Cattlemen in Wheeler County are invited to attend a Beef Cattle Nutrition meeting sponsored by the Wheeler County Agriculture Committee, Texas Agricultural Extension Service and the Wheeler County Soil & Water Conservation District. The Federal Land Bank of Childress will provide a free

dinner for those attending The meeting is scheduled for Monday, November 28 at 4:00 P.M. at the Church of Christ in Wheeler. Those planning to attend are asked to contact the County Extension office at 826-5243 by noon Wednesday, November 23 so a meal count can be

obtained. At 4:00 P.M. the group will go to a nearby range or pasture site where J.F. Cadenhead, Extension Range & Brush Control Specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service will demonstrate a method to determine the amount of forage available. He will show how to use that information to calculate the carrying capacity of a

given site. Cadenhead will also discuss the control of weeds and brush in ranges and pastures.

Following dinner, Dr. Matt Cravey will discuss the nutrient requirement of wintering cows and present supplemental feeding recommendations for meeting these requirements based on forage being fed. He will also show the importance of maintaining good cow condition in getting cows to rebreed in the spring.



#### **Texas Highway Patrol Gives Winter Advisory**

Trooper L.B. Snider, Public Information Officer for the Texas Department of Public Safety said, "Winter driving is more hazardous than most people realize. There are more hours of darkness, often less visibility, and sometimes freezing temperatures with ice, sleet or snow. These are real challenges for drivers and test a person's ability to drive."

"Safe winter driving, when it's all said and done, is largely the application of common sense to some basic driving facts," Snider added. "Drivers must be able to see all around their vehicle to drive safely. Make sure all ice and snow is removed from all windows. Don't be a "peep hole" driver. Keep windows from fogging by using the defroster. If necessary, stop and knock ice or snow off wiper blades to keep the windshield clear."

Too much speed on slippery roads is the mistake that breeds the most trouble. Adjust your driving habits to match the weather and road conditions. Trips on icy roads are going to take longer. Face the facts, don't be in a hurry. If the road is covered with ice or snow, start your vehicle moving slowly and gently. When stopping, apply your brakes lightly and much earlier than usual. Make your turns slowly and smoothly.

Most loss of control comes in the form of skids. Skids don't just happen, they are caused by the driver in most cases. To recover from a skid, back off the accelerator, stay off the brakes and steer your vehicle in the direction you want to go.

Is it obvious that winter driving can pose problems for even the most experienced drivers.







#### **Caution in Driving Over** Holiday Advised by DPS

Thanksgiving is the most heavily travelled holiday of all. This has law enforcement officials pondering what can be done to raise traffic safety awareness during this critical driving

Trooper L.B. Snider, Public Information Officer for the Texas Department of Public Safety stated, "We know that the potential for injury and loss of life is greater during holiday periods, especially a high-volume holiday like Thanksgiving. We are asking motorists to drive defensively.

Many motorists have heard the term 'defensive driving"; however, it seems few know what it involves. "Much of the art of defensive driving comes from common sense and your own instinct. Training and knowledge of the proper procedure make these senses more effective, "Snider ex-

Defensive driving can and should become a way of life for all drivers regardless of age or experience. Don't assume the other driver will make the right decision. Be prepared for anything. Defensive drivers are in tune with their minds and bodies, as well as the road. They're ready for any situation the road might hand them.

But some drivers are out of tune. They give in to distractions, daydreams, fatigue, anger, stress, frustration or perhaps alcohol. They are not prepared to react when a dangerous situation arises.

Defensive drivers also make fewer mistakes. Drivers on the average make one error for every two miles they travel. While not every mistake leads to an accident, about 85% of all collisions are the result of driver error. "The most common mistake is probably speeding. Most people don't match an appropriate speed with driving conditions," Snider added.

Once again, State Troopers will be highly visible during the Thanksgiving holiday trying to make the roads as safe as possible. Let's all do our part to make this a safe and happy holiday.

## **Emergency Farm Loan Applications Being Taken**

Applications for emergency farm loans due to damages and losses caused by hail, high winds, and excessive rain, which occurred on August 17 and 18, 1994, are being accepted at the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) office located at 1224 N. Hobart, Ste. 102, FmHA County Supervisor, Johnny Earp, said today.

Wheeler County is a contiguous county recently named by Secretary of Agriculture, Mike Espy, as eligible for loans due to damage and loss caused by hail, high winds, and excessive rain, which occurred on August 17 and 18, 1994.

Mr. Earp said farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 80% of their actual losses, or the operating loan needed to continue in business or \$500,000, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest rate is 4.5 percent.

"As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least 30% loss of production to be eligible for an FmHA emergency loan." Earp said. Farmers participating in the PIK or Federal Crop Insurance programs will have to figure in proceeds from those programs in determining their loss.

"Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until 6/12/95, but farmers should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing and possibly over into the new farming season," Mr.

FmHA is a credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. It is authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recognized farmers who work at and rely on farming for a substantial part of their living. Eligibility is extended to individual farmers who are U.S. citizens and to farming partnerships, corporations or cooperatives in which U.S. citizens hold a majority interest.

The FmHA office is located at 1224 N. Hobart, Ste. 102, Pampa, TX. Our hours are 8:00 a.m. to 12:00 noon and 1:00 p.m. to 5:00 p.m. Monday through

From The Minister's Desk:

In the first chapters of his letter to the church at Rome, the Apostle Paul emphasized that righteousness was needed by Jews and Gentiles. He first described the Gentiles' need for righteousness by saying: "For the wrath of God is revealed from heaven against all ungodliness and unrighteousness of men, who suppress the truth in unrighteousness, because that which is known about is evident within them; for God made it evident to them. For since the creation of the world His invisible attributes, His eternal power and divine nature, have been clearly seen, being understood through what has been made, so that they are without excuse." (Romans 1:18-

Notice that the Apostle Paul said that the Gentiles were "-without excuse-." I think that the same phrase could also be used to describe Susan Smith.

Mrs. Smith is the mother who recently reported that her two small children had been taken when her car was carjacked. But after a nine day search, she finally confessed that she had driven her car into a lake with her children strapped into their car seats. Both of the children drown. In my opinion, Susan Smith is "-without excuse-"! I totally agree with an editorial that was in last Thursday's issue of the Amarillo Globe News. This editorial, which was entitled, "Victim Argument In Trouble," was written by Mona Charen, a syndicated journalist from California. And it said:-

"According to reports from Union S.C., investigators became suspicious about Susan Smith's story when elements of her tale failed to hold together. She said, for example, that she had been shopping at K mart before the "carjacking" incident, yet no one at K mart could recall seeing her there."

"The investigators hardly need to trek to K mart to know that something was off in Smith's claim. Just based upon a knowledge of normal human behavior, they should have been skeptical, and perhaps they were. What kind of parent would abandon her children in such circúmstances? Even threats from an armed gunman would fail to budge most people. There are things more valuable than life itself. For most of us, the lives of our children are first on the list."

"Moreover, stranger abduction is actually quite rare. Despite the impression given by those pictures of children on milk cartons, only a tiny percentage of the kids who are reported missing each year are actu-


