


SUPERIOR RATING, OUTSTANDING 1-A BAND

There the band will face the same bands from the Canadian festival plus Kress, Claude, and Memphis. The performance will be at 10:48 at Dick Bivens Stadium. If the band receives a "Superior" rating at this contest, they will earn the right to compete at the Area Competition on October 23, in Odessa, TX.





Eunice Virgie Edwards, 94, died Thursday, Oct. 7, 1999.

A megasavant, Peek, was born with damage to his brain that makes it impossible for him to reason; his brain also has no filtering system, so he remembers everything he reads. Kim Peek's message to all people is "Respect differences in others and treat them as you want them to treat you. This will give us the kind of world we want."

Among the six local awards given for outstanding performance by clients and employers was Joe Lackey, formally of Shamrock. Joe received the Texas Panhandle Mental Health Independent Living Achievement award presented by Gaynelle Williams and also received the Outstanding Achievement Award. This award





Add 8 oz. cool whip, folding in gently.


Pour in 2 qt. casserole dish and refrigerate.

Erick Honey Festival To Name Chairman Soon





Mr. Alton Lohberger will be supervising the examination. This is an increase in student interest in the PSAT. The PSAT examination is a precursor to the actural SAT examination, which some colleges use for entrance test scores.

The Allison Volunteer Fire Department paid a visit to Allison ISD, Friday, October 8 to supervise and oversee the fire drill. Volunteer firemen on hand were: Destry Coulter, DeWayne Lane, Richie Kiker, and Clint Huff. Sheryl Lane was also present representing Emergency Medical Services as the "first response" member. Hiram Begert and Nelda Dukes served to judge the fire escape maps that the K-5 students prepared with their parents help. Winners of the escape map contest were: in first grade -Vicki Goldsmith, first place; Adam Seigrist, second place and Matthew Jeremy Kliewer, first place; Alisha Robinson, second place and Ezra Hendrickson, third place; in third grade - Leslie Archer, first place and Kara Lane, second place; in fourth grade Cody DuPont, first place; Mary Hendrickson, second place and Seth West, third place; in fifth grade -Jordan Lane, first place and Allison Bray, second place.

The emergency fire drill began at 2:01/19 seconds and ended 2:02/25 seconds. All Allison ISD students, faculty and staff evacuated the campus building in 66 seconds. After the fire drill students viewed three emergency vehicles brought to the school by the Allison Volunteer Fire Department and several students were allowed the opportunity of spraying water through the fire hose. The Allison ISD administration, staff and faculty would like to thank the firemen for coming to the school to talk to the students about fire safety and for allowing the students to have a "hands-on" education with the equipment during National Fire Prevention week.

Students were also shown a fireman in his fire coat and helmet while using a breathing tank. Students were then told that "if your house is on fire and you see someone coming through your house that looks like this, don't hide from them but go straight to them for help." Two community members represent Emergency Medical Services in Allison. Sheryl Lane and Wanda Lane both serve as "first response" emergency personnel. After the fire drill and demonstrations were complete the firemen treated each student and faculty member with homemade chocolate chip cookies, which were provided by Wanda Lane. Science teacher Misty Tucker and Dr. Andrew Seigrist took the Meteoology/Geology and Oceanography class to Palo Duro canyon to extend the classroom and the learning environment. Students in attendance were: Kendra Lane, Ky Brownlee, Kyle Bush, Terry Keys and Levi Swafford. Students studied the soil and the various layers, paying particular attention to the depth and color. Mrs. Tucker queried students as to why soil layers were different colors and they were also asked to formulate opinions as to the age of the canyon and its structures. Students not only studied the soil strata and rocks but also the canyon vegetation and wildlife. Students were asked to identify specific vegetation and to also name the two aviary raptors that are most predominant in the canyon. Students were allowed extensive opportunity to hike through the canyon and to climb some of its taller structures. As the students were walking back to the van to leave the canyon. Ms. Tucker pointed out several different stands of prickly-pear cactus and the bright crimson red seedpods. She explained to the students that some people eat the seedpods or even make jelly from them. Levi Swafford was the first student to pick one of the seedpods and sample the canyon cuisine. Mrs. Tucker warned the stu-

dents to be careful of the thorns and stickers. Well, Levi announced to evervone that it wasn't bad and so some of the other boys went to picking cactus seedpods to see for themselves how good it was. As we approached the van, the boys began to notice all of the tiny, nearly invisible thorns that they had acquired from their dining experience. It was a big laugh all the way around.

One interesting and unforeseen event was the opportunity to see Canyon Emergency Services respond to rescue a little boy who climbed a steep rock formation and then couldn't come down. Emergency personnel responded to the scene and using rappelling equipment safely rescued the young boy.

Fire Prevention Week



record keeping system from Quicken to QuickBooks should definitely plan to attend."

The seminar will run from 8 a.m. to noon, at the Texas A&M Research and Extension Center north of Lubbock. The center is located 1/2-mile east of Interstate Hwy. 27 on FM 1294.

Instructor Mark Moore, Kansas State University Extension economist, will cover the whys and hows of record keeping, and demonstrate the capabilities of Quicken and QuickBooks in a side-by-side software comparison. He also will explain how to set up books in QuickBooks -- covering topics such as payroll, capital purchases, using classes and categories, and generating reports.

"Moore has many years of handons experience working with producers and computer record keeping software. He regularly consults with 115 northwest Kansas farmers on record keeping, financial planning and analysis, and tax planning," Smith said. "He will use real-world examples of ag financial information to explain QuickBooks and compare this program to Quicken software." Seminar registration costs \$10 per person if mailed in by Nov. 1, and \$20 at the door. Registration forms are available at county Extension offices, Smith said. Texans who want more information on this seminar can contact Smith at (806) 746-6101 or their local county Extension office. 
