Spearman came from district 5-2A and at the time were ranked number nine in class 2A. This was a great challenge for the Mustangs. Not only as a football game but to put the homecoming festivities behind them and focus on the ballgame with a chance to win. One of these teams would go away with the first lose of the season.

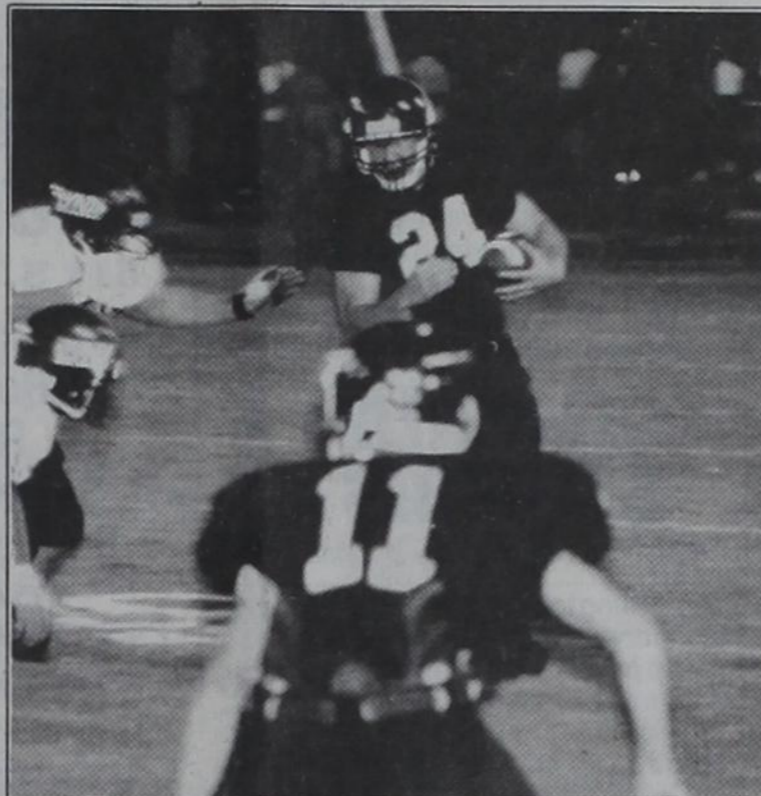

Kyle Masters, #88, goes for yardage against Spearman



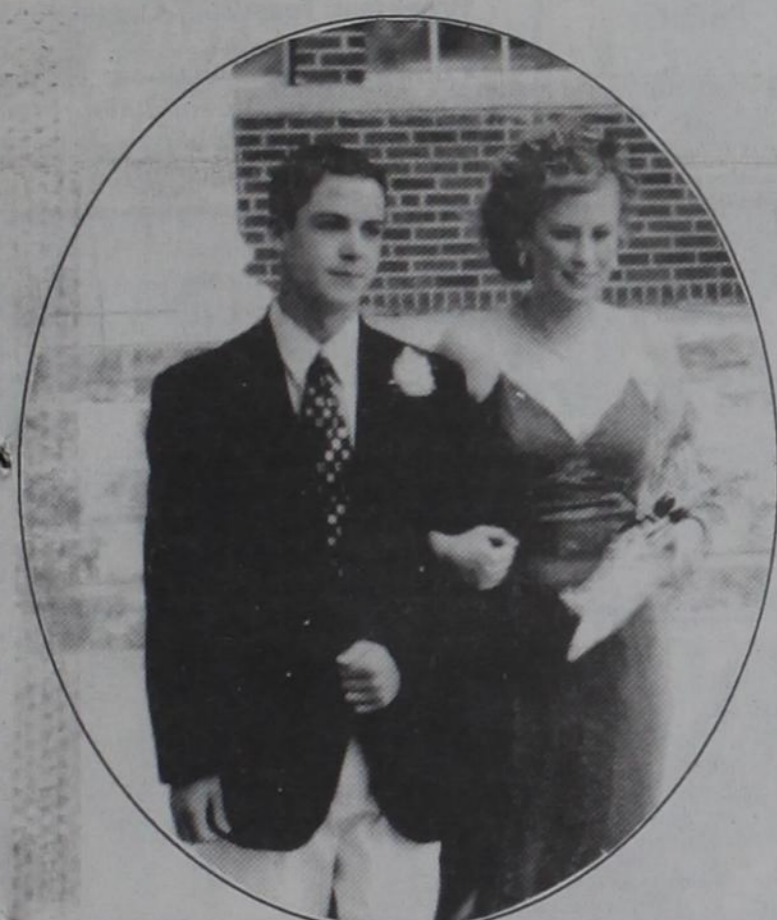

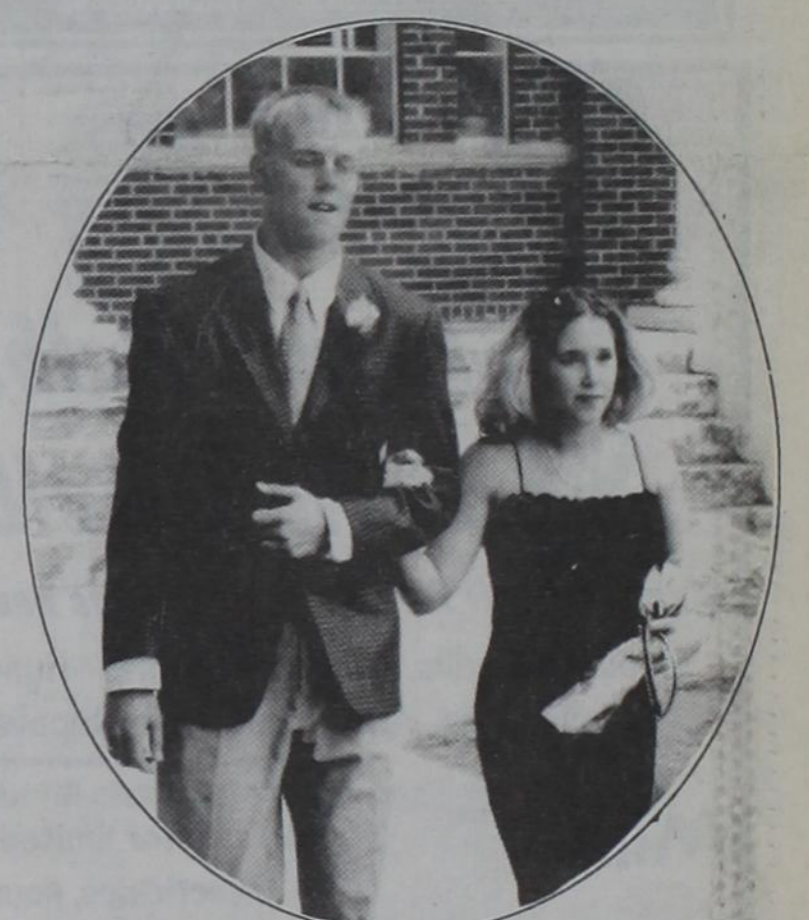

Wheeler Receives \$250,000 To Be Used For Two Wells

U.S. Sen. Phil Gramm announced that over 100 cities and counties in Texas are receiving Community Development Block grants totaling \$30.9 million to help finance various water, sewer or street improvements.

"I am pleased that some of the tax dollars sent by Texans to Washington are being returned to benefits area citizens by financing improvements to the areas where we work and live every day," Gramm said in making the announcement.

