MUSTANGS CONTINUE WINNING STREAK

The Wheeler Mustangs hosted the White Deer Bucks at Nicholson field last Friday night and it appeared to most Mustangs fans that deer season had already opened. This was a key district matchup for the boys in black, especially since such an emotional battle was fought and won last week against the Irish. The team had a few rough practice early in the week (which might be expected after the Co. championship), but the Mustangs had to be ready for the unorthodox and wide open style of play that the Bucks threatened with.

In the first quarter the Mustangs opened up play with a strong 6 yard

run by Andy Francis. The second play of the first series Jarrod (Gerard) Ledbetter took the ball for a 57 yard run down the homside line that gave the Mustangs a quick 6-0 lead (the extra point failed). Throughout the rest of the first and second quarters of play the Mustangs added 14 more points and held the Bucks to a big 0 to take a half time lead of 20-0. The other two Mustang scores of the first half were on powerful runs by Andy Francis and a super catch by Keith Rose. (Rose had 5 catches in the night for a total of 32 yards). It appeared that through the first two quarters that the boys in black were going to totally dominate the game.

The Mustang offensive line led by a strong core of seniors, Harrison, Stiles, Case, Fletcher, Wiggins and the lone Junior (Charlie Flanagan) opened up tremendous holes for the backs to run through. These unsung heroes of the gridiron have continued to improve throughout the year and are pushed daily by their backups of Dorman and Weatherly.

Anyway, on to the second half. The third quarter of play was a bit of a disappointment to the Mustangs. Offensively, we had great individual effort but were unable to score. This was probably because White Deer had the ball most of the third quarter. The Bucks were able to move the ball up the middle on the Mustangs and this proved to be a concern for the Stang coaching staff who hopefully will be able to correct the situation before the Groom game. Thanks to a lay penalty by the Bucks that kept them out of the endzone the Mustang defense held and did not allow any points in the rest of the game. (The Bucks only score was on a late 4th quarter kick off return of 95 yards).

In the fourth quarter the Mustangs appeared revived and again received excellent blocking from the line and great runs from the backfield. Phillip Wiggins added the 1st touchdown of the 4th quarter on a 21 yard fade pass from Case. This was a tremendous catch by Wiggins as he appeared to run under the football for the score. The extra point pass failed. Andy Francis added the second touchdown of the fourth quarter on a 33 yard run up the middle. Andy broke several tackles and turned on the speed for this score. Dusty Case added the extra point on a nifty run around the corner. Jeremy Davis then provided additional offensive fire power by scoring on a 9 yard run with the extra point being blocked. Davis only carried the ball 9 times but rolled up 74 yards of rushing and spun

a few White Deer heads with outstanding moves. This was the last score the Mustangs would need as they won 40-6. Jarrod Ledbetter had another exciting night with 14 carries for 155 yards, Francis had 16 for 109 yards and Dusty Case had Francis for 15 yards. In the receiving department, Wiggins had 3 catches for 42 yards and 1 touchdown, and as mentioned earlier Rose had 5 catches for 32 yards and 1 T.D. Case was 8 for 17 for 74 yards, but had 3 interceptions. The Mustangs had a total of 428 yards of total offense also.

Defensively the "Black Death" defense bended a little more this week but never really broke only allowing White Deer 174 yards of total offense, 129 of that in the air.

'jump kits' with the materials needed in most emergencies.

Jimmy Selby lives in Mobeetie and many times is able to respond to a location faster than the ambulance.

Lacy Horton lives near Briscoe and is presently pursuing her paramedic training along with Jan Bohls. Lacy carries a pager and will respond to any call requiring her assistance. Vicky Nelson is presently taking L.V.N. training and is an E.C.A. at Briscoe.

Chuck Hartline lives in the Gageby Community. He is an E.C.A. Sheryle Lane lives in Allison. She is an emergency Care Attendant and also a trained nurse.

A call to 911 will alert the ambulance service of the emergency and help in most cases will be only a few minutes away. The individuals taking the calls are trained and will know how to get assistance to you the fastest way.

The local 911 phone system is manned by the Wheeler County Sheriff's Department dispatchers. These individuals are to be complimented on the job they are doing for north Wheeler county.

