## MUSTANGS WIN BI-DISTRICT TITLE

### WHEELER WINS OVER CLAUDE 34-7

The Wheeler Mustangs had a tough time getting started last Friday night in their bi-district showdown with Claude at Bronco Stadium. It appeared that the Mustangs were a little too tight and tentative, but were able to pull together and soundly defeat Claude 34-7.

After a scoreless first quarter, the Mustangs put together 247 yards of rushing and 86 yards of passing for a total of 33 yards of offense, only allowing Claude 7 first downs and 121 yards of total offense. Time and time again Wheeler was able to come back from adversity. (2 lost fumbles and one interception) to drive the ball down the field for scores.

Andy Francis scored Wheeler's first two touchdowns in the second quarter. The first extra point failed, but on the 2-point conversion try on the second T.D. was a perfect pass from Dusty

Case to Justin Hefley to put the Mustangs up 14-0 for the half. Even though struggling at times the Mustang offense still looked explosive with runs by Case, Ledbetter and Francis. The Stang offensive line was finally able to control the all important line of scrimmage and allowed good holes for the backs to run through. It was especially difficult to block Claude's 5-3 defense with our 5 linemen since Wheeler was in a split formation, but Case, Fletcher, Stiles, Flanagan and Harrison did a super job.

The second half began strongly as the "Black Death" defense held strong, as it had all night with super defensive plays by Hefley, Stiles, Francis and C. Case. On the Mustangs first possession, Dusty Case threw a perfect 40 yard pass to Jarrod Ledbetter to break the back of Claude and to take a 21-0 lead with the extra point provided by "shotgun" Corey Case.

Through the night the Mustangs

kept stalled drives alive by fake punts, one by Ledbetter and one by Jeremy Davis up the middle, not only did these stalling tactics work, but both had estimable uplifts for the Mustangs.

In the fourth quarter the Mustangs received excellent field position thanks to Ty Ferguson recovering a fumble at the Claude 21. Andy Francis just needed two carries to cover the 21 yards and the Mustangs took a 28-0 lead late in the fourth quarter.

The Wheeler J.V. team, then took over and only had one miscue that gave Claude their only score of the night, but were also able to mount a drive of their own, thanks to Jorge Salas recovering a poor Claude pitch at the Claude 16, setting up another T.D. by Jason Bradley. It should be noted that the J.V. or Wheeler Reserves as the Globe News referred to them, have played super all year for the Mustangs big defensive effort was received by Jeremy

Davis, Ramon Meraz, Shea Weatherly, Josh Lee, Layne McCasland and Andy "the Bad Boy" Bradstreet. Also, Dustin Weatherly should be especially commended for coming in at reserve line backers. Dustin continues to be one of the top tacklers for the Stangs and had a big hit on Claude's Q.B. late in the game. Defensive stats for the Mustangs are as follows:

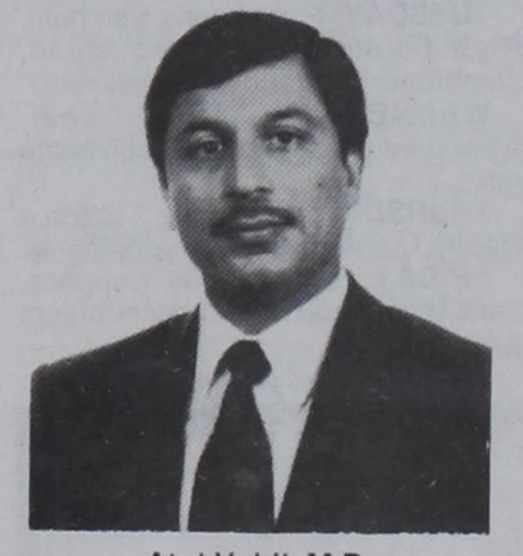

## Texas Highway Patrol Gives Winter Advisory

Trooper L.B. Snider, Public Information Officer for the Texas Department of Public Safety said, "Winter driving is more hazardous than most people realize. There are more hours of darkness, often less visibility, and sometimes freezing temperatures with ice, sleet or snow. These are real challenges for drivers and test a person's ability to drive."

