Shamrock Man On Trial In Manslaughter Case

The Intoxicated manslaughter trial of Richard Joseph Johnson, 37, of Shamrock began Tuesday at the Wheeler County Courthouse.

Johnson was the driver of a pickup which overturned east of Shamrock. The pickup rolled, pinning Frankie Mae Angton, 38, underneath.

Sun Healthcare Group, Inc. (SHGE:OTC-BB), the parent company of SunBridge Care and Rehabilitation in Wheeler, today filed for protection under chapter 11 of the U.S. Bankruptcy Code. The filing will allow Sun to restructure its financial obligations, while continuing to provide quality care to the residents in its nursing homes.

"Our focus continues to be on providing excellent care to our 74 residents. There will be no interruption in our services or programs," said Gennell York, Administrator at SunBridge Care & Rehabilitation for

Because of additional financing Sun Healthcare Group expects the bankruptcy court to approve shortly, SunBridge Care & Rehabilitation for Wheeler will continue to carry out normal business operations during the bankruptcy proceeding. The facility is not planning any changes in staffing, services or clinical programs as a result of the filing. SunBridge Care & Rehabilitation for Wheeler, with 76 employees, has served the local community for 4 years.

Deep cuts in the federal government's Medicare reimbursement program in addition to underfunded Medicaid programs at the state level, have meant significantly reduced revenues for long-term care providers such as Sun Healthcare Group. Sun Healthcare Group, Inc. Files Chapter 11

Sun Healthcare Group, Inc. (SHGE: OTC-BB) announced today that Sun and its U.S. operating subsidiaries have filed voluntary petitions with the U.S.Bankruptcy Court for the District of Delaware to reorganize under chapter 11 of the U.S. Bankruptcy Code in order to restructure the company's debt obligations. The company elected to seek court protection in order to facilitate its efforts to restructure its capital and lease obligations.

To ensure that the company has the short-term working capital necessary to operate its business, it has obtained a commitment for up to \$200 million in debtor-in-possession ("DIP") financing with a group led by the CIT Group Business/Credit, Inc. and Heller Healthcare Finance, Inc. Sun has requested the Court's permission to access the DIP financing to fund normal business operations and other cash needs during the bankruptcy proceeding.

"Deep cuts in Medicare reimbursement exceeded all industry expectations, and severely impacted the company's ability to service its current capital structure. This situation, coupled with a significant decline in the market demand for ancillary services, resulted in the need for us to lower our operating costs and significantly reduce our indebtedness," said Andrew L. Turner, Sun's chairman and chief executive officer.

Mark Wimer, president, added, "Most important, court protection under chapter 11 ensures that we can continue to serve our patients and our customers' patients while we reorganize."

Because of significant debt repayment obligations, the company has been in negotiations with its banks and senior bond holders in anticipation of the need to restructure its obligations. The company believes that it is close to reaching an agreement with the banks and bond holders on the key terms for a financial restructuring. The Court protection afforded by chapter 11 will enable the company to develop a plan of reorganization with the goal of emerging from bankruptcy in a stronger financial position. The company is also in discussions with some of the owners of the nursing homes it operated in an effort to renegotiate certain leases.






