Bill Helton To Retire In **March From New Century**

New Century Energies (NYSE: NCE) on Tuesday announced the retirement of Chairman and Chief Executive Officer Bill D. Helton, effective March 1, 2000. The NCE board named Helton to the honorary position of Chairman Emeritus in recognition of his 36 years of service and leadership. Vice Chairman, President and Chief Operating Officer Wayne H. Brunetti has been elected to succeed Helton as Chairman, President and Chief Executive Officer.

Helton had been scheduled to step down as CEO on Feb 1, remaining as chair until the closing of NCE's pending merger with Northern States Power of Minneapolis, expected later this year. "I felt it made sense for me to step down now to facilitate the transition. The people in these two fine companies have significant integration work to do, as they create the eighth largest gas and electric utility in the country," Helton said.

Brunetti will be CEO of the merged company for the first year, until NSP's chair Jim Howard steps down a year after closing, Brunetti will then assume both titles. Brunetti said, "We'll miss Bill and his leadership, both inside the company and in the community. And I personally wish him well in his future ventures

"I have been exhilarated by helping create New Century Energies out of two great smaller companies - and further, I've enjoyed getting this next merger ready to go. But my role in that is essentially finished and I'd like to (Continued Page 4)