"Safe winter driving, when it's all said and done, is largely the application of common sense to some basic driving facts," Snider added. "Drivers must be able to see all around their vehicle to drive safely. Make sure all ice and snow is removed from all windows. Don't be a 'peep hole' driver. Keep windows from fogging by using the defroster. If necessary, stop and knock ice or snow off wiper blades to keep the windshield clear."

Too much speed on slippery roads is the mistake that breeds the most trouble. Adjust your driving habits to match the weather and road conditions. Trips on icy roads are going to take longer. Face the facts, don't be in a hurry. If the road is covered with ice or snow, start your vehicle moving slowly and gently. When stopping, apply your brakes lightly and much earlier than usual. Make your turns slowly and smoothly.

Most loss of control comes in the form of skids. Skids don't just happen, they are caused by the driver in most cases. To recover from a skid, back off the accelerator, stay off the brakes and steer your vehicle in the direction you want to go.

Is it obvious that winter driving can pose problems for even the most experienced drivers.

## Caution in Driving Over Holiday Advised by DPS

Thanksgiving is the most heavily travelled holiday of all. This has law enforcement officials pondering what can be done to raise traffic safety awareness during this critical driving period.

Trooper L.B. Snider, Public Information Officer for the Texas Department of Public Safety stated, "We know that the potential for injury and loss of life is greater during holiday periods, especially a high-volume holiday like Thanksgiving. We are asking motorists to drive defensively.

Many motorists have heard the term "defensive driving"; however, it seems few know what it involves. "Much of the art of defensive driving comes from common sense and your own instinct. Training and knowledge of the proper procedure make these senses more effective," Snider explained.

Defensive driving can and should become a way of life for all drivers regardless of age or experience. Don't assume the other driver will make the right decision. Be prepared for anything. Defensive drivers are in tune with their minds and bodies, as well as the road. They're ready for any situation the road might hand them.

But some drivers are out of tune. They give in to distractions, daydreams, fatigue, anger, stress, frustration or perhaps alcohol. They are not prepared to react when a dangerous situation arises.

Defensive drivers also make fewer mistakes. Drivers on the average make one error for every two miles they travel. While not every mistake leads to an accident, about 85% of all collisions are the result of driver error. "The most common mistake is probably speeding. Most people don't match an appropriate speed with driving conditions," Snider added.

Once again, State Troopers will be highly visible during the Thanksgiving holiday trying to make the roads as safe as possible. Let's all do our part to make this a safe and happy holiday.

