MUSTANGS EARN FOURTH STRAIGHT WIN

When it rains it pours, or in Groom's case when the sprinklers come on it might be time to pack up and go home. The Wheeler Mustangs defeated the Groom Tigers last Friday night for

their fourth straight district win 35-0. This win guaranteed the Mustangs the #1 playoff seed from District 1-1A, even though the Mustangs take on the Kiowas of Booker at Booker this Fri-

day night.

The Mustangs fumbled the opening kickoff, but through the keen eyes of one of the officials were given possession of the football (a poor call, but we'll take it). The Mustangs again came out with split backs and ran the ball up the middle, hammering the Tigers every step of the way, but were unable to produce any points even with the fine catch over the middle by Phillip

Wiggins. Then Groom seemed to take hold. The Tiger offensive line and backs began driving the ball down the field on the Mustangs. The Tigers put together a 29 yard drive but had to punt to the Mustangs. So ended the first quarter in a 0-0 tie. In the second quarter, the Mustangs received good runs by Ledbetter and Francis, but two lay passes caught by Justin Hefley resulted in the Mustang's score of the

night. The 23 yard T.D. catch was tipped by Justin but he was able to

come up with the catch for the 23 yard reception. Corey Case added the extra point and within the next six and one half minutes the Mustangs added 2 more touchdowns. The first was on a tremendous 38 yard run by Francis and a 8 yard run by Ledbetter. Both extra points were kicked by Case. The Mustangs received superb up front blocking by the offensive line as well as downfield blocking help by Travis Stevens, Keith Rose, and Justin Hefley. Again, as been stressed before, there touchdowns, as well as the win was a team effort. "We had good blocking and and backs running hard," stated Coach Verden. When it all boils down, it's really a pretty simple game.

Extension Update

An understanding of the following terms which often appear on labels of various birds may help make your choice of a turkey easier. Before use, all labels must be approved by USDA's Food Safety and Inspection Service (FSIS).

As you can see, some of these terms describe methods of slaughter the addition of a solution to the bird or the internal temperature of the bird. They aren't indicators of quality of nutritional value, which is about the same for all turkeys.

Here is a list to help you understand some of the terms found on turkey labels:

KOSHER—may be used only on the labels of meat and poultry products

slaughtered and processed under rabbinical supervision.

NATURAL—may be used on label if products contain no artificial ingredients or added color and are only minimally processed. Examples of minimal processing are cutting, grinding, canning, drying and freezing. The label itself must explain the use of the term "natural" (such as: "no added colorings or artificial ingredients" and "minimally processed").

FREE RANGE—means the birds are permitted free access to an outdoor yard or other outdoor facilities. The company must submit written documentation substantiating the claim. USDA will use this documentation to decide at the time of label approval, if the term "free range" may be used.

FRESH—never stored at or below 0 degrees Fahrenheit. Raw products never frozen can be labeled "fresh" even though they may feel slightly crusty when you touch the surface.

FROZEN—temperature of poultry is 0 degrees or below.

BASTED OR SELF BASTED—solution may be a butter or other edible fat, broth, stock or water plus spices, flavor enhancers and other approved substances. It is injected into the breast and legs of ready-to-cook poultry. Added weight of approximately 3 percent solution is included in the net weight on the label.

The product must be labeled with a descriptive name and ingredients in the solution (such as "Injected with approximately 3 percent of a solution of...").

What's not on the label of turkeys is "Organic". To date, the Food Safety Inspection Service has not allowed the use of the term "organic" on meat and poultry product labels because of the lack of consensus on what the term means as applied to animal products. For example, production standards are needed to ensure that medications, which are used on non-organically raised livestock, are not

