SPUR BULLDOGS KICKED FOR 14-8 LOSS, REGIONAL GAME FRIDAY AT LEVELLAND

The Wheeler Mustangs continued their playoff quest by winning a big game against the Spur Bulldogs last Friday night 14-8. Neither team did much offensively, but Wheeler's defense recovered 3 emont Spur fumbles and held on late in the game for a very exciting win.

After a quick and scoreless first quarter the Mustangs were able to mount a 5 play 23 yard drive that allowed Andy Francis to bowl into the endzone on a 1 yard run, with C. Case providing the extra point.

Throughout the first half the Mustangs offense was consistent but unable to break any real offensive effort.

able to break any real offensive effort. On the other side of the ball, all the talk that proceeded the explosive Spur offensive and #33 was put to rest by the Mustang defense. The boys in black (white), stopped the Spur backs on every occasion, keeping Spur on their own end of the field. Not enough can be said about the Mustang defense last Friday night and those at the game saw tremendous effort by the entire defensive team.

The third quarter began as the first and was indicative of the entire night—a tough defensive battle. The Mustang defense was not going to let Spur get

way breathing room for a chance to score. On the same note, the Mustang offense was also struggling. There just didn't seem to be any lanes to run through.

The fourth began and the Mustangs showed promise. With a little over 8 minutes to go, the Mustangs capitalized on another Spur turnover (they had 4 in all, including a big first half interception by C. Case) and it only took the Mustangs 6 plays to go 55 yards with Jarrod Ledbetter providing the 5 yard T.D. run and C. Case adding the extra point. Spur began to come alive late in the fourth quarter with Kelley scoring on an 18 yard run that had been the culmination of a big 62 yard drive. Spur went for two and were successful making the score 14-8 with a little over 3 minutes left in the game. The Mustang offense began a drive but had a tough 4th & 2. The Mustangs were able to draw the Bulldogs offside with a key snap by center Robert

Stiles. This play just might have won the ball game for the Mustangs. By being able to keep the drive alive four more plays and run the clock the Mustangs again had to punt on the 4th down but had super coverage on the punt & put Spur in a hole. The Mustang defense then bent a little but held on for an exciting and close finish. The Mustangs put an end to Spur's hopes early in this game by big plays from Corey Case, Jarrod Ledbetter, and Cliff Fletcher taking down Spur's running game in their own backfield. These 3 players were responsible for 10 tackles in Spur's backfield. We had 16 total. Another big play that can't go unnoticed was the hit that Dustin Weatherly put on Spur's alleged # back on the first attempted punt return by Spur. Weatherly knocked the crud out of Kelly causing a fumble that Jeremy Davis recovered & set the tone of the game.

Offensively the Mustangs have to

improve and will this next week as they take on Wink. Ledbetter had 40 yards in 12 carries, Francis had 49 in 12 carries, Case had 10 for 32 yards and Davis had 1 carry for 1 yard. In the passing category the Mustangs were 2 for 6 with one interception. Phillip Wiggins was the lone receiver with 2

receptions for 17 yards. It's real hard to believe that Wheeler still won this game with this poor of a performance. But, we did and that's all that matters. Again, the Mustangs would like to express their thanks to the Mustang boosters and their fans for all the support provided. The Mustangs take

Wheeler Care Center, Hospice of the Panhandle Enter Agreement for Hospice Care in Wheeler

B. A. Hyatt, director of Wheeler Care Center, and Sherry McCavit, director of Hospice of the Panhandle, announce the two organizations have signed an agreement bringing hospice care to the nursing home.

"We have set aside a room for Hospice patients and have equipped it to accommodate the needs of terminal patients," says Hyatt. "Under the arrangement, we will provide nursing care in regard to the activities of daily living and general nursing care while Hospice of the Panhandle will provide the specialized care needed by the terminal patient. The room will also provide a place for family members to spend quality time with the patient in a setting of privacy."

"We at Hospice of the Panhandle are especially excited about this agreement with Wheeler Care Center," said McCavit. "Although we have contracts with a number of nursing homes in our nine-county service area, this is the first nursing home to establish a special room just for hospice patients. We feel it is an ideal situation for terminal patients who are residents of the nursing home or Hospice patients who need more continuous skilled care than is available at home."