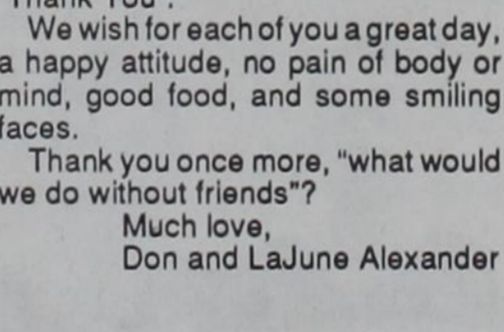

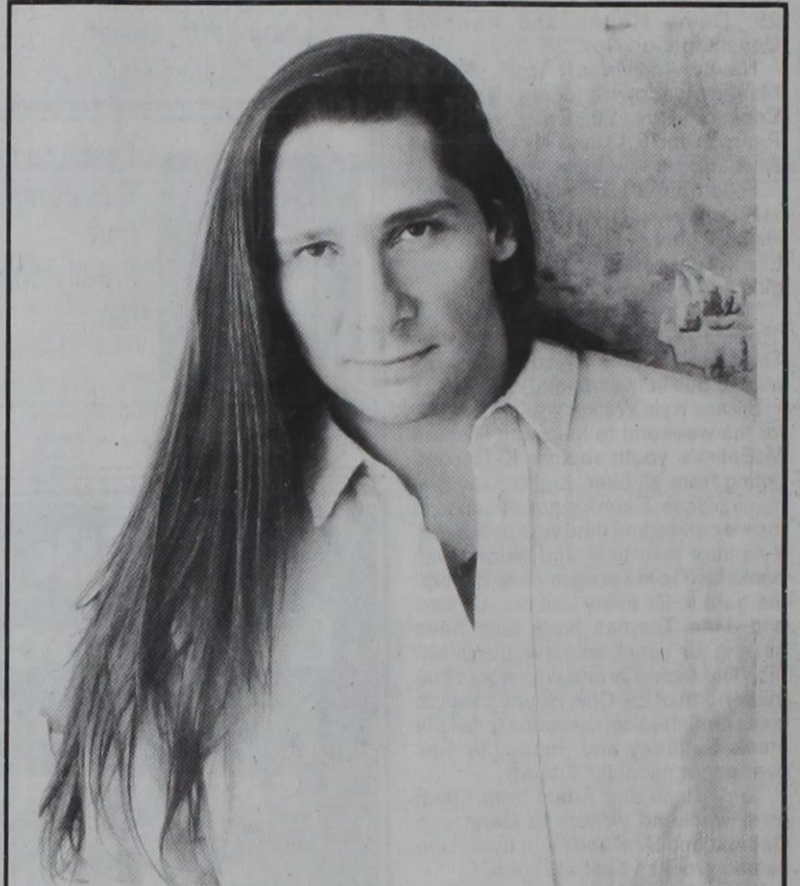

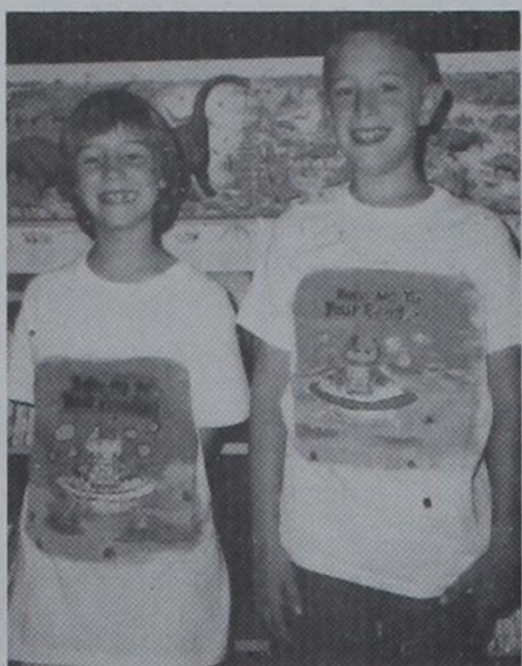

## Wheeler School Board Holds Monthly Meeting

A regular meeting of the Wheeler Independent School District Board of Trustees met at 6:30 P.M. with Chris Osborne, Vice President, presiding. All members were present except Mr. Ledbetter and Dr. Smith. Guests were Charles Kuntz, CPA, Doug Rives, Jim Bassett, Becky Hardcastle, Donna Waiser, Supt. Glyndol Holland, Scout Master Ben Ed Hillhouse and Boy Scouts Drew Hillhouse, Ben Britt, Ben Dollar, Jed Brooks, and Alan Gill.

(1.) Motion by Mr. Ford, seconded by Mrs. Fletcher to approve the minutes of the previous meeting. Motion carried unanimously.

(2.) Motion by Mr. Kuehler, seconded by Mr. Dunnam to accept the 1993 Tax Collection Statement presented. Motion carried unanimously.

(3.) Motion by Mr. Ford, seconded by Mrs. Fletcher to annex to WISD the following property due to nonpayment of taxes: a tract 100 feet by 150 feet out of the SW corner of Block F-1, Prairie Lawn Addition to the Town of Wheeler, described as follows: Beginning at the Southwest corner of said Block F-1; thence north 100 feet; thence east 150 feet; thence south 100 feet; thence west 150 feet to the place of beginning. The above has an estimated value of \$5,000.00. Motion carried unanimously.

(4.) Motion by Mr. Kuehler, seconded by Mr. Dunnam to approve the list of fixed assets for deletion (see attached). Motion carried unanimously.

