Mustangs led 49-0. Mustang defense who played well all night again to finish up the scoring for the Wheeler Mustangs, the ball is kicked out of the end zone and the Mustangs defense and special teams increase the margin 51-0, that's the way the game would end. Wheeler had one more scoring opportunity in the fourth quarter as they deliver a White Deer fumble. The Mustangs would turn it back over to the Bucks thus throwing any chance of increasing the score.

The Mustang offense put points on the board, the defense is playing superb defense as the stats would show.

## County Range & Pasture Tour Is Attended by 22

Twenty-two ranchers from Wheeler County took part in the annual Wheeler County Range & Pasture Tour on September 30. The tour, sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, was hosted by the Joe Van Zandt Family.

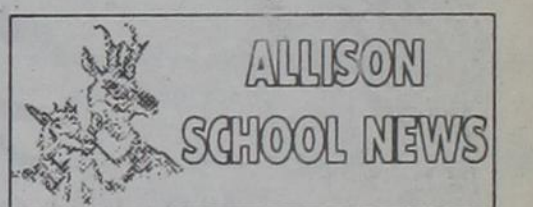
During stops on the Van Zandt Ranch, Joe Van Zandt discussed his brush control and grazing management practices. The group saw how brush and trees such as honeylocust, cedars and western soapberry can spread if left unchecked. Treatment included a foliar spray of 1% Grazon P+D on locust and 1% Tordon 22K on cedars. Basal treatments of 1 part Remedy and 3 parts diesel were effective on locust and western soapberry. Ground treatment with Spike was used to control locust, hackberry, western soapberry and wild plum.

Grazing deferral of previously overgrazed range and pasture had allowed the grass to recover and establish a good stand.

Following the tour, Joe, Janie and Becky served lunch to all the participants at the historic rock house near Hidetown.

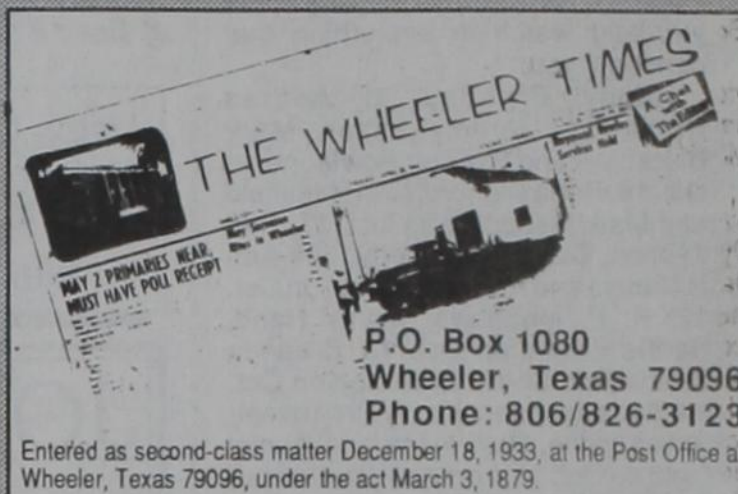

**From The Minister's Desk:**  
A paradoxical character in the American Revolutionary War was Benedict Arnold. At the beginning of the war, Arnold was a general who served with impressive distinction in the army of the Patriots. But he eventually became a traitor and served in the British army until the end of the war.  
Many historians have tried to explain why General Arnold, an officer of outstanding military character, would "turn traitor". Some have suggested that it was because he thought that General George Washington received more praise from the Continental Congress than he did.  
For example, it is reported that he once complained to another officer: "My troops are better trained, better dressed and better fighters. My troops and I can even march better than Washington and his troops."  
The other officer thought for a few minutes. He then made a very insightful reply. He said: "But General Washington and his troops can march without a drummer."  
To serve with little or no recognition, is more than a characteristic of a good soldier. It is also a characteristic of Jesus' disciples. Jesus once described His disciples as "—the light of the world." As "—the light of the world—" the disciples of Jesus will attract attention. But they will always direct this attention towards God and not themselves.