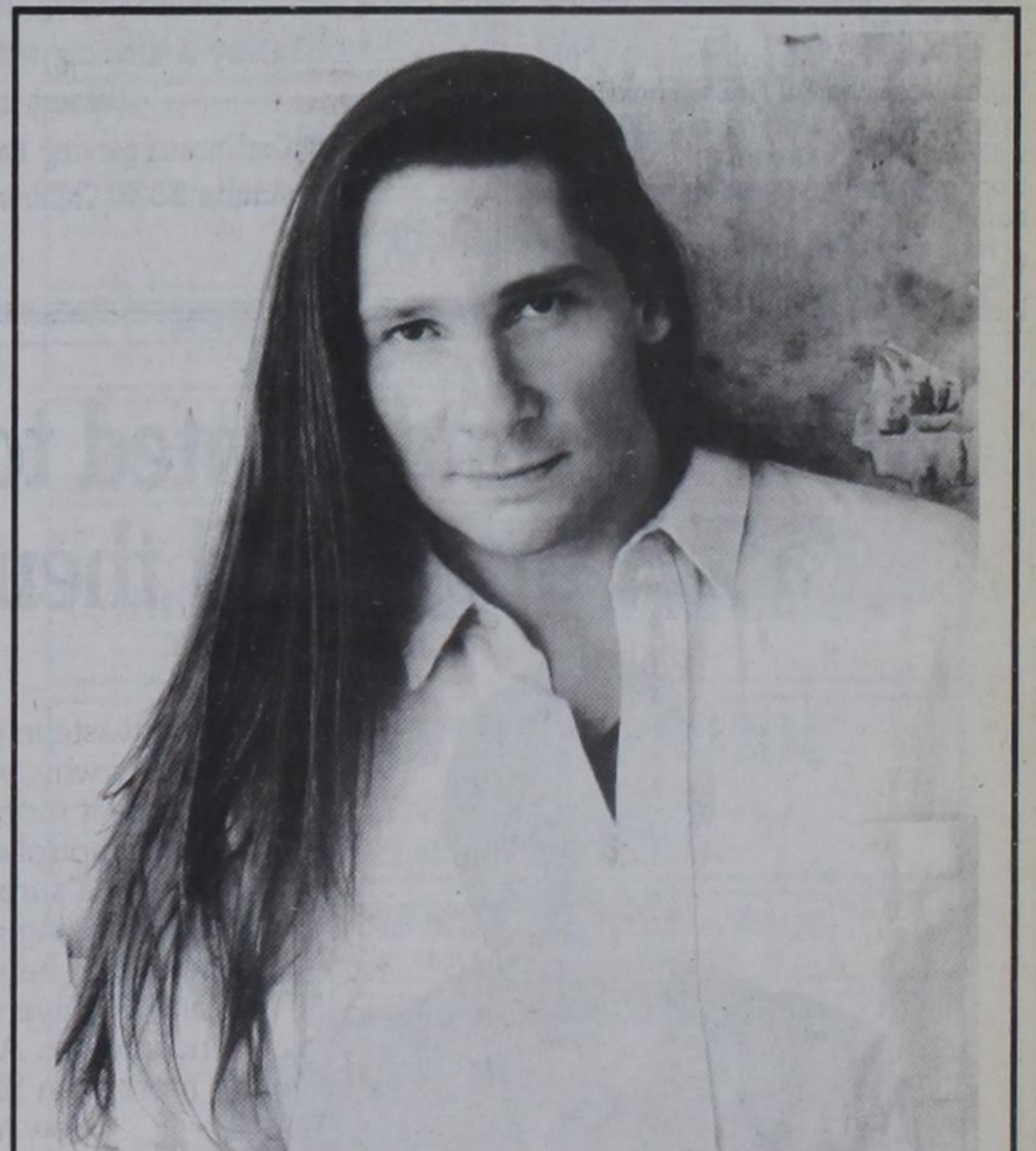

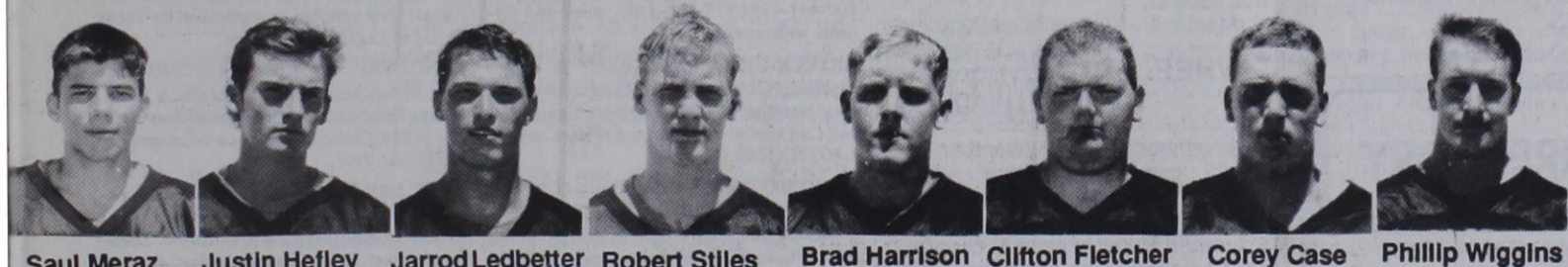

Emergency Farm Loan Applications Being Accepted

Applications for emergency farm loans due to damages and losses caused by a lack of moisture and other weather-related problems, which occurred during the 1994 crop small grain growing season are being accepted at the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) office located at 1224 N. Hobart, Suite 102, FmHA County Supervisor, Johnny Earp, said today. Wheeler and Hemphill Counties are two of the contiguous counties recently named by Secretary of Agriculture, Mike Espy, as eligible for loans to cover physical and production losses caused by a lack of moisture and other weather-related problems, which occurred during the 1994 crop small grain growing season.

Mr. Earp said farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 80 percent of their actual losses, or the operating loan needed to continue in business or \$500,000, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest rate is 4.5 percent.

