

WHEELER AREA CHAMPS

MUSTANGS 11-0 FOR SEASON; REGIONAL GAME FRIDAY AGAINST SUDAN

The Wheeler Mustangs traveled to Amarillo last Friday night to play an area playoff game with Springlake—Earth at Dick Bivins stadium. The Mustangs entered the game with a perfect 10-0 record, while Springlake—Earth entered with a 9-2 record. It would be a typical game with two class A teams that have had success in the past and present.

Springlake—Earth has made it to the playoffs in the last few years as well as Wheeler.

Wheeler would win the toss and elected to defer thus having to kick off to the Wolverines of Springlake—Earth. Defense falls on the first series turns the ball to the Mustang offense, as the offense seems to become cranked up the penalty bug bites. The Mustangs were flagged for two illegal procedure penalties, thus taken by the rhythm. The Mustangs can't sustain any kind of momentum in the first drive and have to part back with the Wolverines. This is where the Mustangs get their first break of the ballgame as Springlake—Earth return man fumbles the ball. The Mustangs would recover giving the offense new life on an early turn over. But as with the first drive the second drive is marked again with a penalty flag and the Mustangs not able to mount any sort of drive. The first quarter would see both teams play extremely well on defense and neither team being able to move the ball offensively.

The Wheeler Mustangs would mount a series of drives in the second quarter as they marched the ball down to the six yard line at first and go for the six. A five yard illegal procedure penalty would push the Stangs back to the eleven and then the Mustangs were flagged for a personal foul thus pushing them back to the twenty seven. The drive would stop going in with the Mustangs missing a field goal wide to the right. The first half would see both teams playing good defense the half time would end with neither team being able to score.

The second half would start with a bang for the Mustangs as they would receive the ball. The opening kick off Kyle Masters takes the ball back up the middle with some good blocking from his fellow teammates. He goes 73 yards with a kick off return for a touchdown. Ben Dollar's kick is good and the Mustangs open the second half with a quick touchdown, they lead 7-0.

Not to be outdone Springlake—Earth would come right back as they would go march the ball down the field. Springlake's quarterback, Chance Furr, would break loose right around the left end and go 50 yard down the left sideline for a touchdown, the kick is good. The score is knotted again at 7-7 with 10:35 to go in the third quarter. This is where the game would stay until the fourth quarter.

The Mustang offense would finally get on track as they would march the ball down to the third and fifteen, from the 28 yard line. Brooks Brown would roll out to his right and find Donny Phipps in the end zone for a touchdown. Donny was able to catch the ball after his tip from a Wolverine defender in the endzone for a touchdown for the Mustangs. The first extra point kick by Dollar is no good but he's roughed with a personal foul and the Mustangs take the penalty about half distance to the goal and kicked it again. This time Dollar's kick splits up right and the Mustangs take a 14-7 lead with 9:05 left to go in the fourth quarter. The touchdown drive would take the Mustangs 11 plays and 48 yards.

The Mustang defense would then turn the ball over to the offense. After playing tremendous defense forcing the Wolverines to punt. This time the Mustangs would drive the ball down in four plays as Casey Childress goes over to left tackle for two yards and the score of this drive would be highlighted by a good run by Brooks Brown for 25 yards. Ben Dollar's kick is good the Mustangs increase their lead to 21-7 with 5:45 to go in the fourth quarter.

This is the way the ballgame would end with the Mustangs getting the victory in the area 1-A playoff 21-7 over the Springlake Wolverines. Defensively it was a good game for the Mustangs as they were able to hold Springlake—Earth to 123 yards total offense, 50 of that coming off one play. The offense could not get on track most of the game because of penalties putting them in long yard situations, erasing positive plays.

The Mustangs will play again in Amarillo this Friday night as they take on the Sudan Hornets, that game will be at Dick Bivins stadium at 7:30.

Two Women Killed In Accident

Two women from Shamrock, Texas—possibly a mother and daughter—(Janice Marie Johnson and Tina Marie Alley) were killed when their small car was hit violently by a new GMC pickup at 10:45 a.m. Saturday at the

intersection of County Line Road and U.S. Highway 183 south of Clinton.

Both victims apparently died instantly of massive head injuries. Their names were still being withheld late Saturday afternoon pending work that the Texas Highway Patrol had been able to notify next of kin and confirm identity. Trooper Gary Smith of the Oklahoma Highway Patrol principal investigating officer, said the driver was 26 years old and her passenger was 50.

Both were riding in the front seat of a 1988 Chevrolet Nova that was eastbound on County Line Road and failed to yield from a stop sign. The right front of the half-ton pickup, a (Continued Page 8)

County Awarded \$21,000 Grant

State Senator Tom Haywood, District 30, today announced that the Wheeler County Courthouse was awarded a \$21,000 grant from the Texas Preservation Trust Fund (TPTF), a program of the Texas Historical Commission (THC). The grant will assist the County of Wheeler in its efforts to preserve this valuable land-

mark.

"The financial aid the Texas Preservation Trust Fund provides is a unique resource that contributes to our state's growing heritage tourism industry," Haywood said. "The grant program helps our community and many others create a quality of life that attracts new business to out state."

