PLASTIC BEATS WOODS FOR **CUTTING BOARDS IN FDA STUDY** Joan Gray

County Extension Agent - Family & Consumer Sciences Texas Agriculture Extension Service If you're thinking about buying a new cutting board, you may want to

consider these findings before you go A Food and Drug Administration researcher has added further evidence

that plastic is better than wood for cutting boards. Dr. Diren Shah reported at the FDA's

American Society for Microbiology meeting that microorganisms were quickly and easily trapped in porous wood surfaces, not dislodged by rinsing, and survived for prolonged periods under high-moisture conditions. On plastic surfaces, the results were that most of the organisms were removed by rinsing. Cleaning cutting surfaces used in

animal products such as beef, poultry, or seafood - is a critical factor in preventing microbial cross-contamination of foods with organisms such as Escherichia Coli 0157:H7, Salmonella and Campylobacter that result in foodborne illness. The researchers placed colonies of

food preparation - especially raw

E. coli bacteria on sterilized wood surfaces. They demonstrated that the majority of bacteria were trapped in the wood tissues were still viable after air drying of up two hours. In a similar experiment, E. coli was

placed on sterilized wood and plastic cutting boards for different periods of time. The boards were then cleaned in an automatic dishwasher at low temperature without detergent. The results showed that the vast majority of bacteria were not removed from the wooden surfaces but were removed from plastic.