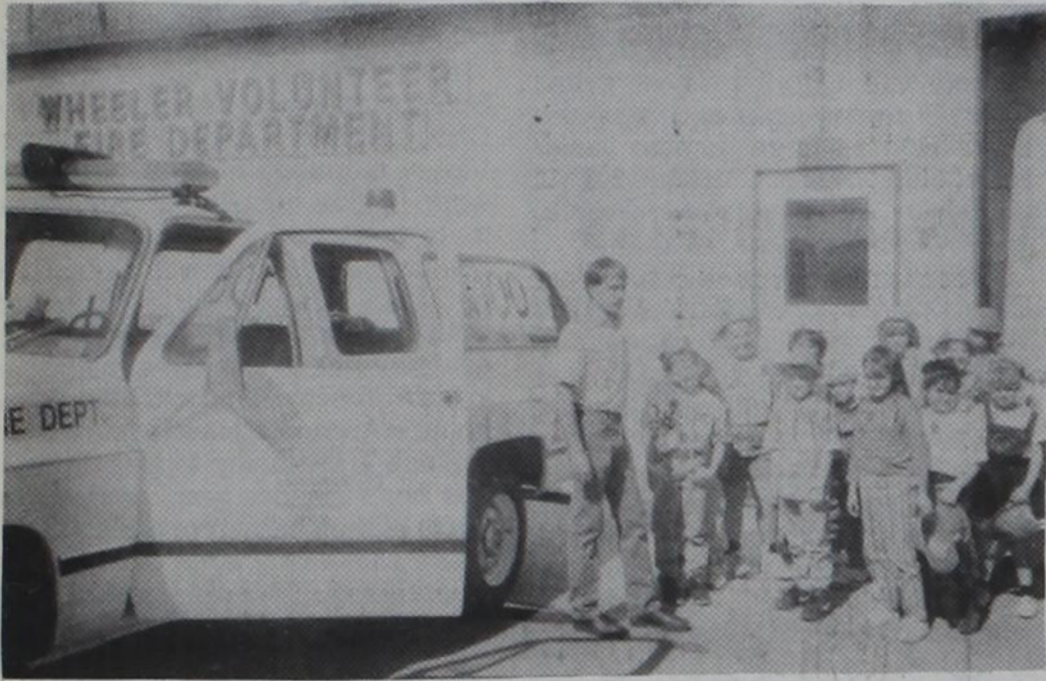
ALLISON NEWS

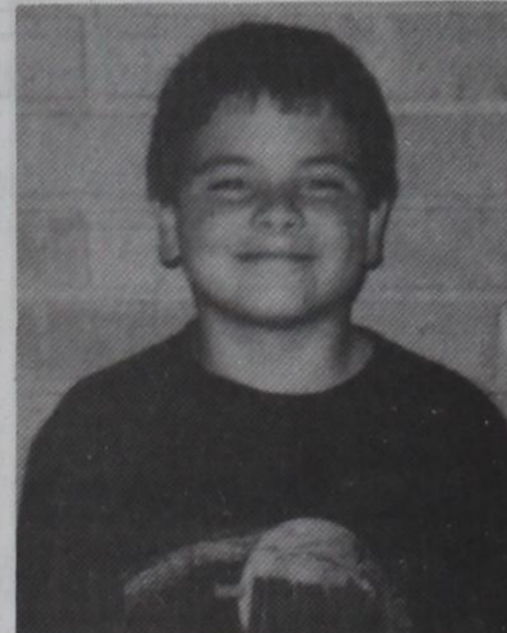

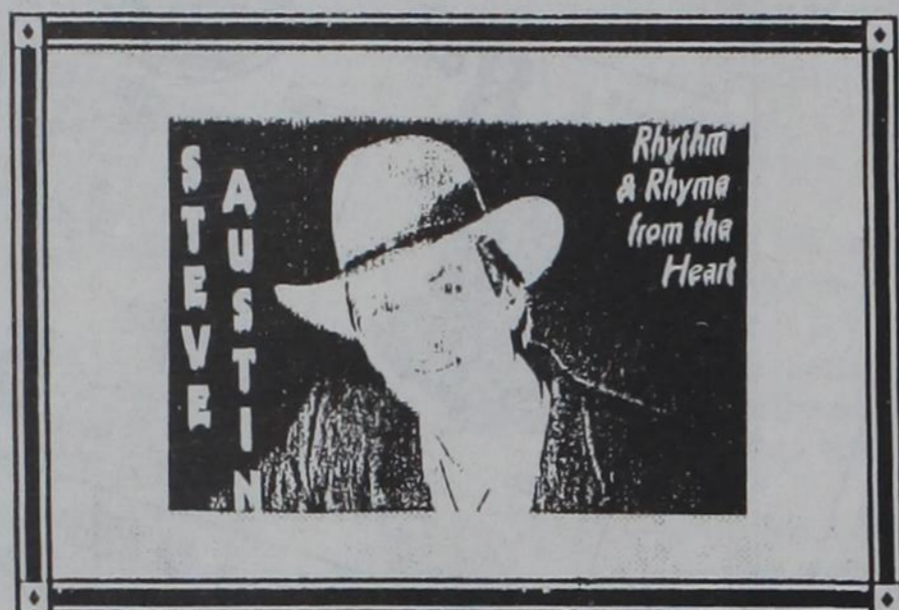

From The Minister's Desk:

When I was a student at Abilene Christian College in the 1960's, I was privileged to meet several outstanding preachers. One of these preachers was Mashall Keeble, a black preacher who preached for churches of Christ in Tennessee.
 Mr. Keeble was an excellent Bible student who participated in numerous religious debates during his ministry. In these debates, he often used his keen sense of humor to emphasize or illustrate a Biblical truth. For example, he once had a debate with a preacher who had been a farmer until he had an experience which directed him to become a preacher. When this preacher was asked by Mr. Keeble to describe this experience, he said that he was working on his farm when he saw some clouds in the sky which formed the letters, GPC. He then said that he interpreted these letters to mean that he should "go preach Christ". With one humorous question, Mr. Keeble refuted this preacher's contention. He asked: "Sir, how do you know that GPC did not mean, go plant corn?"
 With this one question, Mr. Keeble clearly showed the foolishness of a faith that allows an emotional experience to be its authority. The apostle Peter also recognized the foolishness of such a faith because he wrote: "— We did not follow cleverly devised tales when we made known to you the power and coming of our Lord Jesus Christ, but we were eyewitnesses of His majesty. For when He received honor and glory from the Father, such an utterance as this was made to Him by the majestic Glory, This is My beloved Son with whom I am well-pleased, and we ourselves heard this utterance made from heaven when we were with Him on the holy mountain." (II Peter 1: 16-18)
 In this text, the apostle Peter apparently referred to an emotional experience that occurred during the ministry of Jesus. This emotional experience is vividly described in the seventeenth chapter of Matthew which says: "— Jesus took with Him Peter and James and John his brother, and brought them up to a