(5.) Motion by Mrs. Fletcher, seconded by Mr. Ford to lower the insurance reserved balance to \$90,000.00. Motion carried unanimously.

The Superintendent may modify the term of expulsion for a student or assess another comparable penalty that results in the student's exclusion from the regular school program, on a case-by-case basis. 20 U.S.C. 3351. Motion carried unanimously.

onded by Mrs. Fletcher to clarify a motion made at the Aug. 11, 1994, meeting to buy a second school bus at the previously bid price from Bridges-Hemphill. Motion carried unanimously.

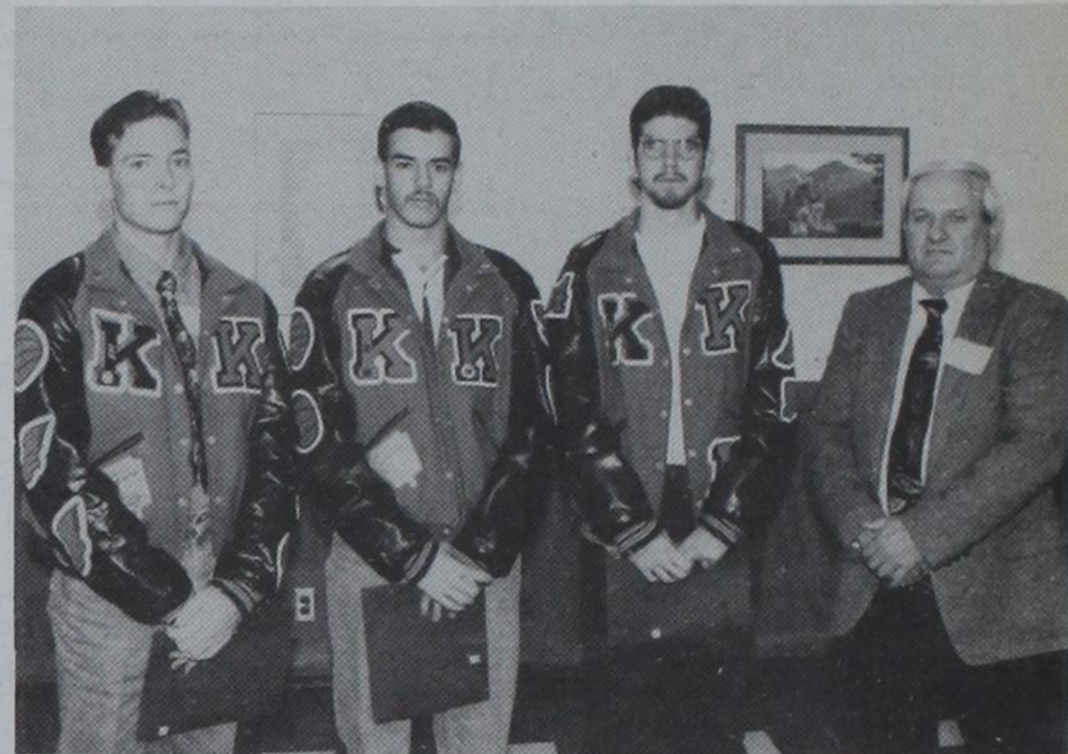
(11.) Motion by Mrs. Fletcher, seconded by Mr. Kuehler to approve the budget amendments as presented (see attached).

### From The Minister's Desk:

In the first chapters of his letter to the church at Rome, the Apostle Paul emphasized that righteousness was needed by Jews and Gentiles. He first described the Gentiles' need for righteousness by saying: "For the wrath of God is revealed from heaven against all ungodliness and unrighteousness of men, who suppress the truth in unrighteousness, because that which is known about is evident within them; for God made it evident to them. For since the creation of the world His invisible attributes, His eternal power and divine nature, have been clearly seen, being understood through what has been made, so that they are without excuse." (Romans 1:18-20)

Notice that the Apostle Paul said that the Gentiles were "—without excuse—". I think that the same phrase could also be used to describe Susan Smith.