When Jesus described His disciples as "—the light of the world—" he also said: "Let your light shine before men in such a way that they may see your good works and glorify your Father who is in heaven." (Matthew 5:16)  
Notice that Jesus stated that the purpose of His disciples' "—good works—" was to glorify God not the disciples who do them. Throughout His ministry, Jesus sternly condemned the use of discipleship for personal glory. For example, Jesus taught: "Beware of practicing your righteousness before men to be noticed by them—" (Matthew 6:1) With this admonition, Jesus did not prohibit His disciples from practicing their righteousness before men. But He did prohibit His disciples from practicing their righteousness "—before men to be noticed by them—".  
Disciples of Jesus are "—light of the world—" What stars are to the darkened sky, disciples of Jesus are to a world that is darkened by sin. Their righteous lives should shine brightly and distinctly "—before men—" But they should resist any temptation to glorify themselves and not God.  
As the "—light of the world—" the disciples of Jesus should march without a drummer.

The purpose of this letter is to question the complacent behavior of most of the cellular phone customers in Wheeler County. I have had a burr under my saddle for some time regarding this subject. We continue to pay the cellular providers thousands of dollars each month and allow them to laugh all the way to the bank. Many of us are in quite a predicament because we have allowed the providers of cellular service to seduce us into signing long term contracts for a few additional minutes each month. These contracts assure the provider a large client base and a tremendous profit while giving them no incentive to improve the reception in our area. Surely I am not the only one that has seen automobiles perched precariously on the roadside hoping to complete a conversation without being disconnected. This practice is not only frustrating but it is also dangerous.

It was just a few years ago that the "Information Super Highway" did not pass through Wheeler. This caused a few brave individuals to contact GTE, and the PUC with a request that our service be upgraded. GTE was initially unwilling to upgrade our service as we had requested because the upgrade would not have been profitable. If these individuals had been deterred by GTE's denial we would not have the local calling area that we have today, nor would we have local access to the World Wide Web. GTE was monopolizing our local calling service as well as our ability to select a competitive long distance carrier. In our current situation, both Dobson Cellular Systems and Cellular One offer their services to the residents in this area. If a grass roots movement can bring a giant like GTE to their knees, then surely in the highly competitive market of cellular phone service, some major improvements could be seen in our cellular reception. Our family has accounts with both of the aforementioned companies and they have indicated to me that very few complaints have been received from those in this area.

I would like to see that change! I would like Wheeler to be a "squeaky wheel" and for the residents of Wheeler to request that they provide us with the service that we deserve. The technological advances of today have created cellular phones no larger than a credit card and yet the powerful bag phones hardwired in your car cannot maintain a decent signal in many areas. I would like to request that you take a few moments to write to the customer service departments listed below with your personal comments about your cellular service. I have learned from experience that if you complain of bad reception they would like to know exactly what areas you are referring to. I would also like to see those of us that have not signed long term contracts to consider changing our service to the company that responds to our requests. This consideration might possibly be the only incentive that they have to improve our service.

Wheeler has always prided itself for being the best. Because of this pride, our local businesses provide quality service, we are successful athletically and academically, we have the highest quality doctors, dentists and hospital staff around. I ask you to take pride in Wheeler once again and demand the service we deserve.

