## HOMESTEAD EXEMPTIONS



### CAN LOWER THE PROPERTY TAXES ON YOUR HOME

A homestead exemption lowers the property taxes on your home by lowering its taxable value. For example, if your home is valued at \$50,000 and you receive a \$5,000 homestead exemption, your home will be taxed as if it were worth only \$45,000.

You qualify for a homestead exemption if you owned your home on January 1 and used it as your primary residence on January 1. It doesn't matter whether your home is a house, a condominium or a mobile home.

Exemptions are available to all homeowners to lower their school taxes. Additional exemptions are available to homeowners who are disabled or age 65 and over. Other exemptions may be offered to homeowners by school districts, counties, cities, and special districts. All taxing units offer exemptions to disabled

Apply to your local appraisal district office at the address shown below for all exemptions you may qualify for. Application forms are available there.

If you received a homestead exemption on your present home in 1987, you won't need to apply again for 1988 unless your chief appraiser requires you to reapply.

However, if you became 65 or disabled before January 1, file a new application to receive the additional exemptions.

If you haven't received an exemption on your present home, or if you've moved to a new home, make a new application for 1988.

The deadline for applications is May 2, 1988. Contact your appraisal district before then if you need more time.

Mr. Johnson is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth D. Johnson of Campo, Colorado.

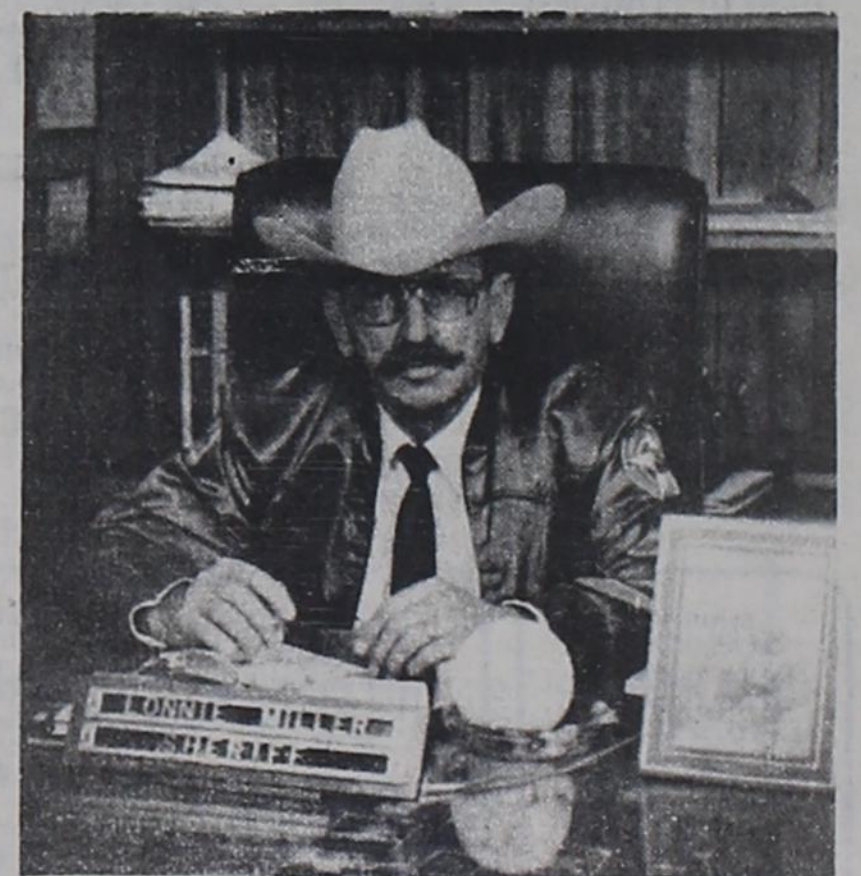

**LAND PRODUCTIVITY VALUATION**



**MAY LOWER THE PROPERTY TAXES ON YOUR FARM, RANCH OR TIMBERLAND**

Texas law provides farmers and ranchers with a way to lower their property taxes, known as productivity valuation.

If you qualify, your agricultural land will be taxed on its capacity to produce crops, livestock, or timber, instead of its value on the real estate market. Productivity valuation can lower the taxable value of your land, and lower your property taxes as a result.

If your land has never received productivity valuation, you must apply to the appraisal district by May 2 to get tax benefits for 1988. You can choose from two types of productivity valuation.

If your land already receives open-space or timber (1-d-1) valuation, you don't need to reapply unless the chief appraiser requires you to. But remember, you must apply every year for ag-use (1-d) valuation.

## WHEELER BRINGS HOME 2ND PLACE TROPHY FROM HORNET RELAYS

The Wheeler Mustangs brought home the 2nd place Team trophy from the Hornet Relays held in Sudan this past Saturday, with 21 teams entered.

