

At the present time we are going through licensing requirements required by the State of Texas. These requirements insure the safety and protection for children.

We will have a curriculum for each age group that teaches age appropriate learning activities. The curriculum is from Church Weekday Education. It is produced by the Southern Baptist Association and is called WEE Learn. The curriculum quide is developed around themes which provide opportunities for children to learn about God's world and how to live in it. The themes are designed to help lay a foundation for understanding God, Jesus, the Bible, the church, self, others, and the natural world. We will not be teaching religion, that is the responsibility of each church, but instead teach the basic truths that are age appropriate for preschool children. Anyone is welcomed to view the curriculum guide upon request.

The rooms will be divided into centers such as; Art Center, Homeliving Center, Block Center, Book and Listening Center, Nature and Science Center, Music Center, Puzzles and Manipulative Center. The centers will reflect the theme for the month.

We want to keep the cost down for parents as much as possible. This first year we will only take 12 children. Each child will need to bring a sack lunch, but we will provide a nutritious morning and afternoon snack for each child. We really wanted to provide the noon meal, but in order to keep the costs down this first year we chose not to. We hope to provide a noon meal in the future.

For children 2 years and up we will accept enrollment from now until July 31. For children under 2 years old enrollment will be August 1-14. To obtain enrollment forms please contact Christie Jones at 826-5935. The director of our CDC will be Christie Jones. She is currently taking classes to obtain her Associates Degree in Child Development at Amarillo College. Christie has been gaining experience at First Baptist Child Development Center in Pampa, TX

The hours that the CDC will be open for parents will be from 7:00 am until 6:00 pm. The cost is \$60.00 for 2 years old until school age, \$75.00 for children under the age of 2. Payment will be expected weekly. There will be a yearly one time fee of \$35.00 for supplies. The CDC will be funded only by the fees listed above, careful consideration was made to provide quality care at the lowest possible cost to the parents. We will provide 2 teachers when we have all 12 children present.

Other possible booths are Volleyball, Roller Bowler, Dunking Board, Sponge Throw and the Tug Of War.

The street dance will begin immediately following the fireworks. This year the Chamber is encouraging discretion in the use of alcoholic beverages. No beer cans/bottles, or liquor bottles, please. The music will be recorded with the playing of requests; bring your tapes/discs and know the location of the particular song. Brent Lee has volunteered to serve as deejay.

Texas Dept. of Trans. Meets With Co. Comm.

The Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) met with the Wheeler County Judge and Commissioners on June 23, 1999, at 1:30 p.m. to discuss the results of the inspection of all off system bridges in Wheeler County.

TxDOT inspects all county and city owned bridge structures that are 20 feet or longer in roadway length at least every two years. These inspections are performed under the direction of Lori Davidson, P.E., TxDOT Bridge Engineer by independent consulting engineers.

Structures are evaluated and scored with a sufficiency rating (SR). This number conveys the overall condition of the structure and is based on a scale of 0 to 100. Structures with less than a 50 SR are eligible to received federal funds for replacement. Structures with less than a 30 SR is a "near critical" structure and should receive special attention. In addition to the condition rating inspection the consulting engineers also performed a load carrying capacity analysis on each structure. Several structures in the county are restricted to the amount of load they are allowed to carry. These structures are signed and it is very important that the traveling public observe these weight restrictions. A potluck dinner will be served at the school cafeteria, starting at 12 noon.



I had known many Apache Indians and knew Geramamo's son and am still friend of his grandson. He is a very close friend. He lives in Moscalaro, N.M.

Mama and I knew Chief Kicking Birds' daughter. Her name was Lucy Kicking Bird Botone Kassanvaid. Lucy gave us a beautiful dear skin ceremonial dress beautifully beaded and hand belt that Kicking Bird had done the silver work on. We have Lucy's last pair of beaded moccasins she wore. She and James are both now in the Great Beyond.

We met James and Lucy in Green Tree, N.M. Just a few miles from us. They had an Indian Village there, tepees and all. They put on shows. They had dancers and all. Lucy's son, Frank Botone was their Eagle dancer and was the best Eagle dancer l ever saw.

I have sit by a campfire at night with James and Lucy and had Piotte Tea. It was their Religious Tea. James wanted to smoke our son Terry, but his mother wouldn't allow it. James gave Terry something like Little Buffalo.

James and Lucy have spent several nights at our home on their travels. One time James left a mounted Buffalo head with us and I stored it all covered up. Sometime later, James came through town on his way to Oklahoma. He came by our store and mentioned the Buffalo head and wondered what we had done with the head. I took him to the back of the store and uncovered the Buffalo head and asked James if that was what he had worried about. He hugged my neck and shed tears. That was unusual for an old Comanche Indian. Mama, Terry and I treasured James and Lucy as grandparents.

James was a close friend of Quanah Parker. They both in the Native Indian Church and went on several trips for the church.

Quanah gave James one of his robes and one time someone had stolen it from James. It had wound up in the museum at Canyon and James had seen it there. He told me about it and I told my very good friend Uncle Wes Izzard of the Amarillo Daily paper about it and that James could identify the robe. Some how Uncle Wes got the robe back for James. It thrilled James to no end.

I have had Indian friends from Alaska, Washington, Oregon, New Mexico, Oklahoma and other states. I am part Cherokee and proud of it. From the Minister's Desk:

Let me share you with an astute observation that I recently heard. This observation was: "Please don't count my blessings for me. I want to count them myself."

There are probably several circumstances of life where this observation is applicable. But it is particularly applicable when people are grieved. Virgil Fry, a chaplain at M.D. Anderson Hosptial and Tumor Institute in Houston, Texas, recently listed some statements that did not comfort people when they were grieved. These statements were: -

"Just be glad that you had him/ her as long as you did."

"Don't cry.'

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- "Try not to think about it."
- "It is God's will."
- "You shouldn't feel that way."
- "Nobody promised you'd have him/her forever."

The Bible teaches us "-to comfort those who are in any affliction-." (II Corinthians 1:3-5) But if cry with them, or do a good deed such statements do not comfort people, then it is only reasonable to ask: "How can grieving people be comforted?" 1. Be mostly silent. To comfort people, it is not necessary to speak an abundance of words. It is not

necessary to give an explanation or to give advice. Your presence will be appreciated and remembered more than your words.

2. Be supportive. You may be a Christian who strongly believes that "-the free gift of God is eternal life in Christ Jesus our Lord." (Romans 6:23) However, this conviction should not nullify your sensitivity. The Apostle Paul wrote: "weep with those who weep." (Romans 12:15) Supportive people are a genuine balm to people who are grieved.

3. Be Helpful. you cannot erase or remove the feelings that grieved people experience. But you can be helpful. You can cook food, wash dishes, shine shoes, clean house, or do laundry. Such helpful acts can be a great comfort to people who are grieved.

If you know people who are grieved, do not count their blessings for them. Comfort them. Put your arm around their shoulder,

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for them. With such comfort, these people will eventually be able to count their blessings for themselves. **Bill Morrison, Minister**