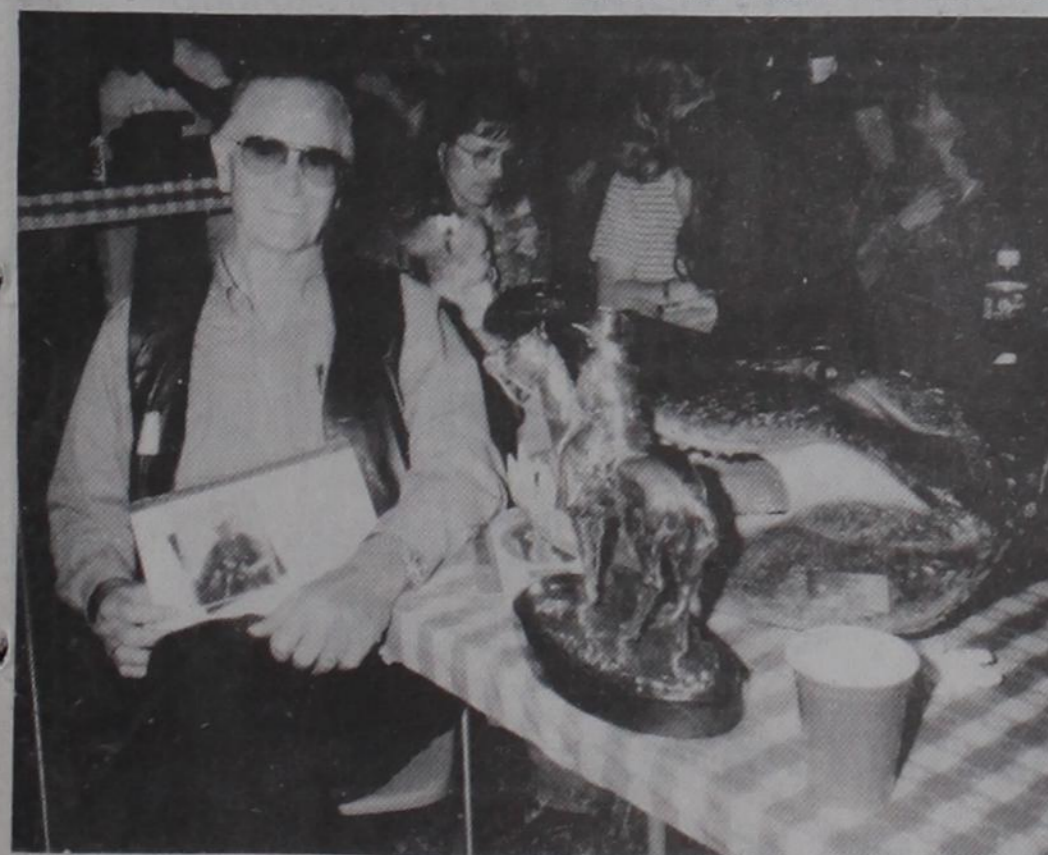
The funds are provided by the U.S.

Department of Housing and Urban Development and will be administered by the Texas Department of Housing and Community Affairs through the Texas Community Development Program.

"My strong commitment is to assure a fair return to Texas taxpayers on the money we pay in federal taxes," the senator said.

The Community Development Block Grant program one of HUD's largest is designed to assist commu-

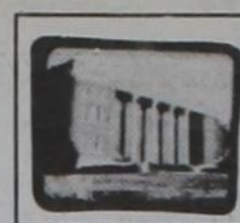

About Veterans on County Memorial

According to Webster's New World Dictionary, "Hero means to watch over, to protect. Any man admired for his courage or exploits, especially in war."

Today we are writing about five local men, who served their country and are listed on the Wheeler County memorial. Two of these fine men are deceased. The following information came from "Men and Women In The Armed Forces from Wheeler County".

PFC William A. Goad, Jr., son of Mr. and Mrs. W. A. Goad, Sr., Wheeler, graduated from Wheeler High School, entered the Army in 1944; trained at Camp Fannin, TX. Served in France and Germany. Awarded the Purple Heart and 3 Battle Stars. Wounded in Germany, 1944. Discharged in 1945.

S/SGT Hiram A. Whitener, son of Mr. and Mrs. C. A. Whitener, Wheeler, attended Wheeler High School. Entered AAF in 1942, trained in TX, Wash., and Nev. Served in Italy, awarded Air Medal with 3 Clusters, the Purple Heart, MTO with 4 Battle Stars, and GC. Wounded in Blechammer, Germany in 1944. Discharged in 1945.

AOM3/C Earl F. Barnes, son of Mr. and Mrs. F. E. Barnes, Pampa. Attended Wheeler High School. Entered the Navy in 1942, trained in San Diego, CA. Served in the South Pacific and Philippines. Awarded the Air Medal, Purple Heart, President's Citation, A-P, AT, Philippines. Wounded in Leytein 1944. Discharged in 1945.

