Mrs. Guthrie was born in Lacasa, Stephens County. She graduated from Abernathy High School in 1918 and Wayland Baptist College in 1922. From 1922 until 1926, she taught in various schools.

In 1926, Mrs. Guthrie attended the University of Texas. With her husband, she co-owned and operated the Chevrolet dealership and service station in Matador from 1926 until 1930 when they moved to Wheeler. Wheeler Co. Jail Inmate Death Sat. Ruled Suicide

Kenneth Ray Rowton died Saturday, July 3, 1999, of an apparent suicide in Wheeler County Jail. Rowton had moved to Wheeler from Tulia afew months earlier and worked as a farm laborer.

Rowton was booked into the Wheeler County Jail on Friday, July 2, on charges of unlawful possession of a fire arms.

The jailer found Rowton dead Saturday morning. It appeared Rowton had hanged himself.

One change in livestock rules requires that lambs and hogs be tagged with a Tri-State Fair tag no later than August 1 to be eligible to enter the show. Any 4-H member planning to exhibit lambs or hogs must contact County Extension Agent Don King by July 15 to order tags. The tags will cost \$5.00 each.

All 4-H entries for youth livestock, including steers, heifers, hogs and lambs, are due in the county Extension office by Monday, August 2.

A Panhandle 4-H Wheat Show and a Garden Basket division have been added for the 1999 Fair. To be eligible for the 4-H Wheat Show the 4-H member must have been involved in production of the wheat and submit two quart jars of wheat. One entry per county is allowed.

Entries in the Garden Basket Show will consist of 5- 10 varieties of fruits and/or vegetable that the member or group of exhibitors has produced.

Any 4-H member interested in either of these division should contact the County Extension office by August 2 for more information.


Aaron Valencia Receives 'Top 5%' Scholarship