Mrs. Smith is the mother who recently reported that her two small children had been taken when her car was carjacked. But after a nine day search, she finally confessed that she had driven her car into a lake with her children strapped into their car seats. Both of the children drown. In my opinion, Susan Smith is "—without excuse—". I totally agree with an editorial that was in last Thursday's issue of the *Amarillo Globe News*. This editorial, which was entitled, "Victim Argument In Trouble," was written by Mona Charen, a syndicated journalist from California. And it said:—

"According to reports from Union S.C., investigators became suspicious about Susan Smith's story when elements of her tale failed to hold together. She said, for example, that she had been shopping at K mart before the "carjacking" incident, yet no one at K mart could recall seeing her there."

"The investigators hardly need to trek to K mart to know that something was off in Smith's claim. Just based upon a knowledge of normal human behavior, they should have been skeptical, and perhaps they were. What kind of parent would abandon her children in such circumstances? Even threats from an armed gunman would fail to budge most people. There are things more valuable than life itself. For most of us, the lives of our children are first on the list."

"Moreover, stranger abduction is actually quite rare. Despite the impression given by those pictures of children on milk cartons, only a tiny percentage of the kids who are reported missing each year are actu-

ally kidnapped by strangers. Most are either snatched by parents in custody disputes or are runaways."

"Yet, even those, like me, who doubted the stranger-abduction story from the first were dumbfounded by the horrifying truth. It is almost impossible to believe that a woman could drive her car into a lake with her two little babies asleep in their car seats. Yet this is hardly the first case in recent memory. In 1989, Charles Stewart shot his pregnant wife and then blamed it on a mythical black man."

"Susan Smith, like Stewart, seems to be what psychiatrists call a sociopath, a person who looks and sounds perfectly normal but who is missing a key component of the human character, a conscience. She demonstrated one of the distinguishing features of sociopaths for all to see on television—an ability to lie convincingly and to ape the normal emotions of other people. It was an impressive performance—the desperate mother asking her two boys to "be strong" and telling them that "they are the most loved little children on this Earth."

"The press seems more outraged that Smith concocted a tale of a black carjacker than that she mercifully drowned her own children. Both Tom Brokaw and Peter Jennings led their broadcasts, on the evening of her confession, with the fact that Smith had originally blamed a black man for the "kidnapping."

"Well, perhaps some good will come of this agonizing story after all. Perhaps Smith's despicable con game—sobbing before the world on behalf of her missing children—and her contemptible invention of a black carjacker will dampen the credulity of future jurors about her status as a victim."

"Because that is coming. The first straws are already in the wind. The *Washington Post* has reported that Susan Smith was the daughter of a suicide and was rumored to have suffered abuse as a teen-ager. We are bound to hear more of this. It has worked so well for so long. But perhaps this is the beginning of the end for victimology."

"The Eric and Lyle Menendez hung juries were more than most Americans could stomach. But this crime is even more grotesque. Many people are probably already coming to conclusion that whatever Susan Smith's past suffering may have been, it is no excuse."

## Emergency Farm Loan Applications Being Taken

Applications for emergency farm loans due to damages and losses caused by hail, high winds, and excessive rain, which occurred on August 17 and 18, 1994, are being accepted at the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) office located at 1224 N. Hobart, Ste. 102, FmHA County Supervisor, Johnny Earp, said today.

Wheeler County is a contiguous county recently named by Secretary of Agriculture, Mike Espy, as eligible for loans due to damage and loss caused by hail, high winds, and excessive rain, which occurred on August 17 and 18, 1994.

Mr. Earp said farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 80% of their actual losses, or the operating loan needed to continue in business or \$500,000, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest rate is 4.5 percent.

"As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least 30% loss of production to be eligible for an FmHA emergency loan," Earp said. Farmers participating in the PIK or Federal Crop Insurance programs will have to figure in proceeds from those programs in determining their loss.

"Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until 6/12/95, but farmers should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing and possibly over into the new farming season," Mr. Earp said.

FmHA is a credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. It is authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recognized farmers who work at and rely on farming for a substantial part of their living. Eligibility is extended to individual farmers who are U.S. citizens and to farming partnerships, corporations or cooperatives in which U.S. citizens hold a majority interest.