The Mustangs totaled 85½ points to place behind host Sudan which had a total of 133 points.

Wheeler was led by Bubba Smith's

two first place finishes in the shot put and discus, a second in the long jump, a third place in the high hurdles, and a 6th in the high jump. Bubba threw the discus, 166'5", the shot, 51' 11", ran the high hurdles in 15.4, long jumped 19'7½", and high jumped, 5'8".

Richard Smith placed 2nd in the discus, with a throw of 163'7", 2nd in the shot put, with a toss of 48'8".

Grayson Benson brought home the gold medal in the pole vault with a jump of 12'6"

Chad Bentley brought home the bronze medal in the 800 m dash with a

time of 2:09.

David Jones placed 4th in the 400 m dash, with a time of 53.5, and placed 4th in the high jump, with a leap of 5'10", and a 5th place finish in the long jump with a jump of 19'3".

The 1600 m. Relay team of David Jones, Grayson Benson, Bryan Kenney, and Chad Bentley placed 4th with a time of 3:38.

Jason Wood ran a 2:14 in the 800 m dash to claim 6th place.

## Farmer's Home Adm. Accept Nominations

The Farmer's Home Administration (FmHA) will begin accepting nominations April 5 for election of County committee members under new rules that make it easier for farmers to qualify as candidates and to vote, County Supervisor John D. Wolf III said today.

FmHA county committees perform a variety of duties for the U.S. Department of Agriculture credit agency, including deciding whether an applicant is eligible for a farm loan.

"One important change broadens the definition of a farmer to anyone who has an interest in a farm in the county as owner, tenant or sharecropper," Wolf said. "The new definition also includes the spouse of an eligible farmer. An old requirement that more than half of the candidate's income must come from the farm operation has been dropped."

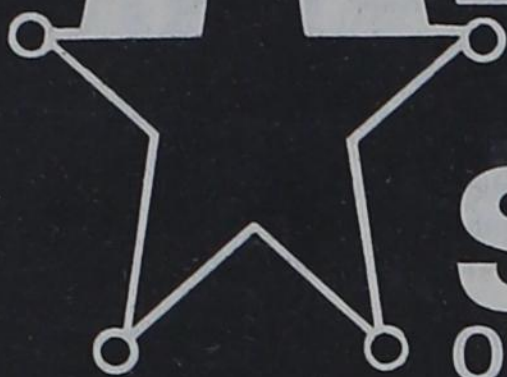
"The nominating period has been extended to 45 days from the previous 25 days, thus allowing more opportunity of people to run for the committee," Wolf said. "At least three eligible farmer voters, including the nominee, must sign the petition."

Two of the three committee members are elected by farmers in the county, and one is appointed by FmHA. One of the elected seats is to be filled for a three-year term at this year's election, which is scheduled for June 30.

"Another important change this year is that one member of the committee can be an active FmHA farm borrower, or be eligible for the FmHA farm loan," Wolf said. "Previously, this was not allowed."

Anyone interested in running for the committee can obtain a petition and other information from the FmHA county office at 112 West Oklahoma in Wheeler, Mr. Wolf said.

### REASONS I WOULD LIKE TO BE YOUR SHERIFF:

I was reared in Wheeler County under Wheeler County Law Enforcement. I know how the parents want the laws enforced with respect to their children. I will fulfill those parents wishes.

I remember how I was treated as a young person by previous sheriffs of Wheeler County in the 50's and 60's. I remember the respect that I had for them that made me want to be a law enforcement officer. I have always patterned my law enforcement career to be the same as those that I remembered. I have trained and reacted to the public the way that I would want to be treated if I were a victim, or in trouble. Even though I worked in the highest crime areas in Amarillo under harsh and deadly circumstances, I always treated the offender with dignity, never using brutality or derogatory statements to anyone.

Selective Traffic Enforcement will be left to the Department of Public Safety and the City Police Department of Shamrock. The Wheeler County Sheriff's Department will perform investigative duties, prisoner transfers, and civil procedures. We will make routine responses to citizen calls and patrol for the security of all citizens.

I worked in a department that made over 90,000 incident reports in one year. The average report per officer was 381 offenses per year. I have worked and investigated every type of crime as an every day occurrence. Experience has taught me that in almost every case, alcohol or drug abuse is involved. Investigating burglaries and theft cases carefully and thoroughly, turn up more drug abusers than any drug raid and are easier to use to obtain a drug possession conviction. Many drug cases are lost because evidence is ruled illegally obtained, because of faulty search warrants, searches under duress, and no probable cause for the issuance of a search warrant which then

renders a search invalid and all evidence inadmissible.