S 1/C Arnold T. Jones, son of Mr. and Mrs. A. A. Jones, Wheeler; husband of Ruby Ayres, Wheeler; graduated from Wheeler High School. Entered the Navy in 1943; trained in San Diego, CA. Served in Hawaii, Marshall, Marianas, Japan, Ryu Kyus, Philippines. Awarded A-P Ribbon with 10 Stars, Navy Unit Commendation Bar. Discharged in 1945.

M/SGT Virgil Jamison, Jr. son of Mrs. A. M. Galmer, Wheeler; husband of Dorothy Lee Krebs, Wheeler; graduated Wheeler High School. Entered AAF in 1940, trained in TX, Ill., and Mont. Served in England and Austria. Awarded GC, ETO Ribbon with 6 Battle Stars, American Defense, Bronze Star, Legion of Merit and Unit Cit. with 2 Clusters. Discharged in 1945.

Clippings from the Past

(Editor's Note: Melba Corcoran is on vacation and unable to gather Mobeetie News. She has gone through newspapers at the Museum and selected a few items which might be of interest.)

Highlights from Wheeler Times December 30, 1943

Wheeler Newspaper 1911 Model brought to Editor. A copy of the Wheeler Sun bearing a date of March 10, 1911 was brought to the Times office this week by J. F. Carter, one of the oldest citizens of Wheeler. The issue, which was the first of volume 3, has W. C. Stamper listed as editor and proprietor on the masthead. Choice bits of news included reports of J. E. Edwards breaking his ankle. W. B. Gilliland a new merchant, expecting his family to follow soon. Ben Cree adding more shed room to his wagon yard. A nice fence going up around the jail building. The Baptist ladies having a dinner to raise money for the church bell. J. M. Dill's family moving to Wheeler. J. W. Hooker, auto specialist repairing the R. B. Roger's machine and "My First and Last Attempt to Milk a Cow by Joe Sappington.

Advertisers included Durham and Sanders Abstracters, Holt Bros. Gilliland and Dills, Stamper and Ford, Citizen's State Bank, David Adams Furniture Store, Ross Smith Meat Market, A. P. Smith Painter and Paper Hanger, W. E. Pennington store, Greer's Barber Shop, T. P. Morton Blacksmith and others.
10,152 Bales Cotton Ginned in

County Prior to December 13th. According to a recent report of J. D. Walker, special agent for the Department of Commerce Bureau of the Census, 10,152 bales of cotton were ginned in Wheeler County from the crop of 1943 prior to December 13 as compared with 6,415 bales for the crop of 1942.

Wheeler Times January 10, 1935: Adams Truck line, Wheeler owned transfer and trucking business, operating between this city and Amarillo Via Mobeetie has added a new 1935 V-8 truck to its service this week. Walter Adams has recently taken over the management of the enterprise to relieve his father W. W. Adams, who wants to be able to give his full attention and all necessary time to the duties of County Commissioner in Precinct 1, Wheeler County.

Make Changes at Court House: In order to provide more room for handling the combined work of tax assessor and collector presided over by John M. Templeton, some alterations have been made at the court house this week. Templeton moved the assessor's department into the collector's quarters, formerly occupied by Mrs. M. L. Gunter and her staff, and which had long been overcrowded.

Partitions between the room and the sheriff's office have been removed, affording ample space. Sheriff Waters' office has been transferred to the former assessor's room, northwest corner of the second floor.