The FmHA office is located at 1224 N. Hobart, Ste. 102, Pampa, TX. Our hours are 8:00 a.m. to 12:00 noon and 1:00 p.m. to 5:00 p.m. Monday through Friday.

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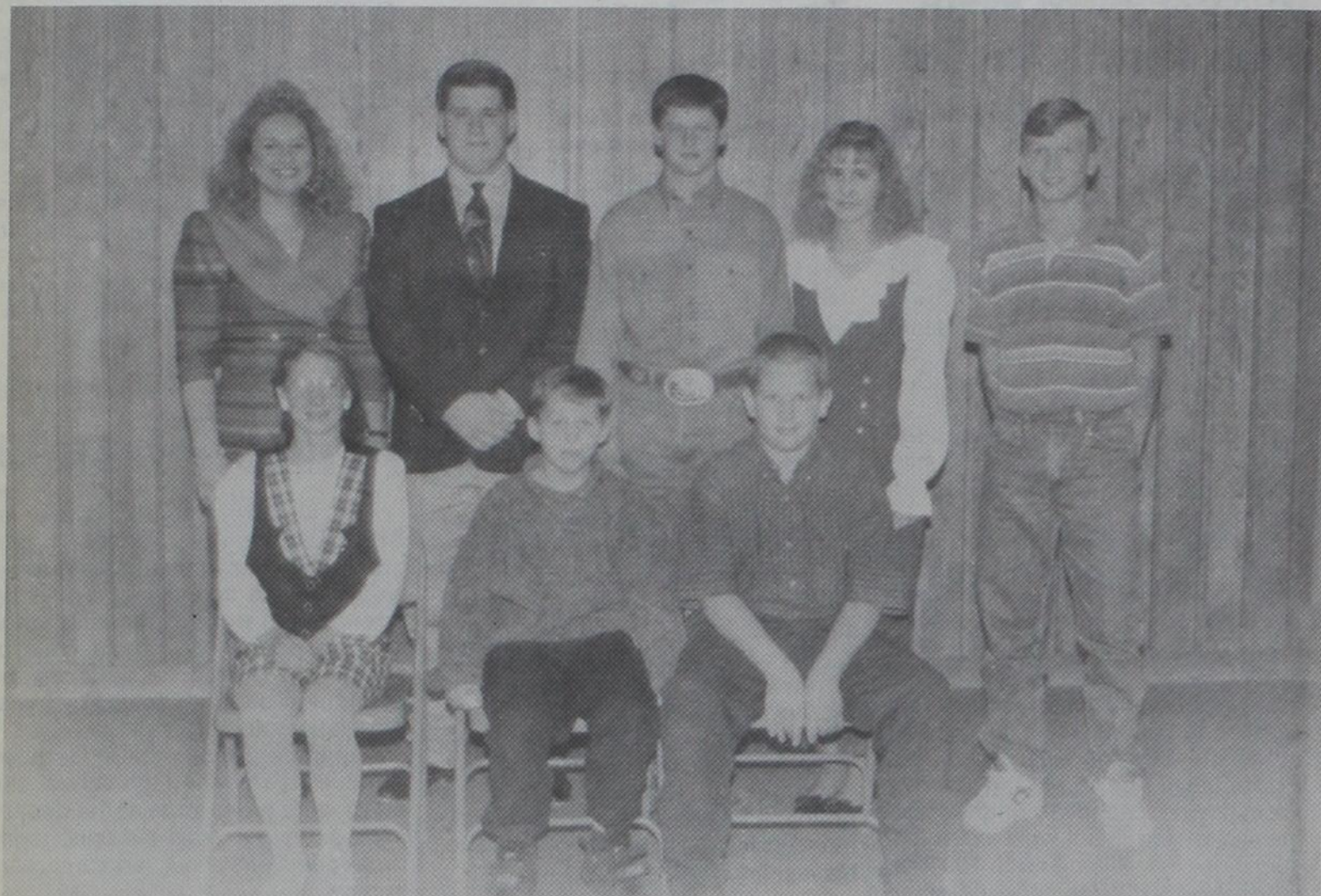
