Here are some of the adapted varieties of vegetable seed that go into the ground early. A suggestion or

Alaska English peas is the variety to plant first. Little Marvel germinates when soil is warm. Inoculate peas with nitrogen vacteria for better stands and growth.

Scarlet Globe, Chartiers, and

White Icicle radishes are good varieties. Radishes sown with Nantes and Danvers Half Long carrots will help the carrots come through the soil. The same trick works with Crosby Egyptian and Detroit Dark Red Beets. Another beet "getter-upper" is to soak the seed overnight

planting. New York No. 12 and Iceberg are head varieties of lettuce. Cool weather is needed to make lettuce head. Black Seeded Simpson is a good leaf





Tate) ranch, which country was thinly settled, back in sixty-five - at the close of the Civil war. Her parents had negroes who refused to leave them after they were freed. She remembers the old negro mammy telling ghostly stories at night. This was against the parent's rules, but the Tate children would slip out to the negro cabin and sit tense for hours listening to the wierd stories - becoming so frightened they were afraid to go back in the dark. In those early childhood days, the negro woman did the laundry by taking the soiled clothes to a spring nearby, where they had a pine log split in two and set up on pegs. The negro would 'battle' the clothers with a "battling stick" to get them clean.

They knew of no cook-stoves in that age. The family cooking was done on a large fire-place, with Dutch ovens, griddle pans and iron pots, or kettles which hung from the top of the fire-place, with a fire built under them for boiling. No one had heard of ground coffee for sale. Peaberry coffee was bought green. It was parched, then ground in a small mill nailed to the wall of the cook room - which was usually built out away from the house. The first ground coffee they ever bought was Arbuckle's, and the signatures from the package were saved, to secure various premiums.

"Clothes were made at home, from start to finish," said Mrs. Whitener. The old-time spinning wheel was an important part of every household. They spun the thread and wove it into cloth for all garments.

Another interesting feature of those times was the transportation methods which were slow and over untrodden trails. Tar-pole, homemade wagons, drawn by oxen, yoked together by huge wooden yokes, was the prevailing mode of travel. The axles of these wagons were made of seasoned hickory wood. A bucket of tar was hung on the coupling-pole, and if the wagon began squeaking, it was stopped and the tar was applied

DON'T PLOW UP YOUR GAS LINE

The gas company is responsible only for the delivery of gas at "the mouth of the meter."

Paragraph nine, of our contract with you, provides that, "The consumer is liable to pay for all gas passing through the meter, whether used or wasted, through leaks in pipes, apparatus or otherwise."

We have heretofore been very tolerant in cases of this kind, and expect to continue so. But on account of labor shortage, you are going to find it hard to get your line repaired just when you want it, in case you plow it up, it is not our responsibility, and we have more than we can do most of the time.

If you own your own premises, see that your gas line is buried at least 18 to 24 inches, otherwise, heat and cold causing contraction and expansion, will gradually work your gas line to the top of the ground.

In many cases where lines were buried deep, wind and water have shifted the top soil and exposed them.

Since starting our victory garden program, we are plowing up patches around our houses which were never plowed before. Few of the gas lines in Wheeler are buried deep enough.

If you have recently moved to a rented place, or bought a new home, don't turn a man or boy loose on your premises with a plow, without showing him where the gas line is. If you do not know where it is, have him take a shovel and locate it before he starts plowing.


If the line is buried shallow, have it buried deep, or never plow across the line.



No sugar ration stamps will be validated for canning sugar. All allotments will be made directly by local ration boards.