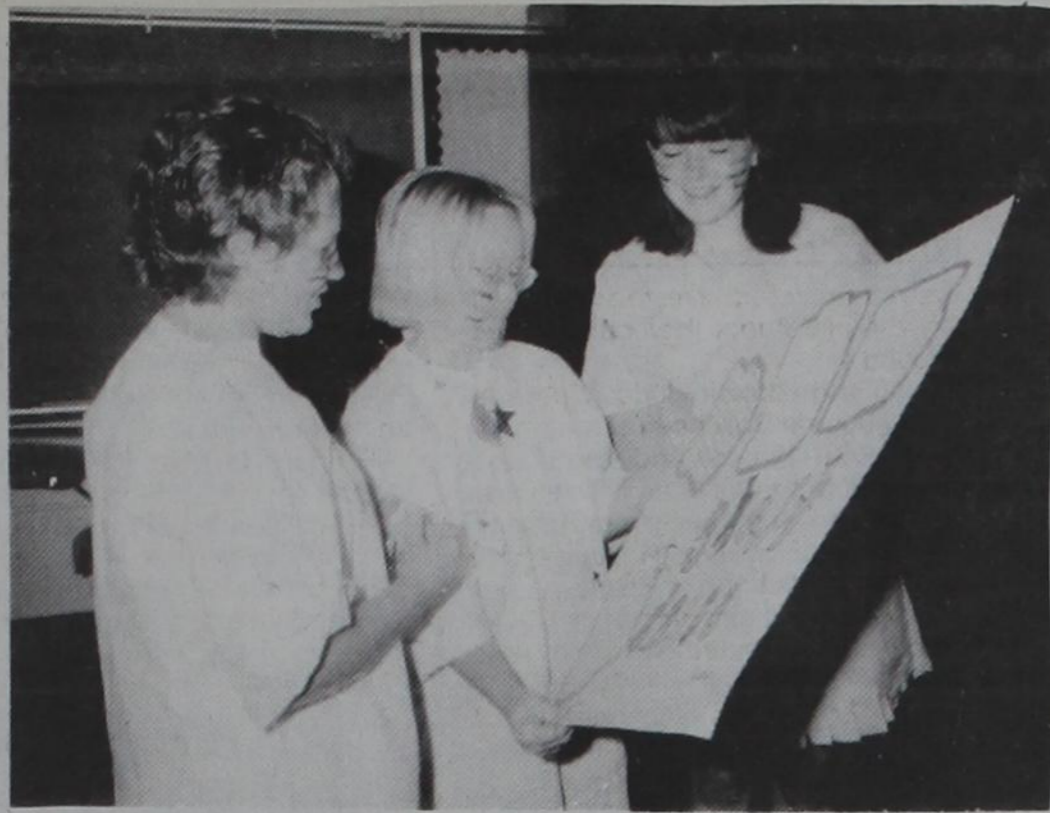

8th Grade Literature

'BIOGRAPHY OF SITTING BULL' PROJECTS

Mrs. Rives's eighth grade class has completed reading the biography of Sitting Bull written by Sheila Black. Sitting Bull's story has been told many times. Most people have read about the "savage" Indian who slaughtered General George Custer at the battle of the Little Bighorn. The class learned about the real story of a brave and resourceful chief who fought to save the lives and liberty of his people. It is also the story of a deeply spiritual man who was trying to save and ancient way of life in this most crucial and painful chapter in Indian history.

To bring closure to this unit, students selected areas of interest to investigate.

From this investigation, the students produced projects to present to the class. Joe Don Glassey, Brad Masters, and Joe Salas presented a demonstration of the Sun Dance and shared with the class a Sioux prayer and description of how the dance was done. The dancer was connected to a central pole by long rawhide thongs attached to his chest and danced trying to free himself from the flesh so that the dancer could come close to the Great Spirit.

Megan Ford, Andrea Jones, and Chelsea Brooks performed the Ghost Dance in ghost shifts that they had made according to Sioux history. The students explained the purpose of the dance that was introduced in 1890 to the Sioux. This dance would bring dead ancestors back to life and return the buffalo in great numbers. This dance frightened the white people and led to the massacre at Wounded

Knee where three hundred Indians were killed, mostly women and children.

Blaine Rutherford, James Chapman, and Dusty White gave a detailed explanation of the Battle of the Washita, which took place on November 27, 1868, at the present-day Cheyenne, Oklahoma. These boys drew a map of the battle in which Custer and his troopers massacred Black Kettle and most of his tribe of Indians on the Washita River. Major Elliott and a small detachment of men chased a small group of Indians downstream and never returned. The Indians who came to Black Kettle's aid killed them all.