Wheeler Care Center staff and volunteer auxiliary decorated the room with the comfort of hospice patients and their families in mind. They painted the room mauve with a navy, green, gold and mauve floral border. A love seat folds out into a bed for guests. A recliner is situated near the bed. The

bedspread, pillow shams and curtains match the floral border.

"This service can be rendered to one of the residents of Wheeler Care Center when they approach the end of their life span, or it can be a patient that Hospice is caring for in some other setting who reaches the place where they need nursing care on an ongoing basis and the nursing care provided by the care center can be utilized to assist Hospice," Hyatt said.

"Under the working arrangement," he added, "when one of the residents of the care center needs Hospice care, we work together with Hospice to meet the needs of the patient."

"Financial reimbursement to the nursing home for room and board services, whether private pay or Medicaid, does not change when Hospice assumes care of the resident," explained McCavit. "Hospice of the Panhandle's services are free to all hospice patients," she said.

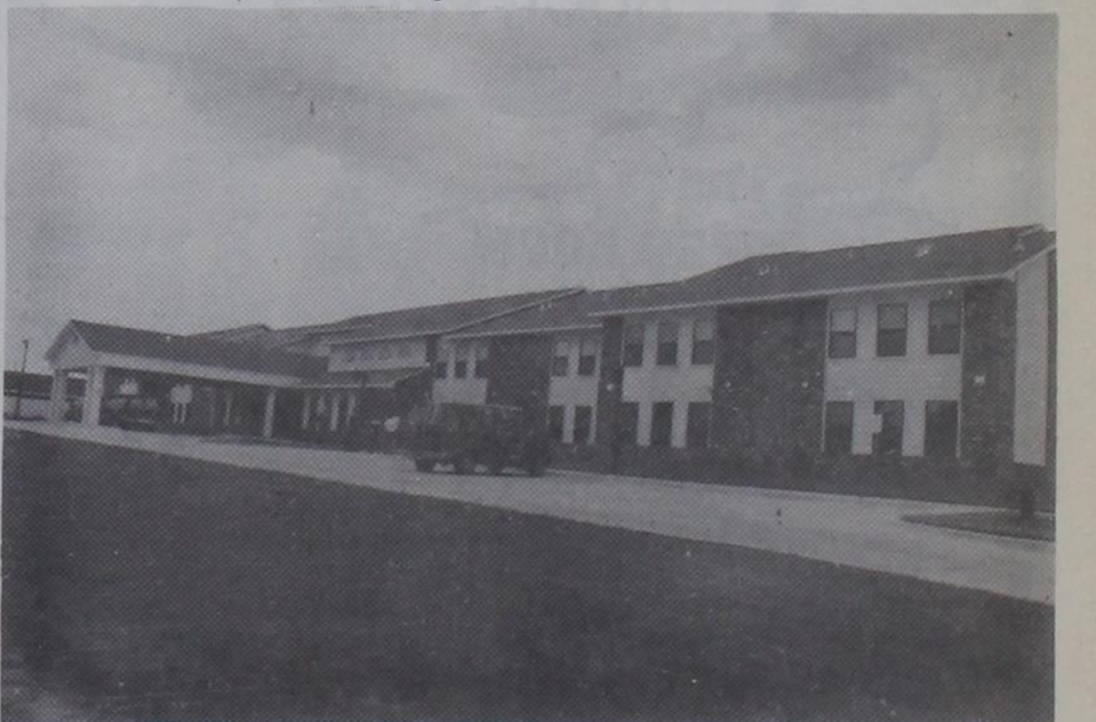

RETIREMENT CENTER: A group of Wheeler citizens recently traveled to Coffeyville, Kan., to visit this facility, which is similar to the housing units proposed for Sandhill Estates in Wheeler. A non-profit corporation has been established for the purpose of conducting the business of processing the building of the housing for the retired citizens. At the present point in the project, funds are needed for the actual planning of the proposed 40 unit facility. Surveys taken in the area show interest which indicated a larger facility could be supported, but the board would rather start on a smaller scale. Members of the Wheeler Chamber of Commerce and prospective residents of Sandhill Estates met with the Wheeler County Commissioners to request financial assistance; the matter was tabled for further research. The next phase of the development of Sandhill Estates will be assimilating tangible information, including primary architectural engineering, and marketing materials which demonstrate the full concept and scope of development; this phase will cost an estimated \$20,000. Additional information, including investments, may be obtained from Van Baize of Canadian, David Wright, Vida Brown, Ben Ed Hillhouse, Charles Brown, Johnny Velasquez, Wanda Herd and Bill Robertson.