high mountain by themselves. And He was transfigured before them; and his face shone like the sun and His garments became as white as light. And behold, Moses and Elijah appeared to them, talking with Him. And Peter answered and said to Jesus, Lord it is good for us to be here; if You wish, I will make three tabernacles here, one for You, and one for Moses, and one for Elijah. While he was still speaking, behold, a bright cloud overshadowed them, and behold, a voice out of the cloud, saying, This is My beloved Son, with whom I am well-pleased; listen to Him." (Matthew 17: 1-5)

Peter had an in credible emotional experience. He had seen the transfiguration of Jesus. He had seen Moses and Elijah. He had heard the voice of God. But Peter did not allow this emotional experience to be the authority for his faith. Rather he wrote: "And so we have the prophetic word made more sure, to which you do well to pay attention as to a lamp in a dark place, until the day dawns and the morning star arises in your hearts." (II Peter 1:19)
 Notice the first part of verse 19. What did Peter mean when he said: "— We have the prophetic word made more sure —?" The apostle realized that the inspired Scriptures were a more trustworthy authority for his faith than any emotional experience that he could have. Some other people need to come to this same conclusion! Instead of having a faith that is rooted in the Scriptures, these people have a faith that is rooted in the emotional experiences that they have. Then these people either mangle the teachings of the Scriptures to fit their experiences or they completely ignore the teachings of the Scriptures.

Emotional experiences are the natural outgrowth of a genuine faith, but these experiences must never become the authority for faith. When emotional experiences become the authority for faith, it cannot be genuine because it will be