The THC selected 28 preservation projects from 79 applications to be recipients of the 2000 TPTF grant awards totaling approximately \$376,000.

The Texas Legislature created this fund in 1989, the only preservation grant program in the state, to preserve endangered historic buildings and significant archeological sites statewide. The TPTF is an interest-earning pool of public and private monies. The earned interest and designated gifts are distributed as matching grants. The program provides up to one-third of the total project costs for acquiring, planning and developing historic properties.

The state legislature provided a significant boost to the TPTF with a \$2.5 million appropriation in 1995, 1997 and 1999. A portion of the interest on these appropriations was used for the 2000 grants to public or private owners of eligible historic properties.

"With the continued support of the Texas Legislature and with the funds raised through private individuals, foundations and corporation, the THC's Texas Preservation Trust Fund can become a self-sustaining source of funding for the preservation of historic structures and archeological sites throughout Texas," Haywood said.

The Texas Historical Commission is the state agency for historic preservation. The agency administers a variety of programs to preserve the archeological and cultural resources of Texas.

We had one less day for putting the paper together this week and had lots of cooperation in getting the job done.

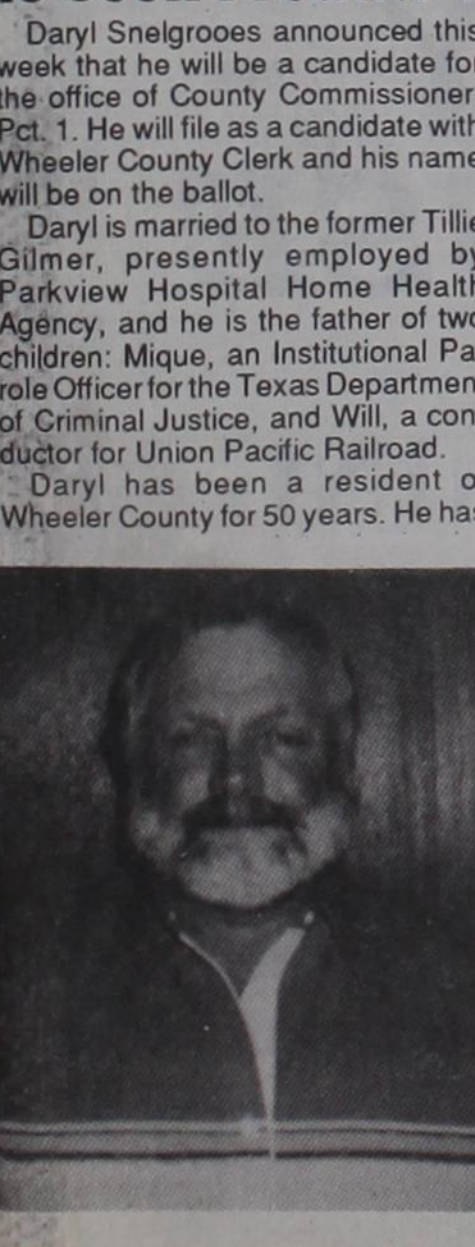

1999 GMC Sierra that was southbound on U.S. 183, struck the driver's side of the car and the vehicles traveled 295 feet to the south locked together. When they eventually came to a stop on the east shoulder of the highway, the right front wheel of the pickup was still attached but was resting in the driver's seat of the demolished car.

Jason Kindred, 21, currently living at Elk City, was driving the pickup. He is originally from Woodward and was treated at Integris Clinton Regional Hospital for head and leg injuries and released. Smith said he had had the pickup only two or three days.

"Basically it was a failure to yield," said the trooper commenting on the cause of the accident. "The car traveled into the path of the pickup, which left no skid marks before impact."

While noting the failure to yield, 2nd Lt. Bruce Peoples said troopers are continuing their investigation and are looking into the possibility that the car driver's vision was obstructed by a permanently installed sign that a piece of construction equipment had been left sitting on the west side of U.S. 183 a short distance north of the intersection.

Also undetermined late Saturday afternoon was the speed of the pickup. All three people involved were wearing seatbelts, and an airbag deployed in the pickup.

But despite their use of seatbelts, troopers said the two women had no

chance as their small car was totally mismatched by the much taller and heavier pickup, Trooper Rick Weeden said the pickup outweighed the car by 2,000 pounds.

Local resident Janet Sawatzky was traveling behind the pickup when the accident happened.

"I just don't think she (the car driver) ever saw him," said Mrs. Sawatzky, adding that events were totally out of the pickup driver's control.

"When he hit that little car, that little car was just like a toy."

"You just fail to remember how quickly something like that happens," she added. Besides Weeden, officers assisting at the scene were Trooper Dick Dodge and 2nd Lt. Brad Neidy of OHP, 1st Lt. Joe Hutcheson and Patrolman Paul Adams of the Clinton Police Department, and Washita County sheriff's deputies. Clinton Fire Department rescue personnel helped remove the bodies, and paramedics

with Sinor Emergency Medical Service rendered on-the-scene aid to Kindred.

The victims were pronounced dead at the scene by Dr. Gary G. Hays, Custer County medical examiner.

Because of baby's toys found in the car, Lieutenant Hutcheson was

concerned for a time that there might be a third victim. However, that proved not to be the case.