Mr. Williams will discuss ways to avoid contamination of the water supply, the current status of and trends in the local ground water situation and state and federal policies that affect local control of the ground water. He will also explain the operation of the Panhandle Ground Water District, including its organizational structure, services, regulatory policies, and financing.

Extension programs serve people of all ages regardless of socioeconomic level, race, color, sex, religion, disability or national origin.

 AN ORDINANCE DEFINING AND PROHIBITING A "KENNEL", AND PROVIDING A PENALTY FOR VIOLATIONS THEREOF.
 BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF WHEELER, TEXAS:

I. That from and after the effective date of this ordinance it shall be unlawful to have a kennel in the City of Wheeler, Texas.

II. DEFINITIONS
 When used in this ordinance the following words and terms shall be defined and interpreted as follows:

II(a). "Cat" means Fels Felis Catus.
 II(b). "Dog" means Canis Familiaris.
 II(c). "Kennel" is defined as keeping six or more dogs or cats or both or six or more dogs or cats for breeding purposes.

III. A person commits an offense if the person has a kennel in the City of Wheeler, Wheeler County, Texas. An offense under this section is a Class "C" misdemeanor.

IV. All portions of any existing ordinance which conflict with this ordinance are hereby repealed.

V. Should any section, paragraph, sentence, clause, phrase or word of this ordinance be declared unconstitutional or invalid for any reason, the remainder of this ordinance should not be affected thereby.

Allison Antelope BASKETBALL PLAY

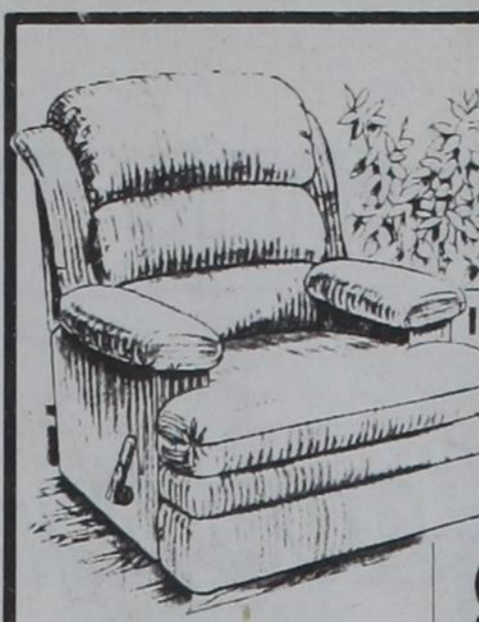
The Allison Antelopes High School basketball teams opened the season with a pair of victories over Alamo Catholic High School of Amarillo on Nov. 15th at Allison.