Karry Fite and Jennifer Nowlin chose "Crazy Horse" for their project. They drew a picture of this Sioux warrior and addressed the class about his life. Following their report, Karry and Jennifer gave the class a test that they found on the Internet about the life of Crazy Horse.

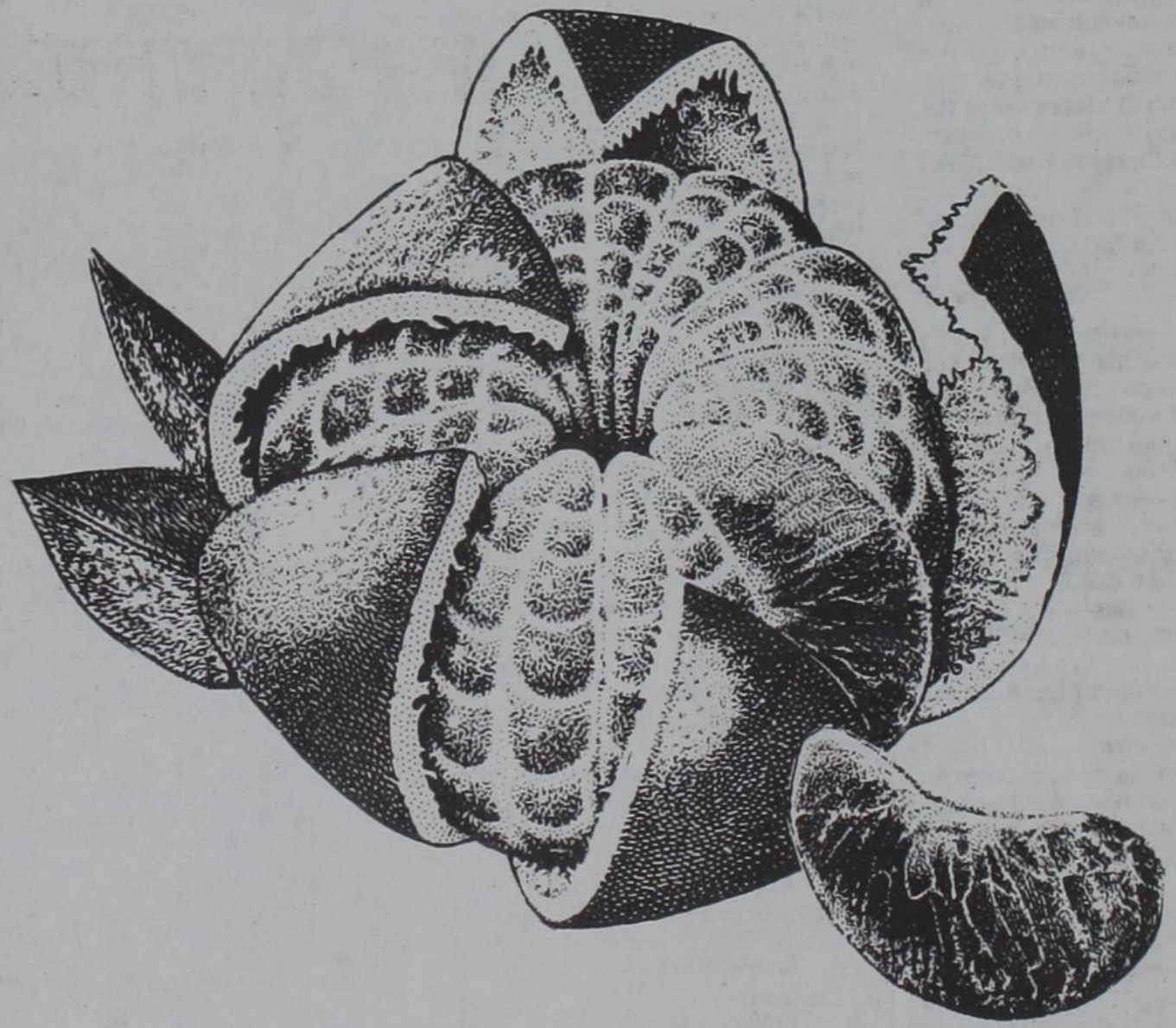