"As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30 percent loss of production to be eligible for an FmHA emergency loan," Earp said. Farmers participating in the PIK or

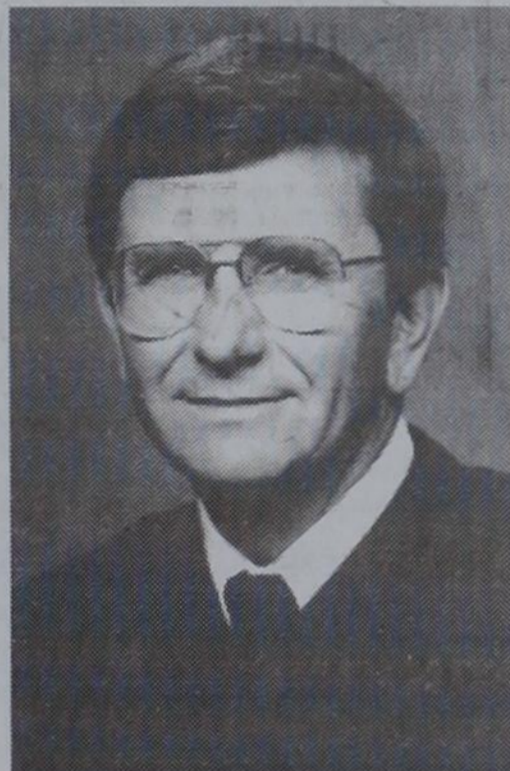

Farmers Home Adminis. Loans to Disadvantaged

The Farmers Home Administration has loan funds to help members of socially disadvantaged groups, including minorities, buy land for farming or operate farms in WHEELER, HEMPHILL, GRAY, and ROBERTS Counties, Mr. Earp, County Supervisor, said today.

Under this program enacted by Congress, socially disadvantaged populations groups are Hispanics, Native Americans, African Americans, Asians, and Pacific Islanders.

FmHA tries to find members of those groups who are interested in farming and can qualify for an FmHA farm ownership loan. The agency can sell or lease to those who are eligible a farm held in its inventory or make a loan for purchase of land on the open market, Mr. Earp said.

FmHA can also provide other loan assistance, including operating loans, and advice, if needed, to help the borrower get started.

People who think they may be eligible, whether they already are in farming or would like to become

farmers, are urged to contact the Farmers Home Administration county office in their area. WHEELER, HEMPHILL, GRAY AND ROBERTS Counties are serviced in the Gray County FmHA office located at 1224 N. Hobart, in the NBC Plaza, Suite 102, Pampa, TX. The office hours are 8:00 A.M. to noon and 1:00 P.M. till 5:00 P.M. Monday thru Friday.

From The Minister's Desk:

A Passion for Victory is the title of a book about Joe Kerbel, one of the Panhandle's legendary football coaches. The author of this book is Jack "Sleepy" Harris who served for almost twenty years as one Coach Kerbel's assistant coaches.

In his book, Mr. Harris describes Coach Kerbel as a football genius whose obsession was to win football games. He emphasizes that Coach Kerbel was for twenty years a highly successful high school coach, compiling an impressive won/lost records at Cleveland High School in Cleveland, Oklahoma, at Breckenridge High School in Breckenridge, Texas, at Amarillo High School in Amarillo, Texas and at West Texas State University in Canyon, Texas.

Besides describing Coach Kerbel as a football genius, Mr. Harris also describes him as a demanding perfectionist. He said: "For Joe Kerbel, every opponent should be held scoreless, every season should be all-winning. In his perfect world, there would have been nothing but victories, injury-free practices, total dedication on the part of every player, and an endless and unbridled enthusiasm on the part of fans and school officials for what he was attempting to accomplish."

From this description it is obvious that Coach Kerbel did not recognize one the fundamental characteristics of this world. He did not recognize that it is an imperfect world that is filled with imperfect people. There are also some disciples of Jesus who make this mistake.

These disciples strive to be perfect in every aspect of their lives, but they continually fail to meet this self-imposed standard of perfection. For this reason, these disciples are usually angry and bitter people. They are also extremely critical of the imperfection that characterize the lives of other people.

With this demand of perfection upon themselves and upon other people, these disciples fail to recognize an important New Testament truth. The Apostle Paul emphasized this truth in the third chapter of Romans when he quoted from the Old Testament, saying "There is none righteous, not even one—". (Romans 3:10) Since "—there is none righteous—" it should be obvious that disciples of Jesus are not expected to be perfect. Rather they are expected to develop a Christ-like character. The New Testament teaches that they are "—to grow up in all aspects into Him, who is the head, even Christ." (Ephesians 3:15)

As disciples of Jesus "—grow up—" into the likeness of Jesus, they will often sin, but they will humbly repent, asking for the forgiveness that God has promised to give them. (1 John 1:8-10) But when disciples of Jesus demand perfection from themselves and other people, they make the same mistakes that Coach Kerbel made. They do not recognize that it is an imperfect world that is filled with imperfect people.