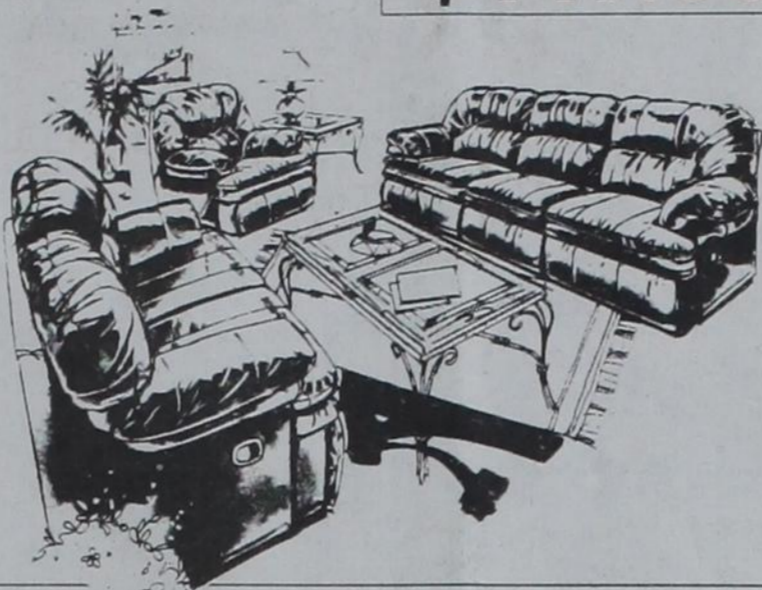

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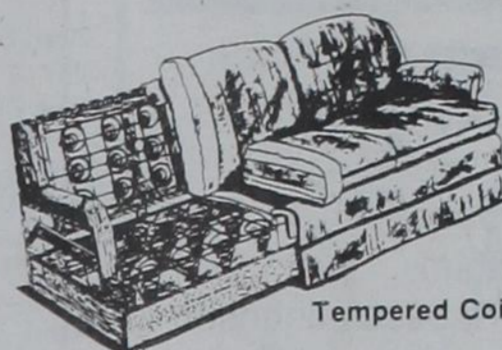


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FARMERS MUST COMPLY WITH FSA PLANS IN 1995

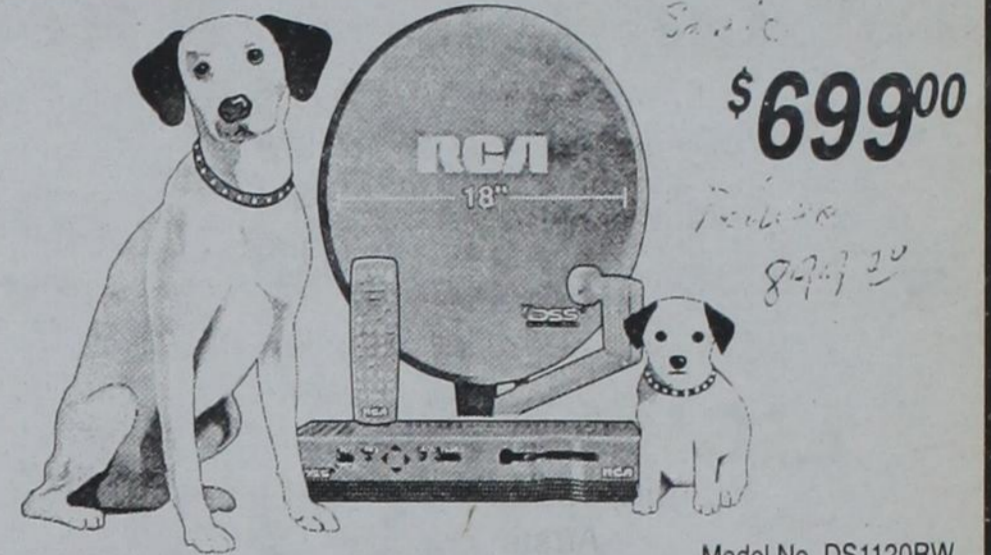

tact the County Extension office at 826-5243 by noon Wednesday, November 23 so a meal count can be obtained.

At 4:00 P.M. the group will go to a nearby range or pasture site where J.F. Cadenhead, Extension Range & Brush Control Specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service will demonstrate a method to determine the amount of forage available. He will show how to use that information to calculate the carrying capacity of a given site.

Cadenhead will also discuss the control of weeds and brush in ranges and pastures.

Following dinner, Dr. Matt Cravey will discuss the nutrient requirement of wintering cows and present supplemental feeding recommendations for meeting these requirements based on forage being fed. He will also show the importance of main-

taining good cow condition in getting cows to rebreed in the spring.

Dr. Cravey was formerly the Extension Beef Cattle Specialist in Amarillo and is currently a nutritionist with Hi-Pro Feeds.

Don King, Wheeler County Extension Agent, will report on the analysis of grasses in various stages in maturity, including CRP grass.