Drug use and drugs are not just a problem of the poor and under privileged. It can affect any member of our communities. A person can become a victim of drug trafficking or drug abuse at any time or any place. Only through peer pressure, education, and relentless enforcement of our laws can a war on drugs be effectively fought and won. It is my belief that only through the cooperation of all law enforcement agencies can we fight the flow of drugs in and through our county.

The Good Kids of our county are a valuable asset. Drug and alcohol play a small role in the majority of our children's lives because of the involvement of parents, friends, and teachers in our children's activities. As a result alcohol and drug abuse is not flowing in the streets of this county as it is in other communities who have less involved parents. I will work to see that this remains to be true. Wheeler County citizens have a natural protection against drug and alcohol abuse. It is called "Parents who care enough to know their children", "Teachers who recognize potential problems", and "Law Enforcement that will be there when and where needed to help parents and teachers to combat drug related crimes."

The Basics of Law Enforcement that I propose to pursue are:

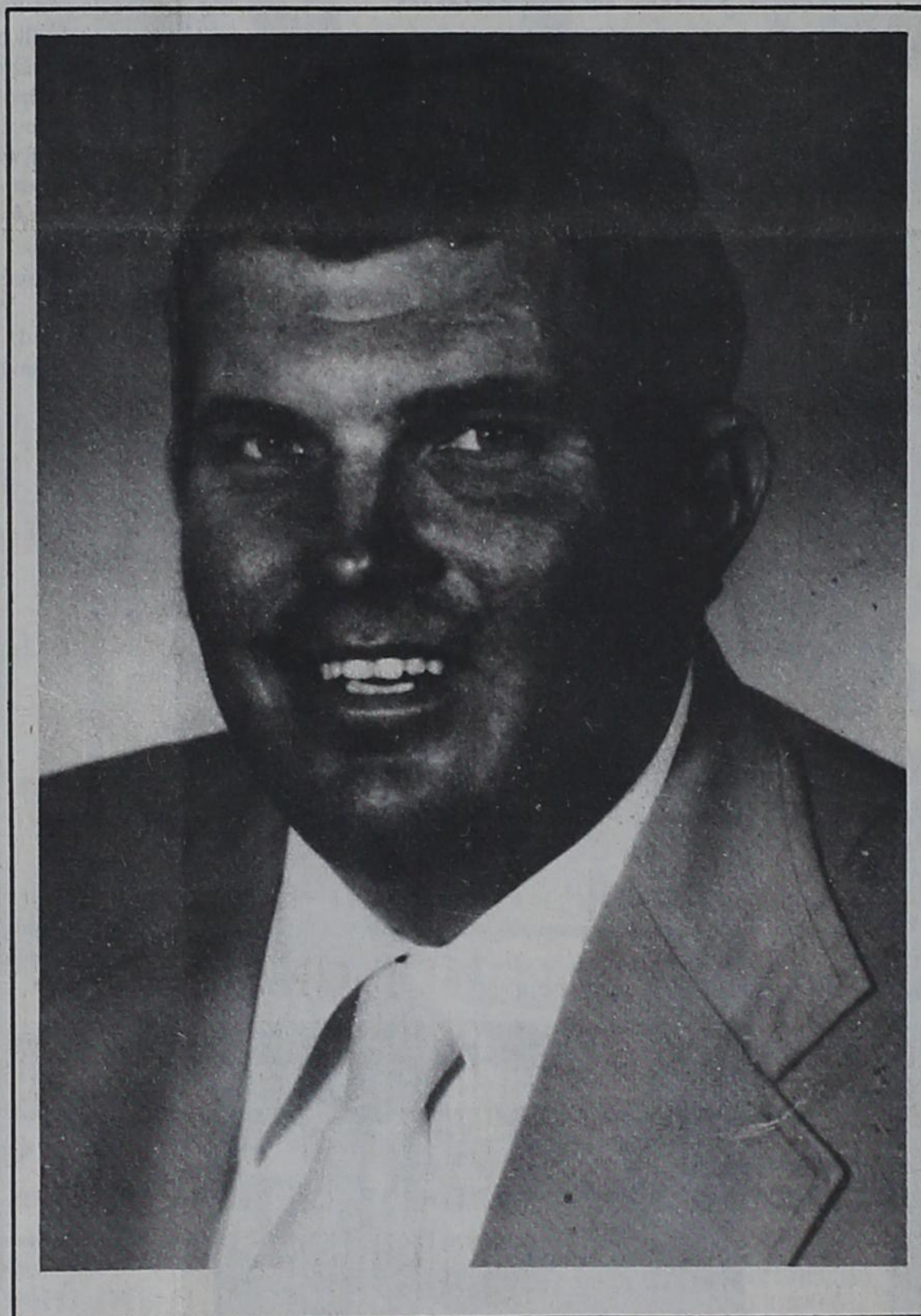
COOPERATION-Between The Sheriff and other Law Enforcement Agencies.