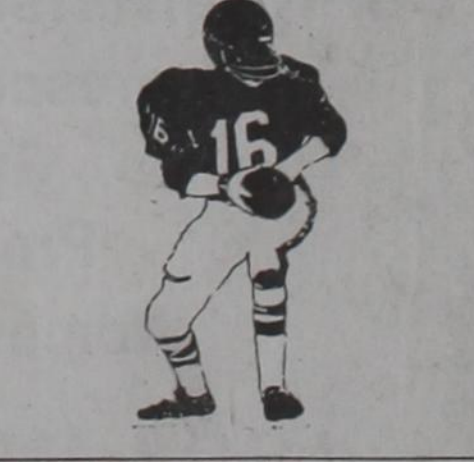
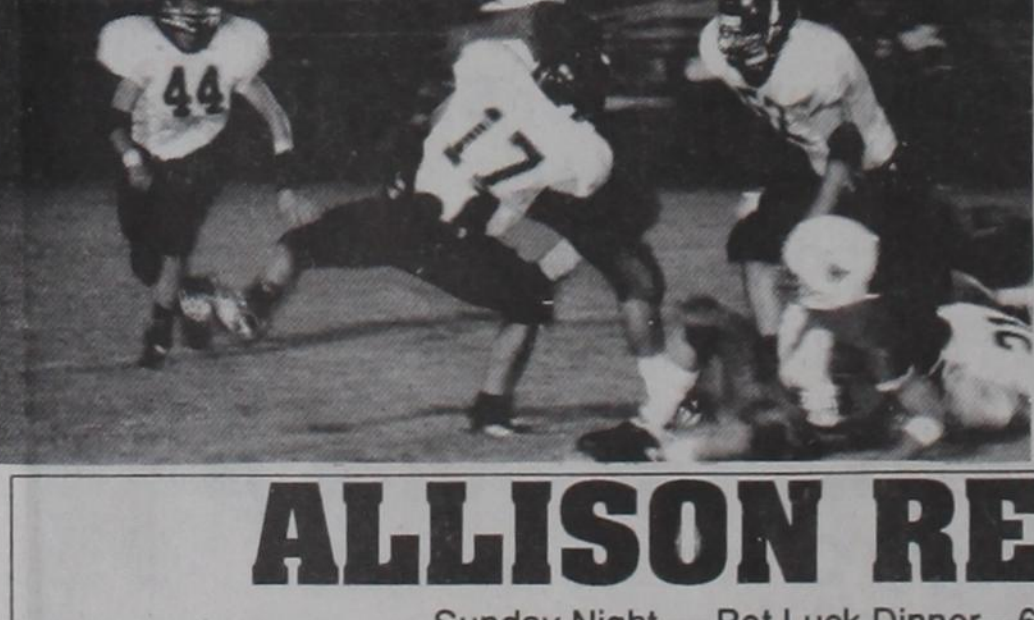
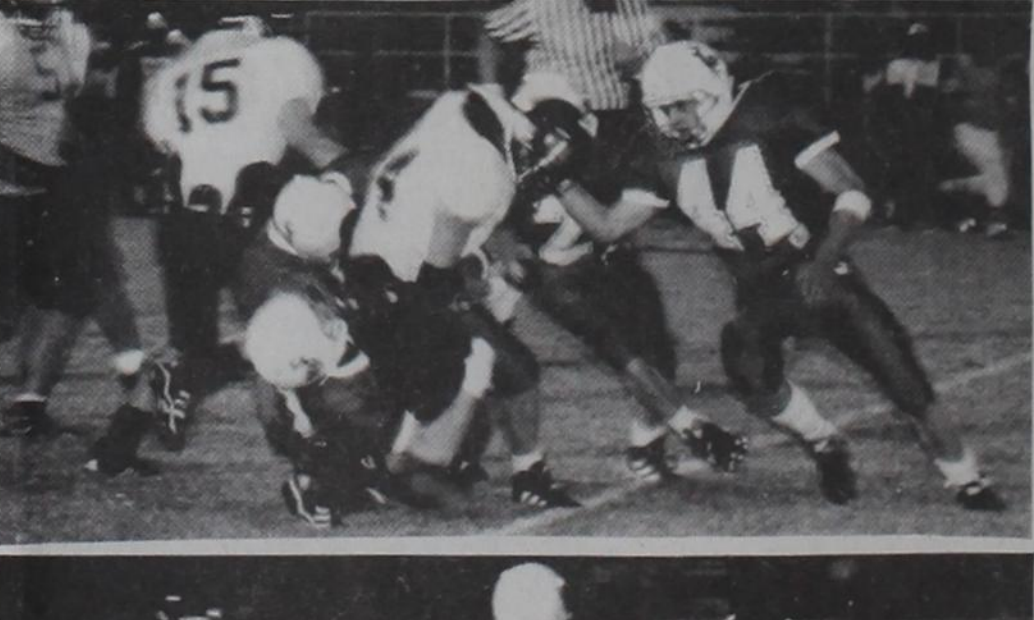
